work you would have expected to be done by a servant in one of the departments.

"If I had known what it was before hand perhaps I would have refused to do it, I think I would."

As for the typewriting done for Mr. Stratton, the latter explained to Mr. Ford that his own typewriter was busy. What Mr. Ford thought of that explanation he did not say. To the people in the court room it seemed only natural that Mr. Stratton should not call his busy typewriter away from such a triviality as the preparation of the Globe interview, and the typewriting of what is known as the Aylesworth letter.

"Didn't touch me," says Frank Sullivan smiling and jaunty as when he first walked into the witness box, young Frank Sullivan slipped down and out just before 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon. He beamed joyously on the array of counsel thru which he passed, reached for his hat and coat and walked to the other side of the court room. R. R. Gamey happened to be going the same way at the same time. Sullivan turned at the side corridor just in time to be bumped into by Gamey. They looked at each other but did not embrace, in fact they did not speak. They had been staring each other all morning, one in the box, the other on the floor of the court room. Sullivan had hung back statement upon statement on Gamey.

Became Quite Dramatic. In a highly dramatic manner he had referred to one of Gamey's assertions as a lie, and as he did so his hands were clenched more nervously than ever and his lips made nervous movements vertical and horizontal. The examination by Mr. Blake had been mild, and the cross-examination by E. P. B. Johnston was milder. Sullivan between everything that affected the honor of Hon. J. R. Stratton.

Sullivan's Contradictions. Here you sample of Frank Sullivan's style of contradiction: "You say as a fact that you never got any money from this man at all?" "No, I never got a cent from him."

"From Mr. Stratton?" "Never."

"From Mr. Gamey?" "Never."

"Did Myers bring any money to Chase that you knew of?" "No."

"Did Chase bring anything to the smoking room?" "No."

Mr. Johnston took the witness thru the piano factory interview, very carefully and very gingerly. Sullivan declared that in nearly every instance Gamey initiated the subjects of conversation. He still claimed that the whole thing was rehearsed carefully gone over before by Gamey and himself.

FRANK SULLIVAN AGAIN.

Proceedings Begin With Star Witness for the Defence in Box.

When the examination of Frank Sullivan was resumed yesterday morning he was asked to produce the letter or copy of the resignation he wrote. He could not, but testified that he did not confer with anyone about resigning, but did so on his own volition when the Gamey hurricane swept into the Chamber March 11, tho his resignation was not filed until the following day.

The Globe interview, in which Gamey had pledged to support the government, he had first seen in Mr. Stratton's office. Gamey and the Globe man were at a table with the paper between them on which it was written. That was the day it was given out, and he knew it was going to be done, because Gamey

had told him. He had telephoned Gamey that Stratton would see him at 2.15, and Gamey had told him, while going to lunch, that he had an interview with him but which he was to make some corrections in. It was between 6 and 7 in the evening when Gamey finally came out of Stratton's office, and the interview had just been handed to the reporter. In closing the examination, Mr. Blake asked the witness if all he had sworn to was true, and he said: "Certainly."

On Cross-Examination. The cross-examination was quite thorough. It went over all the ground covered by Sullivan during his six hours in the witness-box, and the general tendency was to make strong the contention that whatever his relations with Gamey were they were purely personal and did not represent the government or any of the Ministers. He said he received \$2 a day as government clerk, and was not anxious to hold the position, especially after the charges were made; therefore, he had resigned. Manitoulin was a new district, and in answer to Mr. Johnston's suggestion, said all new districts required a certain amount of government assistance, which the older districts do not get. Gamey had assured him when he talked with him that he did not want to be a mere voting machine, such as would be necessary if he supported the opposition. Gamey had suggested deals to the witness. He declared Gamey's statements about the division of spoils a falsehood. It was the Manitoulin man who was after him to get his influence in having the contest proceedings dismissed.

Sullivan denied that he had told Gamey evidence could be bought, switched or fixed. He had complained to him in writing of the alleged patronage of the district after he had promised to support the government. He further declared that all correspondence with Gamey had not been produced, and that he had a deal on written concerning some public work, and H. H. Collier of St. Catharines wanted to buy it.

Had Written Others. He had also written W. R. Smyth, M.L.A. of Algoma, on the same matter. Letters were read from Collier to Sullivan, relating to the matter about Sept. 11, also one to Gamey of the same character, the latter signed by Frank Sullivan. He was asked if he had destroyed an agreement with Gamey, by which Gamey was to receive \$2000 in his support, or any other sum. Sullivan denied emphatically that he had ever received any money from Gamey, Stratton, Myers or Chase. Every detail of the Gamey story relating to the bribery feature he denied. As to patronage, Gamey had told him he had asked for an appointment for his brother.

This concluded Sullivan's evidence.

FRANK FORD CALLED.

Postmistress on the Stand. Miss Sarah Dobson, postmistress at Yorkville, was the first witness called yesterday afternoon session. She was called to prove the postage of the registered letter from Mr. Sullivan to Mr. Gamey, as testified by Mr. Gamey and Mr. Sullivan. Her evidence was that she had received several books all tied with pink ribbon, she was not called to produce the books, but she was asked to produce the letters. Her assistant made the entries.

George T. Bartlett, paying teller of the Ontario Bank, who was on the stand when the commission adjourned at noon, was recalled.

Witnesses handed Mr. Ritchie the book entries and accounts found in a volume which was in his possession. This technical evidence was tedious, and in no way startling.

ALONG THE WATER FRONT

Disatisfaction with regard to shunting across the foot of Yonge-street is not lessened. The cars still hunt to and fro and succeed in rendering the passage to the boat 'no thoroughfare' at most inconvenient moments. The fire of the delayed pedestrian is daily brought to a white heat. The only persons who view a stoppage with outward calm and apparent equanimity are the hired wagons who sit on the boxes of their appearance of philosophical reflection.

Still Another Scheme? While the matter of the Yonge-street bridge is in abeyance new solutions of the crossing problem are continually offered. It is universally conceded by shippers that the closing Mr. Young street would be a costly matter for them and would cause much more hauling than necessary. They agree that heavy traffic would rather go a long way round than use a bridge. One of the latest schemes that have been talked about on the street, but one that no one can be found to father, is a bridge starting from Front-street, immediately west of the main Customs House building. The idea is that if it track it could be made much shorter, and so could be constructed at less expense. It is also urged that this scheme would do away with the necessity for filling in Yonge-street slip, and would so entail no outlay for the reconstruction of the wharves from that point east. One objection is that it would render necessary the cutting away of a part of the Customs express department.

Mr. Marks of Port Arthur will place the steamer A. J. Tyrone on the route from Thebeson to Sault Ste. Marie, and during the months of July and August will carry passengers between Sault Ste. Marie and Desbarats. The work of fitting out the steamer will be commenced at once.

Capt. Crangle, president of the Chicago and St. Lawrence Navigation Co., has received a letter from James E. Dewar of the Province, saying that the new boat that was built here steers like a yacht, and is in every particular. The company is having another splendid boat built at Collingwood. This last will be 385 feet in length and is being built by the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company.

Capt. William Bemrose of Collingwood was in town yesterday. He formerly sailed the Carmona on the Soo-Cleveland line. This is the boat which afterwards became the lumber barge, recently sold to the Detroit Savings Bank. Captain Bemrose is on his way to the Soo, where he has been ordered to command the steamer King Edward, one of Clergue's new boats on the Soo-Toronto line.

The schooner Scott-Bird, which wintered in the Scott-street slip, was towed round to the repair yards yesterday. The yacht Electra, which has been lying in the same slip is also undergoing the process of refitting.

Poor Outlook for Schooners. Chicago, April 24.—Fair weather and favorable winds on Lake Michigan lead owners of sailing craft to order their vessels to enter the port. Within two days, it is expected forty schooners, that wintered at Chicago, will have left port on their return.

Reports from other Lake Michigan ports indicate that the resumption of business among the schooners is general, and that fifty schooners will leave their winter quarters at once. Most of the craft will enter the lumber trade, trading between northern ports, Milwaukee and Chicago.

Chicago River tugs are having hard work keeping up with the demand for their services, and schooners are being taken to the lake from river docks as fast as possible. For a month, it is believed, the sailing craft will be confined to Lake Michigan. The demand for their services, during the winter, has opened this season lighter than ever. Indications are that rates will be low, and that owners of schooners will have a hard time making both ends meet.

FRENCH RIVER PROMOTER'S VIEW. Declares Mr. Tarte's Policy Does Injustice to That Project.

Editor World: As a promoter of the French River improvement for transportation purposes and author of the famous transportation map presented by him to parliament last year, Mr. Tarte has squarely placed himself on record, and doubtless upon the merits of his proposition, is willing to be adjudged and accepted or rejected as an authority upon transportation matters. The subject which he has accepted by which our country and commerce shall obtain economic transportation, is the French River project.

The endorsement of his proposition and expenditure thereon of indeterminate millions by parliament has been sought. The cartage of the French River project and continuation across Lake Nipissing to North Bay would but establish an eighty-mile artificial channel, which is known and regarded by practical men and mariners as 'slack water,' the saving of which would necessitate the checking down of a steamship from her normal speed in free open lake to the speed of a tug in such a channel; compensation for the speed thus lost would be estimated in her charges for the transportation of her cargo; the operating expenses of a steamship may be measured by days, hours or minutes, and exclusive of any contingency which might arise causing special insurance, the expense and time of a ship consumed in navigating that eighty-mile artificial channel in and out from North Bay at a minimum would equal three-eighths of one cent, per bushel upon a North Bay cargo in excess of that by the same ship sailing direct to any port upon Georgian Bay; therefore, the commercial utility or value of the French River project would prove a negative quantity.

New York City.—The strike of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers against the American Bridge Company has been officially declared off.

Butte, Mont.—The local Western Union telegraph office has closed down on account of a strike since noon, and the C.P.R. trackmen have been working for some time past with some extra men.

Wilson, the president of the International Trackmen's Union, was in town, has been seen by Mr. McNeill, the general manager of the C.P.R., in regard to its renewal.

Certain increases are asked for, and modifications of original terms, but there is no thought of trouble, and, indeed, so far the attitude seems to be like the usual routine when the committee representing a particular order goes over the ground with the management in regard to the needs of the men affected. All the trackmen in Canada, it would appear, are asking for better terms.

MANITOBA SUES FOR LAND

Ottawa, April 24.—(Special).—Mr. Justice Burleigh held a session of the Exchequer Court to-day to hear the case of the Province of Manitoba vs. the Dominion of Canada.

By the Dominion act of 1880 all swamp lands in the province were transferred to the government of Manitoba for its use and benefit.

This act was assented to by his Excellency the Governor-General July 20, 1885. The province claims that from that date the Crown in right of the Dominion was trustee for the Crown in right of the province.

These swamp lands, by order of the Governor-General-in-Council are directed to be set off to the province by a swamp land commission, but the practice has been for the Department of the Interior to administer these lands until so set off as if they were the property of the Dominion.

The province claims rents and profits, amounting in round figures to \$150,000. The M. Daly, K.C., and Dr. Travers Lewis acted for Manitoba, and E. L. Newcome, K.C., for Canada.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Chandler P. Anderson of New York has been appointed assistant counsel for the United States in the presentation of its case to the joint commission, which will consider the Alaskan boundary question.
