

ANNUAL MEETING.

The 64th Annual Meeting of the Grande-Ligne Mission was held on the 11th October, 1900, at 2.30 p.m., in the French Baptist Church (l'Oratoire), in the City of Montreal. Mr. A. A. Ayer in the Chair.

The meeting was opened with singing and prayer.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read and adopted.

The Secretary then presented the Annual Report. The reports of the different fields were then read. The report was adopted and referred to a committee for publication.

The Treasurer presented the Financial Statement, also the Report of Endowment and Building Fund, both of which were adopted and ordered to be printed with the report.

The following persons were, on ballot, elected members of the Board for the ensuing year: —A. A. Ayer, Rev. T. Lafleur, Joseph Richards, Rev. J. A. Gordon, Rev. A. L. Therrien, Rev. G. N. Massé, Rev. A. J. Lebeau, Rev. S. Sheldon, Rev. J. H. Hunter, James W. Tester, Rev. J. R. Webb, Joseph Picard, Rev. J. L. Gilmour, of Hamilton, Representative of the Maritime Baptist Convention, and the President of the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec.

The following were elected as Advisory Board :--Rev. John Gordon, D.D., Philadelphia ; Rev. D. D. McLaurin, D.D., Detroit ; Rev. A. G. Upham, D.D., Rev. W. N. Clarke, D.D., Hamilton, N.Y. ; Thos. Leeming, Brooklyn, N.Y. ; S. P. Hibbard, Boston; Rev. A. A. Cameron, D.D., Ottawa; W. A. Marsh, Quebec; Geo. Foster, Brantford; Rev. W. W. Weeks, Toronto; Rev. James Green, Montreal.

On motion, the following persons were appointed a Building Committee,

annual reports to the Secretary not later than the 15th September each year, and that the Committee on Revision of Annual Reports be a standing committee, to prepare all reports for the Annual Meeting.

On motion it was resolved :-- " That this meeting endorse the request of the Board, that Rev. E. Bosworth be appointed in charge of all arrangements for canvassing and collecting from the churches, for the building of new wing of the Feller Institute, and that Brethren A. L. Therrien and Principal Massé be associated with him.'

The following resolution concerning the death of our late President, was unanimously carried :

Whereas, in the providence of Almighty God, who doeth all things well, Grande-Ligne Mission has sustained a great loss in the removal by death of its honored President, Rev. E. W. Dadson, D.D.; be it therefore

Resolved, That we hereby place on record our appreciation of his devotion to the work of Grande-Ligne Mission, especially his deep interest in the educational and evangelistic efforts put forth by our missionaries. He had set his heart upon the speedy enlargement of Feller Institute, but in the inscrutable wisdom of God, he was not permitted to see the fulfilment of his prayers and purpose. The influence of his example as a humble Christian man will long remain in our midst. May it inspire us to follow him, as he followed Christ.

The Board met at the close of the meeting and elected Mr. A. A. Ayer, President; Joseph Richards, Treasurer; Rev. Theo. Lafleur, Secretary; Rev. E. Bosworth, Field Secretary.

At 8 p.m. a platform meeting was held, presided over by Rev. A. L. Therrien. Stirring addresses were delivered by Rev. E. Bosworth, Field Secretary of the Mission, Rev. J. L. Gilmour, M.A., of Hamilton, and Rev. T. Lafleur, LL.D., Secretary.

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SIXTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Grande=Ligne Mission.

This has been a year of joy and sorrow. Joy because of the conversions and prosperity of our Mission, especially in the school department; sorrow because of the great loss we have sustained in the untimely death of our President, Rev. E. W. Dadson, D.D., late Pastor of the Olivet Baptist Church in Montreal.

In our last Annual Report, we gave a somewhat lengthy review of Protestantism compared with Catholicism as to its numbers, progress and influence, in this Province. We would ask our friends to read that Report again.

We are on the edge of the Nineteenth and Twentieth Centuries. So much has been done in the past, so much is hoped for the future. The past with its long ages of labor, progress and enlightenment, has shewn in lurid light so many of the dark p aces of this earth ;—the missionary spirit of the beginning of the century, in its beautiful zeal, seemed not to realize the magnitude of this undertaking. The Divine Master said that "after wars and rumours of wars, the end was not yet to be expected." We are glad to know that the difficulties and resistance we have met with in our labors is a continuance of the prolonged struggle predicted by the Lord. We have come to understand more clearly that the conversion of the world is not accomplished in a magical way by some su iden manifestation of irresistible power, but by the work of enlightenment, of moral change, of spiritualization, by the work of the Divine leaven in the lump of humanity. We are thankful that our Mission has had a share in this divine process, during the past sixty-five years. Missionaries and their friends have been able to see in individual cases and in churches too, that having sowed the good seed of the kingdom, they were permitted to behold, "first the blade, then the ear, and then the full corn in the ear." They have seen many souls ripen for heaven. Alas, they have also seen like all other churches and missionary enterprises, promising, beautiful blades, that withered long before harvest time, and have gone to waste. The Son of Man also saw this in his own ministry.

There has been a striking manifestation of the power of God's spirit in the congregation at Marieville, in the conversion of Roman Catholics and also young people of the regular congregation. The pastor mentions in his report a man known to be of a very irreligious spirit and conversation, and whose conversion is a wonder to all who knew him. The church and congregation have been quickened by this manifestation of the Spirit's power.

In an old field, St. Constant, which for many years, had given but scanty returns for very much labor, a new life seems to have developed under the labors of our devoted and intelligent evangelist, Mr. Moise Robert. The scattered families have made a great effort in raising the sum of \$420 towards the building of a chapel, which is nearing completion. A church was organized last winter with a dozen members, now numbering thirty-one. Of these three were recently baptized. As the members are scattered over a large field, a good number of them being well to do farmers with large families, we may look for an extensive and successful work in that neighborhood ere long. That will be another proof that we should not be discouraged by long waiting and apparent sterility.

The Annual Meeting of the Association of our churches was held this year at Roxton Pond. It was a season of refreshing from the presence of the Lord for all those present, and the beneficial effects of these largely attended meetings are felt to this day.

In the beginning of the year, there was a great effort made by the Roman Catholic clergy of this city, under the patronage

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of the Archbishop, for the conversion to Catholicism of the English Protestants of Montreal. The Rev. Father Younan, from New York, delivered public Lectures in St. Patrick's Church, to enlighten English heretics on the true docrines of the Roman Catholic Church, and to bring them back to her Especially on account of ritualistic tendencies and bosom. practices in a portion of English Protestantism, they entertained great hopes of many conversions to the old popish Though intended for English speaking Protestants, church. this effort became almost as much a French propaganda, because a great many French Canadians know English, and many of the French newspapers gave good translations of the lectures of this Irish American priest. His principal point was to belittle the. Holy Scriptures as the means of imparting sure Christian truth; the church, he contended, being the only authorized medium as keeper and interpreter of that truth, and then illogically quoted those same Scriptures to sustain that questionable point. The Archbishop endorsed the teaching of the said Father, emphasizing the fact that Jesus had written nothing, and had not commanded His Apostles to write. However, this effort, with large Protestant attendance, did not produce many conversions, and certainly no remarkable ones, but it gave us another opportunity on a large scale to state evangelical truth in French and English. Many persons remarked that some of the sayings of the eloquent priest had a decided Protestant tendency. So much for living among heretics.

In the general review of the year's work, the friends of the Mission will certainly think with us that there has been a good deal of work done during the past year; that our Heavenly Father has acknowledged our labors in the conversion of at least fifty persons, a good many of them recent converts from Romanism, and forty-two of whom have made profession of their faith, in the ordinance of baptism.

During the past year, which has been one of many changes, we have special blessings to record in the midst of troubles and sorrows. A remarkable work of grace in progress early in the year at the Institute at Grande-Ligne, culminated in the conversion of more than a score of the pupils. The pastor baptized

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twenty-one candidates, most of whom were scholars in that school.

The Principal of the Feller Institute will tell you what he and his associates have done in that School, and what a blessing it has proved to many, both English and French. He could also tell you how much too small was the largest room of the Institute on the evening of the Anniversary of the students last February at Grande Ligne, what an uncomfortable place that basement dining room is, where more than a hundred pupils crowd to get a hearty meal, how much an enlargement in the shape of a wing is needed for that ever growing institution, and what noble efforts in contributions towards it the Society of Students has made. It is worth going a long distance to see the beautiful, inspiring sight of many of those old and new students crowding that building on their festal day. Imagine their going back to their homes, their village, their parish, taking light, culture, and religious principles with them; but who can measure the influence it will have in ages to come on Protestantism over this whole Continent? This is the burden of our work.

COMPORTAGE AND EVANGELISTIC WORK.

In addition to the regular pastoral work of our Ministers, who are more or less evangelists, the Mis ion has, during the past year, carried on an extensive work of Colportage and Evangelization. Colportage work has been carried on during the whole year by Mr. Rouleau in Manitoba with some success, and during the summer months by Messrs. Vien on the south side of the St. Lawrence, and St. Germain and E. Roy in the Ottawa Valley. The Colporteurs, especially in the Province of Quebec, find that almost in every parish and settlement where they go they have been preceded by other agents, either Colporteurs of the Bible Society or some other missionary societie, who have sold, loaned, or given copies of the Holy Scriptures. Some of the copies thus disposed of had been burned by order of the priest, who had told the possessors to have nothing to do with such books or their vendors. We suggest that the work of evangelization be emphasized and enlarged. A good especially in associates

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CHANGES.

There have been several changes among our laborers. Rev. Mr. Coté has left Sorel to return to New England, there to work with his accustomed zeal and fearlessness. He will be replaced at Sorel in November by one of our former students, Mr. Sené, now pastor at New Bedford, Mass. Mr. Jacques Cesan has also left the service of the Mission for the United States. The field of South Ely is already occupied by Rev. Mr. Brouillette ; he will also have the charge of Waterloo where he resides. Rev. Mr. Grégoire has exchanged fields with Mr. Leonard A. Therrien, the latter having come to settle at St Pie, while Mr. Grégoire has gone to Maskinongé.

OUR HELPERS.

The Ladies Associations have continued their valuable help to our Mission, and we hope they will continue to do so for the furtherance of that work begun and carried on for so many years, in the midst of numberless obstacles, by one of their sex, the noble pioneer, Madame Feller. We express our hearty thanks to the following Associations for aid received : The Ladies Association in Montreal, the Women's Home Mission of Ontario, the Women's Home Mission Society of Eastern Ontario and Quebec, the Women's Baptist Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces, the Ladies' Association of Philadelphia, and last of all, but not least in their generous efforts, the Brooklyn Ladies' Association. They have all helped us in our work, their womanly gracious kindness and help will always be needed by the laborers of this Mission.

We had lately as helper in and President of our Mission a most devoted and faithful worker,—the Rev. Dr. Dadson, recent pastor of Olivet Baptist Church, of Montreal. After months of harrowing suffering, borne with wonderful courage and sweetness, he was at last relieved by the rest and calm of death. His sufferings and death caused great sorrow, not only to the Baptist community, but to many others outside of it. It was greatly alleviated by the knowledge of his cheerfulness in the midst of his suffering, and his unclouded faith in the love of the Heavenly Father, whom he was so anxious to honor in the service of His dear Son's kingdom. The Grande-Ligne Mission does not forget its debt of gratitude to this friend and helper of many years, and for his service at all hours.

FELLER INSTITUTE.

REV. G. N. MASSÉ, B.A., PRINCIPAL.

The school register for 1899-1900 shows 126 pupils enrolled, classified as follows: 72 boys and 40 girls boarders, with 9 boys and 5 girls as day pupils. Of this number 10 were Roman Catholics, 27 professed conversion during the winter, and 18 joined the Roussy Memorial Church by baptism in the spring. Let those who can rightly estimate the value of a human soul and the value of the influence of this converted soul upon others all during its human life, ponder these few figures and consider if it is worth while to give of their means to carry on and develop this two-fold work of training both mind and soul.

The teaching staff was unchanged, save that Miss Permelia Bullock resigned, much to our regret, to assume the care of the school in Coaticook. Mrs. Ernest Roy, an experienced and devoted teacher took her place.

Discipline was comparatively easy and the health of the pupils *excellent*—in fact the attending physician received but \$2.50 for his medical services during the entire year.

The higher classes were both stronger and more numerous than previous years. Six of the students completed the course for University matriculation, of whom four are now in McMaster and one in Geneva, Switzerland, for a seven years' course.

Two of the young men, missionaries in training, spent the summer colporting with commendable success.

The farm, which should be a source of revenue to the school, is taking on a more promising aspect, under Mr. Norman's careful supervision, and with necessary funds might become a valuable adjunct to the work.

Plans for the "New Wing," already spoken of last year, have been drawn with a view to providing room for the many students who are yearly refused admission for lack of accommodation, and generally to May (

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ear, have ne many ommodation, and at the same time to rearrange the class rooms, and generally to meet the requirements of a more modern institution. May God graciously help us secure the funds to carry them out.

GRANDE-LIGNE.

Rev. M. B. PARENT, M.A., PASTOR.

So far as we can see, nothing particular has taken place lately that would throw any light on the state of mind of our Roman Catholic neighbors.

We cannot say therefore whether there has been progress in their religious opinions or not. Doors are as tightly closed as usual. Only once in a while a Roman Catholic will come in to our services. Just now there is a young man who has been in a couple of times. There is a new priest at St. Blaise but we see no difference. Within our circle the work has been progressing as usual.

Painting and other repairs have been done to our chapel and parsonage, costing considerably over \$200.

Our collections for denominational objects show a general increase.

Our Sunday services are well attended, and our prayer meetings have been unusually interesting of late.

Twenty-one candidates were baptized last spring, most of whom were pupils in the Feller Institute. Before this year closes we expect a few more to come forward and profess their faith by baptism.

MONTREAL.

Rev. A. L. THERRIEN, PASTOR.

The past year has been one of blessing and encouragement. Fourteen Roman Catholics became interested enough to attend our services regularly, and out of these five have already confessed Christ in baptism. One who was to join the five already baptized was suddenly summoned to her rest above, a few hours after undergoing a surgical operation. There are more than half a dozen others who, we believe, are under the influence of the Spirit, and will eventually come out on the Lord's side.

Two of our good families have removed to the United States. It is the old story : a few come in with us from Rome and as many leave us for the States. So that numerically and financially we are no stronger, if as strong, as we were last year. One of our old members has also died. He was a convert from Rome of ten years' standing. While on his death-bed the priests made strenuous efforts to win him back to Rome, but he remained firm to the end, and left to his Roman Catholic neighbors and friends good evidence of the power of truth to sustain the soul in the last conflict.

* A number of those who have come to see the light through our work would like to take their stand on the side of truth, but are held back by material and social considerations. It must be admitted that the difficulties our converts experience, especially in finding employment after they have left the Church of Rome, are serious enough to make the sturdiest souls to pause.

Hall work was continued through last winter in our Bethany Home, but the building we occupied having been sold, we had to vacate it, and for other reasons close the home. We are in hopes to start hall work in another locality this winter. The church goes on harmoniously and steadily. The ladies of the church have organized a missionary society and a handsome amount has already been raised by them for missionary purposes.

Last winter a series of lectures on controversial subjects were delivered in our church by five of our Grande-Ligne missionaries. We believe some good was done, though the attendance of Roman Catholics was not as large as we had hoped it would be.

We have also distributed a large quantity of religious literature, most of which was printed this year by our Grande-Ligne Board.

That God blesses and will bless the seed scattered through these various agencies we have faith to believe.

MARIEVILLE.

REV. A. J. LEBEAU, PASTOR.

I beg to report the following important events that took place upon this field.

1st. The year began just as we were finishing repairs upon the parsonage and building a new wood shed. These alterations made the house much more comfortable and gave it a better appearance. We spent some \$94 on these buildings.

2nd. But better than this are the repairs of God's spiritual house, or a revival, in the month of February, when two Romanists were converted and two of our young people gave their hearts to the Saviour; many more were impressed, and God's people were led to a deeper spiritual life in Christ Jesus. Two others have been

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recently converted. One young man was baptized lately. An American gentleman, a nominal Protestant, long known for his Godless life, who when spoken to of spiritual things, answered with profanity. Like "the stone cut out without hands" we saw no power, but the Holy Spirit led him into the kingdom; and he is now a new man, hating what he had loved, and working to build up what he had despised. He humbly asked for baptism and membership into the little French Baptist church, wherein he is now a thankful and zealous member.

3rd.—This work of grace led us to feel our need of a baptistry in the church. We had always baptized in a little stream some five miles away, and our church had lost the blessing from witnessing these baptismal services. We have therefore put in an open baptistry, which improves the appearance of the church as well as provides a great convenience in the administration of the ordinance.

4th.—We have had five baptisms this summer; witnessed by a good number of Romanists who were deeply impressed by the ordinance as instituted by our Lord himself. Three of our eight young people at Grande-Ligne last winter were baptized there. We feel that God has been very gracious to us, for which we are deeply thankful.

5th.—There has been a much needed increase in the benevolence of our people. We have forty members, and over \$400 was collected for all purposes. Home and Foreign missions, Ottawa fire fund, Indian famine fund, &c., &c., being among the objects.

6th and lastly—The Dissentient School house has been repaired, and now we hope to have ten months of school term instead of five as in the past. Evening classes for Romanists who wish to learn English, will be formed. In this school house we hold our little prayer meetings Wednesday evenings, when half a dozen christians meet to pray. May we ask those meeting in larger numbers and in better circumstances, to pray that our faith may be strong and that we may be more and more faithful.

ROXTON.

REV. W. S. BULLOCK, PASTOR.

We have this year attempted again to carry forward our threefold purpose, namely: To reach Catholics with the Gospel light; lead our own unconverted Protestants to repentance and trust in Christ, and to help the church to become a much brighter light in the midst of darkness.

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While we have had no outward professed conversions among Roma'n Catholics, we have nevertheless met with encouragement. Three persons, one man and two women, have attended our meetings frequently and said that their heart was with us. We have had access to a good number of Catholics in their homes, and have had satisfactory religious conversations with them. We have preached the Gospel to over sixty different Roman Catholics, and to many of these on several occasions. Many of our Protestants have had long conversations with their Roman Catholic friends, and in several ways have endeavored to sow the good seed of life.

We continue to see marked signs of Rome's failing power and of an increased spirit of independence among the people. The lump is being leavened, *slowly* but *surely*.

During the last two years, one of our French Canadian Grande-1 gne girls, who is a trained nurse by profession, has been frequently called to spend from one to three weeks at a time, careing for sick people in Roman Catholic homes; and in this way it is surprising how many of these poor dying Catholics have sought or received from her lips words of help and consolation. A few years ago a French Protestant person would not have been tolerated at the bedside of a dying Roman Catholic. Times are changing.

With reference to the work among our own people, we rejoice in progress. Two brethren, after having held back for several years, joined our church by baptism. Several others have on various occasions testified to good received and their determination to follow Christ more closely. Complete harmony reigns, and unity prevailed whenever work in connection with missions, the destitute, or our own church needs has been undertaken.

There has been an increase again this year in the amount contributed to various objects: the total amount raised being \$310.

The average attendance is about 100 on Sunday morning; 40 in the evening and 30 at the prayer meeting. There are 36 French families connected with our church and congregation.

We have again suffered considerably by the emigration of some of our families, who have been obliged to leave us. The church numbers 51 resident and seven non-resident members.

On the whole, we feel that the Lord has blessed our efforts, and having done what we could in the way we thought best, we leave the results with the Master.

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ST. PIE.

REV. N. GRÉGOIRE, PASTOR.

I continued to occupy the field of St. Pie until the fifteenth of September last, when I was called to take charge of the church of Maskinongé.

I have not much to say about the old mission of St. Pie, except that it labors under peculiar disadvantages. This fact is especially regrettable when we consider that the Roman Catholic people of this region ar. liberal and accessible to the preaching of the Gospel. The church of St. Pie once numbering eighty-five members, is now reduced to six, in consequence of emigration. But although the membership of this church is small, there is a Protestant congregation of over thirty adults, a large proportion belonging to other denominations.

The Protestants of St. Pie during this year built a school house, costing over two hundred dollars, and the repairing of the church costing fifty dollars.

The Rev. L. A. Therrien, B.A., is now in charge of this field, and reports increased interest and congregations.

MASKINONGÉ.

REV. LEONARD A. THERRIEN, B.A., PASTOR.

Outward evidence of progress has been given us during the year in the baptism of a new convert from Rome. But there is also much encouragement to be taken from signs and incidents which can scarcely be publicly recorded. Two men at least, (heads of families) are earnestly interested in the study of the Word of God, and already declare themselves to be Protestants at heart.

The faithful witness given by the members of this brave little church accounts to a great degree for this news. These brethren receive blessings that they may give blessings.

There has been no change in the personnel of the congregation, save the removal of two members to another of our fields.

Total contributions amount to \$80.25.

Rev. N. Gregoire is now in charge of this field.

WATERLOO AND SOUTH ELY. REV. T. BROUILLETTE, PASTOR.

I am pleased that I accepted the Board's invitation to assume the care of the church at South Ely where I expect to spend most of my time.

Waterloo, which was at one time a promising field, has not yielded what was expected, although there are now signs of more interest, as some who had been absent have come back to stay. I had easy access to many Roman Catholics, of good standing, intelligent and well to do, who freely and often told me that many of the things taught by the priest they did not believe, but unfortunately they were not interested enough in higher and saving truths to receive them and follow them.

Three weeks ago I came to Ely. At the evening service a woman who had lately come to the place, and who but recently had seceded from the Roman Catholic Church, came to ask me to baptize her. After a prolonged conversation with her I was satisfied that it was a genuine case of conversion, and the following Sunday she was baptized in the presence of fifty Protestants and many Roman Catholics, who spoke very reverently of the ceremony. This woman has several relatives in the place, to whom she intends to make the Gospel known.

Two new members have joined the church.

ST. ROCH MISSION, QUEBEC.

REV. L. R. DUTAUD, EVANGELIST.

When the enemy is in overwhelming number and strongly entrenched, every small victory means much.

Looking over the year's work, as the merchant does his books, we are happy to say that the balance is on the right side, though all cannot be counted, for part of the seed has not yet come to maturity. Our last Report mentioned that two of our young men, both Roman Catholics, were admitted to the Grande Ligne School. One of them has proven to be "a young man of valor." Besides taking the honors of his class, he accepted Jesus Christ as his only Saviour, and confessed Him by baptism in the spring. His parents residing in Quebec were boycotted, and doomed to separation from their large family and their aged parents. It is through such a severe trial that we receive our few converts. Several families outside the city have been visited, two of which have abandoned their traditions to follow the pure Gospel. Several others are interested. Hundred availed thems

The distribution of a large number of tracts in the city and suburbs, and the visiting work done has evoked a warning from the pulpit and the confessional.

An English speaking young man, married to a French Roman Catholic girl, brought her to the knowledge of the Truth. She has joined the church by baptism. Moreover, feeling himself called to French evangelization, he left a promising situation to enter Grande-Ligne School this fall, and will join the church there.

The money raised for different purposes is \$60.10.

THE OTTAWA VALLEY.

REV. GEO. R. McFAUL, B.A., MISSIONARY.

Rockland, Ont.—A French service has been held during the summer months when time was given to touring work. Besides our French Protestant families a number of Roman Catholics have attended these services. One family, husband and wife, have left Romanism. A bright young man, a convert from Romanism, now attending Grande-Ligne was baptized last Sunday. A weekly class, for teaching the French language, was conducted during the winter months, some of our French Protestants and a goodly number of English young people attended regularly. We hope by this means to create a deeper interest in our work among the English young people, and help our French people. Some Roman Catholics have dropped into the French class who were too timid to attend our services.

Canaan, Ont.—Services have been occasionally held at Canaan. Three Roman Catholics were seen upon two occasions at service, one went away with a New Testament. The two French Protestant families are still faithful, and our French Deacon, Joseph Filion, as zealous as ever in working for the conversion of his friends and neighbors.

Plaisance, Que.—The Roman Catholic people here having been promised a Chapel, they do not seem as anxious as at first to listen to the Gospel. Yet they have up to date received the missionary's visits without serious opposition. Over 100 attended an open air meeting, and an interesting discussion with some twenty men followed. One man appears to be anxious to find the light; he cannot read and is quite deaf, but in spite of these infirmities he may be the first to enter the kingdom. Buckingham, Que.—A number of French services have been held here, as many as 17 French Protestants and occasionally a Roman Catholic attending. One hundred French Romanists attended an open air meeting and listened attentively to the preaching of the Gospel. One young man has professed conversion and entered Grande Ligne School.

Rapide de L'Orignal, Que.—This is a village 100 miles North-West of Buckingham on the Lievre River. Trouble arose some two years ago over a site for a priest's residence. The man who was most prominent in contending against the priest, for the rights of the people on his side of the river, finally had his eyes open as to the errors of Romanism. We visited him and found him reading a Bible. He received us kindly and asked many questions about its teachings, stating that when he had studied the Word and had sufficient knowledge he would instruct his family and his neighbors. He gladly took New Testaments and Tracts for distribution. He is the best educated and most prominent man of the village.

On our return we held an interesting conversation with a priest who had left the Romish Church three years ago, but who still professes to believe in her teachings.

Several visits were made to other places in the Ottawa Valley with many interesting encounters of which space will not permit us to speak.

Touring.—With the assistance of Messrs. E. S. Roy and Emile St. Germain, open air meetings were held at Plaisance, Papineauville, Lachute, Point Fortune, St. Andrews, St. Eugene, Moose Creek, Casselman and Buckingham. Smallest attendance, 60, largest attendance about 250. Indoor meetings were also held at several places. During this campaign between 900 and 1000 French Roman Catholics heard the Gospel preached, many for the first time. Some 600 tracts were distributed, 11 New Testaments and 24 portions of Scripture placed, while many interesting conversations were held with groups of people and with individuals. With one exception, all these open air meetings were orderly and the people gave an attentive ear to the preaching of the Gospel.

SUMMARY.

In Ottawa Valley French Baptist families, or so inclined, 20; Professing conversion during the year, 5; Baptisms, 1; Visits to families, 291; Conversations, 195; Public and Cottage meetings held, 84; Total attendance, 2089; New Testaments placed, 31; Gospels, 31; Tracts distributed, 1117.

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COLPORTAGE WORK.

Mr. St. Germain.—This young brother labored in the Ottawa Valley under the supervision of Rev G. R. McFaul, his headquarters being in Plaisance. He found the people liberally disposed, and many of them supplied with the Scriptures and with religious tracts. He, however, was enabled to place a few more copies of the New Testament and the Bible, and to distribute many tracts.

He visited St. André, St. Joseph, Papineauville, Thurso, North Nation Mills and Buckingham. He had a number of interesting conversations with the people, some of whom defended their faith vigorously. One man threatened to assault him, but having finally cooled down, agreed to visit the priest with the colporteur. A school teacher was greatly shocked to hear him say that her church had undergone changes in doctrine and practice, while a young man became so interested that he purchased the New Testament with the earnest intention to make it a subject of study.

Mr. St. Germain had succeeded in distributing a number of copies of Scripture in Thurso, but the priest succeeded in compelling the persons who had secured them to hand them back to the colporteur. One woman, however, whose Testament the priest had destroyed by fire, secured another, saying: "This time the Priest will not lay his hands upon it."

EVANGELIZATION WORK IN SHERBROOKE.

M. O. Therrien.—Our Brother working in this city has to meet with many difficulties. His work consists mainly in the distribution of the Word of God, in conversation with the people, and preaching to them whenever and wherever, in houses or in open air, he can gather a few hearers. He has often been insulted and assaulted by ruffians. But, on the other hand, many respect him and are glad to receive his literature.

During the year he has placed over fifty copies of Bibles and Testaments in Roman Catholic families, and distributed a large number of portions of Scripture, pamphlets and tracts. Some of his Testaments have found their way into the friar's school, where he learned they were being eagerly read. Among those who heard him proclaim the Gospel in public squares are a mother and her two daughters who afterwards secured a copy of the New Testament and are now reading it. In some instances Roman Catholic people have even come to his house to secure the Scriptures and religious instruction. He has also been enabled to furnish literature to lumbering men working out in the woods.

This seed sowing must bring forth fruit, "My Word shall not return unto Me void."

Mr. Ephrèm Vien's Report.—I began my work by visiting my parents and some other families, who last summer, had been pleased with my visits, and seemed to be interested in hearing the Gospel. My parents, though pleased to welcome me, seemed a little surprised, as if I would no longer come to see them. Invited to return I did so. They were greatly pleased, and for the first time I prayed with them. My father and one of my brothers asked me to procure for them a Catholic version of the New Testament.

I was also well received by one of their neighbors, who got so interested that I left him a New Testament to replace an old copy which he had marked here and there. I had the opportunity to speak of the Gospel in several families. I have also partly sold and partly loaned ten New Testaments and six Bibles. I was rudely spoken to several times, and once shown the door.

On my return I found things less favorable, as my sister, who is very bigoted, had partly destroyed what I had done. One of my brothers, a married man, procured a Bible. I visited the parish of St. Paul, where I loaned a New Testament, and met a young man desirous of getting an education. I recommended him to the school at Grande-Ligne, and his father decided to send him there. From there I went to St. Césaire, visited persons I had seen before. Had again occasion to speak of the Gospel to many persons. During that month and a half, I disposed of three Bibles and seven New Testaments.

In the last month of my work of colportage—that is September, Mr. Vien summarizes as follows :—During the summer I have visited the parishes of St. Marie, St. Angèle, St. Grégoire, St. Césaire, St. Jean Baptiste, St. Matthias on the Richelieu, St. Hyacinthe, St. Pie, &c. I have distributed (chiefly sold, but a few loaned and given) seventeen Bibles, twenty-six New Testaments, and a great number of tracts. I have visited hundreds of families, and in some of them had hours of conversation on the Gospel. Some have invited me to return and see them, so that I consider a certain number of doors are open to the Gospel by my labors.

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Mr. Moise Robert, Evangelist, Reports—For the year ending on the 30th of September, 1900. During the year I have preached thirty-five sermons to an average congregation of thirty persons. I have visited eighty families, distributed five copies of the New Testament, 500 pages of religious tracts, and have had numerous conversations with Roman Catholics on the subject of Religion. I have given a great deal of my time to the object of raising funds and building a nice chapel. Our people have contributed \$420 to that object. The Board helping them to the balance.

They have besides contributed \$26.31 for current expenses. We have had three baptized in St. Constant.

SOREL.

The Rev. L. O. F. Coté who had been laboring on this field for seven years left for the United States in May last. For a part of the summer it has been occupied by Bro. Jacob Nicol, B.A., now a teacher at Feller Institute.

The number of members has been greatly reduced by emigration, caused by the persistent practice of the boycott, so that they were unable to earn a livelihood.

The congregations are small and there is nothing special to report. A few families living outside the city have shown some interest in spiritual things, and are accessible to the mission.

A former Grande Ligne student, Rev. Henri Sené, will enter upon his work here in November next.

COATICOOK.

For some years past the Grande Ligne Board has been operating in whole or in part a school at Coaticook.

During the first three or four years the attendance seemed to justify the maintenance of the school, but last year the attendance so diminished because of local causes, that the Board has decided to discontinue it, and attempt mission work along some other lines.

DIGBY COUNTY, N.S.

C. W. GRENIER, MISSIONARY.

We feel very grateful unto the Lord for the blessings we have had during the past year. We have been blessed individually, as a church, and God has given us souls for our hire. For two years I have been visiting a certain Acadian, father of a large family; he used to walk seven miles on the railroad to attend our meetings, but for one year he did not seem to make any progress, and I prayed for him, always in the hope that the Lord would touch his heart, as he was a very hard man. That man is now converted, and Brother Giffin baptized him two weeks ago last Sunday. We have two others who are interested. An old Acadian, aged 85, who greatly persecuted my predecessor, has always seemed to respect me highly. About three months ago he took very ill and sent for me. I went to see him, read and prayed with him, and had the comfort to know that he accepted Christ as his Saviour.

Much interest is manifested at all the meetings at the different stations. We also have cottage meetings at Sissiboo Falls with good success. I am glad to say that our church has paid \$100 towards my salary, as required by the Board.

Mrs. Grenier had the privilege to go to the M. B. W. M. U. Convention held at Windsor, N.S., where she spoke about our work. All the ladies showed much interest, and expressed a desire to do more for their missionaries in the future.

RATHWELL, MANITOBA.

F. ROULEAU, MISSIONARY.

This is the first report of our pioneer missionary in Manitoba, whose appointment resulted from the visit of Rev. A. L. Therrien to that province, and was made at the request of the Manitoba Mission Board.

His field is situated about 100 miles south west of Winnipeg comprising about 75 European French families, of these, over twenty are *accessible* and the number is increasing. "Sweeping them into the Kingdom" however is out of the question, not only because they are too scattered, but also because they are not ready.

Some encouragement has been found, from the fact that with a goodly number the bonds of Rome are growing looser, and one French convert together with six English converts have been baptized upon a profession of their faith. Some 12 others have renounced Romanism, several have professed conversion, and it is hoped they may soon follow the Lord in His own appointed way. Owing a baptistry h at Treherne, for us.

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Owing to the difficulty of finding a suitable place for baptizing, a baptistry has been placed in the hali where our meetings are held at Treherne, and Rev. J. R. Coutts has administered the ordinance for us.

The Rev. M. B. Parent, of Grande Ligne, visited the field after the Winnipeg Convention.

BIBLE WORK IN MONTREAL.

Mrs. Scott reports 66 Testaments and 46 portions of Scripture sold; 1027 chapters read; 4438 houses entered to offer the Word of God, and 243 visits made to Protestant homes to do missionary work.

A number of persons have become interested and about a dozen attend church. Five have united by baptism. Mrs. Scott has her share in these results. During the first seven months of the year, she had charge of the Bethany Home, devoting half of her time to that work. She feels encouraged in her Bible work, and feels better qualified for this than for any other work. Several interesting incidents are reported in her monthly reports that cannot be reproduced here. Mrs. Scott is supported exclusively by the Montreal Ladies Grand Ligne Association.

Miss Northwood reports for nine months work (she spent three months this summer in England) is as follows :----

Testaments sold 72; chapters 2 Scripture read 420; prolonged conversations held 315; houses entered to offer God's Word, between four and five thousand. A goodly amount of religious literature, besides the Scriptures, was distributed.

Many show a disposition to hear, but a good proportion are actuated by unworthy motives, that is, the desire to gain material advantages. A few, however, are sincere, and take hold of the Truth. Two families known to have accepted the New Testament, and to be reading it faithfully. One of these had the first Testament they purchased burnt by the priest, but they bought another. One person persistently labored with was led to Christ and united last month with the church. Singing hymns in the homes, especially at the bedside of the sick, is proving to be an efficient means of reaching the heart.

NOTE

The total amount contributed this year by the French Baptist Churches in connection with Grande-Ligne Mission, for their own support and for benevolent objects, is over \$2,000.

There have been during the year 25 conversions from Romanism, 40 baptisms, and 50 conversions to Christ.

A neat and much needed chapel is being built at St. Constant, where a church was this year organized, already numbering thirty-one members.

Two of our missionaries have gone to labor in the United States, and two of our former students have taken their places in the ranks of the Mission's labourers.

Three of Foller Institute's former students graduated at McMaster University last spring.

The work of Grande-Ligne Mission began in the garret of a log hut.

Since then 4,000 young people have been educated in its schools. Of these a large proportion were converted to Christ, 40 became ministers of the Gospel, 35 unordained missionaries, 65 teachers, 27 doctors, 5 lawyers, while *all* were made better citizens.

The expenses of Feller Institute last year cost about \$2,000 above the receipts from the students.

There were 126 residential students last winter.

Eighty students were refused admission to Feller Institute for lack of accommodation.

Enlargement is imperative, it will cost \$35,000. How much of this will you give ?

The Feller Institute at Grande-Ligne, and the primary Schools at our various stations, can be made an ever increasing power for moulding the destinies of this people, and reaching them with the Gospel message.
