The Halifax Chronicle of Saturday last announced in its Ottawa dispatch that the government has fixed the date of the taking of the plebiscite in the last week of September.

A Remarkable Engagement. One of the greatest military achievements of ancient or modern times, and the crowning incident of the Indian Mutiny, was the memorable Relief of Lucknow by General Havelock, which is thus described in an old history:

"A weak battalion of five hundred all told, the 33rd (Duke of Cornwall's) still armed with the smooth bore musket was at Lucknow when the storm cloud of the great mutiny burst in May, 1857, the only British regiment within hundreds of miles, in the midst of a mal-content population. The heroic defence of the Lucknow Residency by this regiment and a few loyal natives, until the arrival of Havelock on September 25th, and the tragic fate of the detachment under Captain Moore at Cawnpore, are undying pages in British History."

This magnificent spectacle will be reproduced with remarkable fidelity to detail at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition at Halifax, September 22nd to 29th.

In view of the recent, native uprising in India, and of the spirit of war now in the air, the Commission are exceedingly fortunate in the selection of the "Relief of Lucknow" as their central attraction. Over two hundred trained soldiers will be employed in the production of this splendid military drama. The Scotch men's enthusiasm will know no bounds when the Highlanders appear in the distance, bringing help to the beleaguered garrison, and the Scotchmen are playing the "Campbells are Coming."

The action of the piece is accompanied by a grand pyrotechnic display.

Bismarck Dead. Prince Bismarck, the greatest son of the "father-land," died on Sunday morning at his palace at Friedrichsruhe. The prince was born April 1st, 1815. The greatest event of his most wonderful and brilliant career was the unification of the petty states of Germany into the great and powerful nation of to-day. He was brave and heroic in everything he undertook. He thought wisely, acted promptly and effectually, and made but few mistakes.

His death is mourned by both Emperor and people alike - the former on account of a former antagonism for a time, is now particularly lamenting the loss of so great a subject.

Bismarck has not been in active politics for years, so his death will have little or no influence upon the general European policy.

The courteous and considerate treatment accorded by the American troops to the Spanish prisoners, that have already surrendered in Cuba, will not be without reward in the final stages of the conquest. Spanish troops will, perhaps, still fight hard for "honor's sake," but a surrender to a brave and merciful adversary is preferable to a suicidal fight against vastly superior forces, and a combat to the "bitter end" will probably be avoided.
