COLD COMFORT FOR MEIGHEN

Sir John Willison is a Conservative and an advocate of a high tariff. His friend Premier Meighen will hardly relish what Sir John said in the London Times, of which he is a correspondent. Early in September he wrote to the Times:

"No one believes that the government can carry the majority of the constituencies or that any one group will be able to control the next parliament. It is believed that Quebec will give Mr. Mackenzie King practically solid support. It is doubtful if more than half a dozen candidates representing Labor, Conservatives, or the Farmers' Party, will be elected in the French province. Mr. King should also carry eight or ten seats in Ontario and ten or a dozen in the Atlantic provinces. It is expected that the Farmers' Party will sweep the three prairie provinces, while Conservatives and Labor will secure most of the constituencies in British Columbia. It is impossible to foresee what effect two months' active campaign by the government may have on public opinion, but at the moment Mr. King seems likely to have a plurality over the other two groups, and if this is the result he will be called upon by the Governor General to form an administration. In that case he will probably receive enough support from among the farmers to control parliament. But when it is remembered that Mr. King will probably have in the rest of the Dominion to give him a position of advantage. The government will endeavor to make the tariff the chief issue between parties, but Mr. King has declared from every platform that there will be no radical reduction in the tariff by the Liberal government, while Mr. Meighen's attitude in regard to the tariff by which the Conservatives hope to win votes.

This should be a busy week for the friends of prohibition. The vote next Monday should be a large one, and the verdict decisive.

ASKS DISMISSAL OF APPEAL IN THE PICKFORD DIVORCE

Carleton Place, Ont., Oct. 4.—P. A. McCarron, counsel for Mary Pickford Fairbanks, motion picture actress, in her divorce proceedings against Owen Moore, yesterday asked the court to dismiss an appeal from a judgment upholding the divorce. The appeal was filed by State's Attorney-General Leonard Fowler.

Mr. McCarron argued that the appeal was not submitted within the statutory time limit and that the judgment was not subject to appeal.

Mr. Richards asked the court to examine the record so that it might see that the appeal was regular in every way. He admitted, however, that the appeal was not made within the statutory time limit.

FINDS BABE NUDE IN STREET CAR AND WILL ADOPT IT

Montreal, Oct. 4.—Finding a six-month-old child in a tram car today, its sole covering a sheet of brown paper, Mrs. Albert Simard of 887 Montcalm street, walked into the nearest police station and announced to the constables her intention of adopting it. Her husband, she said, had seen the child and agreed with her decision.

She said that she had bargained an Amherst street car at the corner of Robin street and had found a large bundle on a seat. Unwarping it she had found the child, entirely nude and apparently in good health. She had clothed and fed the child at her home, and both she and her husband were prepared to adopt it. They are childless.

SAWS HIS WAY OUT OF JAIL IN BRIDGEWATER

Bridgewater, N. S., Oct. 4.—Sawing his way through the walls of Bridgewater jail with a hand saw, Ambrose Cook, recently arrested at Westville on charge of theft of a bicycle and said to be wanted for having a liquor still on his premises, escaped yesterday and has not yet been recaptured.

LIBERAL LEADER WELL RECEIVED AT DIGBY, N. S.

Declaring that there might be some excuse for putting farmer candidates in the field, if the Liberals in 1911 had not gone down to defeat fighting the battles of the farmers on the reciprocity past, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, brought home a ringing message to a large and enthusiastic audience at Digby last evening. But as it is said they are dividing the forces of progress in seeking not alone a voice for the government, but a group in the government of their country. It would not be surprising if the common enemy of the Farmers and the Liberals had been responsible for many of the farmer candidates being placed in the field.

Dr. J. K. Lewis, Liberal candidate, Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. H. S. Bond were heard in splendid addresses which were enthusiastically received. Jules E. Prevost Renominate.

Jules Edouard Prevost, M. P. for Terrebonne county, Quebec, was renominated yesterday as Liberal candidate in the forthcoming federal elections. Increasing taxes and cost of government were the real questions today, declared Mr. King, and "businessmen" must be cut down with Mr. Meighen in power; "economy" and "retrenchment" were today's watchwords, the Liberal chieftain asserted.

And it is the home and the life of the home that we consider first, last and always in framing our tariff policy. We are not considering any special group or interest, Mr. King declared. Canada needed a proper audit of her books by men who were not seeking to cover up wrong-doing and extravagance.

Liberal Tariff Policy

"The Liberal tariff policy," declared Mr. King, "was wide enough for all the dominions." He enumerated the different industries found in the surrounding area which included the four great basic industries—mining, agriculture, lumbering and manufacturing. "The natural resources of our country must be fully developed," the Liberal leader declared, and implements and instruments of production should be relieved as far as possible from taxation to encourage fullest production. There would be no tariff.

There is no one in our party who believes free trade is a possibility in this country, said Mr. King. Our policy is not based on the interests of one class of industry only, but on the interests of all. All industries and all interests grow with increased production, and our aim is to bring about that increase.

The necessities of life, he declared, should be as free as possible from taxation, that is an aim in Liberal policy. The tariff must be for purposes of revenue, and not to aid any special interest.

There is a great national policy, and we believe as this policy is carried out so Canada will prosper and make a better place for all to live.

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 3.—Premier Meighen's opening speech in the main session was listened to by 8,000 people in the Armories here today. Again the prime minister made a powerful plea for protective tariff. Again he charged Hon. Mackenzie King with duplicity in tariff matters. Again he rebutted charges of extravagance and autocracy. The prime minister received a respectful hearing from an audience which displayed a bias and concentrated on the arguments advanced by him. With great earnestness he warned his hearers of injurious results from abandoning the present tariff system. Canada would become a backdoor, a mere dumping ground for the United States; her industries would be injured and the present unemployment system would be aggravated.

ZARO, AGED 146, MARRIES AGAIN

Oldest Man on Earth Weds Girl of 25 Years—Works as Porter in Munitions Factory.

Paris, Oct. 4.—Zaro of Constantinople, aged 146, and the oldest man on earth, lost all his teeth and hair at 109 and then grew an entirely new set of both. Developed third kidney at 105. Gets angry with his ninety-six-year-old son, because he will not work, but sticks around the house.

Zaro has been offered a fabulous sum to tour America. He says he may—after the honeymoon.

ON SURVEY TOUR FOR VICTORIAN ORDER

Miss Jessie Forshaw, of Ottawa, who was director of the first training school for public health nurses which was held here last spring and who is now Dominion inspector of the Victorian Order of Nurses, arrived in the city last evening. She left this morning for Nova Scotia to make a preliminary survey of several districts in the neighboring province which have made application for Victorian Order service.

Miss Forshaw came to the city from Montreal where she had been inspecting V. O. N. work with a view to enlarging it. During the past two months and a half she has been engaged in inspecting the work of the order in Ontario, in which province there are more than thirty branches.

Miss Forshaw expressed herself as well pleased with the manner in which the Victorian Order was co-operating in the promotion of the cause of public health. The method of the organization of serving in the home, she said, enabled the nurses of the order to demonstrate the principles of more hygienic and healthful living in an effective manner because of their actual contact with conditions and their practical work in the homes.

The regular meeting of the Catholic Women's League, central branch, was held last night in the league rooms, 100 Colburn street, with Mrs. D. P. Chisholm, the president, in the chair. Reports of the standing committees were read and were highly satisfactory. Plans were made for carrying out a successful year's work. The League is to take an active part in the home visitation which has been arranged for this week.

The free night schools were opened last evening in King Edward school and in Albert school in West St. John and the attendance at both was large. There is room for more pupils in both schools. Subjects taught are reading, writing and arithmetic. Rex Cormier, principal of King Edward school is in charge of the evening classes there, while Miss H. Smith, acting principal of Albert school, is in charge of the classes in West St. John. Classes will be conducted every evening except Sunday.

H. C. Creighton, formerly superintendent of the Canadian Express Company in this city was presented a gold watch last evening by G. H. H. Nare, on behalf of the Canadian National Express Company's employees and also former members of the staff of which Mr. Creighton was superintendent. Mr. Creighton, although greatly surprised, made a suitable reply.

The Loyalist Chapter of the I. O. O. F. held its first meeting of the season last night. The regent, Mrs. Helen Yroom, presided. The educational secretary reported that prizes had been presented at school closing to various pupils. Miss E. MacKenzie gave the report of the municipal chapter. It was agreed to contribute to the salary of the Victorian Order nurses. Miss Marion L. C. Magee was made an honorary member.

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Liberal Tariff Policy

"The Liberal tariff policy," declared Mr. King, "was wide enough for all the dominions." He enumerated the different industries found in the surrounding area which included the four great basic industries—mining, agriculture, lumbering and manufacturing. "The natural resources of our country must be fully developed," the Liberal leader declared, and implements and instruments of production should be relieved as far as possible from taxation to encourage fullest production. There would be no tariff.

There is no one in our party who believes free trade is a possibility in this country, said Mr. King. Our policy is not based on the interests of one class of industry only, but on the interests of all. All industries and all interests grow with increased production, and our aim is to bring about that increase.

The necessities of life, he declared, should be as free as possible from taxation, that is an aim in Liberal policy. The tariff must be for purposes of revenue, and not to aid any special interest.

There is a great national policy, and we believe as this policy is carried out so Canada will prosper and make a better place for all to live.

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 3.—Premier Meighen's opening speech in the main session was listened to by 8,000 people in the Armories here today. Again the prime minister made a powerful plea for protective tariff. Again he charged Hon. Mackenzie King with duplicity in tariff matters. Again he rebutted charges of extravagance and autocracy. The prime minister received a respectful hearing from an audience which displayed a bias and concentrated on the arguments advanced by him. With great earnestness he warned his hearers of injurious results from abandoning the present tariff system. Canada would become a backdoor, a mere dumping ground for the United States; her industries would be injured and the present unemployment system would be aggravated.

ZARO, AGED 146, MARRIES AGAIN

Oldest Man on Earth Weds Girl of 25 Years—Works as Porter in Munitions Factory.

Paris, Oct. 4.—Zaro of Constantinople, aged 146, and the oldest man on earth, lost all his teeth and hair at 109 and then grew an entirely new set of both. Developed third kidney at 105. Gets angry with his ninety-six-year-old son, because he will not work, but sticks around the house.

ON SURVEY TOUR FOR VICTORIAN ORDER

Miss Jessie Forshaw, of Ottawa, who was director of the first training school for public health nurses which was held here last spring and who is now Dominion inspector of the Victorian Order of Nurses, arrived in the city last evening. She left this morning for Nova Scotia to make a preliminary survey of several districts in the neighboring province which have made application for Victorian Order service.

Miss Forshaw came to the city from Montreal where she had been inspecting V. O. N. work with a view to enlarging it. During the past two months and a half she has been engaged in inspecting the work of the order in Ontario, in which province there are more than thirty branches.

Miss Forshaw expressed herself as well pleased with the manner in which the Victorian Order was co-operating in the promotion of the cause of public health. The method of the organization of serving in the home, she said, enabled the nurses of the order to demonstrate the principles of more hygienic and healthful living in an effective manner because of their actual contact with conditions and their practical work in the homes.

EVIDENCE ON THE MURDER CHARGE

Edward O'Brien was arraigned in the supreme court before Mr. Justice Barry yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock charged, with Thomas James Spellman, with acting together and murdering Albert Norris in this city on the night of Sept. 8. O'Brien pleaded not guilty. A separate trial will be given each of the accused, O'Brien being tried first. Considerable difficulty was experienced in selecting a jury, there being nineteen challenges by the defence. Twelve members of the panel were absent and Judge Barry ordered that a fine of \$10 be levied against each. Five of the men who served on the jury which tried John Paris were sworn in yesterday as members of the jury that will try O'Brien. The new jury is composed of the following: G. Whitfield Hatheway, John A. Deiscoli, A. Chipman Ritchie, DeWitt Cairns, Walter A. Adams, Herbert Nice, William T. Jenkins, Charles J. Hoyt, Wilford M. Barlow, Joseph S. Gray, John W. Arnour, Richard H. Irwin.

The work of selecting the jury was then undertaken. This took an hour to complete. Those who were absent at roll call were: Charles J. Clayton, Geo. A. Kelley, T. Carleton Olive, James B. March, George A. Stackhouse, Clarence B. Allen, W. E. Anderson, Edward A. Farren, William Scott, Gilbert A. Davidson, Harry A. B. Pales, Robert B. Amland. Judge Barry said it was no joke for jurors to come and go as they liked. It was as fair for one to come as for the others. He requested a list of those absent and placed it in the hands of the sheriff to levy a \$10 fine. Frederick C. Wesley said he was prejudiced and was challenged. Joseph Gilbert and G. Connell also were accused. Those challenged by the defence were: William W. Hawker, Stanley C. Webb, Marshall D. Austin, Howard G. Blayk, Ralph Dyleman, James Boyle, George H. Berton, W. Edgar Campbell, George B. Crowe, Albert W. Black, William A. Dykeman, Robert M. Thorne, J. Fred Emery, Robert E. Armstrong, William S. Clawson, W. Arnold Fox and Robert M. Barch.

The limit of the panel was reached when only eleven jurors had been selected but the sheriff called Richard H. Irwin from among the spectators and, after slight objection, he was sworn in.

same as that given at the preliminary examination. Henry W. Norris, son of the murdered man, told of his father's

movements on the day of the tragedy. He said that when he found his father unconscious in an alley off Erin street, one of his pockets was turned inside out. He identified two pieces of board and a hat produced in court as the same as were lying beside his father. To Mr. Ryan he said that his father drank occasionally.

John L. Steeves testified to finding Norris unconscious. He said he had seen the murdered man sometimes in an intoxicated condition. His evidence was corroborated by Judson Totten and Roy Shannon.

Bernard Bowes told of receiving a drink of whiskey from O'Brien about ten o'clock on the night of the murder. Both O'Brien and Spellman, who was with him, were under the influence of liquor, the witness said. Bayard Vanwart told of receiving a drink from Spellman, who was quite drunk.

Dr. E. M. Pennington gave evidence regarding Norris' injuries and his death, which he said was due to fracture of the skull. Dr. H. L. Abramson told of making an autopsy and of finding death due to skull fracture. Mrs. Mabel G. Patter-

CECIL SCORES AMBASSADORS

Geneva, Oct. 3.—The assembly of the League of Nations made amendment of the covenant easier by adopting today under the old unanimity rule a change in article 26, requiring unanimity for amendments, and some began consideration of the proposed alterations in the covenant under the new rule.

The Albania-Greco-Yugo-Slav problem broke out again unexpectedly, but finally was disposed of so far as this assembly is concerned by the declaration of the Albanian delegation that it would accept the decision of the ambassadors' council.

Lord Robert Cecil took occasion to score the ambassadors for their delay, saying: "We have heard that the ambassadors are about to give their decision. I hope and trust it is so because, if I may venture very respectfully to say so to such an august body, delays in such a matter are criminal to the peace of the world."

KENTVILLE MAN IS DROWNED

Kentville, N. S., Oct. 3.—Ernest O'Hara, 25, Kentville, was drowned, presumably Sunday night, in the Cornwallis river. It was learned with the recovery of his body today.

THREE MOTORISTS KILLED BY TRAIN

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Cortland, Ont., Oct. 3.—Mr. and Mrs. J. Lafond and Miss E. Rocher, residents of South Walsingham, were instantly killed and three-year-old Guy Farrell reported dying in Tilsonburg hospital as a result of their motor car being struck by the Wabash flyer at a level crossing one mile west of here today.

Edinburgh, Scotland, Oct. 3.—Field Marshal Earl Haig, who commanded the British forces in France and Belgium in the great war, speaking at a grand rally of the Edinburgh branches of the British Legion here, said he had written to President Harding congratulating him upon what he was doing in connection with the calling of a conference at Washington on limitation of armament and problems of the Far East, and that he had received a reply from the United States president to this communication.

The field marshal read the president's letter to the audience. In it President Harding said he was deeply impressed with the warm congratulations upon "our efforts to establish more firmly the foundations of world peace."

COAL TO TORONTO FROM N. S. BY THE WATER ROUTE

Toronto, Oct. 4.—Toward the end of the present week Toronto will once more see Nova Scotia coal being unloaded here after an all-water passage. The Torco Cape, owned by the Century Coal Company, is due on Friday or Saturday with a load of coal, the first cargo to be brought from Sydney following a trial shipment made some time ago. The consignment will represent the first real effort to get around the haulage obstacle and port demolition coal into Toronto on a commercial basis.

To avoid returning empty, the vessel will carry grain from Port Colborne to Montreal.



IMPROVEMENTS TO HOSPITAL PASSED

Plans for the extension of the epidemic hospital to provide accommodation for the nurses and for sixteen cases of measles at an additional expenditure of \$10,000, above the previous grant for the epidemic extension, were approved at the meeting of the board of commissioners of the general public hospital yesterday. This plan has been approved by the mayor of the city and warden of the county, who have undertaken to support a petition to the municipal council for the grant of the extra amount. Alterations to the present hospital and the former nurses' home, to give accommodation to 48 more patients, and an enlarged out-patient department also were approved. The interns, the help, and part of the laboratory equipment are now housed in the former nurses' home and the space left in the hospital is being used for patients. Much business was transacted at the meeting and matters not dealt with were left for a special meeting to be called shortly. The financial statement showed receipts as follows: X Ray, \$171; seamen, \$201; paid patients, \$2,298.15; city, \$10,187.06; total \$12,959.04. Expenses were \$9,508.65. The overdraft was \$1,924.28.

Dr. Roberts explained a scheme to clear out the present hospital basement, to bury the piping and heating beneath the ground, and replace the brick supports with steel stanchions at a cost of \$2,500. In the empty space, 24 feet by 80 feet, he proposed to provide accommodation for the out-patient department, for X-ray department, for clinics for the admission of ambulance and general patients. The heating of the remodelled basement and of the flats above, together with the cost of emptying the basement, would cost about \$4,000. In the present out-patient department, accommodation would be provided for twenty-four more patients in addition to the eight private and eleven semi-private provided for by the nurses' home alteration.

The superintendent reported 169 patients admitted, sixteen died and 118 remained. There were fifty-nine operations in the operating rooms and fifty in the out-patient department. Hon. Dr. Roberts, for the committee considering alterations to the epidemic hospital and enlargement of the out-patient department, reported that the plan to build a separate epidemic nurses' home was not approved and the erection of a new epidemic was considered an impossibility from a financial standpoint. The mayor and warden of the county had approved a proposition to extend the present epidemic to the north and east by the Municipal Council for this purpose. Mr. Brodie submitted plans for proposed alterations.

The superintendent of nurses reported eight graduate nurses, sixty-one student nurses in the school, three on leave, three on vacation, four in Montreal, two in isolation and eight on night duty. Dra. Kelly, Allingham and McDonald were appointed as a committee on the appointment of a radiograph to consult with the commissioners. The dietician's report contained statistical statements with total expenses, \$8,029.26 for the food supplies for the month.

It was made known that the appropriation was being exceeded, but the hospital population has increased since the appropriation was made.

Fatality in Sydney. Sydney, N. S., Oct. 3.—John Crooks, a workman at the Dominion Iron and Steel plant, died yesterday from injuries sustained on Saturday when a turbine which he was operating at high speed was burst by centrifugal force.

Trade Commissioner Speaks of Visit in the Interests of Trade Expansion.

Speaking to a Times reporter this morning, Hugh A. Chisholm, Canadian trade commissioner to the Caribbean Sea district, said that he had interviewed exporters and importers of St. John with a view to encouraging trade to the West Indies and the far East. He said that he has met with some success, but as a whole he found the various concerns a little too much conservative; that they looked too much to the Canadian market, and not enough to the world market, which, on account of the cheaper haul, were as close as our own western market.

He said that they complained of the lack of ships, but if the shipping companies were sure of freight they would provide the service. He said that it was noticeable that the merchants of both St. John and Halifax did not pull together as well as those of the upper Canadian cities. He hoped, however, that his visit might do some service in this regard. He paid a strong tribute to the Canadian Government Merchant Marine and said that they were doing excellent work in this direction. Mr. Chisholm left for Montreal this afternoon.

Pittsburg, Oct. 4.—Another advance in the price of Pennsylvania crude oil was announced here today by the principal purchasing agencies, the second within a week. The new price is \$2.75 a barrel, an increase of 25 cents.

EMPLOYER AND RETURNED MAN

Matter Comes Up at Meeting of Association of Workmen's Compensation Boards.

At this morning's session of the annual meeting of the Canadian Association of Workmen's Compensation Boards, merit rating, method of computing interest, after care of pensioners, construction of a provincial balance sheet, rehabilitation plan of the D. S. C. R., cost of second injuries, industrial poisoning and repairs to pyrothoetic teeth were discussed carefully. There were no prepared papers, at each question came up the various members of the board gave their opinions and offered suggestions for improvement of the regulations now in force. The care of pyrothoetic teeth was considered carefully and the medical members of the board gave opinions which they formed from cases which they had treated.

At the afternoon meeting E. H. Scammel, of Ottawa, assistant deputy minister of the D. S. C. R., delivered an address on the subject of the returned man. He said that the average employer hesitated to take a slightly disabled man into his factory because he was more likely to be injured and thus cause expense to the concern. The Dominion government, though the D. S. C. R. has set aside a sum for the purpose of paying the injured returned man who is employed. Any man who is a pensioner of 20 per cent or more will be looked after by this fund.

The Workmen's Compensation Board of the province in which the accident occurred will assess the liability but the employer will not be liable.

Mr. Scammel asked the various boards to co-operate with him in explaining this matter to the employers and thus secure employment for the returned man. Several members of the board advanced suggestions for the betterment of the scheme and all promised to do their utmost to help it along.

TRAFFIC CASES

No By-law to Cover One Reported in Police Court Today.

Most of the time in the police court this morning was taken up with by-law reports. A report, governing which apparently there is no city by-law, was made by Policeman Dykeman against Joseph Kelleher, a motorman with the Power Company, for stopping his car between seventy and eighty feet from a white pole. The policeman said that Kelleher had topped his car on Union St. yesterday afternoon in front of the Opera House and some passengers got off. He had made the report he said in view of the by-law dealing with buses which read that they must stop within fifty feet of a white pole.

H. H. McLean, Jr., for the power company said that there was no by-law covering this report and asked for a dismissal but stating that, if brought into effect such a law might prove a good thing. There was no law to compel cars to stop at white poles or within fifty feet of them.

The court held the view also that there was no by-law to deal with this report. He commended the policeman, the wedding to take place at an early date.

Thomas Dickens a chauffeur was fined \$10 for speeding in Main street. Frank McGarrigle was fined a similar amount for driving on the wrong side of the street. Both pleaded guilty.

Frank Dykeman, Fred Sewell, Frank Cheney, Michel McNeally, James Rogers and Fred Hyman were reported by Policeman Linton for operating public cars in West St. John without displaying the proper license tag. Fines of \$10 were imposed in each case. When the court was closed to take up some juvenile matters the six men filed from the court to the guard room down stairs. The magistrate said they would secure to stay until they arranged to pay the fine.
