



## A Judge and His Court

The Judge carries his court with him wherever he goes. We have examples of this from time to time in England, such as the court recently held in a cab by a metropolitan magistrate. Then there is the classic instance of Sir Lancelot Eldred, the last Vice-Chancellor of England, who heard an urgent application while taking his morning dip in the Thames at Barnes and gave his decision and granted an injunction while alternately treading water and floating on his back.—From the London Chronicle.

## Gyroscope Danger in Flying.

The gyroscope, the complex "spinning top" which balances the single wheel train, has certain dangers when applied to ships or aeroplanes.

M. Delagrang, before his fatal accident, noticed that the rapid revolutions of the motor of his aeroplane produced a gyroscopic effect, making his machine so stable in the air that he had to slow down to ascend or descend. It is pointed out by M. Rene Gasnier in L'Aerophile that on the day of his accident a gust struck the machine and buckled a wing, as the gyroscopic effect prevented any resiliency.

A gyroscope in a torpedo-boat is said to have had a similar effect. The boat rolled very little, but the shock of the waves was so great that the gyroscope was abandoned.

## Deakin Praises Kitchener's Plan.

"I Will Help Australia to Assist the Empire to Stand Against the World."

Sydney, N. S. W., Feb. 16.—Premier Deakin, in a speech delivered yesterday, stated that the military scheme which has been devised by Lord Kitchener would make the Defence Act much more effective.

The scheme, he said, would come into operation immediately. Preliminary arrangements and appointments were being made.

Lord Kitchener's arrangement, the Premier declared, was devised to prevent bloodshed and invasion, and to enable Australia to stand for herself in the Empire, and to assist the Empire to stand against the world.

Hon. Joseph Chamberlain Unable to Write His Name or Hear the Oaths.

London, Feb. 16.—For the first time since he was stricken with paralysis years ago, Joseph Chamberlain put in an appearance at the House of Commons yesterday afternoon and took the oath as a member of the new Parliament. The advent of the tariff reformer was unexpected and afforded a dramatic surprise for the officials and members who were being sworn in. Mr. Chamberlain walked with marked difficulty, being assisted by his son, Joseph Austen and Lord Morpeth. Mr. Chamberlain advanced to a front seat before the bench, where the oath was administered. When the members roll was

placed before him for his signature he required the aid of Austen, who signed the name for his father, the latter appended his mark. Still supported on either side, Mr. Chamberlain moved to the speakers chair and shook hands with Mr. Lowther, after which he made his way slowly from the chamber within which so many stirring episodes of his life have occurred.



He was unable to move without assistance and but haltingly whispered the words of the oath after his son had spoken them in his father's ear. "If I ever marry and have children," a man said to me the other day. "It's an old joke you know that a man always says, 'If I marry,' and a woman, 'When I marry.' There is one thing that I am sure going to do that is teach them as soon as they are able to think at all to begin to think about what they want to do when they grow up."

"Of course, they'll go through a good many stages before they find out what they really want. **Rich Find of Iron.**

Maas's Discovery May Be the Greatest in the History of Marquette.

Republic, Mich., Feb. 19.—A discovery of ore which may prove the greatest in the sixty years of the Marquette iron range has been made ten miles west of Ishpeming by George J. Maas of Negaunee, Mich. An immense deposit has been found by diamond drills.

Some ten years ago Mr. Maas discovered at what is now the Maas mine at Negaunee the largest single body of ore so far developed in the Marquette district. Now he has surprised that find. He struck hard specular ore 383 feet below the surface, continuing unbroken for twenty feet.

Beneath this deposit is a formation of mixed specular and Jasper and at a depth of 500 feet hard hematite ore. The drill passed through seventy-two feet of solid ore and then entered a dike for ten feet, the ore reappearing at that depth and continuing unbroken to a point 623 feet beneath the surface, making in all 116 feet of hematite.

Mr. Maas figures that on the present showing there are not less than 15,000,000 tons of hematite alone and not less than 237,000,000 tons of mixed ore which can be concentrated.

**Collision With a Comet**

Sir Robert Ball recently published in the Times the text of a reply he has sent to an inquirer who expressed alarm as to the possibility of a collision with the comet. The letter ran as follows:

"My dear—A rhinoceros in full charge would not fear collision with a cow! and the earth need not fear collision with a comet.

"In 1801 we passed through the tail of a comet and no one knew anything about it at the time.

"For a hundred million years life has been continuous in this earth, though we have been visited by at least five comets every year. If comets could ever have done the earth any harm they would have done it long ago, and you and I would not be discussing comets or anything else.

"So far as I can learn we may be in the tail of Halley about May 12; and I sincerely hope we shall.

"I think Sir John Herschel said somewhere that the whole comet could be squeezed into a portmanteau."

**Explosion Kills Five.**

OAKLAND, Cal., Feb. 17.—An explosion in the mixing room of the Rogan Powder Works at San Lorenzo, today, cost the lives of chemist Robin T. Harp, and four workmen, and caused a property loss of \$60,000. Four other employees were seriously, if not fatally, injured, and a dozen more, including Superintendent Martins, were severely burnt and bruised. Twenty-five buildings made up the plant. Fire followed the explosion and ten of these buildings were burned. The explosion wrecked neighboring buildings and hurled one of the mixers hundreds of feet through the air. The injured pinned under collapsed buildings, were threatened for a time with incineration, until spectators assisted by the police, dragged them from the ruins.

**Rule of the First-Born.**

It will be observed that the cable message to-day attributes to three members of the Ministry the desire to make membership of the House of Lords elective. Yesterday we drew attention to the report of the House of Lords Select Committee, of which Lord Rosebery was chairman, which reported in December, 1908, in favour of modifying the almost exclusively hereditary character of the House of Lords.

The modernity of the hereditary title may be perceived from a glance at a compilation made by the Liberal Magazine in February, 1907. Out of the 617 Lords of Parliament, 524 sat by a qualification which was hereditary. The century of the creation of their titles is as follows:

Thirteenth	8
Fourteenth	8
Fifteenth	6

Eighteenth	101

Twentieth	40

The author of the compilation declares that "the 524 hereditary peers now in the House, four-fifths have been created since 1750, more than three-fifths since the beginning of the nineteenth century, and more than one-half in the nineteenth century alone."

The Liberal Ministry of the day, speaking through its leader in the House of Lords, Earl Crewe, declined to associate in the work of the committee on the ground that the relation of the houses was the crux of the difficulty and not the composition of the membership of the House of Lords. This is apparently their main attitude to-day. Curiously enough even this Conservative Committee placed on record that "The Committee feel that the party in power in the elected chamber should be able to count upon a substantial following in the House of Lords." This is an admission of the charge that a Liberal Government is always in a minority in the House of Lords, whatever its majority in the House of Commons may be.

The present position appears to be:

- (1) The Conservatives propose to reform the composition of the House of Lords, but they are not urgent about curbing its power.
- (2) The Liberals wish to make the House of Lords impotent on finance, and to limit its power of vetoing other legislation to some fixed period, after which it shall cease.
- (3) The Nationalists demand that the veto limitation shall be attempted immediately.
- (4) The Laborites care for none of these expedients. They want to abolish the House of Lords, root and branch, as a parliamentary chamber.

Morris from Fox Harbor for a road; by Mr. Watson from New Donaventure for a wharf; by Mr. Clapp from Cape Norman to be made a port of call; by Mr. Devereaux from Harbor Buffett for a road, from St. Mary's Bay for a light and fog alarm on Colinet Island; by Mr. Clift from Exploits Harbor on education and from Botwood Harbor about a wharf; and by Mr. Kent from Pouch Cove praying that pellars be prohibited from taking fish in barter from juveniles.

The Col. Secretary tabled the P. M. C.'s report. Mr. Watson informed Mr. Clapp that Josiah Gosse had not been instructed to make expenditure for the relief of distressed fishermen.

Bills to permit females to practice law; to prevent dumping of ballast in harbours; to extend the jurisdiction of magistrates; to compel the payment of wages at stated times; to amend Dental Act; to deal with constitution of Game Board were read a first time.

The Municipal Resolutions were carried "in the affirmative."

The Crown Lands Bill was read a third time. The Wool Bounty Bill and the Education Bill passed the second reading.

Sir Robert Bond gave notice asking for the tabling of the Customs returns at Trinity for the first half of the year.

The House adjourned till Monday at 3 p.m.

### DALAI LAMA DEPOSED.

Special to Evening Telegram.

PEKIN, Feb. 25.—The Chinese Government has deposed Dalai Lama as head of the Tibet Government, and in an official statement issued to-day explaining its action on the ground that the nominal ruler has deserted the capital after an attempt by him to organize a general revolt. The official statement follows the Dalai Lama upon his arrival at Lhasa from Pekin, circulated with the object of organizing a general revolt these rumors:—First, that China intended to exterminate Lamaism; and second, that British trade was injuring Tibet. The Dalai Lama then took measures to thwart this trade, whereupon China became alarmed and ordered two thousand troops to go to Lhasa with the object of preserving peace and affording protection. The Pekin Government ordered Chinese residents to reason with the Dalai Lama, who refused to listen, and on the 12th secretly left Lhasa with his followers. The residents searched ineffectually, whereupon China deposed the Dalai Lama, ordered the Tibetans to elect his successor, issued a decree ordering the protection of Lamaism, and the strict observance of the existing treaties with foreign powers.

The crew of the s.s. Viking will sign on for the seal-fishing in the Gulf next "Thursday." She will sail for Channel next Saturday.

The s.s. Kite, Capt. W. Carroll, will sail for Channel to clear for the seal-fishing in the Gulf next Thursday morning. Her crew will sign next Tuesday.

**RACE PROJECTED.**—Should the weather hold frosty next week and next "Thursday," the "hill" will "roll" on Channel next Saturday.

Mr. Pete Curran, the ex-Labour M. P., who was defeated in Jarrow, has been ordered to cancel all public engagements and take a complete rest. He is suffering from liver and kidney trouble, which may necessitate an operation.



### Asquith's Perplexities.

How Will He Get Through Them?

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Premier Asquith's predisposition to extreme reaction makes a judgment of the political situation a matter of great difficulty. While it is easy to see by the numerous prolonged cabinet meetings that the Government is facing grave problems, it is not easy to forecast the issue. Several conferences of the Cabinet have already been held and another Cabinet council has been summoned for to-morrow. But for the fact that no party or group in the House of Commons wants another general election at present, the ministry's term of office would not be worth many weeks purchase. The Liberals, Radicals and Nationalists added to the difficulty arising out of depleted party funds, fear that a general election now would be a Unionist triumph. On the other hand the Unionists are aware that time is on their side and that while the Liberal ministry is floundering alone, the Conservative-Churchill Home Reform propaganda may be pursued throughout the country to their ultimate advantage. Premier Asquith's statement that he will resign if he is not re-elected, and the bane of the difficulties facing him lies in the impossibility of reconciling the divergent views of his supporters in the manner of dealing with the House of Lords. Sir Ed. Grey, the Foreign Secretary, Chancellor Lloyd George, and Winston Spencer Churchill, Home Secretary, are said to be in favor of reforming the second chamber on the elective principle. The Radicals, led by Sir Chas. Wentworth, oppose the reform of the House and want merely to abolish all power of veto by the Lords, both financial and legislative. The Nationalists also want to abolish the Lords' power of veto, while the Laborites make a still greater demand for the abolition of the House of Lords altogether. A large portion of the moderate Liberals probably would be satisfied if the Lords were debarred from interference in the matter of finances. Amid these conflicting views, all of which are being urged upon him with the utmost vehemence, the Premier needs vigilance and resources to steer the Ship of State. The Daily Telegraph asserts that the Cabinet has abandoned all idea of reforming the House of Lords and will now direct its whole energies to limiting the veto power of the Lords. In this, the Telegraph says, the Government

will proceed by bill, not by resolution first and bill afterwards, as originally intended. This concession of the Radicals will not satisfy the Reformers, the paper thinks, because Ministers have not yet decided to put the veto question before the Budget. The Radical Chronicle partly confirms the foregoing by stating that the Government resolutions will deal with the veto, leaving the question of the Reform of the House of Lords for future consideration.






