

Surgery Made Painless

New York, Nov. 23--A special cable to the Sun from London last night reported that an operation performed Thursday at the Seamen's Hospital at Greenwich by Professor Jounesco, dean of the University of Bucharest, demonstrated a noteworthy development in the application of the wonderful anaesthetic, stovaine. Hitherto the drug had been confined to operations below the waist, its depressing influence upon the heart excluding its employment in operations involving the upper part of the body. Now, however, it has been discovered that this disadvantage can be overcome with stovaine, and it was to demonstrate this that Professor Jounesco in the presence of some forty London surgeons operated to remove a mass of tuberculous glands from a man's neck.

He informed the surgeons that he had used no general anaesthetic in any operation on the Bucharest Hospital in eighteen months, having in that period performed more than 700 operations of various kinds under stovaine injections. In the present case Professor Jounesco inserted a hypodermic needle into the spinal canal between two of the vertebrae at the base of the neck and injected three centigrammes of sulphate of strychnine dissolved in water. In a minute the patient's head and shoulders were lowered so that the numbing fluid might spread upward. Two minutes later the operation was carried out in the ordinary manner. No chloroform or other general anaesthetic was used. The patient was perfectly conscious throughout and answered questions of the surgeon rationally.

It is one of the glories of British jurisprudence that the prisoner, what ever his crime, is presumed innocent. It is the business of the Crown to prove him guilty. Even a confession of guilt in no way affects the action of the Crown, which proceeds to prove its case by legal evidence.

So carefully are the interests of the prisoner guarded that, whether the case be the stealing of a ham, or the taking of human life, the prisoner is warned against making any incriminating statement. The judge and jury approach the case without bias or prejudice.

The former has no knowledge of the intimate facts of the case. He has not connected with the officers of the Crown. He presides simply to see that nothing but legal testimony is adduced, and to instruct the jury in the law which governs the case under consideration.

First Woman to Fly

Diametrically opposed to this is the French judicial system, which presupposes the guilt of the prisoner, and the genius of which is, by an assumption of intimate knowledge of the details of the crime, to overwhelm the latter with a sense of terror, so that, under the influence, a confession may be extorted. The presiding judge, at the preliminary arraignment assumes the character of prosecutor. He has been informed by the Crown of all the steps which have been taken all the details which have been gathered, and he proceeds to cross-examine the prisoner with a ruthless severity, charging him bluntly with questions which probe to the innermost heart of the secret which wraps the case in mystery.

Household Hints
Before sweeping linoleum tie a soft damp muslin cloth over the brush. This should be tied so as not to crush the hairs of the brush, which should then be used in the usual way. A floor swept in this manner looks beautifully fresh and clean, and does not require frequent washing.

In order to prevent a cauliflower from breaking, tie it in muslin as one would a pudding, and boil gently.

To stop a leak in a bowl or kettle, mix some whiting and soap together into a very thick paste. Put over leakages and allow to set a hour or so.

When flower vases are badly stained, it is a good plan to half fill them with a mixture of salt and vinegar. Shake and also brush well with a jug brush. This will be found to thoroughly cleanse them, and leave them free from all stains.

Cleaning suede gloves, put the gloves on the hand, and rub all over with a mixture of Fuller's earth and alum; then brush off and your gloves will look as good as when new. This is much better than washing them as it does not pull them out of shape.

To renovate a shabby silk umbrella, sponge it well with ale or stout. This improves the color wonderfully. If there are any small slits in the cover, put a little black sticking plaster on the under side and press the edges of the plaster together. The result is surprising.

Repairs are being made on the bridge over Trout Brook, at the lake. The work is under the supervision of Superintendent Austin. The condition of this bridge was very bad and the repairs were absolutely necessary.

The members of the dramatic club of Red Granite Division will present the strong play, "The Mountain Wail," before the society in O'Brien's Hall, on Wednesday the 15th. The public will later on be invited to witness the performance.

James McLaughlin, while leaving his home on Wednesday evening last, tripped and fell over a wheelbarrow, which a couple of boys had left at the door. He was considerably shaken up by the fall and was obliged to remain in the house for a couple of days.

The two legs of a man probably from the steamer Hestia were found at Sanford yesterday. Both boots were on the feet, but there was no mark of identification. It is thought the remainder of the body may be among the kelp on the shore, and diligent search is being made for it. Undertaker Sweeney will have all that is found laid beside the other graves in the mountain cemetery—Yorkmouth Times.

The funeral of the late Mrs. George Evans, whose death occurred at St. George, N. B., on Thursday last, was held this afternoon from the residence of Bonford St., and was well attended. The services at the house were conducted by Rev. E. B. McLatchy, pastor of the Highfield Baptist church after which the remains were conveyed to Mul Creek Baptist cemetery where they were interred. Rev. Mr. McLatchy also conducted the services at the grave. There were no pallbearers.—Moncton Transcript.

The hunting season closed last Wednesday, and Thursday morning early a lordly moose wandered through town and drank at the town pump. Local sports were nearly all successful in bringing proof of their skill, with the rifle into town. Moose meat was a drag on the market, deer not so plentiful though a large number were shot. Altogether it was the best season for years, in this to any County in the Province in the number and size of the big animals killed.

The rink association have located the rink on the O'Neill property below Grant & Morins. Last week Mr. Barton Blandford was busy there, putting in dams and levelling knolls. It is expected that this land will hold the water better than the place used last winter and so prevent the formation of shell ice—which caused a lot of trouble. The committee in charge are doing everything possible to provide the public with a rink that will be open for skating every day that the weather permits.

Eastport, Me., Dec. 3.—Owing to the extremely small quantity produced, it is considered doubtful if there will be a crop of American sardines on the market on Jan. 1st. The pack by the sardine canning plants on the Maine coast, which were closed by law at midnight November 27, was small this year, not more than 50 per cent of the usual quantity having been canned. This remarkable falling off was due to the scarcity of the small herrings suitable for canning. In fact, herrings of all kinds have been scarce this year, even the smoked herring industry suffering a shortage. In May herrings of all sizes were unusually plentiful and of good quality, but in June and July there were none at all. During August they returned, but soon disappeared again, and during the remainder of the season very few were taken and these were of small size.

At O'Neill's this year holiday buyers find a larger, more varied and more suitable stock than ever before to meet their desires. The second floor is used to display Fancy Goods and contains an exhibit of these goods that one would expect to see in much larger towns. This store has certainly left nothing undone to make a great snowing this Christmas.

Police Magistrate James O'Brien has resigned. Mr. O'Brien was appointed by the Government, on the incorporation of the town and has filled the position with credit to himself and honor to the Government that appointed him. The position is one calling for clear judgment and common sense, and the part of the appointee and care should be exercised by those recommending a successor to Mr. O'Brien. A knowledge of law embracing technical points is not absolutely essential but unbiased mind is necessary.

A dispatch from Ottawa on Tuesday says—

Hon. Wm. Pugsley, minister of Public Works, and Dr. W. F. King, chief astronomer for Canada, expect to leave on Thursday for Washington, to discuss with the United States authorities and Ambassador Bryce the boundary dispute between Canada and United States over line in Passamaquoddy Bay, which involves the ownership of Pope's Folly Island and contiguous fishing rights. It is probable that the disputed point will have to be left to arbitration.

In connection with the Maritime winter fair at Amherst on December 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th, special fares will be in effect on the Intercolonial railway, from all stations Campbellton and East. This will prove an inducement to the many persons who annually attend this fair, and it is expected that this year will see a larger attendance, than ever, for special arrangements have been made to assemble an exhibit of fat cattle that will prove great attraction to Maritime Province agriculturists. The Amherst winter fair is growing in importance each year. The special railway fares are really very reasonable and doubtless the opportunity to visit Amherst will be embraced by many business men also. The tickets are good going from December 4th to 7th and are good for return December 10th. The fare from St. John is \$2.80.

Since early summer, a party of surveyors have been engaged in a survey of the international boundary line in this section, covering the territory between Joe's Point and Upper Mills and placing reference marks along the course. From these charts will be compiled for the use of Dr. King at Ottawa, Canada's representative on an international commission appointed to determine the true boundary line.

The party here was composed of C. H. Robinson, W. C. Westland, F. W. Jodry, J. Rainboth, of Ottawa, B. Coombes of Winnipeg, J. G. Bole of Toronto, Harold Lyons of St. Stephen was also employed on the staff and George Gallagher of Ottawa was their efficient cook.

During the summer they occupied tents pitched on the bank of Dennis stream and later moved to a tenement in town. They made their trips up and down the river in Fred Holt's motor boat. The labors for this year have ended and they seek their departure Saturday evening.

They were gentlemen and though their duties occupied them time pretty thoroughly they were able to participate a little in the social life of the town and will be cordially welcomed by many friends in their return next year.—Courier.



arisen as to the aims and objects of the Strathcona Trust. It is with a view to the removal of any grounds for misunderstanding that I am directed to submit the following remarks—

3. As you are aware, Lord Strathcona's in forming the trust is twofold: (1) the improvement of the physical and intellectual capabilities of the children while at school, by means of a proper system of physical training calculated to improve their physical development, and, at the same time, to inculcate habits of alertness, orderliness and prompt and obedient; (2) the fostering of a spirit of patriotism in the boys, leading them to realize that the first duty of a free citizen is to be prepared to defend his country—to which end all boys should, so far as possible, be given an opportunity of acquiring a fair acquaintance, while at school, with Military Drill and rifle shooting.

4. With regard to the first point, the Executive Council deems necessary to require that a Province before it can participate in the benefits of the Trust, should pledge itself to include in the regular curriculum of the schools under its control instruction in Physical training for all children of both sexes attending the same. This requirement appears to be clearly understood by all, and there have been, so far as the Executive Council is aware, no serious objections raised to the universal introduction of a well tested system of Physical Training into all the Public schools of Canada.

5. With regard, however, to the question of Military Drill and rifle practice for boys, a somewhat important misapprehension appears to exist in certain quarters, to the effect that the Strathcona Trust is designed to be used as the vehicle for the introduction of a system of compulsory military training into the Schools of the Dominion. I am directed to state, emphatically, that such is in no wise Lord Strathcona's intention, nor that of the Executive Council of the Trust.

6. As stated above, one of Lord Strathcona's main objects is to inculcate a spirit of patriotism in the youth of this country, together with a realization of their duty as free citizens in its defense, and consequently, their training in the rudiments of a soldier's art is, in his opinion, desirable in order that they may be able to give proper expression to that spirit in time of national danger; but His Lordship does not seek to insist that this military training should be made compulsory. All he asks is that the Government of a Province should undertake to encourage as far as possible, the formation of cadet corps and the practice of rifle shooting in the schools under its control, leaving it to the parents themselves to decide whether their sons should join these corps. The proper military instruction and care of the cadet corps when formed is a matter which falls within the province of the Department of Militia. The Department of Militia, however, asks that Educational authorities will encourage, or, at least, place no obstacle in the way of their teachers becoming officers of their School Cadet Corps.

7. The position may, perhaps, best be summarized by re-stating the general conditions, which the Executive Council of the Trust asks the Education Department of a Province to accept, in order to secure to the schools under its control participation in the benefits of the Trust. It is confidently believed that pursuit of these conditions will show that they cannot fairly be in any way construed as an attempt to introduce a system of compulsory military training into the Schools of Canada.

8. These conditions are as follows— (4) Physical training to form an integral part of the curriculum in every school; or public educational establishment maintained mainly out of public funds, at which a teacher holding a certificate other than that of the lowest grade is employed.

(b) A certificate of ability to instruct in physical training to form part of every teacher's certificate, other than those of the lowest grade, granted by the Education Department of the Province.

(c) The Education Department to undertake to encourage the formation of cadet corps, including the practice of rifle shooting under suitable conditions by the older boys, in all educational establishments under its control.

(d) The system of physical training adopted to be that in force in the elementary public schools in Great Britain (which has been recently revised in view of the latest developments in Sweden, Switzerland and other countries), with such modifications therein as the local conditions of any Province may show to be necessary.

(e) The Education Department to undertake to require, within a specified period, all teachers who are already in possession of its certificate other than those of the lowest grade to qualify themselves to instruct in physical training (subject to the exemption of such teachers as are physically unable to qualify, or are nearly at the end of their term of service), so that in every school there shall be at least one teacher capable of imparting the necessary instruction.

9. The Militia Department will on its part, aid the Education Department by affording the necessary facilities to the teachers of both sexes to qualify themselves in physical training, by providing instructors until such time as the Provincial Authorities are in a position to undertake this duty themselves.

10. The Militia Department will also afford to the teachers the necessary instruction in military drill required to enable them to become officers of cadet corps under the same advantages so are already allowed to officers of the Active Militia, and will grant certificates of qualification.

11. The Militia Department will also pay the authorized grants to the teachers qualified and acting as instructors of cadet corps, and will supply to these corps such arms and equipments as are needed under the regulations applicable to each case.

12. Sir Frederick Borden confidently hopes, that after consideration of the foregoing explanations, your Government may see its way clear at a very early date to declaring its acceptance of the conditions mentioned in paragraph 8 of this letter, so that teachers and pupils in the Educational Establishments of the Province may be competent to share in the benefits of the Trust.

Tool has never been considered under art. eight during the two full years of its use. That article covers frame mounted machines. It never covered hand tools; any difference of opinion on that point can be handled as provided in article six miscellaneous. Your Northfield committee ignored the agreement with-out association, and called upon individual members with threats. Such methods followed by article of Northfield branch, without submitting to committee reference to our association, is a violation of agreement. We only believe that agreements legally entered into should be faithfully carried into effect and where grievances arise which are covered by adjustment clauses with provision against strike, that same should be respected. We again ask that the Northfield branch call off the strike and return to work under conditions existing from date of agreement to date of dispute. We only ask a square deal and that any contention be submitted to joint committees as mutually agreed. In replying please answer our questions plainly. Association meeting to-morrow afternoon and must inform them. If you support Northfield branch in breaking agreement. If article six miscellaneous is worthless and can be broken at will by your branches, we wish a plain statement to that effect.

Tool is positively under article eight, which reads "no surface cutting machine." Wagon and article are not used for fun, ornament or cavil, but have full and intelligent. Why a statement so specific should require article six of miscellaneous to decide is novel, but temporary lay aside machine and apply article as cure. We have the law, "article eight," to support us; your claim "indefinite custom" supports you. Surely "clearly drawn rule" supercedes "contested custom" more so when latter in any event is violative of agreement. Condition was laid enough with open sheds, but it is intolerant in your association to try to force men in closed to break clause so plainly stated. We again insist Northfield branch did not break agreement, but instead offered and insisted on adjustment as therein provided, and only when firm insisted on and continued in violation of last four words first paragraph, article six of miscellaneous, to suspend men who had refused to break article eight, and when firm ignored branch request to adjust dispute, did Cross Brothers men refuse to remain on job. Agreements in the several places are individual intact and have no binding effect each on the other; hence as no dispute exists outside Northfield, which has full agreement by itself independent of other places, your association is in acute rebellion against moral and honorable settlements, by locking out where there is no trouble, and thereby giving exhibition of bad faith in maintaining agreements. Your request to answer questions plainly is humbug. We could not fail to do so, even trying. We again repeat, we stand by article six miscellaneous in everything it says and means. We also stand by article eight of regulations which is "one of contentment; it must be fully recognized, then follows adjustment by article six of miscellaneous. We support Northfield branch in breaking agreement."





Lansdowne While in Canada

Canadians will remember Lord Lansdowne, now so prominently in the public eye owing to the contest of Lords, as Governor-General.

If he lacked the warmth or the spontaneous brilliancy of a Dufferin, or the bluff heartiness of a Stanley, he offered a dignity, a weight, a lucidity of utterance a scrupulous exactness, a foresight which marked him out for leadership in the large place.

A certain austerity was marked, but it well became him.

One could not well think of him as greatly relaxing, and yet he had warmth and geniality. At the same time he was the representative of his Majesty; he was the copy of royalty; he was in a position requiring dignity and measured relations. In all his public functions he expressed this sense of responsibility.

In all his public speeches he offered grace and illumination. He had the chosen word, which fitted its place like a glove. His diction was polished like a cameo. Something of Celtic fervor he missed, but there was always weight and meaning, and taste in his deliverance.

He showed a deep interest in the progress of art and learning, and his convocations of the various universities were models of clearness, of weighty reflection.

With the abiding life of this country he was in full sympathy, and kept in touch with all its manifestations.

Lady Lansdowne was stately and queen-like, of a delicate, patrician beauty, and well fitted to give distinction to a young society, whose growth she encouraged in all charming ways.

The term of office of Lord Lansdowne was not marked by any large event; but it was contemporaneous with the beginning of the war of the C. P. R., and all the development which was contingent upon the completion of that system.

It may be remembered at the same time, that a sensational episode marked the beginning of Lord Lansdowne's role at Ottawa. His Lordship owned and still owns (if he has not recently sold under the Purchase Act) extensive estates in Ireland. At that time (1885) the Land League was very active, and boycotting was in full force, and the landlords had fished a lively time of it. A certain unpopularity attached to Lord Lansdowne as an absentee landlord, who, it was alleged, insisted upon his "pound of flesh" in the form of rack rents.

Police Lord Lansdowne tapped on our shores the press of the world was filled with the alleged details of a Land League plot to assassinate him the moment he landed in the Dominion.

Although names were mentioned yet the story was plausibly concocted and many in the Mother County expected to hear of the "removal" of his Lordship, after the manner of the Phoenix Park murders.


