An official of one of the leading banking institutions having extensive dealing with the Far East, referring to the proposed increase of 11 per cent. in the tax on silver imports to India, said: "Presumably this step is taken to raise additional revenue by the government. Not since September, 1907, has the Indian government been a purchaser of silver. All the white metal going to that country has been taken by the merchants, and distributed through the bazaars. TICKETS TO FRANCE CHEAP

How Many Persons Bought Them is Not Known, and Affable

The line, according to Louis Duverrier, the promoters, was to run from both New York and Philadelphia, and the handsome circulars which were distributed lavishly announced that the company had acquired palatial steamships with tonnage estimated at from '5,000 to 10,000 per ship. The boats that were to sail from Philadelphia were known as the Notre Dame de Lourdes and the Jean d'Arc. The palatial steamships that were to sail from New York were also the Notre Dame de Lourdes and the Jean d'Arc. It was announced here that if the service was found prefitable two additional ships would be run from Philadelphia, and that freight and passengers would be carried at the outset for almost nething. For instance, the promise was held out that you could travel first class to Bordeaux and return for \$50, or, if you wanted to see Paris, the ticket would stand you \$10 more.

ATTRACTIVE FEATURES OF

SCHEME. Among the atractive features was the proposition that the tickets were good for two years; that the purchaser might go on any ship and return at any time during the two years. This appealed especially to many Philadelphians, and they sent on their money to the Blue Star Company, packing the tickets among moth balls until the the tickets among moth balls until the time came to use them. Several men saw a chance for taking profit, and bought tickets to Paris, expecting to sell them later at a fine big profit.

Because it was fully understood that at this scandalously low rate the sale was open only for a few weeks. At the end of that time those who had falled to take advantage of the offer must suffer for their negligence. suffer for their negligence.

NEW D. S. A. IS A NEW BRUNSWICKER

Capt. F. W. L. Moore Was Loose Methods of Dealing **Born at Chatham**

Served in South Africa for Eight Years-Country No Longer Offers Opportunities for Engilshmen

Capt. F. W. L. Moore, the recently appointed district staff adjutant for No. 8 military district, in succession to Col. Ogilvie, is in the city preparing to take up his new duties. A New Brunswicker by birth, he has had a varied and interesting career sizes taking up the military profession. He served in South Africa during the Boer war and remained there until last year. In conversation with the Star today he gave some of his impressions of the present situation in South Africa and the trend of affairs in the new federation.

rederation.

Capt. Moore was born at Chatham, N. B., but his family afterward moved to Charlottetown, P. E. I., and he received his education there, graduating from Prince of Wales College.

While practicing law there he was deeply interested in military matters, and for ten years served as captain in the fourth P. E. I. regiment of garrison artillery. At the outbreak of the South African war he applied for a commission in the first contingent, but as there was no vacancy he accepted a captaincy in the Royal Canadian Artillery and went to Quebec to fill a vacancy there.

When the South African Constabulary was organized, he was appointed to that body and sailed for South Africa with them in 1901. The corps was divided into three sections of 400 men each and he took one of them to Heidabury. Capt. Moorse served with them until the end of the war in 1902, and then accepted the post of district commandant at Wormbad in the East Transvaal. He was afterwards connected with the depot troops at Pretoria and then took a full course in cavalry and pilce work before going to Eastern Transvaal. as assistant district commandant. He retired from the S. A. C. in 1904 and went to Natal, where he became chief constable at Fletremaritzburg, where he remained until May, 1909. Returning to Canada in August he took a course at Kingston and has just completed the infantry course at Hallian.

Speaking of present denditions in South Africa, Capt. 
