MILES CITY, MONT., June 13.—The attitude of the Cheyenne Indians continues to be menacing, owing to the fact that they have left their winter quarters scattered over the country in small parties. These tribes are thoroughly armed and are sending their women and children into the towns for safety. Friendly Indians have reported to the whites that there is to be an outbreak and the hostiles are being joined by allies from Standing Rock, Sioux and Pine Ridge. The Cheyenne Indians are well armed with Winchester rifles and government ammunition. Major Carroll has three troops of cavalry and more have gone to his assistance.

RAILROAD PURCHASES.—Mr. HARRIS, President of the National Improvement Co., of New York, and Mr. Wm. Wills, of London, England, representative of the English bondholders of the Salisbury and Haverly railway, arrived in this city Friday, and the result was a purchase of the road by the American company. The price paid was \$700,000. Mr. R. O. Stockton acted as solicitor for the National Improvement Company. The company have purchased the railway in the Albany county, and the road will be run to them. A considerable sum will be spent in fixing up the road and putting it in good order. The deeds have been sent to the Registrar of Albany county to be filed.—*Globe*.

ST. JOHN, June 13.—Albert Morgan, sentenced to twelve months and 12 lashes for indecent assault, revealed the lash in an upper room of the jail to-day. He was stripped to the waist and strapped to an iron railing over the stairway. The Sheriff and other officers, Dr. J. S. Christie and press representatives were present. The lash was wielded by a fellow inmate and muffled so that his identity could not be discovered. He struck so lightly that he was urged "to lay it on" harder. This he failed to do and neither blood nor ridges followed his blows. Morgan yelled when struck but took the matter very coolly. An old time schoolmaster would have wept to see the performance.

LONDON, June 7.—A great sensation in educational circles has been caused to-day by the publication of the mathematical tripos of Cambridge university. The success of the female students has been phenomenal. The highest educational honor yet won by women has been won by Miss Philippa Fawcett, aged 22, who is bracketed as superior to the senior wrangler. Previous to this the first place was occupied by a Miss Ramsay, who was senior wrangler in the classical tripos in 1887, and the second by a Miss Scott, who was the eighth mathematical wrangler in 1880. The former has since married the master of Trinity college, Cambridge, and the latter is understood to be a professor in an American university. In addition to Miss Fawcett's wonderful achievement, two ladies figure in the list of wranglers, 10 are senior optimes, and four are junior optimes. No woman failed to pass, but six men failed completely. Miss Fawcett, a daughter of the late Prof. Fawcett, the blind philosopher and statesman, who was the past master general in Mr. Gladstone's government. She is described as a charming high spirited nervous young woman.

Details have now reached Breslau of the accident by which forty-two children were drowned in the Oder, near Thunze. A number of church-goers, including about forty young girls belonging to the villages of Budzick, Siedlitz, Rula and Thunze, were returning home from a service, when they had been to receive instructions for their first communion. When they arrived at the bank of the river to be conveyed to the opposite side, the ferryman, instead of using the weight carrying flat ferry, contented himself with the ordinary ferryboat, into which the children all crowded together so that the gunwales of the boat, which should have been 35 centimetres out of the water, were depressed to the water's level. Nevertheless the boat with its living freight, crossed to within a few yards of the opposite shore, when it suddenly capsized and sank, carrying most of the children in it to the bottom. One great shriek of horror issued from the lips of the spectators on the bank from which the boat started. They saw for a moment the look of terror on the children's faces; they heard their heartrending cries, but could do nothing but watch one little head after another disappear beneath the water.

pick the beetles before they have
laid any eggs. It requires prompt-
ness to do this effectually, and an
examination of the young plants ev-
ery day for a week or more. If no
eggs are laid early the use of Paris
green may not be necessary. Few
however, are prompt enough for this
and where egg-laying is once begun
there is nothing to do until the larvæ
begin to hatch out, and then be
prompt as possible to apply the Paris
green for their destruction.

Without proper facilities says a
writer in the *Poultry Review*, it is
almost useless to attempt to raise
"broilers" successfully or profitably
for the young chickens are brought
out at a time when they must have
to be provided for, but it pays, and
pays handsomely too to raise ear-
ly broilers, and to have had experi-
ence in rearing chickens for the market.

The difficulty in procuring hens
when they are most needed makes
it necessary to use incubators of
some kind, but a poor incubator is an
expense to anybody. It is foolish to
expect incubators to hatch every
egg and run themselves without
care.

It is not a very difficult or expen-
sive matter to hatch out the chicks
but the trouble and work commences
as soon as the chicks are hatched by
properly caring for them. A good
brooder and artificial heat is also
usually necessary to success, and a
suitable room or building should be
provided which need not be very ex-
pensive.

Generally chicks should be fed
when they are about twenty-four
hours old. Place dry oatmeal and
lukewarm water before them and
they will eat as soon as they require
it. When they are a few days old
feed bread or cracker crumbs, soaked
in milk; for a variety give a little
milk, potatoes, rice, cabbage or
other green food.

Keep before them at all times good
clean fresh water or milk and a
supply of cracked corn, wheat, oatmeal,
ground bone, shells, meat, etc.
Young chicks have small crops,
therefore they require feeding at
least four to six times a day or every
two hours, give them different vari-
eties of food such as boiled rice, table
scraps, and never feed more than
they will eat up clean of soft food.
Chicks treated in this manner will
grow fat and be ready for market at
an early date.

DESTROYING THISTLES.

Entire exclusion from light and air
will destroy the roots of the Canada
thistle in a season. But there must
be no half way work about it, no let
up for a week or the work must be
done over again. Usually when po-
tatoes are grown on thistly soil, some
plants will push up under their shel-
ter and for a time escape notice. It
is better in such cases to not cut off
the young growth, but to cover deeply
with moist soil, pressing it down
firmly so that the plant cannot turn
or break through.

THE BUTTERMILK CURE.

the grains are well charred, and then
shell off the corn and throw it in its
flock, he will see an eagerness de-
veloped and a healthy condition
brought about, which will make a
decided improvement. All pale
combs will become a bright red,
bushy song, "or cackling," which pre-
cedes laying, will be heard, and the
yield of eggs will be greatly increas-
ed.
