Commencement of the Seasons.

Spring commences March 21. Autumn commences Sept. 23. Winter commences Decr. 21 Mean obliquity of the Ecliptic, January 1st, 1855—23° 27' 28".65.

Eclipses.

In the year 1855 there will be four Eclipses—two of the Sun and two of the Moon, viz. :—

I.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, May 1st and 2nd—visible at Halifax, as follows:—

Middle of the Eclipse, 4. 3h. 16m.

IV —A partial Eclipse of the Sun, November 9, 1855—visible only in South Australia and the South Pacific Ocean.

Morning and Evening Stars.

VENUS will be an Evening Star till the 26th September, and then a Morning Star till the end of the year.

Mars will be an Evening Star till the 11th April, and then a Morning Star till the end of the year.

JUPITER will be an Evening Star till the 3rd February, and then a Morning Star till 20th of August; then an Evening Star till the end of the year.

SATURN will be an Evening Star till the 10th of June, and then a Morning Star till the 17th of December.

The Weather.

The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, is to midnight, the fairer will be the weather during the seven following days.

The nearer to midday or noon, these phases happen: the more foul or wet the weather may be expected during the seven following days.

Length of night equal to double of the rising of the Sun; length of lay equal to double of the setting of the Sun.

The following signs are used in our Almanac to denote the different positions and phases of the moon. D denotes the moon in the first quadrature; that is, the quadrature between change and fall; (denotes the moon in the last quadrature; that is, the quadrature between fall and change. O denotes new moon. denotes fall moon.

When viewed through a telescope, the surface of the moon appears wonderfully diversified. Large dark spots, supposed to be excavaions or valleys, are visible to the eye; some parts also appear more ucid than the general surface. These are ascertained to be mountains, by the shadows which they cast. Maps of the moon's surface ave been drawn, on which most of these valleys and mountains are delineated, and names are given to them. Some of these excavations are thought to be 4 miles deep and 40 wide. A high ridge generally surrounds them, and often a mountain rises in the centre. These immense depressions probably very much resemble what would be the appearance of the earth at the moon, were all the seared lakes dried up. Some of the mountains are supposed to be volucine.

Astronomical.

Owing to what is termed the "Procession of the Equinoxes," which equals a recession of the equinoctial points of about 50" of : degree westward every year, opposite to the sun's annual progressive motion. The astronomical year is now opened by Pisces; Aries who formerly led, having passed more than 30° to the eastward of the point where the equinoctial cuts the ecliptic. By preceeding to shif a whole degree every 72 years, and a whole sign every 2160 years the equinoctial points will continue to fall back through the whole line of the twelve signs, and returns to the same points again in 25.920 years, which number of years completes the grand celestial period

Astronomical.

The sun is a spherical body, situated near the centre of gravity of the system of planets of which our earth is one. Its diameter is 877,547 English miles; which is equal to 100 diameters of the earth: and, therefore, his cubic magnitude must exceed that of the earth one million of times. It revolves around its axis in 25 days and 10 hours I'his has been ascertained by means of several dark spots which have been seen with telescopes on its surface. Dr. Herschel supposed the greater number of spots on the sun to be mountains; some of which he estimated to be 300 miles in height,

Astronomical.

The planets may be distinguished from the stars by their sleady light; while the stars appear to twinkle. The planets, likewise. seem to change their relative places in the heavens, while those uminous bodies which are called fixed stars appear to preserve the

The sun, the moon, the planets, and the fixed stars, which appear to us so small, are supposed to be large worlds, of various sizes, and at different but immense distances from us. The reason that they ap pear to us so small is, that on account of their immense distances they are seen under a small angle of vision.

Astronomical.

Mercury is the nearest planet to the sun, and is seldom seen; because his vicinity to the sun occasions his being lost in the brilliancy of the sun's rays. The intenseness of the sun's heat, which is in the same proportion as its light, is seven times greater in Mercury than on the earth; so that the water there would be carried off in the shape of steam : for, by experiments made with a thermometer, it appears that a heat seven times greater than that of the sun's beams in summer, will make water boil.

The most obvious fact in relation to the moon, is that its disk is constantly changing its appearance, sometimes only a semicircular edge being illuminated, while the rest is dark; at another time, the whole surface appearing resplendent.

Jupiter is the largest planet of the solar system, and the most brilliant, except Venus. The heat and light at Jupiter is about 25 times less than that at the earth. This planet is attended by four moons, or satellites; the shadows of some of which are occasionally visible apon his surface. The distance of those satellites from the planet are two, four, six, and twelve hundred thousand miles, nearly. nearest revolves around the planet in less than two days; the next in less than four days; the third in less than eight days; and the fourth in about sixteen days.

Saturn is distinguished from the other planets by being encompassed by two large, luminous rings. They reflect the sun's light in the same manner as his moons. entirely detached from each other and from the body of the planet. They turn on the same axis with the planet, and in nearly the same time. The edge of these rings is constantly at right angles with the axis of the planet.

Astronomical.

Uranus, the third in size, is the most remote of all the old planets. It is scarcely visible to the naked eye. The light and heat at Uranus are about 360 times less than that at the earth. This planet was formerly considered a small star; but Dr. Herschel, in 1781, discovered, from its motion, that it is a planet. Uranus is attended by six moons, or satellites, all of which were discovered by Dr. Herschel; and all of them revolve in orbits nearly perpendicular to that of the planet. Their motion is apparently retrograde; but this is probably an optical illusion, arising from the difficulty of ascertaining which part of their orbit inclines towards the earth, and which declines from it.

The discovery of Herschel completely verified their opinions, and shows the extreme nicety with which astronomers observe the motions of planets.

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Commissioners of Streets.

By an act to amend chapter 64 of the Revised Statutes, entitled, " Of Commissioners of Streets"-passed the 31st March, 1853-it is provi-

1. The Court of General Sessions are hereby empowered to set off, by limits, districts within their counties; and three Commissioners of Streets shall be appointed for each district, in manner following: The Grand Jury shall recommend six persons resident in such district, of whom the Sessions shall select three, one of whom shall annually retire in the order in which his name stands on the recommendation list, handed in by the Grand Jury; and upon such retirement, two other residents shall be recommended in like manner, one of whom shall be selected by the Sessions to supply the vacancy by such retirement; and in case of the death, continued absence, or refusal to serve, of any such three Commissioners, a Special Sessions may fill up such vacancy, subject to the confirmation of the Grand Jury and General Sessions, at their next meeting.; and any person appointed under this act, who, after notice of such appointment, shall refuse or neglect to be sworn into office, shall forfeit and pay a fine of two pounds.

2. The Sessions, in setting off districts, may include within their limits, any bridge now or hereaster to be built over any brook, stream, or river, dividing any districts or townships; and may place such bridge, or any part thereof, under the harge of the Commissioners having supervision

3. Upon being sworn to the faithful discharge of their duty, all the provisions of chapter sixty-four of the Revised Statutes, except so much thereof as is hereby repealed, shall apply to the Commissioners to be

4. Commissioners now appointed shall retire in the order they would have done had this act not passed, and the vacancies be supplied under

5. Sections one, two, three and four, of chapter sixty-four of the Revised Statutes, are hereby repealed.

6. This act shall not apply to the city of Halifax.

Regulations for the office of Superintendent of Streets.

1. The Superintendent's Clerk shall now be appointed by the Council to hold office until the 15th October; removable, however, at pleasure. His salary is fixed at present at the rate of One Hundred Pounds per

2. The Superintendent's Salary is fixed for the present at Two Hundred Pounds per aunum.

3. The office of the Superintendent shall be kept in the City Building in such apartments as the Mayor directs.

4. The office shall be open from 11 a. m. to 3 p. m. daily every week

day, except public holidays.

5. The Clerk shall attend there at all times, during office hours, except when actually engaged outside on duties herein prescribed for him. 6. The Clerk shall prepare and serve all notices for Labour, and all sub-

sequent notices, demanding penalties, and commutations thereof.

7. The Clerk shall do all necessary writing and copying the Superintendent may require of him in executing his duries, in preparing estimates, making up accounts and returns, preparing reports or correspondence and otherwise; and in all respects give his aid in the indoor duties of the department as far as possible.

8. A time table shall be kept in a book, where the daily work shall be

entered of all labour performed by citizens as Statute Labour, and by men hired, specifying the names of each person working, and where he is em

ployed from day to day, and, if hired, the rate of wages.

9. The Clerk shall also keep a time table for each Ward of the Statute Labour performed, and a similar table of hired Labour, and shall annually make up the gross amount of Statute Labour for each Ward, and an account debiting the City Treasurer with the notices served for penalties or commutations.

10. The following Books shall be kept in the office of the Superintendent, viz.: a pass book for materials, book, &c., purchased, in which there shall be a column for date, and for description and number or quantity of

articles.

A Register of encroachments in the City, whether by drains, side-paths,

buildings or otherwise.

A Register of all plans and full statements concerning the same, of sewers, drains and slips, with record of all surveys of old, new, or unfinished drains or roads.

Plans of Property and Slips.

11. A Letter Book of correspondence and notifications. All books and papers so directed to be kept in the office, shall be at all times open to inspection by the members of the City Council.

12. A Committee of the Aldermen shall be appointed until the 1st October next, who shall assist the Superintendent in perfecting the duties and

management of the office.

13. That the weekly labour report of the Superintendent made up by the Clerk be submitted to the Mayor, who shall draw a check for the amount; and the payment of the workmen to be made in the office of the

Superintendent.

14. The Clerk shall, from time to time, ascertain what persons notified have failed to perform their Statute Labour, and shall, at the expiration of ten days, as appointed by law, serve them with notices to pay the commutation to the Treasurer, and shall furnish the Treasurer with the names and amounts in such notices,—and shall from time to time ascertain at the Treasurer's office, what persons have failed in paying such commutation; and the Clerk shall be bound to transmit from time to time, lists of such persons so defaulting in payment for ten days after service of notice to the Clerk of the Mayor's Court, with the sums due by each, and ten per cent. added in a separate sum, in order that the amounts so due may be put in suit without delay.

15. All such notices to work shall be signed by the Superintendent, and

the subsequent notices for the payment by the City Treasurer.

16. The Superintendent is not to enter into any Contract or undertaking involving expense and outlay of money or labour, to the extent of Five Pounds or upwards, unless with the written approval of the Mayor.

[The majority of the Council for 1854-5, have decided to have two Superintendents instead of one. The amount of Statute Labour up to November was about £1400—cash £1000, labour £400, and a balance due the city.]

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The Patrons of our Periodical will very reasonably expect some, however meagre, statistics in the matter of POPULAR EDUCATION. We regret that official documents-Educational Reports-enable us to

meet this requirement very superficially.

The "REPORT" of Mr. Charles Dennison Randall, one of the two Inspectors of Schools, presented to the Legislature in its session 1854, informs us that : "The state of the Schools in our country is a matter of so much notoriety that it seems almost superfluous to refer to it." "Atendance is very irregular," which is attributed to "two causes-the one that parents generally attach but little value to education; the other, that teachers are in most cases so unqualified for their business that it admits of a question whether the benefit resulting from attending School is (be?) proportionate to the expense." Supposing the Inspector to have daubed on the "red" with a heavy hand rather, we fear that much truth lies beneath."

Mr. Randall, with a gallantry, if not discrimination, most creditable, resents the insult "generally" perpetrated upon women, as teachers;

and is of opinion that in Nova Scotia we might advantageously follow the example set in Boston, where, "of 22,000 children, attending Schools, 18,000 are instructed by females."

Mr. R. discusses a variety of other topics in connection with his allimportant subject; but too much at large to admit of even a synopsis

adapted to the measure of our Almanack.

An examination of the "Tables" reveals some of the facts which may prove of utility. Thus it appears that:
"Digby yields a larger support from the people for teachers than any

ther part of the Province." "That the average duration of Schools is greatest in Western Hants." "That Annapolis furnishes the greater number of Common Schools

teaching the higher branches."

"Yarmouth and Eastern Halifax are the only two districts which report

in improvement in "School Furniture."

"King's, Western Hants, Digby and Yarmonth, enjoy the honor of having increased the salaries of their teachers during the year 1853-54."

An " Abstract of the state of Education in the Counties of Victoria, Cape Breton, Richmond, Guysboro', Sydney, Inverness, and S. District of Pictou"-furnishes but a melancholy detail. Thus: In 33 Schools. County of Victoria, having 518 pupils present, when visited, we learn that mly 63! could "read with ease," 249 could read "simple lessons," and 206 were not "able to read at all." Ex uno disce.

There is one passage in the concluding remarks of Mr. Inspector H. Munro, which we shall reproduce, commending it to the perusal and serious consideration of our patrons, entirely concurring ourselves in the soundness

of the views propounded.

" Some means must be employed to raise the remuneration of the educators of youth, from being, what it is at present, below that of a day laborer, to one worthy of a liberal and learned profession. The remuneration claimed is such as will enable the profession permanently to command an adequate number of the most suitable persons, and enable them to maintain an average rank in society, live and labour in their vocation with minds free from pressing worldly anxieties, and therefore able to devote themselves unreservedly to their important duties as educators.

"While the country is so thinly peopled, and the population so scattered, it is necessary that all should unite in supporting the schools, in order to have even second rate teachers; but all do not unite. In almost every district there are some ignorant and unreasonable individuals, whose opposition is never wanting, so that under existing circumstances, gene rally speaking, the few who are willing to educate their children must take the whole burden upon themselves. The consequence is that they cannot afford to keep a good teacher; they look out for one who will come for whatever they are able to promise. My conviction is strong and gaining strength every day, that the only effective remedy for this state of things, is the increase of the present provincial allowance to common school education, and the immediate introduction of general and compulsory assessment for the balance. Until this plan is adopted by the Legis lature, never will education flourish in the country; but let it once be introduced, and the object is so far gained. Well filled schools, regular attendance, and suitable progress, will invariably be the result."

From the most reliable data to which we have had access, we feel ourselves warranted in concluding that not more than one child in every five, above the age of four years, is in attendance upon School; nor is there much apparent probability of any improvement until a system of

compulsory assessment be the Law of the Land.

The above balls, &c., are hoisted at the east or west yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in.

When the Vessels are reported from an Outpost, the following Signals are shewn under the yard-arm as repeats:

For a square rigged vessel, two balls of a size—one at the outer, the other at the inner haulyard, close up.

A Ship—a large ball at the end of the yard, with a small one at the inner

A Brig—a small ball at the end of the yard, and a large one at the inner haulyard.

A Brigantine—a cross close up at the outer haulyard; two or more ditto, a cross half hoisted.

The Act passed in the 16th Vic., (1853,) legalizing the opening of unworked Mines, in any section of the Province, under certain conditions, we are happy to see is not likely to remain a dead letter upon the Statute Book. The Royal Gazette of November last, contains two "Notices," regularly filed in the Provincial Secretary's office and published by authority, containing proposals from J. D. B. Fraser, of Pictou, and Hypolite Marmaud and others, to take advantage of the Act and proceed to open certain Mines unworked in the counties of Richmond and Pictou, respectively. That the increasing consumption of Coal requires some movement to increase the supply nearly one-half, admits of no doubt; and that it proceed from the application of Colonial capital and native enterprise is every way desirable. That the speculation will prove profitable, there is good reason for believing, seeing that there is no present probability that over supply will reduce the price of the article below a remunerating figure, although competition, always desirable, may tend to bring down, a trifle, at least, the present exhorbitantly high prices.

St. Peter's Canal.

Captain Barry's Report to the Government, submitted to the House of Assembly, Session 1854, is favorable to the Eastern site at St. Peter's, opposite to Handley's, which "is well protected from all winds by Jerome Point—it is a clay bottom on the bay side, and, as far as I have been able to ascertain, the subsoil is of the same material mixed with stones.

"I bored in several places, as shewn in section, but was unable to go as deep as I wished; the tools, not being sufficiently strong for the work, were constantly breaking, and were repaired with difficulty. Should there be any stone in the bottom of the autting, it will not increase the expense as the slopes would be altered to meet the contingency.

The level of the water in the Bras d'Or may be assumed at a constant height; it, however, is influenced by the wind and fluctuates irregularly. During my stay there six inches was the greastest rise and fall, but it

sometimes rises about two feet.

At St. Peter's Bay the H. W. spring tide is two feet higher than the mean level of the lake, and L. W. springs four feet lower, the ordinary springs rising six feet and neaps four feet; therefore the waters in the bay alternate from two feet to three feet above or below those in the lake. The difference of level may be as much as six feet, and therefore in the short distance of the length of the canal, viz., two thousand three hundred feet, the current would acquire such velocity as to carry away the slopes and fill up the channels in the bay, or form a bar at the entrance. It will therefore be necessary to have a lock at St. Peter's, and guard gate at Bras d'Or end. The greatest depth of cutting to bottom of canal is filty-seven feet, and will generally have thirteen feet water in it, and be navigable (except at extraordinary H. W. springs, when the St. Peter's guard gate is closed) for the passage of vessels drawing from nine feet to eleven feet six inches water.

As I am informed that the worms in the lake are very destructive to timber, I propose building the locks, &c., of brick work, with stone quoins. This can be done at a nominal price, as the clay on the spot is of such good quality that bricks can be made at about one-third of the usual selling prices; and when wheeling to spoil, the best clay may be reserved for making future bricks, draining tiles, chimney pots, &c., by the sale of which

part of the expenses of the canal may be covered.

A small steam engine will be required for pumping, &c., in the lower part of the work, which can be made available for working the crushing

and pug mills.

With a view to economy, I make the lock level, allowing nine feet of water over the mitre sill at L. W. springs, and any vessel of greater draught could wait an hour or two for the tides rising.

The dimensions proposed are as follow:

Width of canal at 10 feet deep, 20 feet.

Slopes about 1½ to 1—depth of water, 13 feet.

Width of canal at water line, 50 feet.

Lock—length, 120 feet.

"opening of gate, 22 feet.

These dimensions I consider ample for the accommodation of any vessels employed in the fisheries and coasting trade of the province.

A bridge four teet wide will be required at St. Peter's end for the convenience of foot passengers, and will be on the lock gates. Also a swing bridge ten feet wide at the lake end where the main road crosses the canal

Sable Island.

"The establishment on Sable Island is conducted satisfactorily under its present Superintendent, and is usefully answering the humane purpose for which it was founded. There have been three wrecks in the course of the past year, the crews of which were all saved. The vessels were lost -a portion of the materials of one, and nearly the whole of the materials and cargo of another, laden with provisions, from New York, were saved, and brought to Halifax by the Provincial Schooner Daring, by the freight of which, and the salvage allowed, a considerable sum in aid of the funds for the support of the establishment was earned, while the claimants of the property, to whom the net proceeds were paid, were also satisfied.-The dwelling house in which the people at the principal station lived, having been destroyed by fire, a new building had to be erected, which has been done, and which has, of course, caused additional expenditure A house has also been built on the south side of the Island, where vessels have been sometimes wrecked. Persons are placed in charge of it as a station. The house that was burnt was worth very little-that now built is much larger, and much better suited for the purposes required.—From Report of Chairman of Board of Works.

It appears by the Report before us, that two cargoes of Horses were shipped from the Island in 1853, one of 52 head, to the United States. which realized 1131.; the parties who purchased them paying cost and charges, and the usual average price at which they sell on the Island. The other cargo yielded 601 - making together, 1731. Cranberries brought from the Island in the autumn of the same year, yielded over and above the charges for sale, 1071.

The Life Boats presented to the Island, by the philanthropic Miss Dix, which were damaged in their conveyance from the States, by the wreck of the vessel that bore them, have been repaired and sent to the Island.

It is suggested in the Report, that the Daring should be sold. She requires extensive repairs, and is "not in all respects the most suitable vessel for the service," having "small capacity for freight, and often has to make two trips for wrecked goods, when one might suffice."

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2nd.—The E. extreme of the Grassy Sand Hills—see chart—latitude 43d. 59m. 05s. north. Longitude, 3d 49m. 20s. 5 E. of Halifax Dockyard tablet. 11d. 27m. 33s. 5. E. of Obs. Bastion, Quebec.

3rd -- The W. extreme of Grassy Sand Hills—see chart—latitude 43d. 56m. 52s. north. Longitude, 3d. 26m. 21s. 8. E. of Halifax Duckyard

rablet. 11d. 4m. 34s. 8 E. of Obs. Bastion, Quebec.

If we assume Halifax dockyard tablet to be in 63d. 35m. 19s. 5 west, according to Admiral Owen's determination from Cambridge Observatory, the above named points will be in 60d. 3m. 16s. 7 west, 59d. 45m. 59s. west, and 60d. 8m. 57s. west, respectively. The east extreme of the Sand Hills alone remains unchanged for comparison with the observations of Admiral's Ogle's officers; and it is satisfactory to find, that there was not only no reason to find fault with their determination, but that their latitude, and also the meridian distance from Halifax, is the same as ours, within two or three seconds of space. About two miles of the west end of the Island have been washed away since they observed in 1828; and this reduction of the Island, and consequent addition to the Western Bar, is reported to have been in operation at least since 1811, and seems almost certain to continue. A comparison some years hence with the present survey, can alone show precisely the amount of waste in any given time, the correctness or otherwise of the reported shifting of the Bars, and of the opinion that the Island is insensibly becoming narrower, &c. All agree that there has been no material change in the East end of the Island within the memory of any one acquainted with it, a circumstance of importance with reference to the selection of a site for a light house, the utility of which I now proceed to consider.

The Western Bar can be safely approached by the lead from any direc tion, with common precaution, and the West end of the Island, wasting continually by the action of the seas furnishes only an insecure site; I have therefore no hesitation in thinking a light there unnecessary for the general purposes of navigation, whilst at the same time I admit the correctness of the opinion, that a light at the West Flag Staff or Principal Establishment, would be highly useful to the Colonial vessels and fishermen that frequent the Island in annually increasing numbers. The length of the N. E. Bar has been greatly exaggerated, but it is still a most formidable danger, extending fourteen miles from the Island, to the depth of ten fathoms, and thirteen miles to six fathoms, -all within the last named depth being a line of heavy breakers in bad weather. Not far from the end of this bar, the depth amounts to one hundred and seventy fathoms. so that a vessel going moderately fast, might be on the Bar in a few minutes after trying in vain for soundings. This Bar, moreover, is very steep all along the north side, and is, on these accounts, exceedingly dan gerous. The reduction of this Bar from its reported length of twentyeight miles to its real length of fourteen miles will greatly lessen one of the objections to a light on the East end of the Island, which can be plainly seen from the end of the Bar. It is true that almost all the vessels wrecken upon the Island have come on shore in fogs, when a light could not have been seen; but, on the other hand, I was informed of one or two instances in which vessels have run ashore in clear weather, under circumstances which render it almost certain that a light might have saved them.

Scattari Island.

This Island, in length about six miles, and varying in breadth from one mile to three-fourths of a mile, lies contiguous to the east side of the Island of Cape Breton, and previously to the erection of a Light House thereupon,

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was the scene of frequented and many most disastrous shipwrecks. tween the Island the main is a channel known to coasters as the Tickel. the width, very nearly two, or quite two miles, and the water of sufficient depth to make it a convenient and safe passage for the coal-droghers, who. by taking it, are enabled to avoid the generally rough seas which they would have to encounter in doubling the south-east point of Scattari. This Island is one continuous barren rock, covered with a stunted growth of dwarfish fir and heather; it is the resort of vast flocks of birds of the Plover species and Curlew. In their annual migrations southward, numerous companies of the Eider Duck also resort to its shores, and supply the few resident fishermen with abundance of wholesome and rutritious food. Connected with the Light House is a humane provision to meet the contingency of a wreck upon the shores of the Island.

St. Paul's Island

Lies in the mouth of, and directly in the track of, ships bound up and down the Gulf of St. Lawrence. It is wonderful therefore that, many and fatal as have been the wrecks upon its precipitous cliffs, they have not been still more numerous. It is only of comparatively recent date that a Light House has been erected upon one of its most prominent points. Here, as on Scattari, human provision is made by the Government for the contingency of any wreck occurring at a season when the survivors may possibly he detained long upon the Island. It has been contemplated to build a breakwater at some point on its most sheltered side pronounced by competent judges to be quite practicable; its desirableness admits of no question. At present its iron bound shore, upon which the surges of the Atlantic and the Gulf, in tempestuous weather, beat and break with irresistable fury, is altogether unapproachable; and the unhappy barque that is driven upon them is apprised of unavoidable destruction, with little hope of escape for her crew.

The Island affords little or no material shelter for man or brute, being one continuous hald and barren rock, covered with a short herbage and brambles which nature has forced, in the heat of midsummer, into slow vegetation. In the neighbourhood are some of the most prolific Cod Banks, and could certain shelter for boats be had, a profitable fishery might be carried on from this now inhospitable rock.

Anticosti Island.

The Island of Anticosti lies nearly in the track of ships bound up or down the Gulf of St. Lawrence. In some parts it is nearly one hundred and thirty miles in length, the broadest part being about forty miles. nearly the centre, where a hill rises rather abruptly, and runs the entire length of the Island, it is generally level, and mostly covered with a thick forest of trees, stunted near the sea-side, but growing gradually larger as they recede towards the interior. Among these the tumarack prevails, and is about the most valuable. Many parts of the Island abound with rich grasses, and consequently cattle depasturing therein thrive well. On either side, from several large lakes, rivers, abounding with Sea Trout and Salmon, in season, discharge themselves by rather shallow embrocheures, into the Gulf; of these streams the largest is the Jupiter River, flowing from a lake of twenty miles long. At the outlets of the several rivers. Lobsters, in immense quanties, are thrown up by sea during the prevailing heavy vernal and autumnal gales. It may astonish the reader, rather, to be told that Anticosti contains 300,000 acres of land more than P. E.

Island; and considering that its climate being milder and less variable, could, doubtle-s, be capable of supplying with vegetable food and meat a population of 80,000 souls, at least. Owing to the heavy surf almost unceasingly heaving in upon the shores, and the absence of very convenient harbors, the occupation of fishing along the coast after the autumnal equinox becomes exceedingly perilous. Anticosti is not, so far as has yet been discovered, prolific of minerals, although Marble of excellent quality has been discovered and quarried in some quantities. The navigation of the Island is generally open for at least two months after the upper part of the Gulf is closed by ice. During the winter of 1853 there was only six weeks of sea-ice. We have by us no statistics whereby to estimate the number of stationary population.

Coast Surveys.

Henry W. Bayfield, Captain surveying the Gulf of St. Lawrence, in a letter to Vice Admiral Sir G. F. Seymour, K.C.B., G.C.H., &c.. Commander-in-Chief, dated McNab's Cove, 21st September, 1852, says: "I have the honor to acquaint you that our surveys of the coast of Nova Scotia, exclusive of the harbor of Halifax, now in progress extends from Bay Verte through the Strait of Northumberland and Gut of Canso to Cranberry Island Light and Cape Canso, inclusive; and that the whole of the sea coasts of Cape Breton have been surveyed, excepting the S. E. coast from the Island of Scattarie to Point Michaux. The western side of the Bras d'Or also remains to be completed. Of these surveys, the portion included with the Strait of Northumberland and George's Bay, have been published, together with the harbours on the west coast and north coast of Cape Breton."

Captain Bayfield, in a P. S., says: "I have omitted to state that I have had no opportunity of forming an exact estimate of the rise and velocity of the tides near the head of the Bay of Fundy, but the people of the Bend of the Petticodiac informed me that the rise there amounts to 49 feet, and that the first of the flood ascends in a great wave or bore. In the Bay Verte, the ordinary spring tides rise only 9 feet."

"On the 30th September, writing to Sir George F. Seymour, from St. John, N. B., P. F. Shortland, commander of H. M. S. Columbia, informs His Excellency that he has completed the survey of that part of the coast of Nova Scotia from Baccaro Point to the Tusket Islands, inclusive; and that part from the Tusket Islands to the Yarmouth Light House is in hand. My predecessor completed Annapolis and part of St. Mary's Bay, none of which has, I think, been published."

The King's College Act,

About which there was much angry debate in several Sessions of the Provincial Parliament, was at last carried by the Reform Government in 1853, and forwarded to England for our Most Gracious Queen's confirmation and signature,—was assented to under the Newcastle Government, the distinguished Premier "concurring, however, with his predecessors, in regarding the course adopted by the Legislature as an interference with vested rights"—pressing the claims of Dr. McCawley, the principal officer of the Institution, for due provision, as "a gentleman of acknowledged merit and integrity."

Black Rock, South Shore Bay of Fundy-fixed light. Beacon Light at Horton Bluff, in King's County.

Beaver Island, Eastern Beaver or Williams' Island-revolving light. Apple River, North side of the entrance to Apple River, in Chignecto or Cumberland Bay-two fixed lights, horizontal.

Entrance of Partridge Island River-fixed light.

A Light House at the Ragged Island, county of Shelburne, has been constructed, and in operation ; fixed light-on Gull Rock. A Beacon Light at Pubnico, erected last year, is in operation, and

adds much to the safety of navigation.

The Committee of the House of Assembly, in Session of 1854, to whom were referred the several petitions relating to Breakwaters, Beacons, Packets, Boats, Ferries, Rivers, Light Houses, and other natters, recommended that the sum of Two Thousand Pounds be placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, for the purpose of having erected during the ensuing year, (1854,) or so scon as the necessary arrangements can be made for so doing, Light Houses, at the following places:—

A Light House at Margaree Island, on the coast of the Island of Cape Breton.

A Light House on Iron Bound Island, at the entrance of LaHave River, County of Lunenburg.

A Light House on Boar's Head, north east extremity of Long Island, County of Digby.

A Light House on the Isle of Haut, Bay of Fundy.

A Light House on the western end of Scattarie, coast of Cape

'The Committee recommend the adoption of Vice Admiral Seymour's recommendation, of Buoys being placed at the harbor of Port Hood, as suggested by W. Jeffery, Master of H. M. S. Basilisk, in his report, as follows:—

Mr. Jeffrey's, master of H. M. S. "Basilisk," in a letter to the commander of that vessel, dated 16th November, 1853, suggested that Buoys of a larger size should be placed in the following positions, in the harbor of Port Hood, C. B.:—

"On the Spithead, in five fathoms-one black.

"On the edge of the Dean Shoals, in 42 or 5 fathoms—one red.

"On the end of the Shoal, off Smith's Point, in three fathoms-one chequered."

These suggestions were offered with this explanation: "As it may often be of consequence that a vessel should be placed in safety when the weather is so thick as to prevent the leading marks being seen, these buoys, in addition to the new light house now building, would enable any one, by common attention, to take this harbor with perfect safety."

This communication was enclosed to His Excellency Sir J. Gaspard LeMarchant, by Vice Admiral Sir George Seymour, &c. &c., and His Excellency, in reply, "assured" Sir George "that the suggestions which have received your recommendation will obtain from me, and from the Colonial government, the most favorable consideration."

"All the Light Houses have been kept in operation, as heretofore, and five more, as directed by the Legislature, have been built; one of which (Pubnico) is lighted, but the other four were not completed in time to receive the necessary supplies, and White Head light required a revolving apparatus, which is being prepared. It has been suggested that there should be a Light House on Egg Island, near Jedore, the place recommended by Captain Shortland. A dwelling house for the keeper of the light house at Maugher's Beach, as directed by a committee of the House last session, has been erected. In consequence of violent storms last autumn, much damage was done to the beach, which caused considerable

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expense to prevent the further inroads of the sea. much injured, by which further expenditure was necessary, the conditions on which the tower is held being that the Province should keep the part connected with the light house in repair. At Pictou light house, the beach having been washed away by the sea, considerable work to prevent further damage was necessary, which work has been done during the past season."-From Report of Chairman of Board of Works.

Light Duties.

Vessels registered in the Province shall pay six pence per ton to the Collectors of Colonial Duties, or other persons appointed, who shall deliver to the master a certificate thereof, which shall exempt the vessel from further payment until the first day of April then next, such vessel not to be cleared at the custom house without producing the certificate. New vessels leaving the Province first voyage, intended for sale, exempted from duty; and new vessels cleared on first voyage, after first September, exempted from further payment of duty until first of April next following, on payment of one-half of

Other vessels arriving in the Province, shall pay, on entry, as before provided, six pence per ton, and receive a certificate exempting them from further payment until first day of April then next.

Vessels passing through the Straits of Causo, without said certificate, shall pay six pence per ton, and a certificate shall be granted which shall exempt them from further payment, as above.

Vessels or Steamers in the employ of Her Majesty's Government, exempt. Steamers not belonging to Her Majesty, carrying mails, to

The person receiving duty shall pay it into the Provincial Treasury, deducting 5 per cent. for commissions.

Penalty for refusing to pay, or departing without pay, five pounds to be recovered, with the duties, in the name of the officer.

The duty not being paid when duly demanded, the officer is empowered to seize and detain the vessel until said penalty be paid.

The net increase of Light Duties collected in the ports of this Province in 1853, was 365l. 6s. 2d. Amherst, Annapolis, Arichat, Barrington, Beaver River, Cape Canso, (two collectors,) Cornwallis, Joggins Mines, Parrsborough, Pictou, Port Hood, Pugwash, Sheet Harbor, Ship Harbor, St. Mary's, Tatamagouche, Wilmot, were Halifax, Advocate Harbor, Antigonish, Bridgetown, Canso Strait, Church Point, Clements Port, Digby, Guysborough, Hantsport, LaHave, Liverpool, Londonderry, Lunenburg, Maitland, Port Medway, Pubnico, Ragged Islands, Sandy Cove, Shelburne, St. Ann's and Great Bras d'Or, Sydney, North Sydney, Tusket and Wilmot, gave an increase of £816 13s. 2d.

Province Notes

In circulation on the 25th February, 1854, amounted to £59,000.

Accounts in the several Provincial Departments are kept in Halifax Currency. At the Custom House and Military Secretary's Office they are kept in Sterling.

The Fisheries.

The Committee of the House of Assembly, Session 1854, "observe with pleasure that considerable improvement has taken place in the Provincial Fishery during the last year, and that if effectual protect tion be continued, this important branch of industry will ere long furnish a very valuable export." * * * " In view of the signal benefit of protection, the committee recommend the House to grant for that purpose the sum of £3000, in addition to any sum remaining andrawn." * * " 'It appears that weirs in St. Mary's Bay are found to be destructive of the fishery. The committee recommend that the use of them should be prohibited or regulated."

Four hundred and fifty-five vessels-tonnage 16,276, men 3,355cleared on a fishing voyage at the port of Halifax, and other ports in

this Province, during the year 1853.

Crown Land.

The gross proceeds of Crown Lands sold during the year ending December 31, 1853, appears to be, so far as we can understand the oublic accounts published, £8297 8s. Deduct expenses for Surveys, Postage, Printing, Advertising, Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner, Clerks' Salaries, money repaid to purchasers, &c., £2600 14s. 3d. and the net surplus is £5696 13s. 9d. In the hands of Mr. Commissioner Morris, on the 1st October, 1853, there was £3067 1s. 4dd. £2500 was paid over to the Receiver General. We suppose the Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner have paid over this sum, £3196 13s. 9d., so credited, since the accounts were submitted to the Government.

The quantity of Land sold in 1853, to October 31st, was 301 lots, containing 37,142 acres. Immense quantities of Crown Lands are still unsold. Some thousands of Squatters have occupied large tracts also.

To the Honorable Chairman of the Board of Works Report, submitted to His Excellency Sir John Gaspard LeMarchant, Lieutenant Governor,

The Penitentiary.

"This Institution has continued nearly the same as when last reported. Indeed very little change can take place, either in its expenses or in its earnings, until the prison is finished, which will require a considerable time yet to accomplish, unless a large appropriation is made for that pur-pose, or a much greater number of criminals are sent there. The latter is certainly not desirable, and the former not necessary, inasmuch as sufficient is finished for those that are there, and their labour as usefully employed in work as any other. The expenses are perhaps as little as can reasonably be expected. * * Several of the prisoners are acquiring mechanical skill, whereby to support themselves hereafter. Three men, who were discharged during the last year, there learned the art of stone cutting. and are now earning good wages and conducting themselves creditably.

A young boy who is still in the prison, has acquired, in the blacksmith's shop, and exhibited in several articles manufactured by him, considerable skill in making tools, and is now learning to cut stone, and, at the expiration of his imprisonment, will probably commence the world with a knowledge of two trades. With a view to economy in regard to fuel, which is a costly item in the annual expenditure, a hot air apparatus on a small scale, has been introduced into one part of the building, by which several rooms are warmed. It it be found, on sufficient trial, to answer the purpose intended, the principle may be extended to other parts of the establishment. The expenses of the past year have been £1080 11s. 3d., which includes the building of a barn and piggery, and a belance due the previous year for granite (£100). There will be required for the current year £950. The causes above stated have increased the outlay in the year past, but £950 will probably suffice for this year, which is inclusive of £249 2s.

During the year 1853, twenty-six prisoners were received, and twentythree discharged. Grant for 1854, to cover expenses, £700 18s. Od.

Public Buildings.

"The extensive repairs for the preservation of the public buildings rendered necessary a large expenditure. All the floors of the public offices

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commit nts; yet, system of nvenient were sinking, in consequence of the decay of the joists underneath. It was thought that the floors would have to be raised, which would not only have caused a heavy expense, but would in the mean time have greatly interrupted business. The necessary repairs have, however, been made, by supporting the basement story with granite pillars;—much expense and inconvenience have thus been avoided, and the floors it is believed sufficiently secured. New iron pillars have been erected in place of the wooden ones decayed; the exterior of the building has also been examined and repaired, by re-pointing joints and replacing stones that were decayed; a granite wall has also been built under the railings, the whole extent of the front of the Provincial Building."

The Asylum for the Insane.

A site for this Institution has been chosen, and paid for. The quantity of ground is eighty-seven acres. The locality, we believe, is "Woodside," property of the widow MacMain, on the eastern side of Halifax harbour. "The plan of the building, designed to come as nearly as possible within our means," says the chairman of the Board of Works, "was made by the architect who projected the elevation of a similar institution now in course of erection at Washington." * * * "The whole has been under the direction of Miss Dix, who has done much, and who has generously added this gift to several others, for which the Province is to her indebted." Plans have been prepared, and other preliminaries entered into "Nothing has been neglected," says the honorable chairman, "that could, with propriety, have been done since the appropriation was made." The work is going on.

In reference to the expenses connected with Education, the committee of the House of Assembly, Session 1854, remarked in their Report:—

"Your committee beg to call the attention of the House to the necessity of fixing the salaries of the Superintendents appointed during the last year. The grant for a single Superintendent, under the Revised Statutes, is 250l., together with an allowance of 100l. for contingencies of office, and travelling expenses. Mr. Dawson's salary for 1852 was not drawn, in consequence of his having resigned the office; but he was paid 1001., in pursuance of the Report of the committee on Education last year, who recommended that the balance of 1501. should be applied to partially defray the increased expense of employing two inspectors during the current year. By a resolution of the House, passed on the 4th April last, the governor is requested to carry out this recommendation; and the House pledged itself to make provision for any increased expense which it might be necessary to incur. The whole amount paid out on this account for the past year, to 31st December, 1853, is 2561. 19s., which is within the amount already voted; but the expenditure of the coming year will necessarily exceed that amount if made at the same rate.

"The committee are of opinion that the salaries of all public officers should be fixed by the Legislature, and recommend that this should be done in respect of the Superintendents."

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THE WAR.

"I came not to send peace on Earth, but a sword," was the declaration of the Founder of Christiany; and it is matter of history that the sword has had, and is as likely still to have, much to do in the arbitrament of the affairs of Christendom.

Two quarters of the Globe, and by far the most densely packed with professed followers of the Cross, are even now agitated from centre to extremities, engaged in a fierce sanguinary struggle, originated in a doubtful strife of words, as to the right of possession and guardianship of the "Holy Sepulchre," wherein, tradition saith, was deposited the humanity of the PRINCE OF PEACE. But further, we may premise that never in the world's history were " wars and rumours of wars" more rife than in this our own day and generation. In central America-from Yucatan to Peru-we find confusion and strife everywhere among the nations. Petit republics at war perpetually one against the other, or rent in pieces by the conflicts of internal factions. So also of the most important sections of South America;—peace is not within their borders. They are either solving among themselves or with their neighbours. Whilst Uncle Sam, just now, begins to indicate something very like a disposition to try his hand and luck in the way of "armed intervention" somewhere. Such is the actual state of affairs—a state of war from the boundary of New Mexico to that of Patagonia.

In Asia, as already intimated, matters present an aspect nothing more pacific. On its borders the Turks and Circassians contend fiercely with the Moskoos. Schamyl and his ten thousand Horsemen descend and sweep away the flocks and herds, and carry into captivity the Muscovite nobles and their belongings. In the great empire of China rages a most devastating civil war; up-heaving the entire sub-strata of the social world, and portending the hopeless overthrow of an ancient dynasty, with the na-

tional and religious institutions in all their entirety.

Thus the whole world may be said to lie in the very throes of widespread, bloody, and devastating wars, portending, we might almost be induced to conclude, the near approach of the consummation of all things.

With these few preliminary remarks, we shall proceed to compile from the most authentic sources, a compendium of the leading events in what is

very correctly termed the

OTTOMAN WAR.

In proceeding, then, to "weed the literary wilderness," and supply a lucid and reliable narrative of this momentous conflict, we note, first, that so early as June, 1853, the Russian Ambassador and suite having left Constantinople, orders were received from St. Petersburg to carry the Russian divisions over the Pruth, forcibly, if necessary, into the Turkish territory, which order was executed on the 3d July; and a few days after the movement had been completed, the Russian commander in-chief, Prince Gortschakoff, assisted at a Te Deum in the Great Church at Jossy. A week later-on the 15th July-the Russians had collected in that fortress 40,000 men, with 144 guns, which their supposed overwhelming force, on the 3rd August, was advanced towards the Danube.

The Porte, in the meanwhile, was not inactive, and, with a most judicious and happy discretion, nominated Omar Pasha commander-in-chief of its armies in Europe-Selim Pasha having been nominated Gneralissimo

The advance of Gortschakoff was the signal for the Turkish General to break down all the bridges over the Danube. At this time the Allied Fleets of France and England were riding at anchor in Beseka Bay, while

the Russian was exercising despotic powers of a conquerer on the territory of Turkey, even whilst war had never been declared on either side.

On the 1st September the Ottoman Government ordered an extra levy of 80,000 men, which the Czar replied to by commanding a fresh "con-

Six frigates, three French and a like number of English, entered the Bosphorus; but it was not before the 10th of October that the Sultan formally declared Turkey to be at war with Russia, and decreed that "an army of 150,000 men should be raised and organized for the defence of Islam. This was looked upon, the world over, as a bold step; but the fact seems to have been that the eagerness of the Musselman population could no longer be restrained: indeed, a small body of "Rediffs" or retired soldiers of the Turkish regular army, had already passed the Danube,

On the 3rd and 4th November was fought the battle of Oltenitza, and on the 3rd and 4th Omar Pasha forced his passage fitteen miles lower down from Turtukai to Oltenitza, with 13,000 men. The Russians were numemerically much stronger. But they had been, in part, perplexed respecting the designs, and even respecting the presence of the Turkish Generalissimo ; in part, they were out-manœuvred during the actual operations, and in part they were beaten fairly on the field. The Turks forced the passage with artillery, held it manfully by the bayonet, and then secured it with spade and pickaxe. The conflict lasted, omitting the intervals which interrupted it, for three-and-twenty hours; and will ever be memorable under the name of the Battle of Oltenitza. It was at the very time during which it was contested that Nicholas was exclaiming in his distant capital, " non confundar in æternum."

On the 17th November, Russian agency brought about what was intended to be a "diversion" not very agreeable to France, of course, viz., the reconciliation of the two Branches of the exiled house of Bourbon. This took place exactly seven years too late.

November 30th.—The whole civilized world was startled with the details of the massacre at Sinope, in which harbor seven Turkish frigates, under Osman Pasha, were entirely destroyed by a Russian squadron of six sail of the line and several frigates. In honor of this great achievment, Czar Nicholas ordered a solemn "Te Deum" in the churches, and published an exulting manifesto.

The severity of the weather rendered it impossible for the Allied Fleets to enter the Black Sea till the 4th of January. In the meanwhile the Czar continues to pour his soldiery into the Principalities; and his troops continued to spread themselves along the Austrian frontier,—Omar

Pasha, the meanwhile, preparing to make a stand behind "Trajan's wall." Three Russian corps advanced simultaneously, one of which, under the command of General Fishback, consisting of 22,000 men, moved upon the Turks entrenched at Kalafat, under the command of the Pachas, Ismail and Achmet. But the Turkish Commanders did not care to wait for the Russsians, and accordingly, on the 6th January, (Christmas day in Russia,) advanced to meet the enemy posted at Citate, and after a sanguinary battle, commenced in the streets of that village, routed them with great slaughter, and retired within their entrenchments at Kalafat.

In January, General Schilders reported to his Government that thirtythousand Russians had already perished, by sword and pestilence in the

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February 8th.—The Russian Ambassadors were recalled and left London and Paris, and the Allied Powers prepared to carry on the war, now apparently inevitable, with unprecedented energy; and shortly after, the

first detachment of the British contingent left England for Constantinople. After this, regiment followed regiment in rapid succession. The French Troops immediately followed, and the force being greater than that employed by England, the Command-in-Chief of the Allies was invested in the French Marshal, St. Arnaud.

March 11th.—The Baltic Fleet, under the command of Sir Charles Napier, left Spithead; whither the French Squadron shortly after pro-

ceeded to join.

March 23rd.—A detachment of Steamers from the Black Sea Fleet bombarded Odessa. Not long after, the Tiger, (S.) of 16 guns, having grounded near that port, was destroyed by the Russian batteries. About the same time the passage of the Danube was forced by the Russians, and Silistria beseiged; this was immediately followed by an alliance, offensive

and defensive, between Austria and Prussia.

The force investing Silistria numbered about 60,000 men; and a curious story was told to the effect that the Muscovite General informed the Turk that the Czar had sent conclusive directions that Silistria must be taken, therefore, to save effusion of blood, it might as well be given up at once. But Silistria did not fall; in a furious assault by the whole Russian force, four Generals fell, two killed and two desperately wounded, and the discomfitted assailants forthwith retreated, nor did they halt until they had actually re-crossed the Pruth.

In the Baltic, the fortifications at Bomarsund were bombarded and destroyed by the Allied Fleets and land troops, General Bodisco, with 2000

prisoners, surrendering on the 14th August.

October 7th.—58,000 of the Allied forces embarked at Baltschie, in 600 vessels of war and transports, in the Crimea; and were landed at "Old Fort" on the 11th, and upon Sebastopol the columns were at once directed, and after defeating the Russians in a most bloody encounter on the River Alma, invested the City and fortresses, which they commenced bombarding on the 17th.

By sortie, a body of troops from the garrison, led by General Liprandi, succeeded on the 23d in driving back the Allies and occupying four of their advanced forts, but were driven back with loss; the state of Sebastopol reported on the 27th October as one of horror—thousands of corpses lying unburied on the ramparts and in the streets, and rotting in the hospitals. This brings the reports down to our latest advices, November 10th, where

we must close.
