KUROPATKIN LAUNCHES A COUNTER BLOW; DRIVES HIS MEN AT BOTH RUSS WINGS ARE BENT

Nogi Trapped the Russians by Ignoring the Chinese Neutrality.

Japanese Are Exhausted by the Tremendous Effort and Kuropatkin May Win.

St. Petersburg, March 6. - 2:57 p.m. Oyama's left center, just east of the railroad. The fighting is desperate along almost the entire line.

Kuropatkin's losses in killed and wounded up to last night are placed at 23,500. Oyama is believed to have already lost 40,000 men. The Japanese greatly exhausted. They repeat the statement that some of Gen. Nogi's men have not had any food for two

St. Petersburg, March 6. - 2:50 p.m. -The result of the greatest battle of modern times is expected to be determined today or tomorrow. Two of the largest armies of recent times, both in men and guns, are now locked in a death struggle, and although Gen. Kuropatkin has evidently made every preparation to cover his retreat by removing his accumulated stores and munitions northward, it is now the opinion of military men here that one sifle or the other cannot escape an

With both wings bent backward, regarded as only possible by his breaknews of a concentrated offensive is nourly awaited. Unless Kuropatkin can strike and strike hard it is realized that he must lose.

Field Marshal Oyama's strategy in this battle is now clear. He startled and amazed the war office by the marvelous daring of Kuroki's advance against the extreme Russian left, and the series of blows delivered at the center, where no less than thirteen separate attacks have been launched by the Imperial Guards ten miles east of

But it is now realized that the heavy blows at the left were intended to mask the real turning movement, which came like a bolt from a clear sky out of the west. Kuropatkin fell into the trap. The situation seemed an exact duplicate of that at Liao Yang, and the Russian commander-in-chief hastened to mass forces to meet Kuroki. Friday the whole situation was suddenly reversed, when, with lightning rapidity, the Japanese turning operations began on the plain between the Hun and Liao Rivers. In order to succeed Oyama threw the neutrality of China to the winds.

Gen. Nogi, with his Port Arthur veterans, moved up the right bank of the Hun and fell like an avalanche upon the weakened Russian right, doubling it back in confusion, the Japanese advance being co-ordinated with the advance straight from the west of a Japanese column of 40,000 men, which circled around or through Chinese neutral territory.

Although rumors of the presence of the latter column westward of Mukden were circulated as long ago as Tuesday, Kuropatkin evidently was taken by surprise, possibly refusing to believe that the Japanese would thus openly fling Chinese neutrality to the winds. At any rate it was not until Saturday night that he was able to shift sufficient reinforcements to stem the tide when the Japanese were within sight of Mukden.

But the latest advices are to the effect that the Japanese, exhausted by their tremendous efforts, have everywhere stopped, and now, if ever, Kuropatkin's hour has come.



St. Petersburg, Monday, March 6,

The Czar's Rescript.

The Czar's rescript is a new birth of freedom for Russia, not because of mises, but because of what It means that the autoceen compelled to acknowledge the sovereignty of the people. There is no open surrender, but a pretense of voluntary concession, which can deceive nobody. The world knows -the Russian people know-that the reform has been wrung from the Czar by agitation and violence. Had Nicholas grasped his opportunity he might have gone down in history as a statesman. He posed as an idealist, and when he found the liberal elements of the nation took him at his word, his timidity drove him into the arms of the reactionists. The assassination of de Plehve frightened him into the appointment of the progressive Prince Mirsky, who encouraged hopes which found expression in the remarkable petition of the zemstvo delegates for a form of representative government. The Czar, fearful that he had conjured up the spirit of revolution, dismissed Mirsky, after sharply rebuking the zemstvo representatives, and apparently yielded again to reactionary influences, until the carnage at St. Petersburg and Moscow, and the crowning horror of Grand Duke Sergius' death, brought him to his senses. A little moral courage in the first place would have spared him this train of calamities. He opposed the current until it threatened to sweep away the obstruction

The Czar does not promise representative government. He says his purpose is "to convene the worthiest men to the last. The C. P. R. Land Tax.

The clause of the C. P. R. contract under which the company's property and lands were exempted from taxation, is as follows:

"The Canadian Pacific Railway, and all stations and grounds, workshops, buildings, yards and other property, rolling stock and appurtenances required and used for the construction and working thereof, and the capital stock of the company, shall be forever free from taxation by the Dominion or by any municipal corporation therein; the lands of the company in the Northwest Territories, until they are either sold or occupied, shall also be free from such taxation for twenty years after the grant thereof from

The land grant of the company was 25,000,000 acres, and it was the intention of Parliament that all of this recompany should become taxable at the end of twenty years from the date of the contract. On this assumption three municipalities assessed certain of the company's land for school purposes, and a test case was carried to the Court of King's Bench of Manitoba. Two of these municipalities had formerly been in the Northwest Territories, but the extension of the bounderies of Manitoba in 1882 brought them within the limits of that Province. The decision went against them for this reason, but the court, with one exception, decided in favor of the other municipality or school district, which was within the Territories, thus affirm. ing the principle that the exemption of C. P. R. lands expired in twenty years from the date of the contract, All three cases were then carried to the Supreme Court at Ottawa, which reversed the decision of the Manitoba court by ruling that the exemption on each parcel of property extended for twenty years from the time it was conveyed to the company by letters pat-

The company has all along interpreted the contract as the Supreme Court has done, and for many years took out practically no patents on lands until these were sold, so that it has managed to escape taxation up to All in my hunter's camp I lie,

R. would now be taxable had they been formally conveyed to the com- to end. pany as soon as possible after the signing of the contract. The provision forever exempting all the property of the company, excepting the granted lands, was vigorously opposed by the Liberal party during the debates in Parifament 25 years ago.

Fortunately, the C. P. R. is rapidly stilling its lands, which become assess-

able when they pass into other hands. This means that the incubus of the twenty years' exemption is gradually ifting. Within fifteen years a large proportion of the lands then unsold will pay their share of taxation and in twenty years from now the exempion on nearly all will have ex-

Senator Stanford and his wife endowed this institution with landed property worth many millions, and at his death the Senator left it a bequest of \$2,500,-000. The university fell into financial difficulties, and Mrs. Stanford resolved

to devote to it her life and fortune. Her husband's estate became involved in litigation for a period of years, during live earnestly and usefully. which she received an allowance of \$10,000 per month. She reduced her living expenses to \$100 per month, and the remainder of her income went to the support of the university. When the estate was released by the courts she conveyed practically the whole of it to the university, bringing the total endowment up to \$30,000,000. St. Petersburg, March 4.-Mail advices which have just arrived here give details of the student riots at Tomsk, Western Siberia, Feb. 26, preceding the closing of the university and technological institute. 


