All day crowds enjoyed an outing on the grounds of Canada's famous summer resort the "Inch Arran Hotel." Others remained in town and frequented the ice cream parlors, etc. Many ladies and children arrived here on the Ocean Limited from Campbellton, and enjoyed an out door meal on the Court House grounds, so well adapted for outdoor amusements, and which should be turned into a "Park." In the evening hundreds of people took in the photo play the "Transgressor" in the large Convent Hall. This proved to be a most enjoyable treat. A beautiful lesson was given in this picture which lasted two hours. It illustrated the lives and let live understanding that should exist between capital and labor. It will be repeated on Thursday evening, 4th July, in the same hall.

The social dance held last evening at the Inch Arran Hotel, drew hundreds of people from Campbellton, Dalhousie and other places, and all returned home delighted.

PEACE SIGNING CELEBRATED HERE

Official Word Received Saturday Afternoon—Parade at Short Notice.

Saturday afternoon about 2.30 o'clock word was received that the peace terms had been signed and His Worship Mayor Murray immediately wired Ottawa for an official confirmation.

The news was confirmed and at five o'clock the Shives Lumber company's siren commenced to sound, followed immediately by every whistle in the neighborhood, making an awful din. As soon as citizens generally realized what had happened they crowded the streets and added to the noise with horns and any noise producing instrument at hand.

In the evening the citizens band led a parade about the principle streets and in the procession were many beautifully decorated autos, and carriages. The members of the G.W.V.A. took a very active part in the demonstration which nearly equalled that of Nov. 11th when the armistice was signed.



From Fighting to Farming

Not many months ago two men were in the same battalion in France—the one an officer, the other a private. They both were in at the end and in the short interval since the armistice was signed have come back to Western Canada, received their discharge from the army, and are now occupying neighboring farms in one of the farm colonies prepared for returned soldiers by the Canadian Pacific Railway in Southern Alberta.

Here in these colonies are soldiers of all ranks, a number of whom were in the firing line up to the very end of the armistice. What surprises one most is that so many of them have so soon got back to practical work again and the Canadian Pacific Railway is to be congratulated for having had the foresight to adopt a practical scheme which has made it possible for a large number of men to begin farming on their own accounts in so short a space of time after their release from military duties. But this company has a reputation for making it easy for the right kind of men to get a start at farming, and its soldiers' settlement scheme is only an elaboration of its original "Ready Made Farm" and settlement plans, by means of which many of Western Canada's most vigorous farmers were enabled to begin farming in a new country under the most favourable circumstances and which has contributed in no small measure to their present success.

The soldier settler in these farm colonies has an unusual opportunity to make good. He finds on the farm a comfortable home, ready for him to move into with his family and effects. There is a good barn for his horses and cows, his water supply is provided for, his farm is fenced and has forty acres of land broken and ready for crop which will bring him a revenue during his first season. For this farm he is not required to pay anything for three years; time enough to give a man an opportunity to bring his farm to a profitable stage of development and with average luck to have acquired a fair sized bank account as well.

Moreover, if he is unable to purchase live stock, farm implements and seed, he is provided with a team of horses and harness, two roots, and some poultry, and necessary implements and small tools and seed for his forty acres, for which payment is to be made under an agreement entered into for the purpose.

Some of the larger implements are available for use by the colonists in common, a set being allotted to every three farms and use by them in turn under the direction of the colony superintendent. A fixed charge per day is made for the use of these implements.

The colony superintendent is an expert agriculturist and it is his duty to assist the colonists with advice to the best manner of conducting their farming operations. His headquarters is the central control farm, a farm somewhat larger than the rest of the farms in the colony, which is used largely for demonstration purposes, and among other functions, serves as a supply depot for male live stock. The central control farm is situated at a point most conveniently reached by all the settlers in the colony and will be found to be their chief meeting place.

A more enthusiastic community of farmers will be hard to find anywhere than those in process of forming in these veterans' colonies in Alberta. To see the men at work, for themselves, on their own farms, to see what they have gone through in an inspiring sight. The spirit of mutual help and comradeship that everywhere evident, speaks well for the success of the venture. These farm colonies are sure to become a source of considerable agricultural activity.

CAMPBELLTON'S PROGRESS. Campbellton is growing. Those who keep in touch with new citizens coming to town say that if the present rate of increase continues, our town will double its population in ten years. One serious drawback at the present time is the lack of houses for rental at a moderate rent. The high cost of building is preventing many from erecting houses, but there is also a scarcity of lots which can be procured at a low figure. The Graphic understands that a number of gentlemen hold an option on the O'Leary property and are planning to open this up for building. The lots will be small and sold at a very reasonable figure, according to location. The promoters are making a very reasonable proposition to the Town Council so that water and sewerage will be laid on these streets, and if the proposition is as reasonable as it seems to be the Council should encourage the promoters to open up this district which is practically in the heart of the town.

WILL RATIFY TREATY NEXT WEEK. Today's Report From the Germans. PARIS, July 2.—The Germans expect to ratify the peace treaty the first of next week, according to a note sent to the Allies. The Germans also expressed the hope that German prisoners would be released at the same time.

MONTENEGRO IS IN REBELLION. Bern, Switzerland, July 2.—Virtually all of Montenegro is in rebellion against Serbian military occupation, according to private advice received here. Bloody encounters, it is said have occurred at many places and guerrilla warfare is reviving in the mountains.

ARE WORRIED OVER TURKISH SITUATION. Paris, July 2.—(By The Associated Press)—The Turkish situation is giving the peace conference much uneasiness. Reports indicate that there have been organized in Asiatic Turkey three Turkish armies whose generals refuse to obey orders from Constantinople. These armies are concentrated at Amasia, Balikesir and Konia. The Turks at Konia are threatening the Italians, while those at Balikesir are opposing the Greeks. As the position of Constantinople has been much weakened by the refusal of the conference to consider proposals from the Turkish delegates immediately, it is feared that independent movements will develop throughout Asia Minor.
