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A CONFEDERACY OF FEDERATIONS.

There are times when our political ideas run more rapidly than our blood courses, and our political aspirations are often gourd of a night; when, however, we seek to express them in words that we have, or find or coin new ones to suit them, we are hampered at every corner and forced to use phrases that are cumbersome, roundabout, and ill-fitted at that. There is not the same elasticity in our dictionary that there is in our mind, and the rapid march of events these days brings out the fact. Let us explain our view by a few examples:

The term "Great Britain" applies to the island embracing England and Scotland. The Morning Post and The Standard touch lightly upon the unpleasant features of the despatch and take hope from the projected night attack, but all things considered, the despatch looks like preparation for worse news.

When we come to the people of our Empire we are badly hampered in the terms available. The widest term, "subjects of Her Majesty Queen Victoria," includes black and white: Europeans, Asiatics, Australians, Africans, Americans, Caucasians, Malays, Negroes; English, Scotch, Irish, Canadian, Australian; Egyptian, Turk, Greek, etc. A "Canadian" means one thing in Ontario and another in Quebec. The term "Anglo-Saxon," or "Saxon," has no exact value. It applies equally to the people of the United States, "Colonial" means anything "British" and "British" have a score of significations. The phrase "English-speaking people" or "English-tongued" includes the people of the United States and must be taken up. Already Canada, which has led in many things for the consolidation and growth of the Empire, and was the first to apply the principle of federation, has given notice that at the next session of the Dominion Parliament the question of Canada's status in the Empire will be raised in connection with the sending of the Canadian contingents to South Africa. Canada is ready to stand by the Motherland in no uncertain way; but her public men, who are well up in the problems of Greater Britain and have successfully applied the federal principle to Canadian affairs, will expect some kind of declaration from the public men of the Motherland. The Canadians will, as a matter of fact, come very near suggesting a Confederacy of Federations. And the first of our fellow-countrymen resident in the British Isles, who has seen the significance of this idea, appears to be Dr. Conan Doyle, who is reported in the cable despatches to-day as saying that a monument should be erected to Paul Kruger in London, with this inscription: "To the memory of the man who federated the British Empire."

I agree with Conan Doyle; Kruger is the Man of Destiny, who has done more to solve a great problem than any other man. But he didn't know he was doing it. And coming back to our first idea, that of the rapidity of our political thoughts and the slower process of their realization, it is yet an astounding fact that there is less than a span of twenty-seven years between Edward Blake's vision of Imperial Federation in the little Canadian town of Aurora and the consummation of it by Paul Kruger in his ultimatum, issued in the South African Dutch capital of Pretoria last October.

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MACRUM HAS BEEN FIRED BY PRESIDENT M'KINLEY

The Ex-U. S. Consul to Be Received as a Private Citizen and State Department Will Avoid All Embarrassment of His Being a Boer Emissary.

Washington, Jan. 23.—The State Department has removed Charles E. Macrum, recently consul at Pretoria, and who was presumably to remain in the United States consular service until he had made a final report and settled his accounts with the Government.

It was announced at the State Department to-day that Mr. Macrum's connection with the consular service ceased when he was supplanted by young Mr. Hay. The State Department declares that this is usual. It is not. A consular officer who asks to be removed from one post, and whose request is granted, remains in the consular service until formally dismissed, but under ordinary circumstances Mr. Macrum would have received an appointment to some other post.

The only explanation that can be offered for the dismissal of Mr. Macrum is found in the report that he is bearing a serious disposition from President Kruger to the Government and to the President of France, Act of Friendship for Great Britain. The summary disposition made of Mr. Macrum is decidedly due to the State Department's desire to maintain a friendly disposition toward Great Britain, the President Kruger and the President of France. The authorities have succeeded in establishing a practically impervious censorship against either telegraphic or mail matter from the South African Republic.

It is said here that President Kruger, unable to communicate with the United States, or the rest of the outside world, except thru secret couriers and spies, asked Mr. Macrum to bring to the United States the formal appeal of the Dutch Republic for mediation by this Government.

And it is also said at the State Department that Mr. Macrum really left Pretoria, not because of any friction with President Kruger or any fear for the safety of himself and his bride, but because he desired to bring out from the frontlines of the Transvaal a message directed to the world in general, and to the United States in particular; and the State Department, hearing

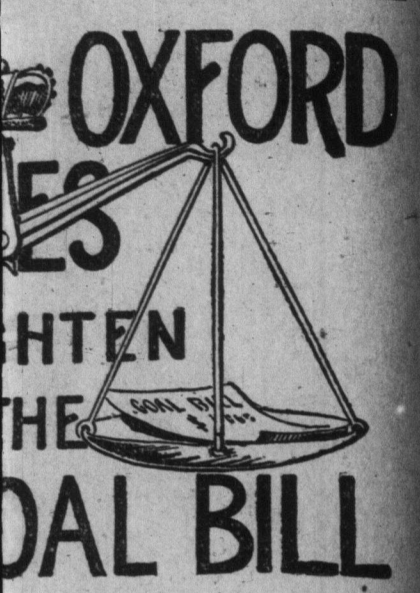

CARDINAL NOW ON TRIAL.

Grand Jury Brought in a True Bill and Evidence Was Taken.

The grand jury of the Criminal Assize Court yesterday afternoon found a true bill against Cardinal Archbishop Manning, charged with attempting to murder another prisoner named John Hughes on Dec. 1st.

Cardinal was committed for trial by Magistrate Denison earlier in the day. The only Crown witnesses examined were Hughes and Sgt. Lyons of the Central Prison. The former testified that when he went to his cell on the night of the crime he was attacked by Cardinal, who was attacked by revenge because Hughes had reported him for some misconduct.

The victim's father is also an inmate of the institution. They were sent from Lindsay as vagrants. Cardinal, who is 23 years of age, was committed at Ottawa for theft.

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REAPATRIATION OF THE HUNDRETH.

Change of Name to "The 100th Prince of Wales Royal Canadian Regiment."

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Following a report to the Dominion Cabinet by Hon. Dr. Borlase, Minister of Militia, who considers the time opportune for the consideration of the proposal to re-appoint the 100th Prince of Wales' Royal Canadian Regiment, an ordinance-Council, a copy of which has been sent to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, has been passed, providing:

That the name of the regiment now known as "The Prince of Wales' Royal Canadian Regiment," with its depot at R.R. Ireland, designated as the "100th Prince of Wales' Royal Canadian Regiment."

That the Imperial regimental system be continued, and that the 100th Prince of Wales' Royal Canadian Regiment be transferred to Halifax, Nova Scotia.

That one battalion of the regiment be stationed in Halifax, N.S., and the other in the British Isles, under the command of the Empress, the battalions taking turn and turn about to serve abroad.

That recruits for the regiment be enlisted in cities and towns of the 12 militia districts, and that the 100th Prince of Wales' Royal Canadian Regiment be organized as follows:

1. That when upon re-appointment of the regiment, the depot shall be Kingston Military College, and from officers of the Canadian militia, who possess the qualifications required for admission to the Imperial service.

2. That the distinctive uniform asked for in the petition to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales in the month of August, N.S., and the words "Royal Canadian," together with the Imperial crest, be embodied in the worsted on blue shoulder straps, edged with white.

3. That original distinctive national emblems, mottoes, etc., emblematic of his Majesty the King, be granted to the regiment, and that they be borne on the colors, uniforms and appointments of the regiment.

4. That non-commissioned officers and privates of the regiment be drafted out of a nucleus of the regiment, and corps with the exception of a nucleus of the regiment, to be met as drill instructors, etc.

FROM COLLINGWOOD TO TORONTO.
Application Will be Made at Ottawa for the Incorporation of a New Carrying Company.

Application will be made at the next session of the Dominion Government for an act to incorporate a company, with all the necessary powers to construct, operate and maintain a line of lines of railway from Collingwood to Toronto, and also to maintain a fleet of vessels to run between Toronto and the River St. Lawrence.

Mr. William Mortimer Clark, Q.C., is the solicitor for the applicants, the names of whom have not yet been made known. Mr. Clark says there is plenty of money in the company, which is composed of financial men. The new railway will do a grand carrying business, especially between the Northwest and Toronto, and the seaboard will be covered by way of steamships.

Mr. Clark says the company will establish elevators at this port for storage purposes. From Toronto the grain will be carried to Montreal and other Eastern ports by a fleet of freighters. If the charter is granted, the work of building the railroad and the boats will be commenced at once.

CASWELL TAKES A FIRM STAND IN HIS STARKING PROPOSAL!

City Solicitor Says Engineer Rust Has, Under the Agreement, No Supervision Over the Toronto Railway System.

Controllers Afraid to Follow the Mayor in His Efforts to Get Justice for the People—Mayor Suggests a Second System in Toronto to Give the Citizens Proper Accommodation, but the Controllers Stand Out—Frame Talks About a "Bluff"—Rust Says the Company Ignores Him.

"I'm sorry to see you late," said Controller Sheppard yesterday morning as the Mayor entered the Board of Control one minute late. Aid. Frame was still absent.

"I want to draw your attention to section 30 of the Street Railway agreement," said the Mayor. "The Solicitor is coming in."

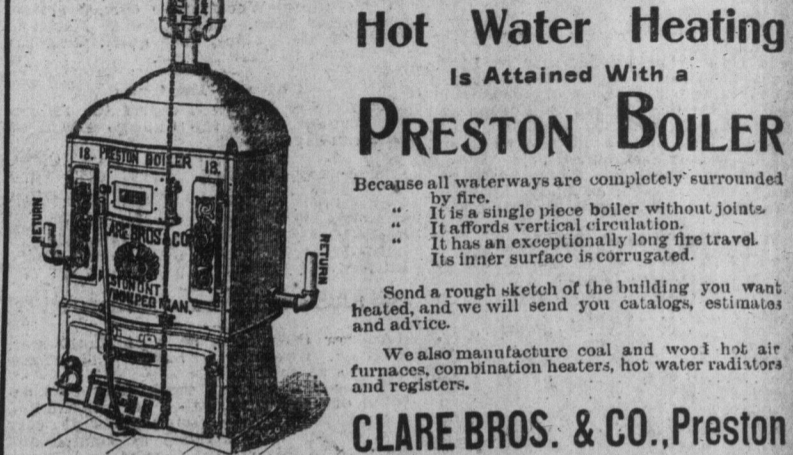
