PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Special to the Tribune.

The House of Commons—Faintness M. P. \$10,000 for Dipper Harbor—St. John Harbor to be surveyed—Gonville's illness—A Contest in West Durham.

OTAWA, March 10.

The House took a breathing spell Saturday afternoon after the excitement of the vote on the resolution in every Province but Ontario, the vote being: In Ontario—Government 33, Opposition 44; Quebec—Government 33, Opposition 27; Nova Scotia—Government 12, Opposition 5; New Brunswick—Government 9, Opposition 8; Manitoba—Government 1, Opposition none; British Columbia—Government 5, Opposition none. A majority of the 26 absent members are supposed to be for the Government.

The reply to the Address will be taken up to-day, and a long and fierce contest will begin over the second paragraph of the paragraph relating to the granting of a charter to the Pacific Railway Company.

The leaders of both parties are making frantic efforts to increase the number of their followers.

The New Brunswick members who have gone with the Opposition, notwithstanding the fact that the Opposition are ready to violently oppose any measure for the relief of New Brunswick's financial difficulties, are sneered at openly as being willing to sacrifice the Province for the sake of getting positions in the Cabinet in the case of an Opposition triumph.

Mr. Palmer has been pressing on the Government the desirability of making a thorough survey of St. John Harbor, with a view to making such improvements in it as will render it one of the safest and best harbors in Canada, and he is confident that it will succeed.

Ten thousand dollars have been secured for the improvement of Dipper Harbor. This sum will be placed in the estimates.

Mr. Cornell is still sick and unable to attend the House.

It is reported that Mr. Glen, the great manufacturer of Oshawa, will oppose Mr. E. B. Wood, for the Commons in West Durham, one of the constituencies which returned Mr. Blake by acclamation.

Mr. Blake has taken his seat for South Bruce, West Durham is a strong reform County, but the prospect of Mr. Glen's return by the Conservatives is good.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FREDERICTON, March 10.

Saturday afternoon Hon. Mr. Crawford presented the petition of A. Christie & Co., and ninety-nine others, in favor of the mechanics lien bill. Mr. Lindsay introduced a bill relating to the assessment of taxes in Woodstock. The members talked and laughed, wrote letters, smoked in the clerks' rooms, and worked for the country in an equally brain-distressing, nerve-exhausting, fat-destroying, muscle-wearing manner until 8 o'clock, when somebody moved to adjourn. "These for-it-yet-against-it-may-yes-have-it," said the Speaker, leaving the chair, and the legislators were at liberty to take a little rest.

To-Day's Proceedings.

The bill relating to the distribution of the Bye Road money was referred to a special committee consisting of one member from each County.

MacPherson presented the petition of John McDonald and sixty others praying that the Bill relating to the Fredericton assessment do not become law.

Lindsay introduced a bill to incorporate the Carleton and Victoria Steamboat Company; Robinson a bill to authorize and empower the Municipality of York to issue debentures to take up the debentures issued in 1868 to the amount of \$8,000 in aid of the Fredericton Branch Railway; also, a bill relating to the acknowledgment and registry of deeds and other instruments; Harrison, a bill to amend the law relating to municipalities; Crawford, a bill to amend an Act entitled an Act to impose taxes on unimproved granted lands to assist in the construction of roads and bridges running through said lands.

Maher presented the petition of Bishop Sweeney and 800 Roman Catholics, praying for an amendment of the Schools Act so as to confer the same rights and privileges on the Catholic minority in this Province as are enjoyed by the Protestant minority in Quebec; Donald, the petition of Rev. Mr. Quinn and 240 others for the same object; Butler, a petition praying for the incorporation of the Loyal Orange Association.

Humphrey introduced a Bill relating to Sewerage, &c., for the town of Moncton; Tibbles, a Bill to divide the County of Victoria into two separate counties and to provide for the Government of each county.

Mr. Girouard's bill relating to marsh lands in Little Chockish, Robbinston, was agreed to in Committee of the whole House, without amendments.

Mr. Maher introduced a bill to limit the pay of members of the House of Assembly; Mr. Stevenson, a bill to incorporate the St. George Granite Company.

Mr. Crawford moved the House into Committee of the Whole to consider the bill relating to several of the County Courts.

Mr. Gough asked the Government if they had taken any means to assist the Dominion authorities in arriving at a just valuation of the New Brunswick fisheries, pending the sitting of the Commission under the Washington Treaty for ascertaining the relative value of our fisheries over those of the United States. He said the Government had undertaken pilgrimages to Halifax and Charlottetown not suggested by the House at the inception of the treaty, and as this was a matter of great money value he hoped the

Government had understood the importance of the situation and had taken steps accordingly.

A late payment for the New Brunswick Fisheries would tend to the easy accomplishment of better terms. The Provincial Secretary answered that the Government had done nothing in the matter.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

FREDERICTON, March 10.

Hon. Robinson Owen took his seat. The Bill relating to the appointment of Notaries Public passed in Committee without amendment.

The bill to enable the Justices of the Peace for the County of Kings to sell certain lands was amended in Committee so as to require notice of sale of lands to be published in some newspaper issued in the city of St. John.

Hon. Mr. Robinson Owen presented a petition of Rev. James Quinn, Hu. Cullinan, J. P., and 200 others, of St. Stephen, for separate schools.

Hon. Mr. Jones presented a petition of the Rev. J. Sweeney, Roman Catholic Bishop of St. John, and 1,074 others, praying for separate schools.
