BRITISH AND GREEK FORCES TO OPEN ATTACK TO DRIVE TURK BANDITS FROM SCUTARI

General Ironsides Will Comma nd Attacking Forces—Cam-SECOND PARTY OF paign Will Be Waged To Clear Entire Peninsula of the Nationalists—Latest Atrocity of Radicals Was Burning To Death in Church of Nearly 2,000 Greeks-British Torpedoboats Destroy Riva, On Black Sea, a Stronghold of Insurgents.

Constantinople, July 19.—(By the Associated Press).—The CHECK IS SENT FOR \$50 British and Greeks are preparing to clear the Scutari peninsula of all Nationalists and establish a line from Ismid to Chileh on the Black Sea, which will control the bandit raids against Bosphorus towns and check communications between Angora and Constantinople through the Scutari peninsula mountains.

Gen. Ironsides of the British forces probably will command the troops. His headquarters will be Ismid. Two British divisions already are available. These will be increased to an army corps. Two Greek regiments will be used.

Turkish Nationalists continue to raid Greek villages on the south shore of the Gulf of Ismid. The Greek Patriarch reports that Fouladjik, a Greek village, with a population of 2,000, near Karamorsal was virtually wiped out July 15. The Greeks were Karamorsal, was virtually wiped out July 15. The Greeks were shut inside the church, which was set on fire. The Patriarch reports that there are only 150 Greeks alive in the village. The second party will be under the same supervision as the first. The same rules will govern, and a very pleasant bandits. British torpedoboat destroyers have shelled and ruined Riva, a Nationalist stronghold on the Black Sea, near the entrance to the Bosphorus, and are carrying out spasmodic bombardments elsewhere against the Nationalists on the Scutari peninsula, who are shortly to be attacked by land forces from the east.







EFFORT TO CONSERVE HELIUM NOW GOING

Industrial Research Council **Makes Appropriation** For Purpose.

WASHINGTON, July 18 .- Movement of a winter stock of United States coal to central Canada was considered here yesterday by members of the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada of Railway Commissioners of Canada and the United States Interstate Commerce Commission. No decision was reached at the conference, which will be resumed on Monday.

F. B. Carvell, chairman of the board of railway commissioners, and Commissioner McLean are here representing the Canadian side of the question. Discussion yesterday was understood to have centered about plans to prevent transportation delays and the advisability of giving priority in movement to coal shipments.

Prepayment of freight charges on goods shipped into Canada from the United States was also discussed. Because of the adverse exchange rate the Canadian representatives oppose payments in American money at the Canadian end of the haul, as is necessary on through rates. It is believed probable that an effort will be made to divide the through rate, so that the money will be accepted in each country for the portion of the haul made there. Prof. J. C. McLellan of the University of Toronto, into the properties of helium to determine its uses in lamps amplifying valves and high resistances. 

11,000 Standard Oil Alds Flx Own Pay Raise. Get 11.11% Boost and Six-Day Week. A wage increase of 11.11 per cent for 11,000 efinery workers was announced yesterday by the Standard Oil Company of Indiana. Coincidentally, all shift men go from a seven-day week to a six-day week, a radical change in the company's manufacturing policy. The new schedule becomes effective on March 1, and it applies in refineries at Whiting, Ind., Wood River, Ill., Sugar Creek, Mo., and Caspar and

Grevbull, Wyo. What is most significant is the fact that the new wage and hour schedule was worked out employees themselves, through the agency of their industrial councils.

Last June, as a step in "democracy in in-dustry," the Standard Oil Company established an employees' council system, drawn up by W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party in Canada. Through joint committees, on which the men and management have equal voice in the adjustment of wages and hours.

Work Out Six-Day System. The process of gasoline manufacture is such that refineries must be operated every hour of the day, every day of the week. Up to 1915. shift workers worked twelve-hour shifts seven days a week. The company in that year put in an eight-hour shift with an increase, giving the men as much pay for eight hours work as they had been getting for twelve. But the

seven-day week was continued.

After the industrial council system was adopted, Col. R. W. Stewart, head of the board of directors, asked the employees' councils to work out a scheme that would make a six-day week practicable.

The result is a new schedule, which gives all shift workers 32 consecutive hours off each week. Under the old plan the men worked 56 hours a week; under the new they work 50.4, or a net reduction of 4.6 hours a week. The 11.11 per cent increase in wages makes the pay for six days equal to that received under the old seven-day week.

Others Also Boosted. A similar increase of 11.11 per cent in hourly wages is also declared for refinery workers other than shift men. Hours are not to be changed, except that men working 44 hours a week may increase it to 48 hours if they wish This affects common laborers, machinists. blacksmiths, boiler makers and others.
