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### MINUTES.

## COVERDALE, Albert County, July 1st, 1865.

THE Thirty-third Annual Meeting of the General Conference of the Free Christian Baptists of New Brunswick met this day, with the Church at "Five Points," Coverdale, Albert County, at 10 o'clock, A. M. This is our Annual Social Conference Meeting, in which the brethren and sisters speak of their hopes, and exhort one another. It was a good season. The attendance was large. Many met who have not seen each other since the last yearly meeting, and others who never met in a similar meeting; and while they spake to each other of their experience in the Christian life, and their hopes of heaven, all felt it good to be present. The meeting continued two hours and a half, with increasing interest. It was really a season of unusual blessing. The Spirit of the Lord was

Met at half-past 2 o'clock, for the transaction of business. After singing and prayer, the meeting was organized by electing Elder G. A. Hartley, Chairman.

The Chairman made a few remarks acknowledging the honour so unexpectedly conferred upon him, by placing him in the chair, and referring to the object of the meeting, and its general business; after which the names of the members of Conference were called by the Secretary. ### ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Corresponding Secretary of the F. C. Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick, for the year ending July, 1865.

BRETHREN, HONOURED AND BELOVED IN CHRIST-

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Through the tender mercies of God our preserver, our lives are spared to meet in another Annual General Conference Meeting. I humbly trust we are all solemnly impressed with the great objects for which life is continued to us. We live, move, and have our being in Him from whom comes every good and We live, move, and have our being in Him from whom comes every good and perfect gift; who has also set us an example that we should walk in His footsteps, and go "about doing good." To this end, in some measure, I trust we have been devoting the health and talents with which we have been blessed during the year just closed, and for this worthy purpose have assembled at this place to day. May the great Master deeply imbue us with His Spirit, that we may, in this annual gathering, strengthen each other's hands, and devise ways and means by which our usefulness in the world shall be increased. We live in an age of selfishness, increasing temptations and cruel wickedness, and are especially called upon in every relationship we asstain to the Church of Christ and the world at large, to let our light shine. Upon us, as a portion of the Christian Church, solenn and urgest responsibilities rest. Many souls are looking to us for religious matruction, and to point out to them the way of salvation. On no other matruction, and to point out to them the way of salvation.

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than that of religious usefulness, and in no other way can we carry out the object for which we do exist so successfully as by having the mind that was in Christ Jesus, which will lead us to go about doing good. We need to cultivate and encourage an active and an intelligent religion, and at no price or gain sacrifice our humility or spirituality. May the Lord enable us to be faithful servants and disciples of so worthy a Master!

It is my duty at this time, and indeed the object for which this paper is prepared, to lay before you a report of the labours and success, under God, of our Ministers and Churches during the year. But I regret to say that, by our present system of reporting our Churches through our Districts, the Annual Meetings of which are held so long before this Conference, it is impossible for me to make my Report as full or as correct as I desire it to be.

That our Report may be as perfect as under the circumstances I can make it, I shall pursue the ordinary course of referring to each District separately.

Our First District lies the farthest North, and embraces twelve Churches which are scattered over a large section of country, on both sides of the Saint John River. This District held its Annual Meeting in October, and reported that three of its present number of Churches were added at its last Session. More ministerial labour is much needed amongst these Churches. They are not large bodies, nor are they located conveniently to each other—hence their disadvantages in sustaining the ministry of God's Word as much as is needed for their life and enlargement.

Elder Taylor has laboured with the Churches at Andover, Perth, California Settlement, and the Gallop neighbourhood, where he has been strengthening the cause, and labouring for the extension of our interests: He baptized eleven at California Settlement, and three in the Gallop neighbourhood.

Brother Curry saw some revival under his labours at Holmes' Settlement, where he baptized eight. Elder Siprell also baptized seven in connection with this Church. This Church is in rather a prosperous state. Elders McMullin and Curry have visited several of these Churches. At Middle Kent, their labours were made a blessing to the people. A number of persons were converted, and six were baptized.

Other brethren have made short visits to several of these Churches. Some of them are quite weak and weak labour.

them are quite weak, and need help.

The Second District extends on down from Peel to Woodstock, embracing the Churches on both sides of the River. This is quite a large and influential District. More of our ministering brethren live within its limits than belong to any other District in the Conference. Several of these Churches have had regular pastoral labour during the year. Elder Hartt has spent a portion of the year with the Churches in Wakefield and other parts of this District. He has spent the year in general care, and has baptized a number in different

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Elder White has laboured with the first Church in Wakefield, and the Church at Presquile, where his labours have been profitable. The Church at Wakefield was blessed with quite a good revival influence at the time of the District Meeting, which was held there last Fall, in which Elder McLeod laboured with much profit. Seven were baptized by Elder Parsons. During the last Spring, the profit. Seven were baptized by Elder Parsons. During the last Spring, the Church at Presquile was blessed with a gracious outpouring of saving mercy. The pastor, Elder White, assisted by Elder Parsons and others, held special services several weeks, and saw a powerful work. Elder Parsons baptized forty-three, and fifty-five were added to the Church. The Upper and Lower Woodstock Churches have had the constant pastoral care of Elder Parsons, and have enjoyed some prosperity. Some revival was experienced in both Churches and eleven were baptized by the pastor. Broi Parsons also had the pastoral care of the Church at Lower Wakefield. Bro. J. Shaw laboured considerably in this District, and saw some revival in Knowlesville. Elighteen were baptized by Elder Doucett. At the mouth of Presquile he also saw good done, where Elder Taylor baptized three. He and Bro, Gray spent same time at Windsor, where there is quite a thriving Church, which was organized about a year ago. Elder Hartt baptized seven there. Elder Curry has laboured to some extent in this District, and saw some revival in connection with the church at Peel, where he baptized eight, and fourteen were added to the church.

Elder Connor, who now lives in Woodstock, has also spent a portion of his time during the year with the church at Williamstown. Some interest was enjoyed, and two baptized by Bro. C. Elder Taylor has also visited a number of these churches.

The church at Lower Wakefield was received into this District at its last

Bro. Gray, a licentiate from the church at Brighton, has laboured with acceptance with a number of the churches in this and the First District. A portion

of these churches are prospering: others are weak.

The Third District extends from Woodstock to Fredericton, including about fourteen churches. A few of these churches have had regular pastoral care; but the largest part of them have only had occasional visits from ministering brethren. The church at Southampton has had the care and labours of Brothe Connor a part of the year, and has been blessed with a good season of reviving grace. Bro. Connor baptized twenty-eight. This church is prospering. Bro. Hatfield has spent a portion of the year with the churches at Caverhill and Hatfield has spent a portion of the year with the churches at Uaverhill and Campbell Settlements, with acceptance and profit. The church at Douglass had some encouragement at the time of the District meeting, held there in October last, when five were baptized by Elder Babcock. Brethren Babcock and Vanwart held a series of meetings with the church at Prince William, when the Lord crowned their efforts with success. Seven were baptized, and nine were added to the churches. Elder Babcock also baptized five at Kingsclear.

The church in Fredericton has had the constant labours of Elder McLeod, and has enjoyed considerable prosperity during the year. Some revival has been enjoyed and fifteen have been hantiged by the paster, who, with six others.

were received into the church.

Elder Kinghorn has spent a portion of his time with the churches on the Rashwaak. He has also laboured at the Ferry, and in other places. He bap-tized two at Staples Settlement. Quite a good revival was enjoyed in the church at Queensbury, under the labours of Elders McMullin and Curry, where Bro. C. baptized eight. At Bear Island, some interest was also experienced, under the labours of Brethren McMullin, Vanwart, and Curry. Five were baptized. Bro. Curry saw a good work of grace at Dumfries. The Lord blessed his la-bours. He baptized fourteen, and nineteen were added to the church. This

church is enlarging, and appears prosperous.

Elder Downey made a short visit to the churches on the Nashwaak, where

Elder Downey made a short visit to the churches on the Nashwak, where there was quite a prospect of an ingathering, but in consequence of illness he left without seeing much accomplished. He baptized one,

The Fourth District continues down the river as far as Upper Hampstead, and extends to the branches of the Oromocto, including the churches on the North and South branches. A year ago, this District was reported as enjoying a large share of the Divine favour, and much revival interest. Since that time, these churches have been pressing ou, and some of them have had more accessions. Bro. Marsh has spent the most of the year at Lincoln, where we hope the cause is being permanently built up. The church at Geary has been strengthened by the labours of Bro. Knight, who is a member of the Fredericton church. Thirteen were baptized there by Elder MoLeod. Elder Pennington has laboured a part of the year with the churches on the branches of the Oromocto, where we trust good is being done in the name of the Lord. Bro. Samuel Downey spent some time in that section of the country, and laboured with profit and we trust goods is being done in the name of the Lord. Dro. camer Downey spent some time in that section of the country, and laboured with profit and acceptance among the people. Elder Merritt has had the pastoral care of the churches at Upper Hampstead, where he has been preaching to them the word of life, and labouring for the general upbuilding of the cause of Christ. The church at Upper Gagetown was visited with a season of refreshing last fall, under

The Fifth District embraces all the churches from Upper Hampstead to the city of St. John, but does not include the city churches. Several of these churches have enjoyed a good interest during the year, and some of them have had quite encouraging seasons. Elder Downey, in his missionary labour, spent several weeks to much profit with the churches on the Washademoac Lake. At Several weeks to make probe with the church was considerably colors Island, he saw a good work of grace, when the church was considerably strengthened. He baptized eight. His labours were much blessed to the first church in Johnston. The cause had become very low there, so that meetings were seldom held; but by the blessing of the Lord things were greatly changed. Many were revived, and a good number converted. He baptized twenty-seven there. At the Narrows he also saw some revival. He baptized eleven in connection with this church. These churches require constant care, and would make a good circuit for some faithful labourer. May the Lord direct some one thither! Our young Bro. Rude has spent the year in constant labour with the churches at Holderville, Jones' Oreek, Jerusalem, and elsewhere in that vicinity, with much profit. His labours have been well received, and have been made a blessing to those churches. Elder Hartley baptized nine, the fruits of his labours at Holderville; and Elder Gunter four at Jones' Oreek. The interest is better in this section of country than it has been for some years. Elder Hartt

Elder Hartt has visited several of these churches, and saw good accomplished, especially in the second church at Wickham. The Lord poured out His Spirit, and gave them a good season of refreshing. He baptized eight at that place, and nine were added to the church. Elder Dobson has spent a portion of the year in pastoral labour with the churches at Kars and Tennant's Cove. He was blessed to see quite a revival of the good cause at Kars. He baptized sixteem. He also spent some time visiting the churches at Little River and Wickham. Elder Merritt has laboured in pastoral care with the fourth church in Wickham. Elder Vanwart has visited several of these churches with profit. He baptized one. Elder McKenzie, who lives within the limits of the District, has laboured some in that section of country. The church at New Ireland has built a fine house of worship—one that speaks highly for the interest the people take in the cause of religion—which was publicly set apart for the worship of God last spring. Bro. McKenzie now has the pastoral care of this church. Bro. French has laboured with the fifth church at Wickham. He saw some revival, in which Bro. Molomald laboured profitably. Bro. F. baptized seven.

The Sixth District extends from the Middleland, eastward, as far as Taylor Village. More labour is called for in this locality. Elder Wayman, who for many years has lived and laboured more or less with these churches, is, in consequence of infirmity, unable to take his former course of public labour. He had the care of the church on the Millstream last year. We trust his care and counsel may continue to prove a blessing to the people of his former ministry. Elder Knollin has laboured in pastoral relationship with the church at Lower Sudholm, known as the River church, where there was some revival enjoyed

there, and but a few people, he felt a cry in his heart for the people. An extensive work of reformation followed his efforts. The Lord poured out His Spirit upon them, and many were converted to Christ. Bro. Downey baptized fourteen at the Kinnear Settlement, and nineteen at the Steeves' Settlement, and organized a church of thirty-one members, which was received into the District at its last meeting. A meeting house has been commenced, and it is thought a permanent interest established. Several churches which were under the care of Elder Downey a year ago, have been without pastoral care this year, as Brother Downey has spent the year in missionary labour, under the direction of the Home Missionary Society. The branch church at the Portage, Sussex, was reorganized into a church last winter, at the time their new meeting house was dedicated to God. This church has now a fine and substantial house of worship, and with proper labour would exert a healthy influence in the community. Elder Wallace has spent the most of his labour this year with the churches at the North River, Snider Mountain, head of Millstream, and Irishtown. He saw some revival, and baptized nine. Bro. Samuel Downey is now labouring with churches within this District.

The Seventh District commences with the churches in the city of St. John, and extends south as far as the island of Grand Manan. This is our youngest District, and, like some others, requires more ministerial labour. The first church in St. John has had the labours of Elder Gunter the whole year, and has enjoyed a year of prosperity. They held evening meetings nearly all winter, and enjoyed a good degree of revival. The church was much encouraged. Elder Gunter baptized twenty-one, and added forty-seven to the church.

Elder Hartley has spent the year with the church in Carleton. He baptized twenty-six, and united thirty-two to the church. This church is pursuing a

steady course, and is exerting a good influence in the community.

The church at Beaver Harbour has been considerably blessed. They opened their new house of worship hast fall, when there was a good interest enjoyed. Several brethren have shall have shall some time there, under the direction of the Home Missionary Society. Brother

Babcock baptized twenty.

The church at Calais has been visited by brethren Marsh, Babcock, and Malloch. Brother Case has been licensed to preach by this church, and has been made a blessing to them. His labours have been blessed to the conversion of a number of souls. They have enjoyed a good revival recently. Elder Malloch baptized four, and received nine into the church; and Elder Babcock baptized thirteen, and added fourteen to the church. The prospects of this church are more encouraging than they were last year.

On the Island of Campobello, labour is much needed. Their church have

On the Island of Campobello, labour is much needed. Their church have had a few visits from brethren French, Marsh, and others, but have not had much revival influence. Elders Babcock and Malloch both live on the Island, and have laboured some with the people, but have not been under any engagements. Elder Babcock baptized three in connection with Brother Marsh's visit.

Elder Barnes has continued his faithful labours on the Island of Grand Manan. I cannot report these churches better than by giving some extracts from a letter recently, received from our brother. He says:—"Although we have not been permitted to see so great a display of God's power in the salvation of souls as in former years, yet we feel that we have no less cause to be thankful to God than we have had in times past. The churches on the Island, upon the whole, are doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances. The church has finished its parsonage, which is now accupied by the pastor. Our meetings have been well sustained, but no expecial interest. One has been baptized. The branch church at Woodard's Cove has had some trial, but the Lord has wonderfully supported this. little flock. They keep up their Sabbath, Conference, and prayer meetings, and have preciping once a month. The church at fourth

Harbour is progressing. Some revival was enjoyed last winter. Three were baptized, and added to the church. The church at Seal Cove is also progres ing. God gave us to see a good revival in the spring. Twelve were baptized, and added to the church. One other was baptized last fall. This church has now a good house of worship, which was dedicated last fall, and is a credit to the community. I have baptized seventeen on this Island, and eleven on White Head Island, for brother Brown."

Our brother also reports three Sabbath Schools, and three Temperance Societies, in connection with these churches. Bro. Brown has spent the most of his time with the church at White Head Island. This church has been steadily increasing. The Lord has made the labours of our brother a great blessing to the people of this little Island. As mentioned by Bro. Barnes, eleven have been buptized, and added to this church. A young brother has been fleensed to preach by the church at Scal Cove, who we are glad to see with us to-day. Thus, dear brethren, I have gone through with all the Districts comprising this Conference, and have noticed the revivals and other movements of importance in connection with the churches in each, as far as I have knowledge. That I have failed to notice some things that should be embodied in this report, is very probable. I have not spoken of the Sabbath Schools nor Temperance Societies connected with many of our churches, because they will be reported by Committees appointed to that duty. I may just say, however, that there are Sabbath Schools connected with the churches in each District, many of which are in an efficient state. There are also Temperance Societies connected with a number of our churches, which are exerting a good influence.

The whole number baptized and added to our churches during the year, is Five Hundred and Nine (509.)

about the state of the state of the The Lord has given us an important mission to perform in this Province, and I trust we will do our duty. Many of our churches are suffering from the want of labour, and there are many other fields already white for the harvest, that are of labour, and there are many other neids already white for the harvest, that are inviting us to visit them. One of our greatest wants is more faithful ministers. Truly, "the harvest is great, but the labourers are few." Much now depends upon the faithfulness of those already in the vineyard. I trust we shall ever content for the spirituality of the church, and labour to possess the spirit and power of the Gospel, and "stand in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, which is the good way, and walk therein."

A Foreign and Home Missionary Society each was organized in connection with our last session of Conference, of which I shall only make a mere notice in this Report, as they will be reported by their respective Corresponding Secretaries at the proper time. The Foreign Missionary Society was organized in connection with the Free Will Baptist Missionary Society of the United States. They were both established with very encouraging prospects. Quite liberal amounts were pledged to the funds of each. Preliminary steps were also taken towards the formation of an Educational Society, which it is anticipated will be organized during this Conference.

That this is a very important period in our denominational history, all must feel sensible. Let each pray that the Spirit, who guides into all truth, may lead us from this hour until the hour of death, and bless all our deliberations to the prosperity of Zion, 10 30

Elder McLeod, in moving the adoption of the Report, made some very appropriate remarks upon the necessity of proper system in our churches, and the importance of denominational loyalty. Elder Hartt, in seconding the motion, spake of the rise and progress of the denomination, contrasting the past and the present. Elder Wayman and others spoke in connection with the Report,

when it was unanimously adopted.

Elder E. Sullivan, the delegate from the Free C. Baptist General Conference of Nova Scotia, gave an interesting verbal report of the state of the cause in that Province. He stated that a number of their churches had been blessed with revivals and large accessions during the year; and that, notwithstanding all the trials through which they have passed, they feel encouraged. They are looking to the Lord for help, and hope in Him for deliverance. They stand in need of more ministerial labour.

Elder Noble, who labours in that Province, also made some encouraging remarks upon the state and prospects of the Free C. Baptist Churches in Nova Scotia. He stated that many of the brethren in the section of the Province where he labours feel

deeply interested in our educational movements.

Elder D. M. Graham, D. D., delegate from the Maine Western Yearly Meeting of the Free Will Baptists of the United States, gave an interesting account of the state of the Churches of that Yearly Meeting, and of the general state of the cause in their denomination. He gave us many valuable suggestions, and showed how we may profit by the experience of older denominations. He was listened to with deep interest.

Adjourned, to meet again on Monday morning, at 8 o'clock.

### THE SABBATH.

The Sabbath was a good day. The Lord met with his people. In the morning, at 8 o'clock, there was a prayer-meeting in the Meeting House. We are glad to know that all our Ministers, and a large proportion of our membership, stand pledged to the cause of Temperance, and that the interest of our denomination in this good cause is not abating, but rather on the increase. ### SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The following Report of the Committee appointed at the last annual Conference to report on Sabbath Schools was adopted. Good remarks were made by a number of the brethren while moving and sustaining it:—

### REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

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Your Committee, appointed in 1864 to Report on Sabbath Schools, and the best mode of managing the same, beg leave to submit the following paper, for the careful consideration of the General Conference, and of the members of the Free Baptist Churches.

Your Committee believe the Sabbath School the nursery of the Church; and as the young vine is carefully trained for future usefulness in the vineyard, so should the children of our families be trained up in the way they should go, and we have the promise that when they are old they will not depart from it.

we have the promise that when they are old they will not depart from it.

If a careful training of children was required under the Law, and parents
were enjoined so to do, how much more now when we have an extended revelation of God's will in the dectrine of his own dear Son.

If Christ would take little children in his arms and bless them, how careful should his followers be, that they seek to impart a blessing, by faithfully and tenderly imparting to them that knowledge of God's revealed will, which will, in after years, be at once a protection and a guide to them.

The idea that christians are excused from parental instruction because their children attend the Sabbath Schools, your Committee fear is too generally believed, and till more generally mastical. but that the doubtine is permicine.

The idea that christians are excused from parental instruction because their children attend the Sabbath Schools, your Committee fear is too generally believed, and still more generally practiced; but that the doctrine is pernicious, and that much evil results therefrom, is too apparent, from the absence in many families of almost all religious instruction and training at home, as well as the reluctance of parents to inquire into the spiritual condition and religious knowledge of their children in the family circle. But should every christian parent perform faithfully his duty in these respects, the necessity still remains for Sabath School labour, inssmuch as thousands of parents in all parts of the christian world are wholly incompetent to impart to their families the first rudiments of the doctrine of Christ; and hence, the Sabbath School is still needed, outside the Church, did no necessity exit for it within.

the Church, did no necessity exist for it within.

In order that an additional interest may be awakened, and that uniformity may be established, your Committee wish to make such suggestions as they hope, if acted upon in a candid and prayerful manner, may be of some service to the cause of God among us, and of still greater advantage to the young who may come under our influence and instruction.

Ist. Your Committee believe, in order that the Sabbath School cause may be successful, the ministers of the Gospel should take a personal and active interest in the Sabbath School. Ministers should be peesent as often as possible, in order that, both by precept and example, they may show their interest therein.

Your Committee believe that our Ministers should call the attention of the community in which they labour to the advantages of the Sabbath Schools at least two three times in such year.

least two or three times in each year.

2d. Every church member, having the ability, should be brought to feel that he (or she) should find a place in the Sabbath School; and when not engaged in teaching, they should arrange themselves into Bible or other classes, for the study of God's word; and on this the minister (if any) should insist, when rescriptions.

3d. The Officers of every Sabbath School, when to be had, should be fully competent to the task assigned, and should be selected because of their zeal, as shown by the care taken to sustain and interest the School.

Your Committee believe the Officers should be elected annually by ballot,

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without reference to either nomination or canvass. The selection of officers should be the deliberate judgment and wisk of the School.

4th. One prayer meeting in each month—if prayer meetings are regularly held—should be known as the Sabbath School prayer meeting, to which the whole School should be invited; and at the close of which a short conference might be held, to hear from teachers and others on their experience and prospects in the School, with suggestions on desired improvements, modes of managements.

5th, When and where it is practicable, Sabbath School Concerts should be octasionally held, for the encouragement of the pupils, and to raise the necessary funds; but when not practicable, some other approved means should be devised to raise funds with which to procure reading matter for the School. Your Committee are of the opinion that a judicious selection of Sabbath School papers is to be preferred, not only to give interest to the School, but to encourage reading. The papers should be carefully preserved, returned to the Librarian, and by him filed for additional usefulness.

Your Committee are also of the opinion that additional attention is required.

rian, and by him filed for additional usefulness.

Your Committee are also of the opinion that additional attention is required in he system of imparting instruction, and that the officers of every School should take care that the following features should be prominently seen in their School:—First, the spiritual force and design, of the Scriptures; the need of salvation and its only source—faith in Christ, and obedience to his laws. Secondly, a systematical knowledge Riblical history, accountained by reviews. salvation and its only source—faith in Christ, and obedience to his laws. Secondly, a systematical knowledgelof Biblical history, accompanied by reviews, and also the moral code, accompanied with regular but brief lessons on proper behaviour in public, and especially in the house of God.

In addition to the above, your Committee recommend that occasional lectures should be delivered before the School on Temperance, and especially against the pernicious habit and practice of the use of ardent spirits, and tobacco, and that pledges be taken in every school against the use of these articles.

Your Committee suggest that some organization be made, by which we may arrive at a correct knowledge of the state and statistics of our Sabbath Schools, so that a report may be prepared annually, and laid before the General Conference.

Your Committee hope, by the adoption of the spirit of the above suggestions, to see not only greater uniformity in the management of our Schools, but greater interest begotten, and a much more glorious result.

But we cannot close this Report without referring to the necessity of those young men applying themselves to the study of God's word, and such other religious books as will store their minds with useful information, to enable them to show themselves approved unto God, workmen that need not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. Furthermore we think too much stress cannot be laid upon the necessity of our young men thoroughly understanding the doctrines held by our denomination. We therefore recommend that Conference require all our young brethren who enter the ministry to procure "Butler's Theology," and strive to become thoroughly acquainted with the doctrines therein treated, which is the best exposition of the leading sentiments held by our denomination of which we have knowledge.

We would also call attention to the necessity of their striving to be soberminded and circumspect in their deportment, ever bearing in mind that the eyes of the world are upon them, and that religion will be judged of by their conduct. The church also looks to them for example, hence the necessity that they should at all times and in all places exemplify the character of the ambassador of the cross, and watch for souls as those that must give an account.

THE FREE CHRISTIAN BAPTIST HOME MISSION SOCIETY held its First Annual Meeting at Coverdale, Albert County, July 4th, 1865, at 7 o'clock, P. M. B. J. Underhill, Esq., in the Chair.

Meeting called to order by the President, who gave out a Missionary Hymn; after which prayer was offered by Elder G. A. Hartley.

The Corresponding Secretary's Report was called for, read and adopted.

My Christian Friends—Amongst the important doings of the last session of our General Conference was the organization of our Home Mission Society, the first annual report of which I now proceed to lay before you.

I may here say that, although the organization of this Society was a new action, and a step taken in the right direction in our denominational history, it nevertheless aims at the perpetuation, in a more perfectly systematized form, of the same kind of labour by which our denomination was planted, and by which the most of our churches have been raised up. Home Mission work is by no means a new thing with the Free C. Baptists of this Province. The fathers of our denomination, to whose faithful labours we are indebted for so much to-day, were really and truly missionaries. Enduring hardness as good soldiers of Jesus Christ, they went everywhere "preaching the word, the hand of the Lerd was with them, and a great number believed and turned unto the Lord." To the spirit and labour of missionary work we are indebted for our existence as a denomination. Not only have the most of our churches been planted by itinerant labourers, but many of the best and most extensive revivals of religion by which secessions have been made to our churches, have been the fruits of their toils. Indeed, missionary work is the true work of the christian church, and the missionary spirit the real spirit of the gospel of Christ. "Go" is the command of Christ, who Himself in His life and labour "went about doing good." There are many reasons why this work should be sacred to each heart within these walls to day—reasons based upon the principles of gratitude for past blessing, and hopes for future prosperity. In the past the rule has been missionary labour, the regular pastorate the exception; and with all the acknowledged advantages of the settled or regular pastorate—to which we attach great importance—we verily believe that our future pro

labour in the more destitute parts of our country. A system of missionary labour was accordingly devised, and under the direction of the "Board of Missions" was, for several years successfully worked. In the exercise of the general care still living in the hearts of many of these same brethren, it was thought by them and by the whole Conference last year, that in the future this work could be even more successfully prosecuted by the organization of a Home Mission Society-hence our existence. This Society is accountable for all financial liabilities incurred by its operations, consequently our General Conference is relieved from providing to meet these expenses.

We are now at the close of our first year's history, and are assembled in our first annual public meeting, to render to you our first report, and to solicit your continued and even increased co-operation in our efforts to supply our scattered and destitute churches with the ministry of God's Word, as well as to give the gospel to those sections of our country from which the Maccedonian cry is coming to us, in which, as yet, we have no churches. The demand for Free Baptist

labour is increasing throughout our Province.

We were organized with hopes of usefulness, and have been blessed with prosperity thus far. Several brethren have been engaged by our Executive Committee, whose labours we have reason to believe have been owned and blessed by the great Head of the Church. But one of these has spent the whole year in connection with our Society; the others have laboured for such periods

of time as the Committee felt warranted to engage them.

Elder Downey was engaged by the year. He has spent the whole year in faithful and successful labour under the direction of the Executive Committee, excepting a few weeks spent by him in Nova Scotia. His first protracted effort was in the Kimear Settlement, in King's County, where the Lord especially owned his labours. We had no church in this place, and but a few of the people knew much about us as a denomination. The spirit of the Lord moved the hearts of the people in a powerful manner. Great crowds flocked to hear the Gospel, and many souls were converted to God. The revival spread to an adjacent settlement, called the Steeve's settlement, where God's power was also displayed in saving sinners. The whole region round about was moved, and great good was done in the name of the Master. Our brother baptized thirtythree in these neighbourhoods, and organized a church of thirty-one members. A meeting house has also been commenced, and a permanent interest we befleve established. He next visited and spent several weeks with the churches in Johnston, Q. C., located about the Washademoac Lake. These churches had had but little ministerial labour for some time, and had become much scattered. Indeed, regular meetings were scarcely held up by them. The Lord made the labours of Bro. Downey a great blessing to them. The church at Cole's Island was much revived, and the hearts of the brethren greatly encouraged. Eight were baptized.

The first church in Johnston had become much scattered, but the blessing of God followed the labours of our brother in this place. They were visited with a gracious outpouring of God's Spirit. Many weak ones were strengthened, backsliders were reclaimed, and sinners converted. He baptized twenty eight.

The second church in Johnston-at the Narrows-also shared in this ble work. Mercy drops fell on the thirsty hill of Zion in that place. Much encou ragement and reviving were enjoyed by the brethren. Eleven were baptized

and added to the church. A visit was next made to the Nashwaak, where there was the prospect of much good; but in consequence of illness, our brother was obliged to leave for his home. The rest of the year has been spent in visiting the churches in dif-

his nome. The rest of the year has been spent when it is a characteristic ferent sections of the country, labouring for their upbuilding, and laying before them the claims of our society.

Brother Jarvis Shaw—a licentiate, living in Carleton County—has spent three months with us. This brother visited several churches in the upper part of the County. He was up as far as the Toblque River, where his labours were

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blessed to the encouragement of the church in that place. saw good done in the name of the Lord. Quite a revival followed his labours in that new and thriving settlement. Seventeen were baptized by some of our ordained brethren, who rendered him timely assistance. At the mouth of Presquile and at Windsor, this brother's labours were blessed. Several were converted and baptized in each place.

Bro. Marsh—a licentiate, now located at Lincoln—took a mission of nine weeks at Beaver Harbour, Calais and Campobello, in each of which places he saw good effected. At the Harbour and Calais especially, did he report the prospects to be encouraging. He saw many wanderers reclaimed, and some souls

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Elder R. French spent half a month in a missionary visit to Campobello, which we trust was accompanied by the Divine favour.

Elder T. Vanwart laboured last fall one month and seventeen days, at Stanley and elsewhere, where he saw some good done in the name of the Lord,

and eigewhere, where he saw some good done in the mane of the Lord.

Elder F. Babcock was sent one month, this spring, to the church at Beaver
Harbour. This church has been steadily advancing since the dedication of their
new Meeting House last fall. Our brother's visit was of great good to them. The Lord poured out His Spirit upon the labours of His servant, and a number of souls were born again. Bro. B. baptized and added quite a number to the

Elder Knollin was engaged to go to P. E. Island for one month, but was unavoidably prevented before this meeting, but is expected to go soon.

In conclusion, let me say that, the importance of this work cannot be overrated. The success of all our operations depends upon the healthy and vigorous-state of our churches. It is a well known fact that all forces are strongest at their centres, and diminish with the distance. It then becomes us to look. well to the state of our churches, and see that they are in a state of efficiency. wen to the state of our characters, and takings to spread our operations abroad, we must take care of our churches at home. Beginning at Jerusalem, let us labour to make our centre strong, and then extend our efforts as we have strength

The adoption of the Report was moved by Elder J. T. Parsons, who made an interesting speech. Elder Downey seconded the resolution.

Brethren D. W. Clark and George McDonald made very earnest and stirring speeches, and powerful appeals to the meeting in behalf of the funds of the Society. Elder Hartley also made some pointed, practical remarks, and proceeded to take up subscriptions in aid of the funds. A deep interest was manifested by the entire audience, and pledges to the amount of \$236 were obtained.

The following Report of the Executive Committee was submitted and adopted :-

One missionary has been kept and sustained in the gospel field during the whole of the past year, and five others have been employed for shorter periods of time, at an aggregate expense of \$585.34, on their several mission fields; these missionaries have collected the sum of \$182.75, and after paying their amounts and advancing \$22 to Elder Knollin, for nine month's labour to P. E. Island, which he has not yet been able to perform, and deducting incidental expenses, there remains in the Treasurer's hands a balance of \$38.52.

## FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

FREE CHRISTIAN BAPTIST MEETING HOUSE, COVERDALE, ALBERT Co., July 4th, 1865.

The first annual meeting of the Free C. Baptist Foreign Mission Society was held this day, at the above place; Rev. Samuel Hartt,

Our last General Conference was attended by the Rev. C. O. Libby, Corresponding Secretary to the Freewill Baptist Foreign Mission Society of the United States, and Rev. Dr. Graham, one of the Executive Committee; they were accompanied by Rev. James L. Phillips, a young man, the son of Missionary parents, born in India, and who had come to America at the age of twelve years. Since his arrival it had pleased God to convert him, and his native land, to labour as a missionary among the degraded heathen there. Phillips of the idolatries of India, as well as in his proclamation of the gospel to ourselves. After deliberate consideration it was determined to organize a Foreign Mission Society possible), an amount annually, sufficient to support Brother Phillips in India. A Constitution and Rules were accordingly drafted by a Committee, and submitted for the approval of the Conference, which being received, our Society with Brethren Libby and Graham for Brother Phillips to go out to the mission field under our anspices, as a missionary of our Society, and to be supported by by confirmed. In consequence of the war in the United States, fewer vessels than formerly were engaged in the Indian commerce, and hence a considerable delay occurred before a ship could be obtained sailing for Calcutta, in which the missionaries could embark. On the 20th of Docember last, however, a party of missionaries including Brother Phillips and wife sailed from Boston in the ship "Elcano." We deeply regret to state that no news of their arrival in India has yet reached us, and great fears are beginning to be awakened for their safety. The whole party of missionaries on board the "Elcano," including your missionary and his wife, his father, the Rev. Jeremiah Phillips, his wife and two daughters, going out under the auspices of the Freewill Baptist Foreign Mission Society, and two Presbyterian missionaries, with their wives. We are anxiously awaiting tidings of these voyagers on the dangerous deep to their far off field of Christian toil, and we but hope that the God of missions has held them in his hand, and tempered the wind and the sea to their vessel during the long days and nights which they have been on the deep. But if Infinite wisdom has seen otherwise, and shipwreck or other calamity has befallen them, we bow submissively to his Providence, exclaiming with the apostle: "How unsearchable are His ways, and His judgments past finding out."

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The field of labour to which your missionary has been sent is the British province of Orissa. Orissa is situated near the head of the Bay of Bengal, on its north-western shore, a short distance south-west from Calcutta. It is divided into three civil districts, viz.: Pooree in the south, Cuttuck in the centre, and Balasore on the north. The districts of Pooree and Cuttuck are occupied by the English General Baptist mission aries, the district of Balasore being the site of the Freewill Baptist mission. This district lies on the west side of the Bay of Bengal. It is about 80 miles long and on an average 30 or 40 miles wide, and contains about 500,000 inhabitants. On its northern boundary lies a considerable tract belonging to the Province of Bengal, which is inhabitated by Oriyas. On the west are several tributary states governed by native Princes, which are peopled by Oriyas, Santals, &c. Missionary operations were commenced in Orissa several years ago by the Freewill Baptists, and the first missionaries sent out were the Rev. Jeremiah Phillips and the late Rev. Eli Noyes, D. D., with their wives. There your missionary, the Rev. James L. Phillips, was born; beneath the shadow of the mission church at Balasore sleeps the dust of his sainted mother, and the field of his labour is hallowed to him by all the associations of his childhood. The Santal language, which is the principal language of the people, he learned in child-hood. Into this language his father translated a portion of the Scriptures during his former missionary tour in India. The whole Scriptures, it is expected, will be completed by him on his return, assisted by his son. Several missionaries from the Freewill Baptist Foreign Mission Society have been labouring there from the Freewill Baptist Foreign Mission Society have been indouring there during the absence of the elder Phillips, and a number of converts from heathenism have been baptized and joined the mission church; schools are being established in different parts of the country; Bible and Tract distribution among the people is being prosecuted, and the leaven of a pure religion is permeating the heathen mind. In this Report we cannot speak of the awful idolatries which the missionaries have been compelled to witness. They are living witnesses to the truth of inspiration, that "their sorrows are multiplied that hasten after the control of the problem." another God;" and that "the dark places of the earth are full of the habitations of cruelty." Our duty is to aid in the great work of giving the Gospel to the world. Perhaps we can do but little, but if we "do what we can," our memorial will be everlasting. The Treasurer's Report shows considerable liberality already manifested on the part of our people in behalf of this infant cause. We trust our zeal will not abate, but that the sum required for the support of our missionary (which is about \$700 annually), will be contributed without grudging, and we are sure the blessing of the God of missions will test upon the E. McLEOD CORRESPONDENG SECRETARY F. M. SOCIETY.

Nore.—Two days after the foregoing Report was submitted, news was received of the arrival of the "Elcano" at Ceylon, after a passage of five months, all but three days. Letters since received from Bro. Phillips report the Missionary party well.

The Rev. John Perry moved the adoption of the Report, and made a very able and impressive speech. The Rev. D. M. Graham, D. D., in seconding the motion, gave a very excellent address, which was highly instructive, and listened to with deep interest. Rev. E. McLeod sustained the resolution with a warm hearted and real missionary speech. By this time the meeting was ready for the subscription list, which was at once opened, when nearly or about \$200 were pledged to the funds.

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### CONSTITUTION

OF THE

FREE BAPTIST EDUCATION SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA.

### ARTICLE I.—NAME.

This Organization shall be known as the Free Baptist Education Society of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

### ARTICLE II. - MEMBERSHIP.

Any person subscribing two dollars annually to this Society shall be a regular member of the same; and any person subscribing twenty dollars (\$20) at one time, shall become a life member.

### ARTICLE III.—OFFICERS.

The Officers of this Society shall consist of a President and Secretary, who shall be ex-officio Directors; two Vice-Presidents, and a Treasurer, with five other Directors; said Directors, with the President and Secretary of the Society, shall constitute the Board of Directors.

### ARTICLE IV.—ELIGIBILITY TO OFFICE.

Only life members shall be eligible to the offices of Vice President and Treasurer, and no person shall be eligible to the office of either Director, President, or Secretary, who has not subscribed at one time at least forty dollars (\$40) for the benefit of this Society.

### ARTICLE V.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Sec. 1. The President, or in his absence, the senior Vice President present, shall preside at each meeting, and, as near as may be, conduct the same according to parliamentary usage.

Sec. 2. The Secretary shall conduct all the correspondence of the Society, keeping a copy of the same. He shall also keep a correct record of the meetings and doings of the Society.

Sec. 3. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all monies belonging to the Society, giving complete and satisfactory security for the same; no money to be paid out by the Treasurer except by the written order of the Secretary, endorsed by the President of the Society.

Sec. 4. The Secretary and Treasurer shall each prepare, annually, a written report, giving a full statement of all the business transacted in his department, and lay said report before the Society at each annual meeting.

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Sec. 5. The Board of Directors shall have the control of all busupposed, to ear tree stop ist siness connected with the Society. May purchase lands and erect buildings thereon for Educational purposes; employ persons as Teachers, and have the whole supervision of such Institutions as they may have means to erect.

### ARTICLE VI.—ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Sec. 1. At the first annual meeting there shall be chosen a President, two Vice Presidents, a Secretary, and Treasurer, with five Directors; and annually thereafter a President, two Vice Presidents, a Secretary, and Treasurer, shall be chosen by a majority of the members present. All who are eligible to the representative offices shall be considered as candidates, and said officers shall be

Sec. 2. On the election of Directors each member shall place on his ballot not more than five names of the persons eligible, whom he may desire to fill the office. Ballots to be counted by the President of the Society, assisted by the Secretary; at the close of which the President shall declare the five persons bearing the greatest number of votes duly elected. The two Directors having the least number of votes shall retire at the end of the first year; the two next lowest to retire at the end of the second year; and the fifth of the five first elected shall retire at the end of the third year; after which the two Directors longest in office shall retire annually, except each third year, when one only shall retire; said vacancies to be filled at each annual meeting by a vote of a majority of the members present; retiring Directors to be eligible for re-election. All ties in elections, when necessary, to be balloted

## ARTICLE VII.—POWER OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

Sec. 1. The Board of Directors shall have no power to contract a debt beyond the amount in the Treasurer's hands, or bona fide pledges made, except to the amount of the salaries of the Teachers engaged, and in all cases provision for payment of said salaries must be made at the end of each year.

Sec. 2. The President of the Society shall be Chairman of the Board of Directors, and the Secretary of the Society shall be Clerk of the same. He shall keep a correct account of all their doings, and report the same fully at each annual meeting. All reports of this nature are to be read before the election of any officer. Said Board shall have power to adopt such by-laws from time to time as they may need, but not to conflict with this Constitution.

### ARTICLE VIII.—SCHOLARSHIP.

Any person subscribing at any time \$400, and paying the same for the benefit of the Society, shall be entitled to send a pupil, continuously, to any Free Baptist school that may be established by this Society, free from any and all tuition fees; half and quarterly scholarships to be secured on payment of \$200 and \$100 respectively; persons taking either half or quarterly scholarships shall have deduction either one half, or one quarter, as the case may be, from all tuition fees charged them by the Society.

### ARTICLE IX.—TIME OF ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of this Society shall be held during the sitting of the General Conference. The time and place of meeting to be named by the President, who shall give due notice thereof.

### ARTICLE X.—AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution hay be altered or amended at any annual meeting of this Society, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, twenty members constituting a quorum. No change shall be made in the Constitution, however, unless a notice of the intention thereof be published in some journal in the Province at least three months previous to making the said alteration.
