Eggs and More Eggs

For many years Canada produced more eggs than we needed and were able to make large shipments abroad. We kept on increasing our poultry but at the same time our towns and cities were growing in size and the consumption of eggs increased more rapidly than the production. The result was, that our exports gradually disappeared, and strange to say, Agricultural Canada became an egg importing country. People were surprised to learn through the press that shipments came in, some times from Russia and frequently from China, two of the greatest egg-producing countries in the world. Of recent years enormous quantities of cold storage eggs from the United States have been brought in to make up for our deficiency. Since the war broke out the foreign supplies for Great Britain have been seriously interfered with. Trade with Russia has been largely cut off. There was, therefore, an opportunity for the shipment of Canadian eggs to Great Britain. In the patriotism and production campaign of last year it was stated that there would be a deficiency of 100,000,000 dozen eggs in Great Britain, thus opening up an enormous market to Canada. In addition to the regular consumption there has been an increasing demand for strictly fresh eggs for hospital requirements. The call for fresh eggs has been as insistent as the call for socks and Red Cross funds. Canadian eggs inspected and graded have found a ready market. This market can be held during the war and after the war if we are ready to take advantage of it. Particular attention is given to this question in The Agricultural War Book for 1916. The outlook as to demand and prices is such as to warrant our people in giving consideration to it. Thousands of families that do not keep fowl have here an opportunity. Instructions and suggestions are available in every Province. The Dominion Department of Agriculture has a number of very valuable bulletins and every Province of Canada has a well organized Poultry Branch ready to give advice. It is a most interesting problem. The United States calculations are that the American hen on the average lays 70 eggs per year. Our Canadian hen, partly from climatic reasons, falls short of this, some calculate by at least 20 eggs. The profitable flock should show an average of at least 120 eggs. The work carried on in developing bred-to-lay fowl and the results of egg-laying contests upon a most interesting field. The record is today held by a hen in Delaware. This hen laid no less than 314 eggs in one year. Last year the Canadian hen did her duty, the biggest ever—she laid eggs to the value of 30,000,000. She can do much better if we give her a chance. There are thousands of families in villages and towns that can keep a small flock at very little expense, thereby serving their own table and helping to increase the exports. Even with eggs we can help finance the war. Meat prices are advancing and the cost of living is going up. Only a half dozen eggs every day will be a great help for the home table. Perhaps, in addition, you can put away half a dozen for use next Fall and Winter.

Production and Thrift

"CANADA from her abundance can help supply the Empire's needs, and this must be a comforting thought for those upon whom the heavy burden of directing the Empire's affairs has been laid. Gain or no gain the course before the farmers of Canada is as clear as it was last year—they must produce abundantly in order to meet the demands that may be made and I believe this to be especially true in regard to live stock, the world's supply of which must be particularly affected in this vast struggle. Stress and strain may yet be in store for us all before this tragic conflict is over, but not one of us doubts the issue, and Canadians will do their duty in the highest sense of that great word."—HON. MARTIN BURELL, Minister of Agriculture.

General Villa

El Paso, Texas, April 11—The three leaders of the Diaz plot to seize Juarez and overthrow the Carranza garrison there last Sunday were executed by the firing squad in Juarez early today.

They were Nichols Chavazaria, Jose Inez Bornel and Florencio Hernandez. The condemned men confirmed the plot before they were executed.

Queretaro, Mexico, April 11—The war department announced today it had reason to believe Francisco Villa had been killed in action, and that searching parties had been sent out to find his body.

BRAVE CONDUCT OF STAN BAULD.

(A. Mackenzie's cable to the Ottawa Free Press.)

London, April 8—Among the many narrow escapes in the recent warm fighting along the Canadian front, Major Bauld's is prominent. Major Bauld and Bauld, the adjutant of the 25th Battalion, and a guide, were inspecting a new position well behind the front lines, when the Germans spotted them and rained high explosive shells around the little group.

The third shell fatally wounded Bauld, temporarily knocked out the adjutant and guide, and

wounded Bauld in two places. An ugly fragment, striking over the heart, cut his pocket case, but was diverted by a cheque book in an inner pocket, which it riddled, skinned the vital organ, making an ugly but non-fatal wound.

The adjutant and guide staggered to a distant point for stretcher bearers. "Take Bauld first," Bauld murmured as the bearers went to raise him. "I'm all right." Bauld today is making a quick recovery in a London hospital.

KENTVILLE BOARD OF TRADE HOLDS IMPORTANT SESSION

The Kentville Board of Trade which is a wide-awake, progressive body held a very interesting session in Town Hall Friday evening, 14th inst. President Blair presiding. After the reading of the minutes for the last regular and council meeting the following matters of importance were brought before the Board:

Report of Exhibition Committee—Counties of Annapolis and Hants had been written to and delegates arranged to wait on County Councils to secure their assistance and cooperation.

Some misunderstanding seemed to exist with the Hants Council in regard to the attitude of this Board in holding the Exhibition here. After some discussion it was resolved that the President go to Windsor and confer with the Council, etc., in order to remove any misunderstanding that may have arisen between them and the Kentville Board.

Horse Show Committee—J. R. Webster reported for the Horse Show Committee. Subscription lists had been circulated, and prospects were bright for a good prize list.

Shortage of Paper—A communication was read from the Trade and Commerce Department re shortage of paper material—a notice of which appears elsewhere in this paper.

Federation of Boards—Letters from Digby, Annapolis, Berwick and Windsor Boards were read endorsing the movement for Federation of the Boards of Trade of the Western Counties.

Sheep Raising—A communication from the Live Stock Department of Agriculture at Ottawa was read approving of the campaign of sheep raising in this Valley and promising that a competent man would be forthcoming about the 1st of August, to assist in every possible way in the promotion of this important industry.

Advertising for Tourist Trade—R. U. Parker, brought to the attention of the Board the importance of advertising for the Tourist Trade, and outlined a scheme for "Letter Writing Week"—April 24th—29th. Some time during this week let every individual write one or more letters to friends or relatives in New England and other parts of the United States, writing them to come here. By exercising our love of patriotism and land of ours we can make this the biggest get-together movement in the history of the County. Support had been promised by other Boards of Trade, County and Halifax papers.

Mr. George E. Graham, General Manager of the Dominion Atlantic Railway offers \$25.00 at any point (excepting Halifax) on the line of the D. A. R., who is responsible for the greatest number of letters written in any one school department by pupils, teachers, etc., and another \$25.00 to the local branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society, located in the same territory, which reports the greatest number of letters written by its members. Further particulars may be obtained by writing Mr. George E. Graham.

It was suggested that the Boards of Trade be sponsors for this movement. Motion passed that this movement be endorsed by the Board and that the tourist committee be appointed to take charge of it.

Dr. W. B. Moore, on motion, was added to Tourist Committee as chairman. Meeting adjourned.



112th BATT. WILL MOBILIZE AT WINDSOR FOR A FEW WEEKS

Will Then March to Aldershot For Camp Training

The 112th Battalion has been recruited to considerable over strength there now being 1500 men. The men were contributed from the following centres:

Windsor, (headquarters) 367
Kentville 145
Middleton 142
Digby 133
Methegan 54
Yarmouth 120
Shelburne 101
Liverpool 68
Bridgewater 152
Lunenburg 58
Chester 80
Methegan's contribution of 54, being all French Acadians, were transferred to Colonel D'Aigle's French Acadian Regiment with headquarters at Moncton. A draft of 25 of the 112th recruits was also transferred to Colonel Miller's Forestry battalion.

The detachments have been in training where they were recruited, as above. Instructors in musketry and other lines of fighting were obtained from Montreal and distributed among the various centres; and a special class in bayonet fighting and physical drill organized at Yarmouth.

Colonel Tremain has obtained permission of the department to concentrate the 112th at Windsor for several weeks training preparatory to camping at Aldershot; and he will immediately devote himself to this duty. The addition of 1,500 men to the population of Windsor will create stirring times in that historic town (for a century or more famous at the seat of King's University).

One of the first problems to be solved is what to do with the excess 500 men. The colonel is strongly in favor of making the 112th into a battalion regiment. This would be the only two battalion Nova Scotia regiment to date and would, of course, vastly add to its prestige and popularity. Unless this is done, the surplus 500 men will necessarily be transferred to bring other battalions up to strength, or sent overseas as drafts.

After a few weeks at Windsor the whole Battalion will march from Windsor to Camp Aldershot in full marching accoutrement. This will be the first march of the kind over a 25 mile stretch ever undertaken by such a large body of soldiery in Nova Scotia. It is expected the hike to Aldershot will be accomplished in one day. It will be a gala day all along the route the march takes place.

The 112th is a remarkably fine body of soldiers and will be a credit to the Province.

The Olympic With 5,785 Officers and Men Has Arrived in England

Ottawa, April 16—It is officially announced, through the Chief Press Censor's Office, that the troopship Olympic, which sailed from Canada on April 5, has arrived safely in England. She has on board the following troops:

59th battalion, 36 officers and 1,073 men; 61st battalion, 36 officers and 1,091 men; 67th battalion, 34 officers and 1,045 men; 71st battalion, 35 officers and 963 men; No. 4 Seige Battery, 6 officers and 212 men; Ontario Military Hospital, 27 officers and 81 nurses; Ammunition Column Eleventh Howitzer Brigade, 3 officers and 108 men.

Drafts: Horse Artillery, 2 officers and 150 men; Mounted Rifles, 4 officers and 200 men; R. C. R., 1 officer and 180 men; University Contingent for Princess Patricia's, 5 officers and 250 men; Medical, 16 officers, 227 nurses and 154 men.

Miscellaneous: Veterinarians, 21 officers; Advance Party Lumberman's battalion, 2 officers, 15

men Detail 2 officers 1 nurse and four men. Grand total 5,785.

Shortage of Paper Material.

Save your waste paper and Rags

The attention of the Department of Trade and Commerce has been called to the fact that there is a serious shortage in Canada of raw material for the manufacture of paper, including rags and old papers.

A very large quantity of different kinds of paper and paper-board is manufactured every day in Canada and a large proportion of this, after it has served its purpose, could be used over again in making some class of paper. Much of it, however, is either burned or otherwise wasted, and has to be replaced by new raw material.

It is of great importance now that this waste should be stopped and that the saved material should be used to reproduce first supplies. In this way new raw material could be conserved and substantial sums realized from otherwise wasted material.

The Department of Trade and Commerce is glad to bring this matter to the careful attention of the public. A little attention to the saving of rags and hold papers will mean genuine relief to our paper industry and a diminishing drain upon our sources of supply for new materials.

The rags and paper thus saved can be readily disposed of through the usual channels of collectors and dealers in these articles, and through the industrial department of the Salvation Army in the principal cities.

(From the Evening Mail.) Sir.—It is a sad commentary upon the efficiency of civic government, when the solicitor for Halifax boldly proclaims the fact that the city Cannot Enforce its Laws. Sadder still is it to see honorable men come forward, men who personally have no excuse for liquor, whose private life is the strongest argument against liquor; and yet making a plea for the "trade" on the paltry ground of a few dollars revenue for the city.

The patent reason for this humiliating condition is that poor rum-rummed Halifax is so controlled by a bunch of booze sellers, that there is not a ward in the city, with one possible exception, where a man has a ghost of a chance to win an election, if he has the liquor element arrayed against him. This is practically what the city solicitor throws up to E. D. King. The coat-of-arms of Halifax today does not bear the motto: "E mare magis" but:—"Licensed to sell spirituous and fermented liquors." This is no secret. The people of the province see their capital rum-rummed; and are angry. The men of the city know it, and are humiliated. Murray's Government must admit it, and so crawl in the dust, and Finn must realize it, and dance as the strings are pulled, or lose his next election.

And the pity of it all is, that

it is so unnecessary. Had Mr. Murray, three years ago, abolished licenses in Halifax, and spent the remainder of his term in ruthlessly enforcing the Act; there would be no bunch of wealthy liquor men to hold him up today. But now he is fearfully between the devil and the deep sea; and to him must come the sad reflection that the devil is of his own toleration and nurture, and creature of his own timidity and woeful neglect.

GERMANS BLAME KAISER AND SON.

From stories told by German prisoners, by accounts of neutrals, and by studying German newspapers, it is possible to obtain reasonably correct information concerning some aspects of the war. The Paris Journal by adopting these means has reconstructed an interesting story of the German plans with regard to Verdun. It learns that the German people are now beginning to realize that their army failed signally at Verdun, and that the French lines there are as strong as they were a month ago; that the main attack has been practically abandoned, and that the responsibility for the failure rests upon the Kaiser, the Crown Prince, and General von Haeseler and General von Deimling. The belief that the Kaiser and his son are great military gen-

uses, a belief that was universal in Germany 18 months ago, is disappearing. There are hints indeed that the Kaiser and his son are nuisances; that they are much worse than mere figureheads, because they have enough assurance to alter or reject the plans of the General Staff and decide upon their own initiative what course is to be pursued.

England Shipping Tomatoes.

It appears that notwithstanding the war, some articles of food are cheaper in Great Britain than in the United States and Canada. During March some 8,000 sacks of English potatoes have arrived in Cuba and there are 20,000 sacks more on the way over. There are being sold in Cuba at a considerably lower price than American potatoes.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (not not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

As settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months out of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$3.00.

The act of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
