PARLIAMENTARY SESSION OPENS

With impressive ceremonies fally in keeping with the traditions of pre-war days and significant of the Vice-Regal relations associating Canada with the Empire throne, the fifth session of the thirteenth Parliament of Canada was opened Monday afternoon, February 14th, by His Excellency, the Governor-General. The function was in marked contrast to the less formal proceedings of the opening sessions in war years. The newly completed Senate Chamber was occupied officially for the first time, and accommodated one the most distinguished gatherings ever assembled at an opening of Parliament-guests particularly representatives of the diplomatic, parliamentary, professional, military, governmental and commercial circles. In contrast war years, there was a marked evidence of the return to more sombre shades of the formal, military and state dress. The brilliant war service of the soldiers in attendance on the Governor General was fittingly reflected in the array of decorations and medals, most of which were being worn for the first time by the recipients privilege incidental to "review order dress. And the gowns of the ladies were wonderful. Black seemed to predominate, both for debutantes and matrons, but there were plenty of bright colors. Although the majority was in evening dress, it did not seen incongruous, as the electric lights in the Senate Chamber made it

The House of Commons as sembled punctually at 3 o'clock, and after prayers and a few matters of routine, awaited the summons of his Excellency. This came in due order, as a loud rap on the main door to the Chamber indicated. The Sergeant-at-Arms hastened to the entrance to ascertain what all this noise was about. Presently he returned to the Chamber and addressing Mr. Speaker reported that a messenger from the Senate awaited admission. Mr. Speaker ordered that the messenger be admitted. Thereupon Col. A. J. Chamberlain, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, marched in, and after most punctiliously executing his bows, announced to Mr. Speaker, in English and French, that his Excellency, the Governor-Ceneral requested the attendance of the Commons in the Senate Chamber and then withdrew, in the same ceremonious manner in which he had entered, amid the applause of the members Led by the Sergeant-at-Arms the Speaker and members proceeded to the Senate Chamber where his Excellency, seated on the throne, read the Speech in English and French.



Rules Relating to Private Bills. 36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the season ex-plusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38/ A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of very Session consisting of five embers of whom three shall be quorum, to be denominated.
