



Busy Meeting was Held Yes terday Afternoon, at Which Important Matters were Dis

The monthly meeting of the Board of Health was beld yesterday aftermoon. The session was a busy one, many important matters being submitted for consideration.

"The death list for the month of February was exceptionally lengthy. Elighty-nine were registered for the month. Of this number, eleven were esused by contagious diseases, five resulting from diphtheria, a similar number from scarlet fever, and one from smallpox.

Several bills were passed by the Board.

Miss Rogers of the Anti-Tuberculosis Association was present, and submitted the monthly report on the notice of the association.

The physician in charge of the isolation hospital reported that the patient detained on account of smallpox was cured of the disease, but on account of an outbreak of absesswas still at the house, but would be discharged soon.

A committee of the chairman, solicitior, and secretary was delegated to association the duties of Miss Rogers.

The question of installing an incinerator was brought up and a committee was appointed to wait upon the Common Council, asking that body to name a delegation to meet the Board of Health on the matter.

Dr. McAvenney appeared in the interest of the Tuberculosis. Association re the literature which the Board has ordered to be supplied to persons suffering from tuberculosis.
