

Thompson sinking at her anchorage off the plant of the Portland. The schooner, which is only 21 tons burthen, measuring 48.5 feet in length, was built at Bristol, Me., in 1889, and for many years has been engaged in the lobster business out of this port, her latest owner having been the Casco Fisheries Co., who formerly carried on business on Long Wharf, but now have their office on Wall street, New York. They have just sold her to a Boston lobster concern, Brooks, and with the intention of giving her an overhauling before taking her there she was brought here on Saturday from Cundy Harbor, where she has been hauled up for the past two years, and anchored just outside the wharf at the marine railway. Probably her seams had opened and caused her to spring a leak, for about seven o'clock yesterday morning she was seen to roll over almost on her beam ends and then commence to settle, going down stern first with her bows sticking high out of water. She remained in this comical position for fully 15 minutes, the unusual sight attracting the attention of numbers of people on the wharves until the air was all out of her hold, when she went all under water with the exception of her masts. Arrangements have been made with the Rowe Brothers to raise the sunken craft and she will be pumped out and foated today and then hauled onto the railway for repairs. There was no one on board at the time of the disaster, the parties who brought her here from Cundy Harbor having returned there. Capt. Abner Jackson represents the owners and will look after the vessel. The schooner has probably not suffered much damage as the result of her immersion and will proceed to Boston as soon as she leaves the railway after cleaning and having seams recaulked.—Portland Argus. **VESSELS BOUND TO ST. 



MILITARY AIRMEN

German War Office Forbids Them to Cross Foreign Fron-Prevent Misunderstandings.


