REVIEW AND PASTORAL ADDRESS BY THE SESSION.

A review of the year 1885 affords ample occasion for gratitude to God. His mercies, both in those things which He has graciously bestowed, and in those which He has graciously withheld, have been very great. For temporal benefits and rich spiritual blessings, for joys and sorrows, for the living and the dead, let us all bless His holy name.

The attendance upon the services of the Sanctuary, and the religious meetings, during the week, have been, in general, a source of gratification and cause of thankfulness.

In May last, the Session made a very careful revision of the Communion Roll. After deleting all the names that could not be vouched for, and removing to the Retired List those that were questionable, the total number of Communicants in good standing, after revision, to the best of the Session's knowledge, together with corrections up to the end of the year, is six hundred and nineteen.

In the past year, fourteen members have been removed by death, thirty-two have been transferred, by change of residence, to other congregations, in all forty-six. Thirtyseven have been enrolled, upon their own confession of Christ, and fifty by certificate from other congregations,

making additions, in all, of eighty-seven.

and thirty-four infants; thirty-five in all. The number of families claiming connection with the congregation, entered on the pastor's Visiting List, is three hundred and seventy.

Twenty-two persons, in all, connected with this congregation, have been removed by death, during the past year. The roll of our blessed dead is, this year, specially remarkable by the large number of men and women prominent in society and in the Church, for their Christian activity, which it includes. Here is occasion, amid universal sorrow, for that mutual sympathy and consolation enjoined in the Word of God: "Whether one member suffer all the members suffer with it." We weep, as a congregation, with those amongst us who weep over their dead.

The Session have, in this connection, to record their profound regret at the removal, by death, of Mr. Duff Cameron, one of their number, and their sense of the great loss which they, and the whole congregation, have sustained in his decease. They desire to bear affectionate testimony to his many excellencies as a Christian and Office-bearer in the Church. They always found him instant in duty, wise in counsel, constant in zeal, and tireless in effort for the prosperity of the congregation, whose interests, both

spiritual and temporal, were dear to his heart.

In consequence of the death of some of their number, the change of residence of others, the increasing infirmities of not a few, venerable for long years of worthy service, and the acceptance of the resignations of Messrs. Robert Scott and Wm. Bain, the Session are convinced that the spiritual interests of the Congregation urgently demand an adequate addition of suitable elders to the present staff. Arrangements will therefore be made at as early a date as possible, to give effect to this demand in the constitutional way.

To all who love the extension of Christ's Kingdom, one unusual and unpleasant fact must be noted in the Report of the Missionary Association—a decrease in the Contributions to the Schemes of the Church. Slight as this decrease may be, taking it into consideration along with the importance of these grand schemes, the least decrease in support of them must be noticed with very great regret. the knowledge of this decrease will prove more than its remedy, and that the increasing liberality towards those splendid enterprises of our Church, on the part of all who profess and call themselves Christians, within her bounds, will henceforth place our Congregation in a most exemplary and honorable position thereanent. On the other hand, there are twofacts which, in particular, are noticed with great pleasure by the Session. (a) The completely successful effort of our energetic and praiseworthy Board of Managers to remove, through the liberality of the Congregation, the debt upon the Church property. We thank God with gladness that, now, St. Andrew's Church "owes no man anything but to love one another." (b) The other fact to be noted, with strong commendation, is the proposed method for raising the revenues of the Congregation by the practice of systematic, voluntary offerings. Such a scheme has very much to recommend it to our people. It is the only equitable method. Its principle is, as the Lord has prospered a man, so let him give to the Lord. It makes giving for the support of religious ordinances not a commercial transaction for the use of a pew, but a consecrated offering to the Lord for the benefits of the Gospel. It is the only scriptural plan. Guided, therefore, to its practice by the Word of God, we may confidently expect God's blessing upon its operations and results.

The records of the year show that the various organizations. for Christian work in the Bible Class, Sabbath School, Band of Hope, Women's Foreign Mission Society, Ladies' Aid, Girls' Benevolent Society, and the Choir, have been faithfully worked and crowned with encouraging measures of success.

An earnest hope is cherished by the Session that all who. are connected with, or may hereafter connect themselves with our Congregation, whether as members or adherents, will kindly give personal aid and Christian co-operation in the various. departments of service opened to them in these organizations. There is room for all. There is opportunity for all. There is work for all. The harvest is great, the laborers are few. May the Lord make all willing to work and send them into his. vineyard.

The Session would most earnestly commend to all the

households connected with the congregation the constant observance of family worship, and to every member and adherent the godly habit of secret prayer, and to the whole Congregation a faithful and regular attendance, as far as practicable, upon all the services of the Lord's Day, the Prayer Meeting on Wednesday evening and a diligent use of every means of They most heartily recommend the faithful work of the Sabbath School Superintendent and his devoted staff of teachers, and affectionately urge all parents blessed with children in their homes, to send them regularly to the Sabbath School and give them a parent's prayers and loving aid in their preparation of the Sabbath lesson. They express great satisfaction at the results of the Pastor's class, and counsel as many as possible of the adult members and adherents of the Congregation, and especially our young men, to avail themselves of the advantages of this method of Biblical teaching.

The Session fervently pray, and invite all to pray with them, for more of the Power of the Holy Spirit to rest on our Congregation, that times of refreshing from the Lord may visit us, and that our beloved people may be as a garden

which the Lord has blessed.

They, finally, entreat all the members to walk more closely with God, during this year, by consecrating some portion, of even the busiest life, to daily communion with God in private acts of devotion and prayful study of His word, by solemn and earnest prayer for the unsaved among us, and by fervent supplication to God, before each religious service, for the promised power and demonstration of the Holy Gnost, to edify, to convince, convert and sanctify all the people.

Now the God of Hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing that ye may abound in hope through the power of the

Holy Ghost.

THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

BEING FOR THE YEAR 1885.

Congregation upon the fact that the Church and all our Church property are free from debt, and have great pleasure in handing to the Trustees the last mortgage fully discharged. For this, and the religious privileges uninterruptedly enjoyed during the past year, we have much reason to praise God.

2nd. A full list of the subscribers, and the amounts paid by each, to the fund for liquidation of this debt since its inception, is appended. There were other subscribers, and, in a few instances, larger sums were subscribed, but owing to changed circumstances these have not been enforced, and it is a great satisfaction to the Board that they have been able so early to bring this matter to a successful issue.

3rd. It should not be overlooked that the Trustees have still in hand \$1,000, being part of the liberal legacy bequeathed to the Church by the late John Stewart. There is also the property fronting on Dufferin Avenue, which was offered for sale last summer but not sold.

4th. The ordinary sources of income, under the present systems of raising revenue for congregational purposes, have not been sufficiently liberal to meet in a prompt and comfortable manner the current expenses. The financing has occasioned much unnecessary trouble and anxiety to the manage-

ment, and in September last the Board had a circular printed and issued to the members urging them to make their Sabbath contributions in silver. The extra amount thus given would not really be seriously felt by any, and it would sufficiently increase the aggregate to keep the Treasurer always in funds, and meet, in a liberal manner, all the ordinary expenses of the congregation for stipend, salaries, repairs and general incidentals, without resorting to special calls, which are always more or less vexatious to some. This circular, and the monthly reminders which followed, did not effect much improvement, although it was hoped the congregation might in a short time be educated to a more liberal and systematic method of giving for the maintenance of religious ordinances and Church privileges, which now require from \$4,000 to \$4,500 yearly.

5th. The Board has seriously considered the question of making the pews and sittings in the Church free, and instituting a system of voluntary offerings in envelopes for the support of Gospel ordinances. This is unquestionably the scriptural method, and wherever it has been introduced and properly worked, the results have been highly satisfactory

both to the membership and management.

6th. The property of the Congregation has been well maintained and improved during the year. Attention is specially called to the removal of the picket fence and substitution of an iron railing around the Church and Manse, which was occasioned by the change of side walk and boulevards on Waterloo Street by the Corporation. We have now one of

the most handsome Church properties in the City.

7th. In April last the Board had under consideration the closing of St. Andrew's Cemetery, owing to the likelihood, in the near future, of further interments there being prohibited, and there being now, it might be said, no applicants for plots, the families connected with the Congregation having mostly secured ground in the other new cemeteries. We have been offered land from both of the new cemetery Boards on very favorable terms, giving plot-holders in our cemetery the privilege of selecting their own sites; or, if desired, the Church could secure sections in the other cemeteries for allotment to

present s, have omfortas occananageour plot-holders in exchange, and the amount which could be realized from the old grounds might be applied in removing and re-interring the bodies, and changing the monuments. The Board is of opinion that St. Andrew's Cemetery has served its purpose, and recommend action in this matter to the extent, at least, of advising against all further interments.

8th. The hearty thanks of the Congregation are due to the members of the choir for their kind and efficient services during

the past year.

9th. The Auditors, Messrs. Purdom and Somerville, have examined vouchers, and audited Treasurer's books for the year, and a full statement of receipts and disbursements is herewith submitted.

noth. Believing that a pipe organ would greatly improve the psalmody, and render the Church services more beneficial to all, and being already well assured that a suitable organ, specially designed for this Church, will be put in without involving the Congregation in any debt, the managers would welcome it, and trust both members and adherents will manifest their approval by voting "Yea"

11th. The following members of the Board retire by expiration of their term of office, but are eligible for re-election, viz:—Messrs. John Ferguson, C. McCallum, H. E. Nelles, J. G.

BIBLE CLASS.

The Bible Class, under the teaching of our esteemed Pastor, continues its work with unabated interest, and, we hope, with increasing spiritual benefit to the young people

attending it.

The average attendance for the year has been seventy-five young men and women. The subjects of study have been the International Sunday School Lessons, which have been made very interesting and profitable, and we would be gratified to see a larger number of our young men avail themselves of the benefits to be derived by attending.

It was felt that a good Library was very much needed in connection with the Class, and this year a committee was formed, who have, at an expense of \$180, purchased, and put in good running order, the same. By contributions in the Class, and one or two social gatherings held, they have raised some of this amount, but there is still a balance of \$85 due. Towards this the Committee are going to put forward a special effort, and they hope, before the expiration of their term of office, to be able to report the Class free from debt.

The collections for the seven months in which the class has been held, is \$35, which, the members have decided, should apply on the Library fund. Hence the reason that they cannot apportion their contributions for the past year to the

schemes of the Church, as formerly.

THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY

Of St. Andrew's Church.

The Ladies' Aid Society have much pleasure in reporting that they have just concluded a prosperous year.

At the last annual meeting, the former officers of the Society retiring, new officers were elected, and a Visiting Committee formed to visit monthly throughout the entire congregation.

The scheme of soliciting ten cents per month from willing subscribers, for the purpose of raising funds for the Society, was adduced and very successfully carried out, it having been collected by the visiting committee on their monthly visitation, the funds raised in this way being entirely devoted to the poor of the congregation. No call was made upon the sacramental collection, which was left in the hands of the managers.

As will be seen by the treasurer's statement, quite a large amount was acquired by this scheme, and in order to assist the managers the Society proposed extending it to the gentlemen of the congregation, and a letter to that effect was forwarded to the managers in July last, but as no reply was received, no further action was taken in the matter.

The Visiting Committee have averaged 175 visits permonth during the year. Trusting in the Giver of all good, we hope the ensuing year may prove as prosperous as the past, and that those who have so kindly and willingly assisted us will be enabled to continue their efforts, knowing that a good work is being done amongst us.
