BOLSHEVIKI ACCEPT INVITATION TO PRINCES ISLANDS CONFERENCE

BRITISH WAR OFFICE PROVIDES MOTOR LORRIES FOR FREE TRANSPORTATION

Soviet Minister Declares That Agreement Will Be Entered Into, But Entente Powers Must Undertake Not To Interfere Further With Russian Internal Affairs.

London, Feb. 6.-M. Tchitscherin, the Bolshevist foreign minister of Russia, announces in a wireless dispatch picked up here, that the Soviet Government is willing to participate in the Princes Islands conference. The message bears the date of Tuesday and was sent from Moscow.

The dispatch begins by referring to "complaints from the Entente press concerning international revolutionary propaganda," and declares the Soviet Government is ready, "if there the ganda," and declares the Soviet Government is ready, "if there be occasion, to enter into a general agreement with the Entente powers on their undertaking not to interfere with Russian internal affairs."

It then announces that the Government is disposed to confer on the basis indicated in the note from the peace conference at Princes Islands, or elsewhere, with the Entente powers, or some of them separately, or even with some of the Russian political groups at the request of the Entente powers.

In conclusion, the Entente powers are asked to inform the Soviet Government without delay where its representatives are to go, also the date and route to be taken.

ACCEPTANCE OF INVITATION BY BOLSHEVIKI CREATES SURPRISE

Paris, Feb. 6.—When Professor Boris

A. Bakhmeteff, a member of the council formed by anti-Bolshevist factions here, was advised of M. Tchitcherin's acceptance of the invitation to the Princes Islands conference, he said that he would be unable to say what the Russian committee in Paris would do. He indicated that a copy of the official message must be received and discussed before any announcement would be made. M. Bakhmeteff said that the dispatch from M. 





BOLSHEVIKI MOWED DOWN BY AMERICAN **GUNNERS IN ARCTIC**

Enemy Ranks Break and Take To Woods.

REDS' PLAN THWARTED

Flank Attack Which Was To Have Been Launched Is Abandoned.

ARCHANGEL, Feb. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Heavy losses were inflicted on the Bolsheviki by the American forces Tuesday and the enemy was driven back in disorder from the village of Vistavka on the Vaga. The American casualties were five killed and several wounded. Many Bolsheviki soldiers were taken prisoner. The enemy began early in the morning a bombardment with field guns and howitzers, and under cover of a shrapnel and pompom barrage, essayed a frontal attack with infantry in the arctic twilight at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The American troops, who were rested after their retirement from Shenkursk, and were now established in a good position, poured a heavy fire from artillery and machine guns into the charging Bolsheviki, whose ranks broke and filed into the woods.

Abandon Flank Attack.

Captured Bolshevik soldiers declared that the enemy had planned a flank attack simultaneously with the frontal attack, but this was abandoned when the Vistavka attempt failed.

Chinese and Manchu troops are now included in the Bolshevik force opposing the Americans on the Vaga. So far these have been held in reserve, but the Americans are preparing a warm reception for the yellow soldiers if they appear in the fighting line, in view of stories reaching them of the Manchu treatment of prisoners in the Baltie provinces.



Creating Opportunities for Employment

PESIDES helping to distribute employment through a chain of Employment Offices, the Government has developed plans to create opportunities for employment.

Briefly, these plans cover the following phases:-

1. Public Works

During the war, many important Public Works have been held up. The Minister of Public Works, has his plans and preparations made to proceed with the more necessary of these in the near future. This Committee has also been in touch with Provincial Governments and Municipalities, with a view to impressing upon them the necessity for similar action. The building and public works programme now in sight will provide employment for many returned soldiers and war-workers.

2. Railways

During the past four years, a great deal of work necessary to keep our railways up to standard has been postponed. Some millions of dollars must be expended improving road-bed, constructing bridges, buildings and other improvements. Vast quantities of ties are being got out this winter. Equipment of various kinds must be secured. The Minister of Railways states that as soon as weather conditions will permit, some thousands of men will be absorbed in various railway undertakings. The supplies and materials required will also provide employment.

3. Shipbuilding

The shipbuilding programme arranged for by the Government will provide employment for many men during 1919. It is expected that arrangements will be completed to keep the shipbuilding yards in active operation throughout the year. The Government recognises that this ship construction is one of the best means of providing suitable employment for many skilled and other workers.

4. Export Trade

The Government has established a Canadian Trade Commission. This Commission. sion has an office in Canada and a "trade mission" overseas. Through this trade mission it is anticipated that Canada will secure an important share in the business of providing materials and manufactured products required for reconstruction work in Europe. A short time may be required before final details are completed and definite results are announced. The business so secured will be distributed through the regular channels of trade and thus afford extra opportunities for employment.

5. Housing

The Government has set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces in order to encourage the building of workmen's houses. When the season for building arrives, this work should give employment to many hundreds of men both in construction work and in the supply of materials.


6. Land Settlement

The Government, as already explained in a former announcement, has developed plans to help soldiers to become farmers, providing land, granting loans and giving training and supervision where necessary. It is expected that a large number of returning soldiers will take advantage of these opportunities. The scheme will involve the expenditure of some millions of dollars, a good deal of which will find its way into building materials, supplies, machinery, etc., all of which will assist in providing employment.

7. Road Building

The Government now has under consideration the question of joining the provincial governments in financing the construction of public highways. Should a favorable decision be reached, a large field for employment opportunities will be opened up. Regardless of Federal action, provincial governments are preparing their own road-making programmes.

The Government is alive to the necessity for providing employment opportunities, and stands prepared to assist in every way possible. If corporations and private citizens will join in this feature of Repatriation Work, Canada should have little difficulty with the employment problem.

Another plan is to make use of the property near the Aged People's Home in North London, already owned by the Women's Christian Association. The two homes under their jurisdiction would then be conveniently situated together. There are, however, some objective this retained.

A matter of public interest came up for discussion at the regular monthly meeting of the Women's Christian Association, held yesterday afternoon at the home of the president, Mrs. Marshall. This concerned the proposed erection of a new "Home for Incurables" in the city. For some time past the work of this institution has been exceedingly cramped, owing to the fact that it has been necessary to carry it on in three different buildings. The main building, situated on Dundas street east, and known as the Victoria Home, was originally an old farm house. This was, however, extended at the front to meet the needs of the increasing number of patients.

ITALY HAS HOPES OF FINANCIAL AID FROM BRITAIN AND U.S.

Former Premier Luzzatti Says Allies Are Strong and Generous.

ROME, Feb. 5.—(Associated Press).—
Italy's national debt is now more than \$12.500,000,000, whereas when she entered the war it was about \$2.750,000,000, declared Luigi Luzzatti, former premier, and a leading Italian financial authority, in a statement today, urging financial aid to Italy. He said that when pensions, government bills to manufacturers and other necessary expenditures had been paid the national debt probably would total \$16,000,000,000.

"Italy, I am sad to say, leads the whole world in the relative height of its war debt," he said. "Subtracting Italy's losses in men and money, her national wealth is only about \$20,000,000,000.

If all the war loans of the Entente should be thrown together in one concentrated sum Italy and France, whose efforts and losses in men and substance have been the greatest, will be compensated by bearing a smaller proportion of the war debt.

"The United States and Great Britain are not only strong, but generous, and they will acknowledge that Italy and France, the two principal centres of Teutonic slaughter and devastation, should be supported financially, therefore, with correspondingly greater help."
