#### **CONGRESS HONORS** HARDING'S MEMORY

Memorial Service Held in House Chamber-Widow of Late President Attends.

Washington, Feb. 28—Congress laid aside legislative business yesterday to pay tribute to the memory of Warren G. Harding.

The House and Senate joined in a memorial service held in the House chamber, with Secretary Hughes as the only speaker, and President Coolidge, his cabinet, supreme court justices and foreign diplomats in attendance.

In a gallery opposite the Speaker's rostrum sat Mr. Harding's widow.

The service lasted a little more than The service lasted a little more than an hour. After a prayer by the Rev. J. Schera Montgomery, the House chaplain, Mr. Hughes read an address in which he sketched Mr. Harding's career and referred to his accomplishments in public life. Secretary Hughes concluded his tribute to Mr. Harding with the observation that he gave his life to his country.

## **LOSE LIVES AS HOME BURNS** Mother Saves Infant as House Is Burned In Glou-

cester County-Bodies In Ruins-Father at Home of Neighbor When Flames Are First Noticed. Fire exacted a terrible toll last night at the little farm-

house of Adelard Savoie, at Maltempeque, a village eight miles from Caraquet, Gloucester county, according to a telephone message received by The Times at two o'clock this afternoon. Four children and a maid lost their lives when flames

broke out in the little home. The dead children are all boys, it was said. The name of the maid is Rosalie Godin, of Waugh. She was 23 years old. Mrs. Savoie and her infant son, four months old, were saved. The father was spending the evening neighbor. Looking out the window shortly before ten

o'clock, Mr. Savoie noticed that the sky was red in the direction of his home. He and two other men hastened to the Savoie farm. On their arrival they found the house and Every effort that was possible was made to save the

children and the maid. These proved futile. At midnight the remains, burned and scarred, were found in the ruins
