



INFLUENZA, 1920 The Metropolitan Life issues an in teresting little brochure dealing with the epidemic of influenza during the past winter. The most mark ed characteristic was that in the epidemic of last year the young and middle-aged suffered most severely while in 1920 early youth and old age seemed to be hit the hardest by the disease, and pnuemonia succeeding the influenza was the cause of carry ing off a very large number of people Dealing with general health condi-tions, the pamphlet says that the length of life of their industrial polcyholders on the average seems be reduced by about three and a half years in the case of white males and about five years with colored pol icyholders. The average life expect ancy of their white males appears to be about 46 years, and if tuberculosis could be eliminated, the average life time would be over 49½ years. They sum it up in these words, that if tuberculosis could be eradicated, more years would be added to the average lifetime than have been add ed to it by all the sanitary improve ments of the past century.


One great fact is that tuberculosis ould be eliminated absolutely, if the disease were treated as it should be treated by absolute quarantine of the individual under such circum stances as would prevent others be ing exposed to the disease, and as would give the patient himself the greatest possible chances for recov-ery. 



NATURAL GAS DEVELOPMENT

The first discovery of natural gas in the Province of Alberta of which we have record, took piace in May, 1884, at Alderson, a station on the main line of the C.P.R., 35 miles west of Medicine Hat. The railway constructon gang, boring for water, structs a heavy pocaet of gas at a depth of 1,300 feet. A little later in the same year, gas was also discovered at Cassiis, 6 miles lurther west, but while this well soon choked, that at Alderson continued to flow for

Lany years. In 1850, Medicine Hat, then but a small town, sank a well and found a small supply at 700 feet; four years later another attempt was made, and history tells how at the eleventh history tells how at the eleventh hour, with money all spent—facing bankruptcy—and despa) and gloom in the hearts of the mayor and city council, a sensational flow was uncovered at a depth of twelve to thirtech hundred feet. The cheap, ap-parently unlimited fuel supply, both for commercial and domestic pup-poses, is largely accountable for that city's growth and present prosperous condition condition.


There are several known gas fields in the Prov.ncc of Alberta, but as yet only two have been utilised tor com-mercial purposes to any cons derable extent, namely, the Medicine Hat and extent, namely, the Medicine Hat and Bow Island Fields. Bow Island lies on the railway line about half way between Mediicne Hat and Leth bridge, 180 miles south-east of Cal-

gary. In 1912 the supply was piped into the city of Calgary. as well as dis-tributed en route to the city of Leth-
