# NEW EVIDENCE IN CASE OF DR. DUDLEY

#### Efforts Still Being Made to Have Man Responsible for Houlton Girl's Death Pardoned.

It is stated that new evidence of a highly important character has been discovered in the case of Dr. Lionel E. Dudley, the Pressue lais physic-ian who in November, 1914, was sent to the state prison for fifteen years for laving caused the death by a crim-nal operation, of Mildred Sullivan, a sixtee-years-old Houlton school girl. The nature of this evidence cannot be revealed at this time, but it will have, it is state, an important bearing on a phase of the case which probably had most to do with his conviction. In the event of a conditional par-den, Dr. Dudley will immediately leave the state, beginning a new career in Southwestern Alaska, where the gov-ernment is soon to develop new ralle to a busy field for surgery. That he will incidentally turn a new teaf is the sincere belief of all who have had an opportunity of studying his personality since his incarceration. When officials refer to him as a model prisoner they have in mind not only bis excellent behavior but his valued E. Dudley, the Presque Isle physic



A meeting of the provincial executive of the Canadian Patriotic Fund was held yesterday afternoon at the Board of Trade rooms to consider the assessment for the year 1917, and apportion to the counties the amounts each would have to raise for the fund. Governor Wood presided, and those present were: Senator Thorne, L. J. Tweedle, R. O'Leary, Mayor Hayes W. H. Price, O. Turgeon, G. W. Ganong, E. A. Schofield, E. W. Jarvis, J. H Frink, F W. W. Desbarres, Dr. Caswell, J. E. Hetherington, T. Carleton Allan, Isaac Prescott and Mayor Mitchell of Fredericton.

NEW BRUNSWICK MUST RAISE

The matter of deficits in several of the counties was talked over and the representatives of some counties in arrears expressed them-selves as certain that the needed amount would be forthcoming. There was also some discussion on the advisability of adopting a maximum standard of payment for the, entire province, but the con of opinion seemed to be that each county should adopt its own scale according to the needs.

It was estimated that the province would have to raise in 1917 the sum of \$500,000 for the fund, and this would represent a tax of about one-half of 1 per cent, on the total valuation

It was decided to assess for \$550,000 to allow for the expen collection and shrinkage, and the question of the apportionment to the several counties was left to a sub-committee who will report to the executive at a later date. The following were appointed the co to do this work: R. T. Hayes, L. J. Tweedie, T. Carleton 'Allan, W. H. Price, J. H. Frink.

Some figures were submitted showing the moneys paid out in New Brunswick since the war began as follows: Up to December 31, 1915, \$194,691; to October 1, 1916, \$469,039, and it was estimated that the

total expenditure for the year 1916 would reach \$375,000.
