Inspector J. F. Oldfield, assisted by central office detectives, after a pursuit extending from Buffalo to Cleveland, Chicago, Duluth, Detroit, and, finally, to New York. The men arrested, it is stated, are members of the Marine Firemen and Marine Cooks' Associations.

It was on June 26 that Fraser arrived with his vessel at Buffalo from Sault Ste. Marie. The lake carrying trade was on the threshold of a big marine strike. Fraser, sailor-like, dropped into a saloon. There he fell in with a crowd of striking sailors, who, Fraser elaims, drugged and robbed him. He was then carried into a factory yard near by, assaulted and left unconscious. When picked up by the police his ear was gone, and over his right eye was pasted a printed label warning men not to take nonunion jobs while the strike was on. The police made a fruitless search for his assailants.

Meanwhile the federal authorities in Washington received a letter sent to the Cleveland shipper, accompanied by Fraser's missing ear, preserved in alechol, and sent through the mails. Written across the face of the letter in red ink was the word "Death,"

the text apparently composed by an

illiterate person, read. "Mister Couldby youre hart will be next. You killed Brotar Italiano. This is one of yours men's eers. We will get no matter where you go." This letter brought postoffice inspectors into the case, and tonight they ran down the men they say com-

mitted the crime. The men under arrest denied their guilt, but admitted they were sailors from the great lakes.
