#### BERLIN'S REPLY TO ULTIMATUM IS AWAITED

### HARDING IN HIS INAUGURAL SPEECH INTIMATES THAT U.S., OF WARREN HARDING WILL NOT BECOME A MEMBER OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

New American President Declares That the United States Is Unwilling to Become Entangled in European Politics — Says Object Is Not to Impede Paths to Closer Relationship With European Countries, But to Promote a Better Understanding — Willing to Confer With Nations of the World On Any Plan That Will Tend to Abolish War. But Not Agreeable to Aiding in Reaching This End Through Present League of Nations.

Washington. March 4.—President Harding, in his inaugural address, declared that the United States "seeks no part in directing the destinies of the Old World," and is unwilling to become "entangled" in European politics. Nevertheless, speaking in behalf of the people of the United States, he expressed willingness to associate with other nations of the world in seeking an agreement for the reduction of armament, in suggesting plans for mediation, conciliation, and arbitration, in clarifying the laws of international relationship, and in establishing a world court for the disposition of justifiable questions.

"Today, better than ever before, we can know the aspirations of human kind and share them," he declared. 



## **FOUR ALLEGED BOOTLEGGERS**

Attorney-General's Department Has Withdrawn the Prosecution at Brantford.



"Of all the presidents who succeeded war presidents, Mr. Harding will face the most appalling mess," according to the New York Herald (Ind. Rep.), while the New York Nation avers that "with the single exception of Lincoln, probably no president in our national history has taken office with as pressing a burden of unsolved questions." Mr. Harding "must meet and overcome obstacles greater than ever Roosevelt surmounted," says' the Newark News, which assures him "he need never fear that history will tint his administration as drab."

While the domestic problems of the incoming president are indeed formidable, peculiarly baffling and fateful, journalistic observers agree, are the problems of foreign policy that confront him. Europe, remarks the Outlook, turns to America "with mingled envy, fear, and hope," and "it is for the Republican Administration to justify that hope with assistance based upon an understanding of reality, and to sweep aside that fear and envy with justice and goodwill." Application of Principes.

Irrigation increases production, markedly so where accompanied by intensive cultivation. With fruit trees and small fruit and market gardening an increase of \$100 an acre is not abnormal. Five hundred acres at that rate means \$50,000 increase—about 5 per cent on a million dollars, representing an increased capitalized value based on earning power.

The Grand River waters can be diverted towards Toronto, and towards Hamilton and the Niagara Peninsula, to irrigate about two thousand square miles—the most productive soil and advantageous climate in Canada.

The Rideau River project can cover as much east of Ottawa for cereals and fodder.


