n the Almanack, printed last year in this Town, a hurried out-line of the Province and its Effablishments was fketched ; but as moft of the Settlers, know the climate, the extent and appendages of the Country, I now forbear to enlarge on an unnecessary subject to which I seel myself so incompetent. There are notwithstanding a few things forming Public wants, which it may not be improper to notice .-- That which occurs to me as an uncommon want, is the want of a regular post. The next, is the want of better roads, ( to obviate the evil, a laudable appropriation has been made by the House of Assembly ) but, I shall ever lament the fyftem, on which Statute-labour is exacted and performed, whilst a plan to ease every rerfon interested is so obvious : by the ordinary execution of which plan the roads would receive a fourfold degree of improvement, and the Settler neither be withdrawn from his necessary avocations nor his Free-hold conterns .- On the want of additional regular Gospel dispensers, animadversion is needless: the indefatigable perseverance and zeal of the Methodiffical-miffionaries fully obwiating the want. Their impressive manner of expounding with supernatural modesty and emphafis, the laws both moral and religious, and the doctrine of faving grace, must leave every auditor callous to feeling, a flupendous unbeliever, and a bardened iceptic if a doubt can remain in their minds that, infpiration, the doctrinal tactics of religious confcription-the unaffailable practice of the exhorters and their irrefiftable call to diffeminate falvation, are not of preternatural and prescient oeigin in the apostolic Functionary. - The necesfity of two paffage boats from this Town to Kinge fron and Niagara, is unquestionable; if such were well found and well conducted, they would amply sepay the proprietors, and be an uteful accommodation -A few men in trade, who would become factors and agents to the growers of Hemp in the country. would effentially ferve the cultivator and themselves ; but on this subject, let Silence, say

Amongst others, I was folicited to join it, and from its exterior features I thankfully did so : the admillion fee, one dollar. From the central fituation of this Town. the Society branched into distant minor locieties, whose admission-fees were remitted (I believe) to the organized focus, our general fund. In the primitive fociety, the candidates for admission, were balloted for with white and black Beans. On our fecond and third meetings, the impolitic Prefident not occultly, hoodwinked the fociety's title so far that, on the part of himself and his assigns, it dwindled into an electioneering club--- the lociety confequently, became unspeakably disgusting to the decent undefigning members : the fole object of the Prefident being manifefully then, to fraternize characters by whose suffrages he anticipated addi-

States, from whence he fled to evade inflice. Such novel harbihood actuating the founder, could not possibly be misunderstood. However, a member of more merriment than judgment, with a ludricous intention, arming himfelf with all the gravity of which a grotesque countepance is susceptible, moved in a crowded meeting. that the Prefident be addressed ' your honor', a motion which from its too obvious meaning, was negatived. The well meant objects of the Society were now so irrecoverably loft, with even its nomipal purpose, that on the part of the President and a few patriotic others, it concentrated in a pecuniary copartnercy between himfelf, the Treasurer, & perhaps one medley subaltern .-- A small part of the prodigal funds, has recently suffered all the horrors of refurrection, and the printer of the fociety rules, has miraculoufly, been PAID !!! Without funds and without prefident, the diffolution of the fociety, was coeval with the political diffolution of its profound ftep fire. It may not be inapposite to glance at the constrained estimation in which the late Capt. Brandt, the celebrated Chief of the Six Nations, (a member) held the Prefident and his fociety. He called two of his particular friends out of a fociety meeting, and begged them to report to the President, the diurnal use he had newly discovered of the Indian corn-cob ; being in one infrance by a mild application an excellent lubflitute for flationary : he alfo defired them to beg bim not to multiply balloting beans, as Py thagoras had interdicted the use of beans by his pupils upon the principle of their generating emetations &c. From these faint Sketches; a dispassionate alluston to irretrievable Sots, the defigning Jacobite, and fribbling manikin, may be visible. In my immature judgement fottishnels is a subject of common pity, the Jacobite from vernacular intention, an object of well-earned abhorrence, and the manakin at one view, exhibits a vaporous and variegated character. The well known fervent interest which is taken in the furtherance and prosperity of the Country, by its Government, incorporates our prosperity with it, and muft beget in us an idelible gratitude : with it, the tear of Necessity, is not shed in vain, nor the healing balm to diffres, fought ufeleffly : and the Suppliants, have experienced the proofs of the fine participating feelings, and genial relief to the rude vifitations of fortune .- But let impregnable bulwarks be reared around the fairest temple of virtue, Rill the daring affassin, would revel in its conflagration .- We have feen latterly the most unblemished characters affailed by despondent resegadoes, with whom flander and calumny are a eatholicon, and fedition the deified demon they worship .... In the days of primitive Christianity, the Asp estayed the laceration of the Apostle, and antecedently the Macedonian Bucephalus, found the Horse-fly tho' a fanguinary, yet harmless nuifance. That thus must refult the licentious attempts, by malicious libels and hoftile defamation

A patriotic with to fee the wide differnination of rigid and beneficent juffice, leads to an unfeigned defire that, my fellow subjects may hereafter feled men to legislate for them, who are deeply impreffed with the facred charge they are entrufted with, and who entertain a ftrong and just fenfe that the well digefied Constitution we enjoy, incidentally wants support, repair, improvement and ap-The Representatives of the Country. ( wifely spread in the British Governments ) ascertain in their respective diffriets, fuch matters of necessity as require Legislative aid, or corrective remedy ; and in the collective and deliberate wifdom of the Representatives, the best remedies and wifest plans of applying them, are deviled; hence the delegation of Representatives, should not be made with thoughtless or inconsiderate levity. It is not fimply for ourlelves, that they are deputed to act ; they are not fimply our mere Executors, but are the conftructive Guardians and Sponfors of the liberty and happiness of (our ) future generations .- Knowing thefe firong and incumbent inducements to judicious felection; it leaves the retrospect of some Representatives having been launched upon the Legislature, a very painful one. Existing fimilitudes, may store us fully in the face, and therefrom, may convince us that the illiterature of the del Fuegans, does not fland unrivalled and that the adventurous hardihood and intrinfic depravity of Buccaniers and incendiaries, can be copied from predilection, and followed from obduracy. EXTRAORDINARY ANIMAL.

During the night of the 14th July laft, the dogs in the village of Bernin were heard to bark in an extraordinary manner. The next morning the trace of an enormous animal, of which no one formed a just idea was observed, but led to a supposition that it was of the ferpent kind. It seemed to have iffued from the banks of the Ifer, and directed its course towards the mountains, croffing a space of two miles in extent, along which its path was plainly visible through the meadows corn and hemp fields, ploughed grounds, and even the public roads. It flightly waved its movements, and was from 12 to 16 inches in breadth. At its aresval in the neighborhood of the first village, it met with a hedge of dead wood, and chose at a middle height, the place where the branches were least entangled, to effect its passage. It crushed every thorn as completely as if they had been intentionally destroyed. At a short distance from this spot it seemed to have refted itself under a tree, as a cireular space 7 feet and a half in diameter was obserwed, where the ground had funk a little under its weight. On resuming its course, it altered its direction, which however fill pointed towards the heights. On reaching the public road it was compelled to pass through a quick hedge, three branches of wich were found broken. Its path was perfectly visible in the middle of the road, and on its sides. It proceeded as far as the most elevated part of the common, where its trace was fuddenly loft in a torrent. Till then it had followed the inequalities of the ground, and in the corn & hemp fields which it had croffed the blades were found compleetly crushed, without any trampling on the left or on the right, which might have induced a belief that men had occasioned that devastation. According to the width of its path, which gives pretty accurately the diameter of its fize, the animal must be upwards of 3 feet in circumterence. It has not been feen by any person, but its trace has been observed again on the common of Ciolles, from which it may be thought that it has once more descended to vards the river.
