She had two of my pictures in her room, but there was no attempt to conceal her friendship for both me and Mrs. Miller. While the evidence was only circumstantial, it was conclusive, and no right-minded individual who heard the testimony could have the slightest doubt about the identity of the slain woman. I am sure that we are the only people she knew in this vicinity, and it is certain she would not come here without visiting us. No there is nothing in it. Some other woman must be impersonating the slain actress. If Attorney Tobin of Philadelphia thinks he has her located, it would be an easy matter to have me identity her. 
