The Speech.

There is nothing in the Speech with which

Parliament was opened yesterday.

It is the flattest document, even for

a Speech from the Throne, that was

ever issued. It omits most and promises

less than any other Gov. General's

speech we ever read. A Supreme Court

Bill, which has been hanging over the

head of Parliament for years; an insol-
vency Bill, which is necessary on ac-
count of the lapsing of the Act on that

subject; and North-West Territory, In-
surance and Copyright Bills, are all that

are fresh-awakened. Only this, and no-
thing more. And then, notice the omis-
sions. Not a word about that miser-
able abortion, Brown's proposals to

the United States Government for "Old Myl-
leton's Money." Not a word of congrat-
ulation at the commutation of Lepine's

sentence! Why so silent? Is not the

Ministry proud of its Amateur Ambassa-
dor and his attempt at treaty-making?

Has it no lamentation to utter on ac-
count of the snubbing his proposals have

received? Is it content to weep apart,
shedding tears which, like those that were

wrung from Mrs. Bluenorth after her Eden-like home had

been debauched by the ambition which the

snake-like Aaron Burr had infused into

her husband, "froze as they fell" in this

cold weather? It seems so. How cruel of it

thus to deprive its supporters—who like

Edward Hicks have steadily refused to say a

word in favor of the draft treaty—of the

opportunity of endorsing it now by their

vote on the Address in Reply!

Having omitted everything for which

it has reason to fear, content and pro-
mised nothing for which it has reason to

expect serious opposition, the Govern-
ment programme is one of absolute

safety. The Supreme Court Bill will be

opposed by no party, and any opposi-
tion to details will not, of course, affect

the Government. An Insolvency Bill of

some kind must be enacted, and the

features of such a measure have been so

thoroughly canvassed by Boards of

Trade and Parliamentary Committees

that an acceptable bill can be expected.

Legislation on Insurance and Copy-
rights is not a very serious matter, and

every member of the House will be pre-
pared to aid in perfecting measures for

the re-organization of the Government of
the North-West Territory. It would seem,

therefore, that the Grip Bill of State has

a clear course this session. The Ministers

will be made to wince under truthful

descriptions of the abortive attempt to

crush Canadian manufactures with the

Brown Treaty; they will be forced to

turn and twist and in vain attempts to

establish non-responsibility for the com-
munication of Lepine's sentence; they will

boast, with some reason, of the amiable

settlement of the British Columbia dif-
ficulty; they will, with the aid of what

the Brown treaty has described as "the

superior majority of the Government,"

stave off inquiry into the numerous cases

of corrupt interference of Ministers in

elections, the numerous cases of super-
annuation of officials for the purpose

of creating places for themselves; they

are capable of making any brazen state-
ment, leaving found by experience that

hypocrysy pays.

There being no prospect of the over-
throw of the Government this session,

the action of the C. Senate having saved

Mr. Mackenzie from certain defeat,
and nothing of particular interest or

importance having been fresh-awakened

in the Speech, the public will not look

for Parliamentary reports with the old

earnestness.

stone in Central Africa, 1843 to his

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I have much satisfaction in meeting you at this early and convenient season. I have to congratulate you upon the organization of the North West Police Force and the success of its operations. It has materially aided in the creation of confidence and good will among the Indian tribes, in the suppression of the liquor traffic, in the establishment of legitimate trade, in the collection of duties, and above all, in maintaining security for life and property in the territory.

The negotiations of friendly treaty with the Cree and Saulteaux of the North West, for thecession of territory, may be regarded as a further guarantee of the continuation of amicable relations with the Indian tribes of the North West during the past summer.

I had the pleasure and advantage of visiting a very large portion of the Province of Ontario, including the whole coast of Georgian Bay and Lake Superior. This official visit enabled me to form a better idea of the great extent of a comparatively well settled country, and of that which is still almost unexplored. I was everywhere received with welcome, and was much gratified in witnessing the enterprise, contentment and loyal manliness of the people.

Your attention will be invited to a measure for the creation of a Supreme Court. The necessity for such a measure has recently become more and more apparent since the organization of the Dominion. It is essential to our system of jurisprudence and to the settlement of constitutional questions.

A Room at Lord Lansdowne's. Tuesday morning, Feb. 20th, 1889. Lady Mary Fox received us as she promised, and most kindly, and I remained near her all the evening. Lady Lansdowne shook hands with me, and was most kind in her reception of me. The house is beautiful. It stands in Berkeley Square, on a square of ground, surrounded by a high wall, and with a lodge at the gate. We entered at one gate, drove round a circle, and came out another way to avoid confusion. We were received in an immense hall, surrounded with statues, with a parqueted floor of different-colored woods—mosaic. The shape of the hall was a long ellipse; the center part was covered with carpet, and was lower than the two ends which ascended into cupolas, which were lighted, so that the lights were concealed, and had the effect of a blaze of light coming from above without our knowing from whence. It was exceedingly beautiful, the ceiling ornamented with carving and gilding. From this opened a library through which every one passed to the reception room—a fine room; from this a small boudoir, from this a large drawing-room hung with yellow satin, mirrors, and some beautiful pictures; and from this the tea-room, at the entrance of which were two of Canova's statues—a Venus, and a cast of his daughter.

"At the end of the room there was a tea-table, behind which stood three women neatly dressed, to give tea and coffee, and a small table of refreshments, behind which stood two or three servants in liveries; there were fruits, ices, cakes, preserves, and champagne. They make very little of refreshments in it. In small parties nothing is given but tea. There is a table with bread and cakes, and some elderly lady sits at it, or else it is handed; but unless it is understood to be a grand party, nothing is given but tea, or sometimes lemonade.

"Mrs. Norton came to speak to me, leaning on the arm of Lord Melbourne. Her Norton is very handsome, but not a person whom you would notice. Her eyes are bright and she has dark hair, and very beautiful arms and neck. I talked, besides, to Lady Listowel and her niece, to the Macdonalds, to Jekyll, to Mr. Figgis, and the Earl of Kerry.

"The Lord Chancellor Brougham is a curious looking person. He was in his official dress, black velvet coat, satin small clothes, and point lace ruffles, and wore his sword and bagging. The dress was on account of the 'drawing room' of the Queen's birthday. He is tall and ugly, with large features, and a curious, nervous, rabbit-like motion of the nose. I heard him rattling away some nonsense to the young ladies about the dreadful discoveries he had made at the drawing-room about the ladies by means of the cross light—discovers which he made a vow never to repeat. They say he is as remarkable for his powers of making himself agreeable in a ball-room as for any other. The Duke of Argyll brought his daughter, Lady Paget, to look at my dress, which he said was one of the handsomest in the room. He said anything like the magnificence of the jewels, stomachers, and head-dresses of diamonds—enough to dazzle one's eyes. We left the room at about half-past twelve, and were in the large hall (into which the door opens), and the cloak room, until two, and the noise was enough to deafen one. There were five servants in a row, screaming as if they were mad. Lady Mary Fox's carriage stopped the way. 'Wanting to come out?' 'Whose carriage next?' and so on, till I thought I should have been deaf. We were very glad to find ourselves at last at home and in bed, though I had a very disagreeable evening. I said to Lady Mary Fox that I would rather talk to her than to any other lady, but she said such nonsense that I could not hear what she said. I was very much disappointed in her. She had the malice to tell him this, and he returned in an attitude of indignation, saying, 'I'm so sorry! I should have brought a little something to you, but I was so busy that I could not do so.' Dante Gabriel Rossetti. In measuring his career as a poet, we at once perceive that he has moved in a somewhat narrow range with respect to both the thought and method of his compositions; but that he approaches Tennyson in simplicity, purity, and richness of tone. His dramatic and lyrical powers are very marked, though not fully developed; if he had been restricted to verse as a means of expression, he no doubt would have added greatly to our English song. Sonnets like the 'Bridal Birth' and 'Napoli Sleeps,' and poems so profoundly thoughtful as 'The Sea Lilies' and 'The Woodpecker,' place him among the foremost contemporaries. He has had a magnetic influence upon those who come within his circle. Should he complete 'The House of Life,' upon his original projection, he will leave a monument of beauty more lasting than the tradition of his presence. His verse is compact of condensation, emotional intensity, and poetic fire. The spirit of the matter whose name he bears clothes him as with a white garment. And we should expect his associates to be humbled lovers of the beautiful, firm of all, and through his ministry to rise to the lustreous upper heaven of spiritual art.—E. C. Steadman, in Scribner for February.
