Between Cliffs 1,200 Feet in Height The Gorge in Some Places Is Only 800 Feet Wide.

Eight miles from the eastern enrance to the pass stands the pictursque little fort of Ali Musjid. At this point the defile is only 450 feet wide, of bread in and the elevation of the fort is 2,433 30 per cent. eet above the sea level. It stands on conical hill which overhangs the valley, 690 feet above the roadway of the pass, through which runs a small stream. For a distance of two and a half miles beyond Ali Musjid the defile retains its difficult character, the width of the gorge varying from 300 to 400 feet, and the hills on each side, about 1,500 feet in height, being slaty, bare and to all appearance inaccessible. The bed of the torrent is likely to be filled with a sudden fall of rain, when the stream that ordinarily creeps through the gravel, sometimes disappearing completely, swells to raging violence. 




