

Province Has Best Year In Its History

Special to The Standard. Fredericton, March 14.—With well filled galleries, Provincial Secretary Fleming delivered his budget speech in the legislature today.

By Hon. Mr. Fleming in rising to move the House into committee on supply said that it was with the greatest feeling of satisfaction that he was able to say that the financial statement he was presenting on the fourth occasion he had been called upon to perform this duty, would meet with the favorable consideration of the House.

HON. MR. FLEMING TELLS OF HONEST MANAGEMENT OF PROVINCIAL AFFAIRS

Provincial Secretary's Fourth Budget Speech Tells Convincing Story of Progress and Prosperity—Great Increase in Territorial Revenue Secured Through Honest Stumpage Collections—Straightforward Statement of Business-like Administration.

More Money Will Be Spent in Improving Public Services During the Coming Year — Important Announcement in Regard to Cheaper School Books—Former Administration's Black Record Compared with Conditions During Regime of Honesty.

"A new item of considerable proportion seems to have crept into last year's expenditure under the heading 'Contingencies' in the department of education, amounting to \$17,626.98. The amount voted for legislative contingencies which are all well established, was \$7,000, the balance of \$10,626.98 is apparently for contingencies of departments. It is rather a large amount, and is open to criticism."

Every Dollar Justified. Every dollar that province had expended, and could expend, on education was absolutely justified, and his only regret was that the appropriation could not be larger, and go further, and give aid along the lines of recognized need and in other branches of education in this province.

Mr. Tweeddale followed and the situation quickly changed to the ridiculous. The Revenue. The revenue during the past year had been larger than formerly, but it was wrong for the honorable members to give an impression that the amount put down as revenue meant that the actual revenue was as much above the actual revenue of the old administration as the figures showed.

Mr. Fleming said he wished to point out that the present government during the past three years, had spent more money on this necessary service than the old administration in the same period.

Bridge Expenditures. But permanent bridges made up a large proportion of the amount by which the debt was increased. Expenditure on permanent bridges during the past five years was as follows: 1906, \$74,872.53; 1907, \$126,739.19; 1908, \$172,591.83; 1909, \$186,102.16; 1910, \$146,652.32.

Another amount which went toward making up the increase in the debt was railway subsidies. During the same period the amount paid in railway subsidies and charged to capital account was: 1907, York and Carleton Railway, \$1,275,000; 1908, International Railway, \$75,000.00; 1909, International Railway, \$43,700.00.

Mr. Fleming presented a message from the governor submitting the estimates of the current year and moved that consideration of such message and estimates be referred to the committee on supply.

An improved System. The estimated expenditure for stampage collection is \$20,000, which proved \$7,906.62 below the actual expenditure. The honorable gentlemen will realize that the cost of the last fiscal year, and had been early increase with the expansion of receipts from stumpage dues. 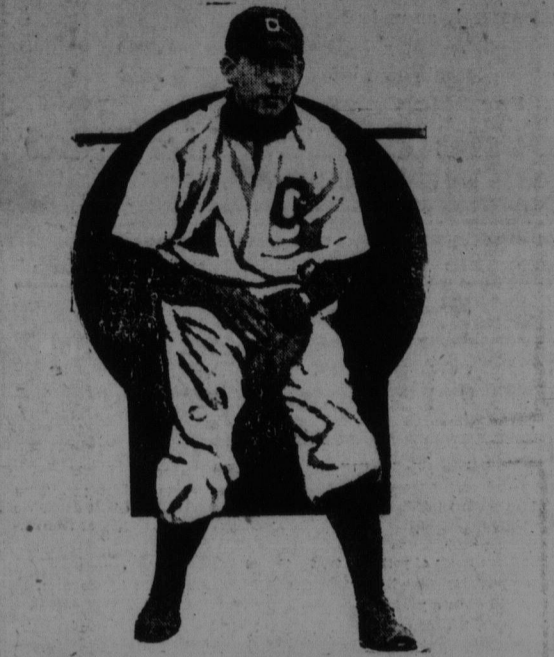

BUT 55 PLAYERS IN BIG LEAGUES NOW WHO WERE PLAYING IN 1903

Baseball fans are frequently heard to remark that it's getting harder each season for youngsters to break into the big leagues, because the veteran modern ball player is so perfectly trained that he is lasting from twelve to fifteen years in the fast game instead of from five to ten years. In support of their argument the fans are quite sure that in the past seven years considerable less than half the big league players in the game in 1903 dropped out before the finish of the 1910 season. The above table shows the fallacy of this belief. Of 247 players who were apportioned off to the various clubs in both leagues when the American and National leagues drew up their argument in 1902, but fifty-six remain in fast company. Of this number several have drifted to the minors to come back for another chance, and a few, Patrick Donovan, Clark Griffith, John McGraw, Hughie Jennings and Bill Dahlen, have become non-playing managers. The players who have remained with the same teams since 1902 are: American league—St. Louis, Walter; Philadelphia, Plank, Bender.

TO PROLONG CAREERS OF RACE HORSES

New York, March 14.—Prominent members of the Jockey Club have turned their attention to devising some system whereby trotters and pacers that have secured fast records may be retained for the turf and their services to racing lengthened as much as possible. A statement from one of the officials points out that under the present system of conducting trotting, the horse that shows its speed ability during one racing season and secures a fast record, practically loses its earning capacity, in spite of the fact that it can be kept useful for several seasons. This is because trotting managers following the customs of 50 years past offer their feature events, not to horses with fast records, which will furnish the most interesting and exciting contests but to horses that either have a slow record or none at all. There being no inducements for the owner of the champion to race his horse, it must either be kept idle or sold to enter the matinee circles and be lost to the turf. The only inducements offered to fast horses under existing systems are the free-for-alls, but there are not enough of them to tempt the best horses for the season.

NEW BILL GIVES WIDE POWERS TO S.P.C.A.

Legislation Sought to Change Name of Society and Give Authority for Children's Aid Work.

At a meeting of the executive of the S. P. C. A., held in the County Secretary's office on Monday evening, two bills, one particularly important, were unanimously passed by the meeting and will be presented to the Legislature for enactment during the present session. One bill provides that the society be given authority to change its name, "N. B. Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals," by dropping the last two words, making the name "N. B. Society for the Prevention of Cruelty."

The other bill, which is very drastic in its provisions, if passed by the Legislature, will give the society power to deal with cases of women and children, particularly the latter. The bill provides, in some cases, for the taking of children from their parents or guardians and placing them in such places as homes and shelters. The measure, which will be applicable to the whole province, will also apply for the organizing of Children's Aid Societies in various parts of the province, with the sanction of the Lieutenant-Governor. Where women and children are thought to be ill-treated, the agent of the society will have power to demand and, if necessary, secure entrance to places where such women and children are inmates. So far as cruelty to animals is concerned, the society is looking for power to take charge of animals being neglected and care for them at the expense of the owner, and in the case of animals unfit for use, or irretrievably ill, to destroy them with the sanction of a veterinary surgeon. Provision is also made that all police officers and constables must assist in the enforcement of this act. Both bills, which were drafted by J. K. Kelley, were, as above stated, adopted unanimously after being read and explained.

THE BOARD OF HEALTH IN MONTHLY SESSION

Busy Meeting was Held Yesterday Afternoon, at Which Important Matters were Discussed.

The death list for the month of February was exceptionally lengthy. Eighty-nine were registered for the month. Of this number, eleven were caused by contagious diseases, five resulting from diphtheria, a similar number from scarlet fever, and one from smallpox. Several bills were passed by the Board. Miss Rogers of the Anti-Tuberculosis Association was present, and submitted the monthly report on the cases of tuberculosis brought to the notice of the association.

WILL MEET TONIGHT TO TALK HIGHER WAGES

Carpenters and Wood-workers will Discuss the Movement for \$3.00 per Day After May 1st.

A mass meeting of carpenters and wood-workers to discuss the movement for \$3 a day after the first of May, will be held in the Market Building, Charlotte street, this evening at 8 o'clock. Several contractors have already signified their willingness to grant the increase of pay, as they realize that the cost of living in St. John is as high as in Toronto where wages are higher than the local men are demanding. The members of the old ship carpenters union have decided to join the carpenters' organization in a body, and the business agent recently appointed by the union, reports that carpenters who have hitherto held aloof from the union are enthusiastic about the movement for an increase of pay, and will line up in the union ranks before the first of May. Peter Sharkey will be the principal speaker at the meeting tonight, which will probably be the largest ever held under the auspices of the carpenters.
