Doings of the General Assembly at Detroit.

Symbolism of the Serpent-Death of Dr. Van Dyke-The Briggs Case.

DETEOIT, May 27.—At Monday's meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States, the matter of having a serpent upon the new seal of the Assembly provoked a hot discussion. The previous seal consisted of a cross, the rising sun and a serpent. In the course of the debate Rev. Samuel Woods, of Walla Walla, Wash. (formerly of London), said there were three objections to the seal recommended. He criticised the Latin of the motto, "Christus Exaltatus Salvator," saying that such Latin would make (ficero shake in his grave, the word "exaltatus" being unknown in the best period of Latin literature. He preferred the substitution of some sentiment in plain English. He objected to the emblem of the serpent. The Greeks themselves, from whom we derive a good deal of this symbolism, worshiped the serpent because they feared it. The symbolism of the serpent is not for good, but is a sign of evil. He also criticised the form of cross used in the symbol, saying he would not perpetuate the emblem of another church against

OTTAWA, May 27.—A good deal of interest centers in the evidence of Mr. Wood, secretary of the Quebec Harbor Commission, whose examination regarding the Tarte-McGreevy scandals was begun yesterday. The Quebec Harbor Commission consisted of nine or ten of the leading Conservatives of Quebec city, including Mr. Thomas McGreevy, the moving spirit or "boss" of the whole commission. This board, acting with the Public Works Department, engineered the contracts for the harbor improvements. Mr. Wood proved that in order to knock out the tenders for the Louise Basin

Mr. Wood proved that in order to knock out the tenders for the Louise Basin and graving dock in 1882 it was resolved on motion of Thomas McGreevy to alter the requirements slightly and call for new tenders, the result of which was to give the contract to Larkin, Connolly & Co., on the recommendation of the Minister of Public Works. It was proved that on the motion of Mr. McGreevy the chief engineers of the commission having charge of these various public works and the resident engineer were all discharged, the Minister of Public Works filling the vacancy with Mr. Perley, his own engineer. It was proved that Mr. H. Laforce Langevin, son of the Minister, was appointed assistant engineer on one of the important contracts, although it is understood he never was an engineer in his life. It was proved that the commission had allowed Larkin, Connelly & Co. to withdraw their security of \$25,000, and substitute their own remarked check, and that Norman McGreevy was cognizant of the substitution, no record of which was kept in the books of the commission. The letter from Mr. Norman McGreevy, found in the same envelope as the check, was written in peculiar English: "I see objection to your taking Mr. Murphy's check for the one now held on deposit." Mr. Verrett, the secretary to the commission to whom this letter was addressed, will swear that when he received the letter it read, "I see noobjection," and so forth, as being an upright man he would have resigned sooner than consent to such a transaction without the express order of a member of the commission. 

Mefiath Neale, who imposed on the First Congregational Church, of this city, and was finally forced to leave this vicinity, has been again posing as a minister as Athens, Pennsylvania, and his character has been found out by the people of that place. J. C. Barrows, secretary of the Olinda Universalist Society, saw accounts in the Adventures of Neale's proceedings in this city and other places. He subsequently noticed that one Neale was preaching at Athens, so he wrote to the chairman of the Pennsylvania Convention, detailing the London affair. The matter was investigated theroughly by the trustees of the Pennsylvania Universalist Convention and the following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, a person calling himself Rev. R. Neale and professing to be a clergyman in good standing in one of the orthodox churches, but bringing no credentials with him, appeared some months ago in Athens, Pa, and secured an engagement to preach in the Universalist Church in that place, and

"Whereas, a fter preaching there for

and "Whereas, after preaching there for some months without having applied for the fellowship of the Pennsylvania Universalist Convention, he was notified by the trustees of the church that unless he should obtain the fellowship of the convention he most years the millist and

trustees of the church that unless he should obtain the fellowship of the convention he must vacate the pulpit, and "Whereas, he afterwards applied for such fellowship, and was refused by the Committee of Fellowship because of unfavorable reports which they had received in regard to him, to which he did not reply in a satisfactory manner, and "Whereas, notwithstanding the action of the committee, he continued to preach in the church at Athens, though forbidden to do so by its Board of Trustees, and thus created a schism in the parish, and "Whereas, it has been found necessary by the trustees of the Pennsylvania Convention to take legal measures to prevent the said Neale from occupying the Universalist pulpit in Athens; therefore, be it "Resolved, that these facts be made known to the Universalist public through its several denominational papers."


