Found Dead

The body of the man which was found near the railway track at Clark's Beach last Friday night has been identified as that of James Muford, a fisherman, of Sandy Cove, Port de Grave.

Mr. Muford, so we learn, was returning from the Labrador in a sick condition. He landed from the steamer at H. R. Grace and bought his ticket for Clark's Beach. He was brought beyond Clarke's Beach to Huelville station. Getting off there he started out to return. Feeling rather weak he visited a house and obtained a cup of tea. Leaving the house he started off to look for a tubman to drive him home, and while doing so he died from exhaustion.

An investigation into the circumstances of the poor man's death is being conducted by Magistrate Thompson at Brigus this week. The conductor of the train and the train crew, relieving officer Gosse and others are being examined.

Westminster Gazette on Voluntary Recruiting

London, Aug. 23.—The Westminster Gazette, while reiterating its preference for voluntary recruiting says the most serious argument which can be brought forward on the question is the necessity, at this stage of the conflict, for making some public demonstration of the firmness of this country's intentions, in order to reassure the other nations with which we are allied. The Westminster Gazette thinks that any doubts on this point could be settled by a declaration from the Government that it was raising an army of minimum forces to be defined by a certain number of troops, and that in order to ensure the reaching of the complement stated, every means, including compulsory service, if necessary, would be exerted.

Ship is Sunk And Captain Killed

London, August 24.—Pursued for four hours by a German submarine, the freighter Diemed, of the Lamport & Holt Line, was finally sunk yesterday, after her crew had been rescued by shells fired by the submarine. The disaster occurred near the entrance to St. George's Channel.

Japs. to Help Russia

Amsterdam, Aug. 30.—Japan's decision to assist Russia by increasing her output of war munitions has been announced officially to Petrograd, The Telegraph says. Japan has notified Russia she is preparing to mobilize her entire industrial resources for this purpose.

Good macaroni is of a yellowish tinge, does not break readily in cooking and swells to three or four times its bulk. If boiled, frosting has been cooked too long, it may be rendered smooth again by adding a piece of butter the size of a walnut before beating it. Only the yellow rind and juice of lemons should be used. The white pith under the yellow is bitter and care should be taken not to use it at all, especially in cookery. If you stage a chicken by holding it over the chafing dish, you can do the task thoroughly and have no spot on the skin of the fowl. After boiling salt beef leave two or three cooked carrots in the liquor until cold. The carrots will absorb the salt and liquor can be used for soup. Sometimes boot polish becomes quite dry with keeping. Moistens it with a little turpentine. It softens the polish, making it usable at once and also gives a good gloss to the leather. London, Sept. 1.—The announcement was made at Lambeth Palace to-day that the Archbishop of Canterbury last week had a serious relapse of illness from which he suffered two years ago. Some weeks must elapse before he will be able to resume work.

Ex-Premier and Others Arrested

Winnipeg, Sept. 1.—Sir Rodmond Roblin, J. N. Howden, Dr. Monaghan and G. R. Caldwell, will appear before Police Magistrate McDonald to-morrow morning charged with conspiracy to defraud the Province. It is expected they will be remanded. The four ex-ministers voluntarily appeared at the city Police Station and were released on bail of \$50,000 each.

Decline in Exchange

New York, Sept. 1.—The trend in the money market here today was a decline in the exchange rate for the first time since it was set at par for the dollar. The alarmingly sharp drop in foreign exchange rates, notably sterling, at the close of business tonight the English pound fetched but \$4.55 1/4 in American money. A detachment of British bankers will soon reach New York on a mission to straighten the money market.

The Pope Ill

Rome, Sept. 1.—Pope Benedict's anxiety over the war reached such a point that he is restless and suffering from insomnia. However he is relentless in his endeavors to mitigate the horrors of the conflict and bring about a situation where efforts on behalf of peace will be likely to have some chances of success.

King's Gracious Message

(Daily News) Through the courtesy of His Excellency the Governor we are enabled to give publicity to the following correspondence which includes the gracious message of His Majesty the King to the Newfoundland Regiment previous to embarking for active service. Royal Wavillon, Aldershot Camp, Lieut. Colonel R. de B. Burton, Commanding The Newfoundland Regiment. "Before the Regiment leaves for Active Service to-night I wish to send my heartfelt wishes to you and all ranks. I have had the most pleasant accounts of the work done by the Regiment since its arrival in England and from my personal observations of the Guard of Honour furnished to me on my arrival at Aldershot, I have little doubt that the Regiment will give a good account of itself in the face of the enemy. Good-bye and Godspeed!"

19th August, 1915. Newfoundland Regiment, Steamship Transport, "Meganitic," Plymouth, August 20th, 1915.

Sir:—I have the honour to forward here-with copy of letter received from His Majesty the King, dated 19th August, and my reply, in the name of Your Excellency's staff captain. I have the honour to be, Sir, Your obedient servant, R. de B. BURTON, Lt. Col. Commanding The Contingent, Newfoundland Regiment, Aldershot Camp, 19th, 1915.

Dear Capt. Seymour:—On behalf of all ranks of the Newfoundland Contingent I beg to thank you very much for the letter received from you for his grace and the honor which you will read out to us, and which we are all proud to receive.

Attention to Mouth and Teeth

Too much attention cannot be paid to mouth and teeth. On May 28th the 800,000 children of the public schools of New York City bought tooth brushes for the first celebration of Tooth Brush Day. The entire week was hygienic Week, and devoted to the scrubbing of teeth and dental hygiene. As 4 o'clock all the children were taught what first aid to the teeth meant, and the serious result of neglecting them. This was done by trained specialists, prominent dentists of the city, 150 of whom volunteered to aid the Board of Education. They spoke for an hour in the schools. Friday, Tooth Brush Day, saw drills in every school immediately after the opening of the afternoon session! The actual demonstration was done in each class by a leader. The class leader had in addition a cup of water; and the drill went as follows: "One, two, three, four, brush the front teeth with a rotary motion. Dip. One, two, three, four, brush teeth at the side with the same motion. Dip." The leader had real water in her cup, but the children made believe, and with their brushes went through the "one, two, three, four, dip," following each motion of the leader.

A field day of dental hygiene brought the week to a close, with tooth brush drills in Central Park, Prospect Park, Van Cortlandt Park and the Bronx. The school children in the contest, which was run by the Department of Physical Training of the Board of Education, C. Ward Crampton, Director, competed for banners. Thus, these 800,000 children spread the gospel of mouth cleanliness in that many homes and to five million people.

Letter From Volunteer Bradbury

Badajos Barracks, Aldershot, Aug. 13, 1915. (Editor the Guardian). Dear Sir,—I suppose you would like to hear how we are enjoying ourselves on this side of the water. As we hear that we are leaving for the Dardanelles in the near future, we are hoping to have the same luck there as we have had during the time since we enlisted. Yesterday we were inspected by Lord Kitchener. He said to us, "You men of Newfoundland, you are not only a credit to your Island but to us all, and I am more than glad to see the way in which you have come up to the standard." There were over twenty thousand soldiers standing on our parade ground, and as many civilians. They were, I believe, uncountable. It is good times with us all the way along, and we believe that when it comes to us to use the steel we will show them the kind of stuff we are made of. One thing, sir, I can tell you, that every one of us are longing for the time to come when we will be able to do our part.

We are now training in the best military base that England has got, and I think we have got enough of training now to manage the Turks. We received our orders this morning to be ready in 14 days' time, so you know that we will soon get our chance. Now, sir, all of our boys are feeling good. I had the preference of being taken from E Company and transferred to A Co., also Robert Butler. Although we didn't enlist as soon as a company we will be to the front as quick as now I have to finish and go on parade. Hoping to be able to come back again and see old Bay Roberts again, and wishing the town prosperity and good luck, I will close. Hoping to hear from you and wishing you as happy times as we are having. I remain, Sir, your devoted soldier boy, R. BRADBURY, 1st Nfld. Regiment, 1st Bn., Aldershot Barracks.

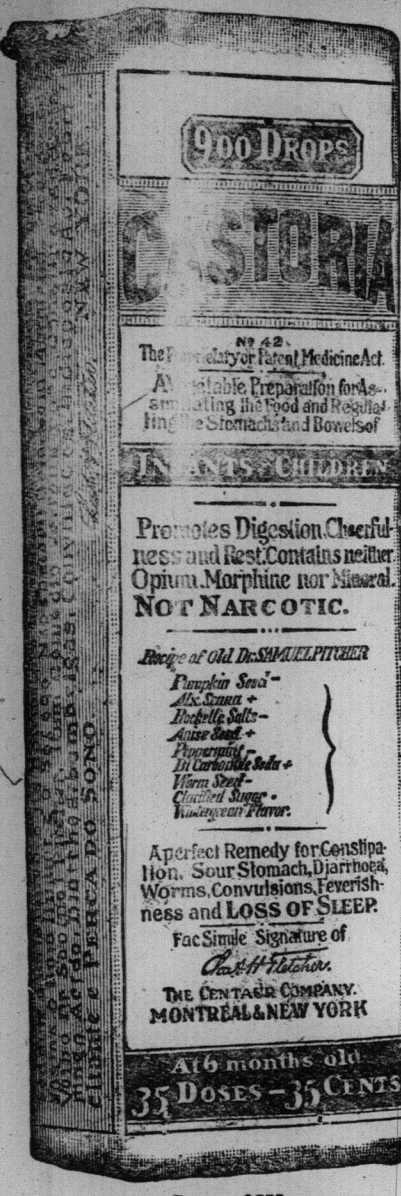

Public Notice

Censorship of Telegraphs, Cables, and Wireless Stations.

By direction of the British Censor, London, the following Regulations will be in force on and after Friday next, January 15th, namely:—
1. Cablegrams in authorized editions of A.B.C. Lieber's, Scott's and Western Union Codes only may be exchanged between British Allied or Neutral Territory or extra European Telegraph System on one side, and British or Allied Territory, wherever situated, on the other side.
2. The term "Extra European Telegraph System" means the places outside the Telegraph System of Europe. Besides the places in Europe proper, the following are also counted as being on the European Telegraph System, namely:—Russia and Asia; the following French possessions in North and West Africa, namely:—Algeria, Mauritania, Senegal, Upper Senegal and Niger; and French Morocco. The Island of Cyprus is regarded as outside the European Telegraph System.
3. Until further notice cablegrams in the following three Codes, namely:—Meyer's Atlantic Cotton Code, Thirty-ninth Edition; Bentley's Complete Phrase Code, not including separate Mining and Oil Supplements; Brownell's Imperial Combination Code, not including Special Rubber Edition, are allowed only between United Kingdom and places in Extra European Telegraph System.
N.B.—As all messages sent under the above Regulations have to be decoded and censored the carrying out of this work will be greatly facilitated if persons sending such messages would hand in at the Telegraph Office, at the time of presenting the message, the translation of the same.

Proclamation

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

Whereas We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern and Northern Districts, respectively, of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned;

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:—
At Placentia, on Wednesday, the Eighth, and Thursday, the Ninth days of September next;
At Channel, on Monday, the Thirtieth, and Tuesday, the Fourteenth days of September next;
At St. George's, on Thursday, the Sixteenth, and Friday, the Seventeenth days of September next;
At Bay of Islands, on Saturday, the Eighteenth, and Monday, the Twentieth days of September next.
And that Our said Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:—
At Botwood, on Wednesday, the Twenty-second, and Thursday, the Twenty-third days of September next;
At Bonavista, on Saturday, the Twenty-fifth, and Monday, the Twenty-seventh days of September next;
At Trinity, on Tuesday, the Twenty-eighth day of September next;
At Brigus, on Friday, the Nineteenth, and Saturday, the Twentieth days of November next;
At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-second, Tuesday, the Twenty-third, Wednesday, the Twenty-fourth, and Thursday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next;
At Carbonear, on Friday, the Twenty-sixth, and Saturday, the Twenty-seventh days of November next.
And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods hereinbefore prescribed, at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.
And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that, in the event of the Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Southern or Northern District of Our said Island being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinbefore appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinbefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and should deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to do so, and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinbefore stated as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.
And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

D. 1915, and in the Sixth year of Our Reign.
