The Female Worth Arrested for Fraud. PARIS, Aug. 22.—Mme. Apparuci, formerly editor and owner of the Fashion formerly editor and owner of the Fashion Journal, published at 7 Rue de Lille, and for some time the female Worth of Paris, is dead in St. Petersburg. She was under arrest for manifold frauds. Soon after her arrest she poured petroleum on her nightgown and set fire to it. She was severely burned and was sent to the Evangelical Hospital for treatment. A few days ago she clipped with soissors the veins at the root of her tongue. She died on Tuesday. About 100 criminal charges are pending against her, and the Paris police were only waiting her recovery from the burns to bring her from St. Petersburg to this city for trial. The amount she was accused of obtaining by frauds was between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 francs.

A Brief Biography of Rev. Walter Rigs by, of King Street Methodist Church—A Career of Success.

Rev. Walter Rigsby, the pastor of King Street Methodist Church, preached his first sermons there on Sunday to large congregations. Those who heard him speak in highly complimentary terms of both discourses. He is a fluent speaker and his logic is clear and impressive.

SANGUINARY SOUVENIR.

A San Francisco Woman Treasures
Part of a Frees Stained With
Lincoln's Blood.
Mrs. Joseph W. De Lano, of this city, is the proud possessor of a valuable piece of moire silk. The section of the fabric measures only about three by six inches and is usually kept by her in a gilt frame. Its value does not depend upon its size or the fact that it is flowered white moire, but upon three or four dark stains which it bears.

Miss Laura Keene once wore a dress out of which this piece of silk was cut. She was playing at Ford's Theater the part of Florence Trenchard in "Our American Cousin," or "Lord Dundreary," on the night of April 14, 1865. The great seene between Asa Trenchard, pikyed by Harry Hawkes, and Florence was just over when a shot rang through the house and almost immediately afterwards a man was seen to leap from the box occupied by Abraham Lincoln, Mrs. Lincoln and two friends. In the confusion which immediately followed the assassination Miss Keene ran around the stage and up to the box, wearing the same dress she had on as Florence. Just prior to the removal of President Lincoln, his head rested a moment on Miss Keene's lap, and it was then that the drops of blood fell on the dress.

Miss Keene cut the stained portions out of the dress and on April 17, three days after the shooting, and two days after Lincoln died, gave Mrs. De Lano the piece she now has. Another part of the silk dress was given to a cousin of Miss Keene's and has been lost sight of. Mrs. De Lano has preserved the relie for 27 years and has declined innumerable offers to part with it.—[San Francisco Chronicle.

The Fight a Boy Made for His Life While Swimming in Florida.

PALATKA, Fla., Aug. 22.—Richard Burnham, a white boy, 15 years oid, has had a narrow escape from death in the jaws of an alligator. Richard and half a dozen other boys were bathing in Crescent Lake, near Crescent City. He swam out into deep water 100 feet from the shore line. The alligator came up nearer the surface and made for the boy as he swam along rapidly. Opening his huge jaws, he was about to close them upon the trunk of the boy's body, when Richard made a dive and swam fitteen of twenty feet under water in the direction of the logs.

As the boy came to the surface the alligator pot his bearings again and gave chase. Richard was nearly winded and the reptile gained on him. When the boy was within three feet of the logs, the reptile closed his big, ugly jaws on the boy's thigh. He was pulled under, and his companions thought he was gone. They yelled for help. But Dick rose to the surface again in about half a minute, the alligator having evidently let go of him in order to get a fresh hold and a better one.

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

"My own opinion is," said Hon, John Haggart, Minister of Railways and Canals, "that the policy of the Government will be to place the Canadian shippers on the same footing as the American shippers, even if they have to recoupt them out of the public treasury. I see that the President has fixed the tolls at 20 cents, the same as is now placed on the Welland, and that they will only remain in effect during the time we are continuing the alleged discrimination. Long before this we saw that it was fin our interest to push ahead the Soo Canal, so as to secure a line of navigation between the Great Lakes and our own territory. Instructions have been given to carry out and complete work on the Canadian Soo as soonas possible. An increased unmber of men will be engaged and work will be maintained summer and winter until the job is finished. I think that by the end of next summer we will have a system of navigation of our own connecting Lake Superior far better than the Americans. We will have a lock 900 feet long and 60 feet wide, which can hold a whole tow and make lockages in one half the time it can now be done on the Americans decreased.
