

THE GOVERNMENT IS RESPON-SIBLE.

The position of the Government with regard to the administration of the license laws is forcibly and admirably stated by the Stratford Beacon, one of the strongest Liberal papers, in the following terms:

"The administration of the license laws is closely associated with the Provincial Government. It - the Government - is held directly responsible, and very properly so, for every action bearing on the enforcement of the law by the different boards of commissioners and inspectors throughout the province, and at the next election it will have to account to the people for its administration of this department. in view of these circumstances, is it unreasonable that the Government should desire to have as officials me nin whom it has confidence, and who are no only in accord with its views as to the en forcement of the law, but in sufficient political sympathy to wish to aid in making a good showing? The office of license inspector or commissioner is unlike that of any other provincial officer in this regard. The Government is not held directly responsible for how a registrar of deeds or a sheriff performs his work. The law provides the means of punishing such officers for maladministration of their offices. But there is no way of reaching an indifferent or inefficient license inspector except through the Government which retains him in office. Hence, we believe the Government should be refor the appointment of such officials, and it should be permitted to choose them from among those in whom it has confidence."

In the reply Mr. Vandiver accuses President McCall of debauching public morals, corrupting legislature and looting the funds of the policyholders by extravagant ventures and reckless speculations. The answer directs specific attention to the charge that President McCall and Vice-President George W. Perkins have, in bad and questionable estate, investments, lost \$7,000, 8000 of the company's money.
By agreement the case was set for hearing on December 27.

THE SAME ALL OVER.

Farmers at Peterboro Demand a Reduction in the Tariff.

Peterboro', Dea 1.—The sitting of the Tariff Commission yesterday attracted a large audience of farmers, deputations being present from Peterboro, Lennox, Victoria and Frontenac counties.

counties.

D. D. Rogers, ex.M. P. of Frontenac and John A. Wilmot, president of the Farmers' Association of Frontenac, urged a general reduction in the tariff, claiming that protection had not benefited the farmer. Mr. Wilmot did not wish to see a duty placed on binder twine. Mr. Rogers said that protection and a high tariff was a huge folly. He denounced the combines, and characterized them as a curse to the country.

Dawson Kennedy of Petarboro endorsed the stand taken by the Dominion Grange, that the tariff should be reduced to a strictly revenue basis.

John Finlay, M. P., of East Peterboro', carriage manufacturer, asked for a specific valuation on several things entering into the manufacture of ve-hicles.

George W. Watts of the Canadian George W. Watts of the Canadian General Electric Co. contended that as the tariff stood at present there was for the company he represented very little protection. The duty was high on all materials used by the company. A deputation representing the farmers of Victoria County, headed by Senator McHugh, gave evidence. Warden Stabback, George Johnston and John Camphell all expressed themselves as Campbell, all expressed themselves as being satisfied with the present tariff, and did not wish for any changes. They strongly opposed any increased protection for the manufacturers. If protection for the manufacturers. If any change was to be made it should be a reduction of the duties on farm implements and materials which farm-ers buy. They claimed that high pro-tection was the father of combines, and farmers had to bear the heaviest burden. The farmers would not stand it any longer. They were going to put business first and party afterwards, and fight for their rights.

The manufacturers were represented by Hen. J. R. Stratton, on behalf of the Peterboro' Lock Works; R. R. Hall, M. P., on behalf of the Canadian Cordage Co. and the Colonial Weaving Co.;
Thomas Barrie on behalf of the fur manufacturers; Horne Bros., Wool
Mills of Lindsay, and the pottery industry of Belleville were also represented. All asked for a readjustment of the tariff, giving their respective concerns increased protection.

Hon, W. J. Hanna Supplies Important Information re. Resignations of Toronto License Commissioners.

Toronto, Dec. 1.-Provincial Secre tary Hanna issued the following state ment yesterday evening after glancing over the entertaining literature of the past couple of days, in which his Department is interested:

"Since my return from New York, to-day at noon, I have not had opportunity to run through much of what has appeared in the Toronto press durated in the Toronto press ing te past two or three days with regard to the removal of the liquor li-cense inspectors. It occurs to me, however, that when the commissioners were giving their statement to the press they omitted some very material facts. I think it is very material to an understanding of their motive in resigning to state that their resignation was signed and sent in to the Government before the old inspectors were removed or their successors were ap-pointed or their names known to the commissioners.

"The resignation followed immedlately upon a personal communication from me to the chairman of the com-mission, indicating to him what the Government intended to do. This comnunication did not name the new inspectors. If the letter of resignation had been given to the press in full, it would have shown to the public at once what I have intimated above. Fol-

lowing is the letter in full:





Diamondville, Wyo., Dec. 4.-Eighen miners lost their lives in an ex teen miners lost their lives in an explosion Friday night in the Diamond
Coal and Coke Co.'s mine. Miners believe that a "blow out" shot caused
the explosion which wrecked the mine.
The shock of the explosion was felt
all over the town, rocking buildings
so violently that their occupants ran
out of doors. Nearly the whole population of Diamondville flocked to the

On account of the after effects of the explosion Superintendent Snedder in-sisted that precautions against fire should be taken, and it was almost noon before the rescue party entered

The explosion occurred 110 feet un der ground and 3,000 feet from the mouth of the shaft. It wrecked the brattices and blocked the entrances to the lower levels of the mine, compel ling the removal of much debris befor the miners could be reached. When none could remain long. The crowds around the portal eagerly watched as corrafter came came up from below, only to see rescuers who had been overcome by the after damp. It was several hours before the first body was brought up. The 800 coal diggers of the Diamond



St. Petersburg In a Panic.

Kieff correspondent in a despatch dated Dec. 2, and forwarded by way of Podwoloczyska, says:

Early yesterday morning a company of sappers, dissatisfied with their martinet commander, mutinied and persuaded a second company to join them. They left the fortress fully armed, and by threats compelled the remainder of the sappers' battalion to join them.

Numbering a thousand, the mutineers marched to the barracks of the 125th Kursk infantry, which, however,

A body of Cossacks allowed the rebels to pass them in the street. Finally the mutineers arrived at the barracks of artillery division, and the Asoff Infantry. The Azoff men answered their appeal with insults, and the rebels opened fire upon them. The Azoffs answered with three volleys. A portion of the mutineers fied, but the others continued firing. The Azoffs replied with deadly volleys, and finally the rebels fied headlong, throwing down their arms. Two hundred of them surrendered, and were conveyed to their barracks by Cossacks.

All was over by 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon. Fifty dead and 100 mutineers were left on the ground.

A court-martial has been convened, and a notice issued that any further attempt at mutiny will be quelled by artillers.

BALFOUR HAS RESIGNED

It Is Now the Liberals Turn to Govern Great Britain.

his Majesty King Edward Has Invited Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman to An Interview and Will Offer Him Mission of Forming a New Cabinet Bir Henry Will Accept the Respon sibility-Cabinet Speculations.

London, Dec. 5.—The political crisis in the United Kingdom reached a climax yesterday when Arthur J. Balfour, the Premier, formally tendered the re-signations of himself and the members of his Cabinet to King Edward, who accepted them.



His Majesty has invited Sir Henr Campbell-Bannerman to an interview this morning, when he will offer him the mission of forming a new Cabinet. Sir Henry will accept the task, and within a few days, even within a few hours, a new Government will be Campbell-Bannerman Calleg.

Campbell-Bannerman Callee.

A brief announcement was made last night that the Cabinet had resigned, that the King had accepted the resignations of his Ministers, and that Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman had been sent for.

It would now appear that the entire program has been cut and dried for some time, and it is even probable that the Liberal leader has already completed his Cabinet, though this, like everything else in connection with British officialdom, must be left to surmise. Rosebery Not In It.

It may be stated as certain that Lord Rosebery will be entirely ignored in the make-up of the new Cabinet, and that John Morley will be one of the chief advisers of Sir Henry in drawing


