His Honor the Administrator of the Government has received a telegraphic despatch from the Colonial Office, informing him that the Proclamation uniting the Provinces has been formally approved of by Her Majesty. The Union will take effect on the 1st of July.

The Bill establishing County Courts provides that there shall be a Court of Law and Record in each of the Counties of the Province. Charlotte, Carleton and Victoria, one Judge; York and Queens, one; Albert, Westmorland and Kent, one; Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche, one; Kings and St. John, one. The Judges are to be Barristers of not less than seven years standing and to hold office during good behaviour. Salary not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$2,600. Won't there be a scramble for these Judgeships?

These Courts shall have jurisdiction and hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant and assumpsit, when the debt or damages claimed do not exceed the sum of \$200, and in all actions of tort when the damages claimed do not exceed \$100, and in actions on bail bonds given to a Sheriff in any case in a County Court whatever may be the penalty or amount sought to be recovered.

Three terms of the Court shall be held in each year.

The Hon. Peter Mitchell was received at his home, with demonstrations of respectful esteem by his friends and constituents. In the course of his eloquent reply, he treated the subject of the Intercolonial Railway, briefly thus:—

Then, there is the Intercolonial Railway which will traverse our country and open up to us the markets of the distant West. The route of this great highway had not been determined by the Delegation. They left their first duty was to secure Confederation and the Guarantee for the money, and not to attempt to raise question which would have introduced dissensions and probably have led to disagreements in their body of a most serious character; and they all felt that the body to settle the route was the Co-ordinate Legislature and the men who were responsible to the people of the whole Dominion, subject to the approval of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies. The Railway will, however be built through our Province, and whilst it will expend Millions of Dollars among our people it will open up a large tract of our forest lands—make available large quantities of lumber that could not be reached in any other way—develop the Mineral resources that lie scattered through our Province in such rich abundance—and give every man who has an article to bring or an article to send a sure and ready mode of investing his money to the best advantage.

We may rightly infer from the foregoing, that Mr. Mitchell has relinquished his advocacy for the North Shore route. We hope he will yet come to the Front on the FRONTIER.—[Ed. Standard.]

London, May 27. It is authoritatively announced that the Government has committed the capital sentences of the Fenian prisoners to imprisonment for life.

The Danish Government has addressed a circular note to the representatives at the Courts of the European powers, denying the truth of the report which had gained some credit that the Prussian Government had entered into negotiations with the Cabinet of Copenhagen, with a view to bringing about the retrocession of the Province of Schleswig to Denmark.
