REIGN OF TERROR IN NANKING CITY

Gen. Chang Waging War THE "WHITE of Extermination on Rebels.

Queueless Chinese Are Being Beheaded Wherwith Mines.

Yuan Shi Kai has Become Premier of China and will Make Effort to Speedily End War.

Shanghal, Nov. 15.—Veritable reign of terror prevails at Nanking, according to late despatches from the city, under the dominance of General Chang Jen-Chun, the Viceroy, who has cast restraint to the winds. A systematic search is being made for Chinese who have discarded their queues, and all found are beheaded.

The revolutionaries in Shanghai are making vigorous preparations to attack Nanking, and at a meeting last night volunteers were called upon to undertake the assassination of Chang. Dr. Gilbert Reid, a prominent missionary, visited Viceroy Chang yesterday and endeavored to induce the General to agree to an armistice. General Chang resolutely refused to entertain the idea and declared that he must be loyal to the Emperor. He said that he intended to lead his troops in the recapture of Chin Kiang, Soo 'Chow and Shanghai for the Dr. Reid, says that Chang's blood

Former Premier Objects to Choice of Dr. Sproule as Speaker.

Montreal, Nov. 15.—Rev. R. J. Campbell, head of the independent labor party in Great Britain and pastor of the City Temple, Loudon, founder of the new theology and known as the White Angel, from the aureola of flowing white locks which crowns his gures, made his first address of his Canadian tour tonight. He spoke in the monument nationale under the auspices of the Montreal trades and labor council.

Through some misunderstanding he had not expected to address such a meeting and had to do so at a few minutes' notice. But he came out with flying colors, after explaining that he had and expected to preach a sermon in a church and not to address a labor party, he launched out into a speech on British politics, and discussed the situation in England in an interesting fashion. He gave a glowing eulogy of Lloyd George and all his works. Spoke in favor of progressive socialism and condemned militarism in general, although speaking in favor of the Boer War, He was listened to by a cosmopolitan audience of 1,800 people.

THE TELEGRAPH AND COURTENAY BAY.

It is almost unnecessary to say that the Telegraph's story is without a shadow of foundation in fact. The Standard is in a position to state that the rumor to which the Telegraph gave such joyful credence is simply the result of imagination. "Tories abandon Courtenay Bay?" is the self-evident explanation why Mr. Pugsley's organ lent itself to the publication of an unfounded rumor. Any means that might tend to discredit the Dominion Government it cheerfully resorted to.

Does the Telegraph remember the Hays banquet? Does it suggest that Mr. C. M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, was lying on that occasion for the benefit of Mr. Pugsley when he announced that this port would be a terminus of his road? The Telegraph's small minded policy will not hinder the development of Courtenay Bay which is part of the national work of improvement. It has only resulted in exposing its frequent protestations that it always has the interests of St. John at heart in their true light.

The military conference called by Colonel, the Hon. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, will open in Ottawa today, and the comprehensive nature of the programme and the importance attached to the meeting may have far reaching results on the affairs of the department. Those summoned to attend the conference, about eighty in number, include not only senior officers of the militia from all parts of Canada, but representatives of the universities and those who have been identified with the cader movement, the administration of the Strathcona trust, etc. In addition to these there will be officers from the headquarters staff and the various divisional staffs throughout the Dominion, who will be present no so much to take part in the discussions as to hear what is said.

I am informed on good authority, that drag seining is legal in all the waters of the eastern coast of Canada, and is prohibited only by special regulation for Charlotte county, which I understand was procured by the weir owners of Charlotte county, and if such a regulation was forced apon St. John county, fishermen through the influence of Charlotte county weir owners, it would be the most iniquitous piece of legislation ver enacted.
