

# ONE MAN OWNS WHOLE TOWN OF HUDDERSFIELD

(London Tit-Bits.) "No ye, that we, in consideration of he sum of £965 Os. 9d." (value about 29,650 7s. 6d today) "have granted to William Ramsden, his heirs and assigns, all that our manor of Huddersfield, etc. and all our capital messuage or tene ment, all Bay Hall, in Huddersfield

It was not, however, until 1880 that the late Sir John Ramsden became absolutely sole lord of Huddersfield, for there was a small plot of land in the centre of the town which did not belong to the Ramsden family. The last owners of the little plot was the late Thomas Frith, a Quaker of Brighouse. Frith could not be induced to part with this little plot of land, although he was offered a price by Sir John Ramsden which would have sufficed to pave the land with guineas. The old Quaker, however, refused to accept, saying: "Nay, not if thou sets them edgeways. Nay, Sir John, Huddersfield will belong to thee and me still."

When Mr. Frith died, in 1880, the testators conveyed the land to Sir John Ramsden, and he thus became sole owner of Huddersfield.

Has Been Raised.

There will be gratification among Carlyleans all the world over that the historian's birthplace is henceforth secure from molestation. The committee of management concerned announces that the purchase of the adjoining house is complete and that there is no further anxiety concerning the building.

Every visitor to the little Dumfriesshire village of Ecclefechan knows "the Arched House," as it is called; indeed this humble building is the only reason that can draw the visitor to a border hamlet which has few attractions.

Carlyle himself says harsh things concerning it in letters to his brother John, and was probably writing more under the influence of the memories of his struggling boyhood than, from any real contempt for the place itself.

Ecclefechan, like its neighbor, Lockerbie, probably grew out of an ancient house of call on the high road that goes north from Carlisle and over the Lanarkshire Hills to Glasgow.

The historian's ancestors may have proceeded from either side the border, and they certainly included, as he tells us himself, a reiver or thief, who was hanged for sheep stealing. But no man could have been more law abiding than James Carlyle, the mason, who built this cottage in which his famous son was born.

The house or pair of houses, joined by an arch big enough to drive a wagon through, is just a two-story structure of lowland freestone, covered with limewash; squared as to windows and doors and firmly slated as to the roof.

It stands on the west side of the broad village street not far from the trickle—half-stream, half-ditch—that distinguishes Ecclefechan from its rivals, and not far from the smart church which guards the little yard where Carlyle lies among his kindred. His wife is gathered to her fathers at Huddington.



"Already the study of housing has led us to the question of tax reform, and, of course, to the question of cheap and fapid transportation. The two questions react on one another, as one of the immediate results of extended means of transportation is the raising of the value as a result of public expenditure. The remedy for housing conditions in Canada will be found, I believe, in proper city planning, accompanied by tax reform; the one to properly control future building development, and the other to secure for the community a fair return for their expenditure on improvements. Proper control under city or town planning schemes is a necessary preliminary to tax reform, as the community should not be permitted to acquire an interest in or enjoy the fruits of taxation based upon high values which result from overcrowded and unhealthy conditions. Subject to this reservation, and to the proper protection of private interests, land values which can be shown to be created by communal activity should belong to and be used for the benefit of the community which creates them, instead of by the individual in whom, for the time being, the title to the property is vested. If each citizen had some share in the newly created wealth there would be less inequality, but under our existing system of taxation and ownership the landless members of the community, who have no participated in the profits, must all pay in some form or other their share of this increment. Communal values are created to meet and are intended to be used for communal exponsibilities. Through values such as these the State can and should make adequate provision for the otherwise unobtainable welfare of its citizens.
