Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Sept. 19.--Canada is now ninth in the tonnage list of the maritime states of the world as published in a report for 1911, just issued by the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The other eight, beginning at the top are, Great Britain, Germany, United States, Norway, France, Russia, Italy and Japan.

Dublin, Sept. 19.--Sir Edward Carson, ex-Solicitor General for Ireland, will submit for the approval of the Ulster Unionist Council the wording of the covenant which Ulster Unionists throughout the province will sign on September 28. The covenant will be as follows: "Being convinced that Home Rule will be disastrous to the material well-being of Ulster as well as to the whole of Ireland, dangerous to our civil and religious freedom, and perilous to the unity of the Empire, we, the undersigned, do hereby solemnly and faithfully pledge ourselves to resist by all lawful means the introduction of Home Rule into Ulster, and to defend the same to the last gasp of our lives."

London, Sept. 19.--The Wellington correspondent of the Times wires that in the House of Representatives yesterday Mr. Myers asked the Premier whether the time had not arrived when New Zealand should follow Canada's lead and ask for representation by ministers on the Imperial Defence Committee. He suggested that the difficulty of distance could be overcome by the appointment of a Minister for External Affairs who should alternatively with the Premier or Minister of Defence attend the committee sessions in London.

Chiasso, Switzerland, Sept. 19.--The Italian and Turkish delegates who are holding conferences in Switzerland, looking to the settlement of the war, received new instructions today from their respective governments, and contrary to the pessimistic view prevailing, it now seems certain that the conclusion of a basis upon which to negotiate peace is being approached.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Sept. 19.--Development of trade with Canada was informally discussed with Hon. Geo. E. Foster yesterday by representatives of France, Holland and Venezuela. The French representative was Henry F. Fletcher, president of the Canadian section of the British Chamber of Commerce at Paris. He came over to the congress at Boston, incidentally inquiring into the methods of developing trade between Canada and France.

Special to The Standard. Moncton, Sept. 19.--The Magistrate Kay investigation being held by Attorney General Grimmer was continued today and brought to a close tonight. The Attorney General will report later.

London, Sept. 19.--The condition of Ulster today suggests, in the words of the Times, that "a fire has been lighted in a magazine filled with gunpowder." The anxious question of the moment is: "How far will the fire spread?" The ministerial journals, which a month ago, were asking whether Andrew Bonar Law, Sir Edward Carson, and Lord Londonderry could not be clapped into jail for inciting crime, as Parnell, warn Sir Edward Carson that outrage is the natural accompaniment of his speech.

FEDERATION OF CANADIAN CLUBS CONCLUDES SESSION

Various Proposals for Canadian Flag Considered at Session Yesterday Morning—East and West Need Clearer Understanding on Common Problems of Immigration.

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 19.—The interest that attaches itself to any gathering of men and women banded together in a mutual desire for the consummation of a common benefit, is always of more or less moment. When, however, the men and women are peoples of one country separated by vast distances, yet striving for the same object, the unification of that country along patriotic lines, the submerging of a vast alien population, and the creation of a greater Canada, the interest becomes intensified.

STRIKERS DECIDE TO HOLD THE MINES

Bingham, Utah, Sept. 19.—An army of miners fortified and determined held undisputed possession of the copper, lead and silver mines of Bingham when the second day of the miners' strike for a further 25 cent increase in pay and recognition of their union demand. The Charges Against Moncton Magistrate

Brief Statement of the Complaints Made by Petitioners Against Magistrate Kay.

In the petition to the government signed by Moncton residents, asking an investigation into the administration of James Kay, as Police Magistrate and Civil Court Commissioner, it is alleged that "there has been at different times since his appointment, dissatisfaction among the citizens of Moncton with the manner in which Kay discharged the duties of his office."

Reference is made to the investigation into his administration by commissioners appointed by the Provincial Government in 1909. It was alleged that he kept the costs of renewals of executions in the Civil Court. It is set forth in the petition that Mr. Kay paid to the city \$275 after the investigation, for costs of renewals which should have been accounted for from time to time in his sworn monthly returns.

The petition, continuing, says: "Your petitioners are advised and believe that since 1909 the said commissioner had made no returns for copies of renewals to the city, and that since the investigation a number of copies have been taken, which copies were made out on city stationery but not accounted for in his sworn monthly returns, one-third of the copies taken and paid for to him."

It is stated by the petitioners that "about two years ago, without any change being made in the law to justify his action, he increased the costs for a summons from thirty cents to forty cents, and the costs for a capias from fifty cents to sixty cents."

The petitioners "believe that the said James Kay is not a fit and proper person for the position he holds; that he is extremely impulsive, irritable and vindictive. When any person comes before him, either as attorney or litigant, against whom he has a dislike, his prejudice influences his decisions to such an extent that his decisions are not in accordance with justice. He alleges that the investigation of 1909 was a conspiracy of the hotel keepers and their friends to injure him, and he displays in cases under the Canada Temperance Act his vindictiveness towards them. SPECULATORS MUST BEAR THE BURDEN

Alberta has Plan to Lighten Taxation of the Farmer by Raising Assessment of Unimproved Land.

Edmonton, Sept. 19.—To further relieve agriculture from the burden of taxation, and to place the burden upon speculative holders of farm lands important amendments to the rural municipalities act will be sought at the next session of the Alberta legislature. By an act passed at the session of the legislature last spring, assessment of lands was made the sole basis of municipal revenue, while a rebate of 25 per cent. of all taxes was provided for the benefit of farmers who improve their holdings. It is now proposed that this rebate shall be raised to fifty per cent., so that the man who owns a quarter section wholly under cultivation will pay in taxes exactly one half as much as the man who is owner of an adjoining unimproved farm.
