





In the hine years not a single per-nanent school building has been erected, though to make adequate provision for the average annual increase of 788 pupils, about twenty classrooms should have been added every twelve months. The trustees might have sent the extra pupils home, saying they had no room for them. But realizing that this would not be fair to the little folk they did what they could to find room, and placed the newcomers in temporary buildings and in offices and corners never designed for classroom use. No fewer than 167 classes are housed in this way, in quarters that are, for the most part, unsafe, insani-


