

NEW LOBSTER REGULATIONS

Laths on all Portions Must
be One and a Quarter
Inches Apart.

Ottawa, Dec. 27.—An order in
council has been passed declaring
that: All lobster traps constructed
after the 31st of December, 1910,
shall have the laths on all portions
thereof not less than one and a
quarter inches apart, and this
space must remain clear and noth-
ing shall be done to diminish it,
and any netting that may be used
in traps shall have meshes of not
less than three inches extension
measurement, and nothing shall be
done to practically diminish the
size of the mesh.

No one shall fish for lobsters
with traps made after the said
date, which are not constructed in
accordance with these require-
ments, but all lobster traps con-
structed before the said date may
be used for catching of lobsters
without being remodelled to meet
the requirements until the 31st of
December 1912 after which date
no one shall fish for lobsters with
traps which are not constructed in
accordance with the requirements
first above described in this sub-
section.

The burden of proof that any
lobster trap used from the 1st of
January 1911, to the 31st of De-
cember 1912 that has not clear
spaces between the laths of one
and a quarter inches and any net-
ting that may be used in the ends
thereof less than three inches ex-
tension measurement, was con-
structed before the 31st of De-
cember 1910, shall lie on the per-
son using such traps.

700 CANADIAN SOLDIERS AT CORONATION

The work of organizing the con-
tingent to represent Canada at the
coronation will be commenced early
this month. The first move will be the
appointment as commandant Col. H.
H. MacLean, member of parliament
for Queens-Sunbury, New Brunswick.
Various corps throughout Canada
will be assigned a certain number of
places among the seven hundred
available on the continent, and they
will be allowed to name men whom
they think should be sent to London
to represent them. Canada pays the
bill to Liverpool and back, Britain
pays the rest.

LUMBER CUT WILL BE LARGE

Conditions for Lumbering
Restigouche Have Been
Very Favorable.

The Lumber cut in the Res-
tigouche and its tributaries this
season will be as large as last
season, if not slightly larger. This
was the information given the
Graphic by a well known lumber-
man.

At the beginning of the season
it was expected there would be
some curtailment in the quantity
but conditions for chopping and
yarding have been so favorable on
the North Shore that many jobbers
had their contracts filled early in
the season. The weather here has
been good. Snow fell early in
sufficient quantities to make good
hauling and staid, dispute the two
soft spells which removed the
snow in other parts of the province.

Recently one of the largest
operators on the Restigouche in-
structed his foreman and jobbers
to cut larger additional quantities
than at first ordered. It is said this
firm's extra cut will be about ten
millions which added to their first
estimate will make an exceedingly
heavy cut. It is understood that
other Restigouche firms are over
cutting their first estimates.

In cedar the cut will be smaller
than usual as the price of shingles
continues to be low.

CHARGED WITH BURNING SCHOOL

Three More Arrests in Arson Case at
Port Greville, N. S.

Amherst, N. S., Dec. 30.—Three
arrests were made yesterday at
Port Greville in connection with
the burning of the school at that
place last year and caused a great
sensation. A few weeks ago detec-
tives sent to Port Greville to inves-
tigate the origin of the fire had
information against Charles Allan
on a charge of arson and Allan was
subsequently arrested and placed
in Amherst jail. Allan has been
remanded from time to time await-
ing further developments. The
men now arrested are from Fox
River, the school section adjoining
Port Greville. They are, Charles
Cochrane, Charles Morris and
Benjamin Canning, and all three
have hitherto borne excellent char-
acters. Cochrane is a leading
lumberman and shipluider at that
place and the others are equally
well connected. They were reman-
ded one week for trial and bail was
fixed at \$2,000. The greatest ex-
citement prevails at Port Greville
over the arrests and the bitterness
of the school struggle is becoming
more furious every day.

BUY AT HOME.

When a newspaper or individual advocates the "Buy in Campbellton" policy the merchants join in with an emphatic "Here! Here!" But how many of these same merchants live fully up to this policy. How many buy from the Provincial Wholesale houses or buy from local dealers exclusively, prices and goods being satisfactory.

Recently a Campbellton citizen in advertising his business used the expression "Patronize Home Industry," yet the very handbills he used to so advertise were printed in St. John.

Manufacturing firms here which should patronize the local merchants, as they depend on the town for many concessions, are not doing so. We have been informed that the proprietor of one buys nearly everything his household requires from Montreal and Toronto mail order houses, and we know his printing is all done out of town, yet this same firm expects the Graphic to publish as news the great resources of its mill.

Before we can expect the rank and file of our citizens to patronize the local merchants and manufacturers will have to set the example.

If Campbellton had all the trade which is being sent to "foreign lands" our merchants would be in a better position to cope with the undertaking of establishing anew their business.

For 1911 let us all "Buy in Campbellton."

Sharpe, in the name of the church and friends, presented him with a most appreciative address and a purse of \$115. Rev. Mr. Robinson feelingly replied.

COUNCIL MEETING

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening, 3rd inst, Mayor Murray presiding over a good attendance, Coun. Richards alone being an absentee.

Minutes of previous meeting read and passed. Town Clerk read a communication from the Deputy Receiver General, requesting payment of \$785.62 as a refund from the Liquor License Fund. Referred to Finance Committee.

Letters from W. H. Gray, Dr. Lynam, Chas. Audet and Robert O'Connell appealing against assessments were referred to that Committee.

The Police and License Committee recommended that a license for a dry goods store be granted to "Leo Quatre Saisons de St. Flavie" on payment of \$500, also recommended that Wm. White's application for a Dance Hall license be not granted.

Recommendations carried. Committee appointed to effect settlement of Patrick Smith's claim against Messrs. Harriman, contractors, in respect of fire at Waterworks last year.

Councillor McDonald moved his motion of which he had given notice as follows: "That that part or portion of Sugarloaf Street within the town of Campbellton north of the southern boundary line, Intercolonial Railway Reservation and between the said southern boundary line of the said Intercolonial Railway Reservation, and the bank or shore of the Restigouche River, be closed up."

Moved as an amendment by Councillor Alexander, seconded by Councillor Moore, that the consideration of closing Sugarloaf Street, be postponed until the Intercolonial Railway Board of Management had been interviewed with regard to matter. The amendment was carried. The vote was as follows—For the amendment, Councillors Moore, Miller, Mowat and against Councillor McLennan, White and McDonald.

In the discussion which preceded the question it transpired that the L. C. R. had changed their plans and had not taken up all the property they had originally intended to hence the desire to meet the Board and ascertain their views.

The Fire Committee were authorized to purchase necessary ladders for the department, and instructed to have the telephone placed in the Police Station.

Hot discussion on the County taxes question resulted in Councillor White moving the following motion—"That the Bye Laws and Legislative Committee take up the question of separation from the Municipality of Restigouche in all matters which do not directly concern the town of Campbellton.—Seconded by Coun. Alexander and carried.

Accounts of several departments were passed for payment amounting to \$227.90. Council Adjourned.

VAN BUSKIRK—BEERS

A very quiet wedding took place at the home of Robert Beers, Ford's Mills, Kent Co., on Wednesday afternoon, December 28th, when his daughter, Sarah A., was united in marriage to Frank Van Buskirk of Glace Bay. The ceremony was performed by Rev. R. H. Stavert in the presence of a large number of relatives and friends. The groom was supported by Wm. A. Dunn of Beersville while the bride was attended by her sister, Miss Mary Beers. Miss Gussie McWilliam played the wedding march. After the ceremony was over all did justice to a well filled table. The evening was pleasantly spent with games and music. Mr. and Mrs. Van Buskirk leave in the near future for their home in Glace Bay.

PRESENTATIONS TO TEACHERS

The teachers of the Newcastle schools with whom retiring Principal B. P. Steeves was most deservedly popular, presented him at the end of the term with a handsome and valuable travelling case.

Principal L. R. Hetherington on his retiring from Richibucto school, was well remembered by his pupils and others.

REV. T. MAGUIRE

The Remains of the Beloved Priest, Rev. Father Maguire Were Laid to Rest in St. Michael's Cemetery Chatham, Thursday.

The pro cathedral was taxed to its utmost capacity when the services began. His Lordship Bishop Barry was the celebrant at the Requiem Mass, assisted by Revs. N. Roher, H. O'Leary, Bathurst, Father McLaughlin, Richibucto and Father Louis O'Leary.

Rev. P. W. Dixon preached the funeral sermon. He took his text from a letter received a few days ago from Father Maguire, wishing all his friends in Newcastle a merry Christmas and happy New Year.

At the grave Rev. Father O'Keefe had charge of the singing. The singing during the mass was most solemn.

When the services at the cathedral were concluded the funeral cortege formed to St. Michael's cemetery, and was the longest procession seen in Chatham for some years. Many former parishioners from Newcastle and Douglastown were in attendance besides a large number from St. Margarets and Kouchibouguac, to pay their last earthly respect for a priest who labored well for them.

WILD RIOT

One of the wildest New Year's eve celebrations ever known in St. John was that which marked the ushering in of 1911. During the destructive march of a riotous mob from King square and its vicinity to Sheffield street in Lower Cave, which followed the usual tooting of whistles, the ringing of bells, and the singing of patriotic songs, four street cars were badly damaged, several large plate glass windows, including the front of McRobbie's shoe store in King street, handsomely finished store signs and street lights were smashed to atoms, street railway employees, two policemen and others were severely beaten and stones and missiles were hurled through the windows of private houses. The sign of F. A. Dykeman & Co.'s store was removed to a house in Coburg St.

The police were powerless and it was not until after scores of fights had taken place with the negro population in Sheffield street that the mob dispersed.

After two or three street cars had been disabled and badly smashed near the head of King street the mob centred its attack on Policemen Wittrien and Perry and threw the former through the opening in McRobbie's store caused by the smashing a few moments before with stones and bottles of one of the large plate glass windows. Wittrien was later struck in the face and badly hurt.





RATES OF EXPRESS COMPANIES MUST BE REDUCED

Toronto, Dec. 29.—The long-standing complaints against the excessive tolls exacted by the express companies doing business in Canada have at last been justified by the Board of Railway Commissioners, whose judgment amounts to a censure of the companies, and orders a reduction of the tariffs within three months, says The Globe. The following are some of the important points in Chairman Mabe's deliverance, which is concurred in by Assistant Chairman D'Arcy Scott and Commissioner McLean:—
"The position of nearly all the express companies doing business in Canada is different from most, if not all, of the express companies doing business in the United States. In Canada all the capital stock of each of the above companies is held by the parent railway company."

"The Canadian companies have been greatly over-capitalized." In the case of the Canadian Express Company, the Grand Trunk Railway Company paid \$660,000 for the stock when the assets were fixed at \$300,000. Now the assets have grown to \$212,719, and the capitalization is \$3,000,000.

"The whole business of express as it is carried on in Canada could go on just as it does without the existence of any express companies at all by simply substituting railway employees for express employees and making express traffic part of their work."

"The law as interpreted by the late Chief Commissioner, and with which interpretation we entirely agree, imposes upon these carriers the onus of satisfying the Board that their tolls are fair and reasonable. Has this burden been discharged? We feel that it has not been."

"After making every allowance for all the contingencies we can think of, we are impressed with the fact that the earnings of the railway companies upon express traffic are upon the whole excessive and should be reduced."

"It follows that the application to allow these tariffs as they stand cannot succeed, and must be refused."

"In this result it will be necessary to prepare new tariffs. The companies are ordered to submit a reasonable basis for the moving of express traffic to delivery limit points, failing which delivery limits will be abolished."

Within three months the companies have to rearrange their standard mileage scales west of Lake Superior territory, the mileage grouping in Eastern Canada being considered satisfactory. Joint through rates which shall be less than the sum of their locals must be established.

The form of contract is described as grossly unfair, and the Board orders its substitution by another more reasonable. A reduction is made to Ontario shippers of fruit to Winnipeg. Empties may be returned free for a period of four months on due notice.
