

REIGN OF TERROR IN BELFAST. LIVES LOST AND PROPERTY DESTROYED. BELFAST, June 11 .- An associated press reporter who was detailed to remain on In aid of the METHODIST the scene of riots, at 5 o'clock this morning reported as follows: "I remained among the rioters all night. The greatest damage in the way of wrecking and looting was done along the Shank Hill and the York Roads. The fighting in both thoroughfares was desperate and continuous. The mob was composed of the lowest ruffians. The bayonets of the police had no terrors for them, and in many cases I saw the mob, in overwhelmin numbers, press up against the bayonets of the police and drive them back. The the police and drive them back. The only instances in which the police drove the mob at all, so far as I observed, were those in which the officers, in compact those fired at close range, rapid volleys of o'clock.

These the rioters could not stand against and they were driven back. But even under such galling fire, the rioters would drop to the pavements and rush upon the police while they were reloading. Fighting of this kind at such close range as to be practically hand to hand was con-tinued until two o'clock this morning when twilight began to dawn and so many of the rioters disappeared as to leave the mob of insufficient strength to cope with the armed police, who succeeded in dis-persing it. My observation shows that the mob of last night was composed of the very scum of Belfast. I saw numbers of it throw paving stones weighing fifteen and twenty pounds. I even saw fiends hurling rocks at the gallant firemen who were imperilling their lives in attempts to save dwellings from destruction by incendiary fires and the helpless inmates from horrible deaths. If anything else were wanting to prove the character of the mob it would be furnished by the dozens of ruffians I saw during the nigh dozens of ruftians I saw during the night sneaking away from wrecked or burning buildings laden with loot. It is impossible to describe the state of terror under which the respectable Catholic people of Belfast are now living, in consequence of the prevalent anarchy and bigotry. The bravest of them hardly dare to venture cut of doors in daylight even. I know that scores of people were shot during last night's riots. I saw ten taken to hospitals this morning. It is feared that every funeral of a victim of the riots may provoke a fresh outbreak. THE FATAL OIL CAN. THREE PERSONS BADLY BURNED BY THE CARELESS USE OF KEROSENE.

Teresa Manning, a domestic in the employ of Mr. John Lorigan, who resides in the northern end of Henderson, Lorigan & Burns' foundry building, Brussels street, was yesterday afternoon left alone with the family, which consists of several young children. About five o'clock she wen into the kitchen to look at the fire and finding it very low, took down a can of kerosene oil and poured it in on the coal.

The stream of oil caught fire and the flame communicating with the larger quantity inside the can caused it to explode. The shock of the explosion threw Mr. Lorigan's youngest child, a baby of nine months, out of the girl's arms The blazing oil, also, set fire to the clothing of the girl and that of the baby in her arms, also setting fire to the dress of Mr. Lori-

gan's eight year old daughter.

Upon discovering that her clothing was on fire Miss Manning ran from the room and out on the street. Mr. Lorigan happened to be standing in the door of the pened to be standing in the door of the warehouse and saw a woman enveloped in flames running up the street. He did not recognize her, but at once took off his coat and ran towards her and throwing the coat about her head and shoulders smothered the flames. When applying the coat to the skirts of her dress he recognized the young woman and turned her back into the house. Mr. Lorigan's ten year old son had seen Miss Manning rushing from the house and, divining that something was wrong, he ran in and found the baby lying on the floor. Suatching up the nearest cloth he could find he quickly extinguished the flames.
