A French Opinion.

Correspondence of the Army and Navy Journal.
Paris, May 23, 1864.

The *Messiah* of France draws a comparison between the present war and that which may be called "the Messiah." It remarks that the United States commenced fighting with the latter, and that the only thing which was new in the present war was the individual courage and political passion, which could not make up for all that was wanting. "An army is not an assembly of men, of horses, and of guns; these are but constituent portions of a force. Permanent armies have a head, a body, a heart, and a soul; they think, they act, and a mysterious fluid circulates in their veins which gives them force, both moral and physical. The American army is ignorant of the real strength of permanent armies where the military chief arrives at supreme power progressively, accustomed to authority and moral responsibility. All his measures, even the most painful, are executed with a calmness that justifies and purifies even acts of violence. Political passions, and the other by that miracle war has been lost on American soil, destroying in an hour a time all right, justice, and liberty and even pity. Families and fortunes have never suffered in Europe as they have done in America, in the moral and political sense. Ignorance. There nothing can be seen but deserted towns, abandoned fields, and marks of vengeance. The only thing that is protecting the Americans was a permanent army, and this was rejected. Directly words proved of its value the hour of action arrived, and two hostile factions rushed at one another. Five days' unceasing battles without result, lasting some hours, and ending in scenes of carnage." The French also write the observations with regard to America point out that where permanent forces are maintained, war does not lead to the destruction of the whole framework of society. Battles are left to professional gentlemen, who carry them on as a trade, and the permanent forces pursue their ordinary occupations. Industry and war both gain by this system. The former is not entirely neglected, and the latter, waged on more scientific principles, is less sanguinary.

The New Atlantic Cable.

A London paper thus describes the new Atlantic Telegraph Cable—
It is to be conducted in a copper strapping, consisting of seven wires, six lead coated and weighing 300 lbs. per nautical mile, imbedded for solid in Chatterton's compound. The conductor in the old cable was gutta serena, laid on in three coverings, and weighing 300 lbs. per knot; in the new it is gutta serena, and the gutta serena is covered with four layers of Chatterton's compound. The weight of the entire insulation is 400 lbs. per nautical mile. The old cable weighed 450 lbs. (No. 13 gauge) were drawn from Webster & Horsfall's homogeneous iron, each wire measured separately with five strands of Manila yarn, saturated with a preservative compound, and the whole laid spirally around the cords, which latter is spliced with ordinary iron, saturated with a preservative mixture.
