

Toronto, Nov. 3.—As the result of a scaffolding giving away at Weston this morning, three men fell eighty feet to the ground and were instantly killed. Their names are James McVey, Robert McGregor and Samuel Smith.

The accident occurred at a stand pipe, which the town of Weston is erecting in connection with the new water works system.

The men were working on the inside of the last layer of the iron tower, which is twelve feet in diameter. The scaffolding broke and they fell to the bottom within the tower.

The mangled bodies were removed to the undertaking establishment of James Gardhouse, where Dr. Charlton, the Coroner, opened an inquest to-night.

## The Evening Chit-Chat

Things cannot always go your way. Learn to accept in silence the minor aggravations, cultivate the gift of tactfulness (about them), and consume your own smoke with an extra draught of hard work, so that those about you may not be annoyed by the dust and soot of your complaints.—William Osler.

While waiting for a boat to sail the other day I amused myself by watching one of the large river dredges work.

Have you ever seen one? How foolish! Of course you have. And don't you think it is fascinating to watch the big scuttle with its wide open mouth slowly descend into the river, slowly swing up again and discharge its mouthful of mud into the scow with a precision and care that makes the thing seem almost uncanny?

"I do. I can watch that weird scow for half an hour at a time without being bored.

But on this occasion, as I started to tell you when I digressed, I observed something particularly interesting and suggestive about the mud scow.

You may learn to consume your own smoke. The scuttles there is darkened by murmurings and whimpers of men and women over non-essentials, trifles that are inevitably incident to the hurly-burly of a day's routine.

And that was the fact that while the scow was going down into the water—a process which presumably doesn't take very much power—the chimney belched forth a stream of heavy black smoke. But while the scow, filled with mud, was being slowly lifted to the surface, while every chain was straining and creaking with the weight it was lifting, there was practically no smoke coming out of that chimney.

Isn't that the way with people? Those who are really doing something, really lifting some big weight, aren't usually belching forth any useless vapors.

And those who are always just getting ready to do things can be very easily distinguished by the amount of vapor they are sending forth.

Great power is almost always quiet. It flows silently in a deep channel. It consumes its own smoke. It keeps its counsel while weakness chatters, and folds its arms and waits while weakness runs back and forth and fro in a passion of activity.

Think of someone whom you admire for strength of character and "bigness."

Isn't he or she a quiet person tending to taciturnity rather than talkativeness, to repose and restraint rather than hurry?

Isn't he like the mud scow in action, not sending forth any smoke or vapor, because he is doing something that consumes it?

And if you admire him, can't you be the same?

## Household Notes.

Salt or a little limewater added to milk will make it digest easier.

A delicious dressing for the simple lettuce salad is made of the yolk of an egg beaten up with lemon juice and seasoned with chives and a liberal amount of salt and paprika.

Before hanging out the clothes in the winter I rinse the soapuds from my hands, rub teaspoonful of vinegar over them and dry and warm them well. This treatment I find is a sure preventive of chapped hands, and helps to keep them soft and white.

I have tried rolling out my pie crust on oiled paper, and find that it works admirably. A tender crust can be lifted on the paper and slipped into the tin without breaking. Roll off the paper carefully and trim the crust around the sides afterward.

According to my grandmother's advice, I keep fruit-cakes and puddings in a stone jar with an apple. The apple shrivels without decaying, imparting its dampness to the cakes. By renewing the fruit when necessary, such a cake can be kept in proper condition a long time.

To keep fruit-cakes and plum puddings for months at a time, place them in a granite kettle, baste them well with thick strawberry syrup and thin paste two thicknesses of brown paper over the top of the kettle. The syrup imparts a delicious flavour and keeps them moist.

Never use wood alcohol in the chafing dish lamp, or the reservoir of the alcohol stove. It will soon clog the burner and cause it to sputter. Instead use denatured alcohol, which is inexpensive, a gallon costing only 60c.

cents and is clean and practically non-explosive.

Launder counterpanes by washing in lukewarm suds, using a pure white soap. Then gently squeeze out the water and rinse. While wet fasten to a clean flat surface, using pins as in lace curtains. The piece must be stretched so as to have the threads of the linen running straight. To dry padded embroidery heat is necessary.

All the tiny pieces and crusts of bread should be saved. Their uses are numerous. They can be made into puddings, dressings for meat and fish and excellent griddle-cakes. Or, if the pieces are dried in a moderate oven, then rolled and sifted, they are always ready to cover croquet's, scalloped dishes and many other things.

Knitted chenille rugs can be made out of old chenille portieres, no matter how worn they are. An old and faded brown one, much stained and discolored, was quickly raveled and wound into balls, then knit on large wooden needles to the desired size. The edge was finished with a coarse "bell-stitch" in loose crochet. No stains are visible, and the rug is much admired.

It is not generally known that King Edward for many years ran a series of card-indexes, of the kind common in all large commercial houses. ## Former Harbor Grace Boy's Bravery.

CAPT. VAL O'NEIL AND HIS CREW WIN MEDALS.

"Official recognition has been given by the French Government to the bravery displayed by Capt. Val O'Neill and crew of the fishing schooner Vancassa, in rescuing the crew of the French fishing schooner L. A. B. on the Grand Banks a year ago. Suitably inscribed medals and diplomas have reached here from Paris, and E. B. Grant, the local representative of the Department of Commerce and Labor, will see that they are presented to the heroic fishermen." — Boston Post, Oct. 28.

The above Capt. Val O'Neill is a native of Harbor Grace, and has sprung from a sea-faring family, his father being the late Capt. Denis O'Neill, an old-time seal killer and planter, and for many years in command of the brig "Curlew," bringing in many good trips of seals. On the mother side he is descended from the well-known family of Hennebury, of Barened and later of Bay Roberts. His grandfather, Capt. Richard Hennebury, was one of our most successful seal killers and merchant-planters, and had seven vessels of his own, notably the Thrasher, Estelle, Anastasia, Brighton, Fond Mother, etc. The first vessel (Thrasher) he commanded when quite a young man in the early forties of the last century, and brought in a full load of seals, and continued successful until his sudden death on board the Anastasia (brig) in the seventies, from heart failure.

At the time of the rescue of the French crew the following Harbor Gracians were with Capt. Val O'Neill: —his brother, Capt. Richard O'Neill (a most successful banking master), James Slocum, Thomas Furlong, Thomas Dugan, Thomas Clance, James Jones, John Hayes and Patrick Smalcombe.

In whatever sphere of life the sturdy Newfoundlanders may be placed, it is noted for his hardihood and bravery, and we congratulate Capt. recognition from the French Government for their heroism.

## His Narrow Escape.

Mr. F. C. Selous, the famous sportsman, who represents the Government at the International Big-Game Congress at Vienna, tells an exciting story of the narrowest escape he ever had from death. In 1878 he, with three other hunters, encountered a herd of elephants close to the Umbila River. "This herd," says Mr. Selous, "numbered some seventy or eighty animals, of which we killed twenty-two of the largest tuskers. We had a long day before we came up with the elephants, and the subsequent salping about after a time completely exhausted my horse. The fourth elephant I shot, a big bull, chased and very nearly overtook my tired horse, his terrific trumpeting sounding like an advancing locomotive. However, he just failed to catch me, and subsequently I killed him."

#### The Crippen Canard.

Our readers will observe from press messages that the Crippen canard is running riot in a section of the yellow American press. How far the canard has gained a fresh lease of life from the fact that Crippen and his victim were American subjects; how far the rumors have been galvanized into new life by the sensational press to increase the circulation of their papers; how far the canard is due to the evil efforts of minds morbidly obsessed with the wish to give the life of a man whose bad pre-eminence is almost Satanic, it is impossible to determine. It is well, however, to remember that the more scathe of the American press concur with the verdict and consider the trial a model of criminal court procedure. It is also well to remember that this canard was fully canvassed at the trial.

Here are some parts of Crippen's cross-examination by the Crown Counsel pertinent to this issue.

On the early morning of February 1 you were left alone in your house with your wife? Yes.

She was alone and well? She was.

Do you know any person in the world who has been her friend since I do not know.

Do you know of any person in the world who has ever had a letter from her since? I do not.

Do you know of any person in the world who can prove in fact that she ever left the house alive? I do not. I told Mr. Dew exactly all the facts.

Mr. Muir: Listen. In your statements to Inspector Dew you say: "I came to business next morning and went home between 5 and 6 p.m. I found she had gone." Is that right?

"If I said that to him it was probably right; I cannot trace it back now," the prisoner replied with an apologetic smile.

This was on Tuesday, February 1.

Yes.

Where did you think your wife had gone to? I supposed, as she had always been talking about Bruce Miller that she had gone there. That was the only guess I could make.

Gone to America?—Yes.

Have you made inquiries as to what steamers were going to America on or about that date?—No, I have not.

Not since your arrest?—Not at any time.

Not to find out whether some steamer had sailed for America in which there was a woman answering to the description of your wife?—I have not.

Nobody has made these inquiries?—No, sir.

Going to America in the month of February?—Counsel continued, "Did your wife take any of her furs with her?"

her?—That I cannot say. She had any quantity of furs, and any quantity of dresses.

Did she take any of her boxes with her?—I believe there is one missing. There are a lot in the house. I believe that last "fall" she bought two or three.

The Lord Chief Justice: Are you able to say whether she took any boxes? This is a most important matter.

The Prisoner: I am not able to say definitely.

"Is there a cabstand," counsel asked, "near your house?"—Round the corner somewhere, in York-road.

Did you go to the cabstand to make any inquiries?—I did not. I had no inquiries whatever, the prisoner answered hastily.

Had you neighbours?—Neighbours on both sides.

Have any inquiries been made of the neighbours to see whether a box was seen to leave your house?—I have made none.

And as far as you know none have been made?—No.

You prepared an advertisement of your wife's death for the Star?—I did two or three days before it appeared.

The Lord Chief Justice: When did you put on mourning with reference to the date of the notice of your wife's death in the newspaper?

The Prisoner: Very soon.

And you had to play the role of the bereaved husband?—Yes.

You got a letter from Dr. Burroughs?—Yes.

Dr. Burroughs and his wife were two of your wife's oldest friends?—Yes.

And you replied to that letter?—Yes.

On black-edged paper?—Yes.

In keeping with your mourning?—(No reply.)

Don't know that if you found your wife there was an end of the woe to that?—Yes.

You were advised by Inspector Dew, and it was very proper advice, to find your wife. Why did you not advertise your name?—I did not then, I could not do so after I had got out of England.

In charging the jury the judge said in this connection:—

Dr. Crippen had said that this woman left him for the most trivial and ridiculous cause, and suggested that she had gone to America to join Bruce Miller. They were not there to consider her relations with Bruce Miller. If Crippen had thought she had gone to Bruce Miller, why did he not make inquiries in that direction? They must ask themselves this question:—Why did this woman, so fond of dress and jewellery, take none of it? Why did she leave behind the bulk of her jewellery, her clothes, and her furs, which were all expensive and ornamental?

His lordship said he was not going through all the lying letters; nothing was to be gained by it. The defendant's letter to Belle Elmore's state was the most remarkable series of statements that had ever come under his notice. Was that letter possible unless he was certain his wife would not appear? The broad point they had to consider was—If Belle Elmore were in the living flesh, would even the defendant have had the courage to do what he did? The newspapers of two continents had been filled with this case, wireless telegraphy had been pressed into the case; if Belle Elmore might be alive, was it possible to think that this case had not come to her knowledge? Did the man in the dock mean to suggest that so abandoned was the woman who was his wife for eighteen years, so mean, and so abominably wicked, as to let him stand his trial for his life without making any communication?

NEW YORK, Nov. 8. The Evening Post and World, in extra editions, announces the election of John A. Dix, Democrat, as Governor of New York State. The returns are not complete.

HAVANA, Nov. 8. President Gomez, in his annual message, recommends a general revision of the tariff, especially looking to the protection of Cuban manufacturers of paper, soap and bottles. He takes occasion to point out that the health of the island is never better.

Passed a Buoy.

Capt. Parsons, of the bark, Magde, reports that on Sunday, the 23rd October, the ship passed a large buoy which had apparently been in the water since the destruction of the ship broken away. It sat very low in the water, as if part of the mooring was still attached to it. It was a small vessel or light steamer, not red and was in lat. 27° 18' N., lat. 52° 37' W. When Capt. Parsons sighted it first he thought it might have been a submarine boat in trouble. It was evidently gone adrift from some southern port, being torn away in one of the recent hurricanes, and if a small vessel or light steamer, could have been at night, it would be disastrous to them.

Three boats left here on the 23rd, all bound to the home in Placentia Bay. Off Bay Bulls they came up with the ill-fated Regulus then disabled and riding at anchor. The names of the skippers that boarded her were: Emmanuel Collins, of Flat Islands, Thomas Crocker of Mortier Bay and Alphonso Hickey of Paradise. They learned from some of the crew that there were three stowaways on board. Capt. Taylor made an arrangement with Capt. Collins to take a telegraph message to Bay Bulls. As the wind was blowing fair for the land, these men say that three boats could have taken her safely to Bay Bulls.

#### Delayed Schrs. Arrive.

The Besse Alice Masters, of Flat Island, P. B., with a load of fish for M. T. Flynn & Co., arrived last night; she was twenty-one days on the passage, fifteen of which was spent in Trepassy.

The King Bird, Capt. Forsey, also arrived from Placentia Bay, with a load of fish for Smith Co., Ltd. Another schooner to them arrived is the Commander with Capt. Collins in charge. These shipments nearly close up the western shipments for the fall.

#### Three Thousand Eight Hundred and Four Killed

Washington, Nov. 2.—"Killed, 3,804; injured, 82,374." This is the casualty record of the railroads in the United States during the year ended June 30, according to the interstate commerce commission to-day. It is an increase of 1,013 in the number killed, and 18,454 in the number injured over the previous year's figures.

There were 5,861 collisions, killing 433 persons and injuring 37,665, and damaging railroad property \$4,929,279. In the year's 5,910 derailments, 345 persons were killed and 4,815 injured. During the last three months of the year the total killed or injured was 20,850.

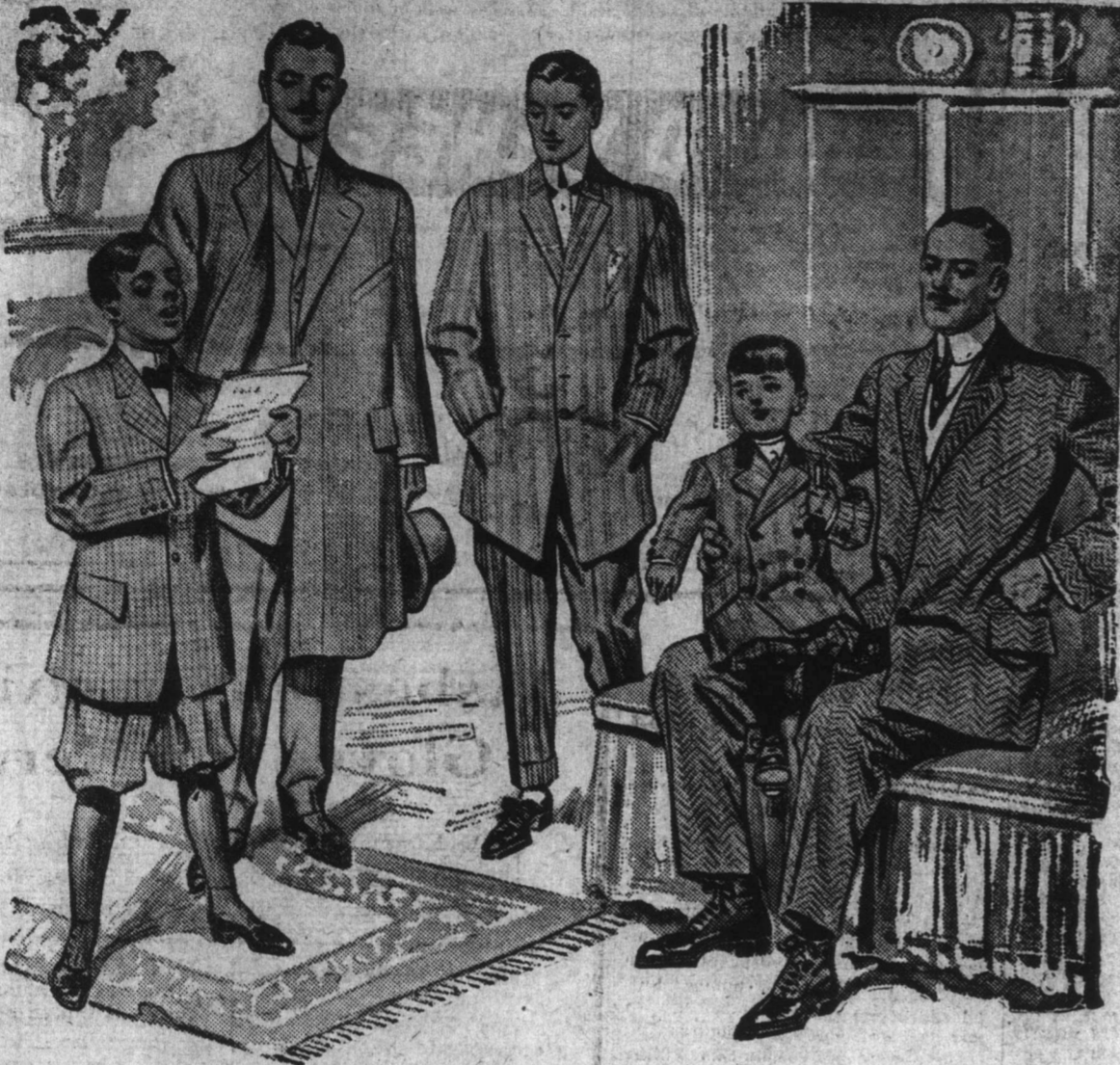

The gold shipped out during the five months of open navigation amounted to \$3,467,538.54.

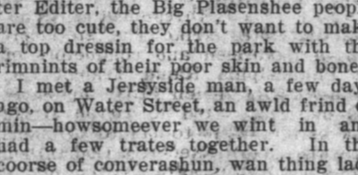

## Indignation at Trinity.

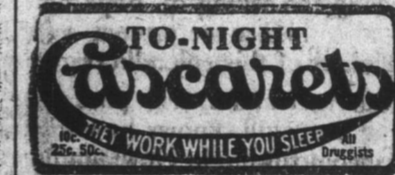

Fr. O'Callaghan. As the procession wended its way along the decorated avenue, the voices of the pupils rang out in clear, sweet tones, rendering appropriate hymns. The day was ideal—the sun, clear and unclouded, sent forth its brightest and purest beams, as if to impart a special benediction for the occasion, and an encouraging smile of approval and sympathy.

Arriving at the scene of operation, His Grace explained the nature of the ceremony he was about to perform, adding that he hoped that next spring all those present should have the pleasure of being again in attendance, when the foundation or corner stone

would be laid. He then imparted the blessing. The ceremony over, all returned to the Convent, with the hope that, in the near future, they should behold, in its completeness and beauty, the new addition to Litledale.

When finished, the new wing will lend an additional charm to the now beautiful pile—and will fill in a much felt want, as at present the good sisters are labouring under great disadvantages by reason of the limited nature of the Academy and convent, for many at present are their inconveniences, and few, very few, their comforts. The grounds and the site for the new building were tastefully decorated with hawthorn—and Litledale looked charming, as it always does. Nestling in the picturesque valley, amid wooded dales, by the laughing waters that frolic and romp by Waterford Bridge.

## Belle Elmore Canard.

Special Evening Telegram.  
CHICAGO, Nov. 8.  
Bruce Miller, of East Chicago, friend of Belle Elmore, the actress, whose husband, Dr. Crippen, is under sentence of death in London for murdering her, takes no stock in the story that the woman is alive. Miller appeared as witness in the Crippen trial to disprove the accusation that he was unduly friendly with Mrs. Crippen. "It's a canard, pure and simple," said Miller last night. "Crippen has cast insinuations that I might know the whereabouts of his wife, and I went to London to prove that I had not seen the woman for more than six years. She had two of my pictures in her room, but there was no attempt to conceal her friendship for both me and Mrs. Miller. While the evidence was only circumstantial, it was conclusive, and no right-minded individual who heard the testimony could have the slightest doubt about the identity of the slain woman. I am sure that we are the only people she knew in this vicinity, and it is certain she would not come here without visiting us. No threat is nothing in my opinion. Other women must be impersonating the slain actress, if Attorney Tobin of Philadelphia thinks he has her located, it would be an easy matter to have her identify her. But she is dead, you may rest assured of that. Then the story about her being here would have had more weight if I had not gone to explain my friendship with Mrs. Crippen. Crippen in his defence declared that instead of being dead she was in America with me. I went over on the same ship with her sister and Inspector Dewey. I went to the Crippen residence and identified my pictures. I told him everything the same as I testified. There was nothing to conceal. She is not alive. Crippen's guilt was fully established.

Special Evening Telegram.  
WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 8.  
No action is contemplated by the State Department with regard to the reports that Belle Elmore Crippen is still alive and in this country, even if the affidavit reported to have been forwarded to Washington are presented at the State Department. It is declared that it would be tendered to the British Embassy or to the English Consul in Philadelphia, as the case is considered solely within the jurisdiction of the criminal courts of England.

Special Evening Telegram.  
PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 8.  
Philadelphia is threatened with another street car strike. The late meetings of motormen and conductors of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Co., the second of which broke up early this morning, voted to go on strike at a certain hour to-day to be named by the men's Executive Committee, unless arbitrators agree on one of the points still at issue between the carmen and the company. The men, it is declared, wanted to go on strike immediately, but a strike was halted by the leaders. The point which the two arbitrators are at deadlock is the interpretation of the term "loyal men." When the last strike was settled the company reserved the right to give the preference in runs to men who had remained loyal to the company. The Union claims that this meant men who were with the company prior to the strike and who remained in its employ during the strike. The contention now is that the company insists upon recognizing as loyal employees those who were taken on during the strike, which, the men assert, means that strike-breakers are given the preference in runs to men who have broken away from the company's service for years.

It is up to the Government to reduce the duty instead of paying experts to cut peat that is useless as fuel. We had during the summer some of their best samples, and as an extinguisher its O.K.

Mr. Albert Butler, of Middle Bight, son of Mr. Ruben Butler, has been appointed teacher at the C. of E. School, Seal Cove, and is very much liked by the people there who pronounce him one of the best teachers they sent there. Your correspondent wishes Mr. Butler every success in his profession.

Mr. R. Bailey who was appointed Principal of the C. & C. School, at Codner, about three weeks ago, is giving general satisfaction. This school at Codner has been very fortunate in its selection of teachers, years, giving satisfaction to all. Then Mr. W. T. Payne was selected and did very good work for five years. Now we have Mr. Bailey, who is "keeping up his end of the plank."

Mrs. Petten, of Middle Bight, was taken to the hospital on Saturday, suffering from cancer and will undergo an operation. It is hoped that ere long Mrs. Petten will be on the road to recovery.

The farmers in this vicinity are now doing their fall plowing, repairing their fences, etc., as the "old-timers" predict a very late spring.

## Keeping Streets Clean.

We hear a great deal of discussion now and then going on about the duty of the City Council in keeping the streets of the city clean. In reading the letters on the subject, especially when the writers speak of the drains and sidewalks, one would be led to infer that dirt is caused by the people of the city, especially those who reside in the localities where streets complained of exist. This is a mistake. The dirty condition of Duckworth Street, from Prescott Street to King's Road, is caused by the outport people from "down the shore" and their ponies. They make stables for the time being of the different sections of the street, where the horses are left standing. When the owners of the horses are leaving for home they never think of picking up or cleaning away any old hay or straw, etc., that they may have left on the street or in the drains. The same thing happens in front of the doors of private residences in different parts of the city, where the outport people stand to sell produce. They make the street dirtier in ten minutes than it would be clean in the normal condition of affairs for a whole summer. They feed their horses in front of people's houses, where the street had been clean all the summer, and when the man and the horse are gone the mark of their presence is left behind them in a disagreeable and offensive manner. This should not be allowed. The City Council should either compel the pony owners to clean up the refuse or else they should make their own men clean up the dirt at once, for the habit referred to is the chief factor in keeping the streets of the city dirty where the houses are connected with the sewer.

## Erecting New Church.

Yesterday the work of erecting a new R. C. Church at Barron Island began, and the pastor, Rev. Fr. Caucio, hopes to have it finished for service by Trinity Sunday. The building will be capable of seating 500 persons. It will be very handsome in appearance and will be 90 x 34 feet. The church will have a concrete foundation and basement, will be heated with hot water and will be a commodious office. Some forty of his parishioners started in to give free labor at the church yesterday, and this number will be augmented later.

## Duke of Connaught at Cape Town.

Cape Town, Nov. 2.—The Duke of Connaught, who will formally open the first Parliament of the Union of South Africa on behalf of King George arrived here yesterday, accompanied by the Duchess and the Princess Patricia. The party received a splendid welcome.

Pending the State opening on November 4, the Parliament was convened yesterday by Lord Gladstone, Governor-General of the Union of South Africa, for the purpose of selecting a Speaker and otherwise organizing.

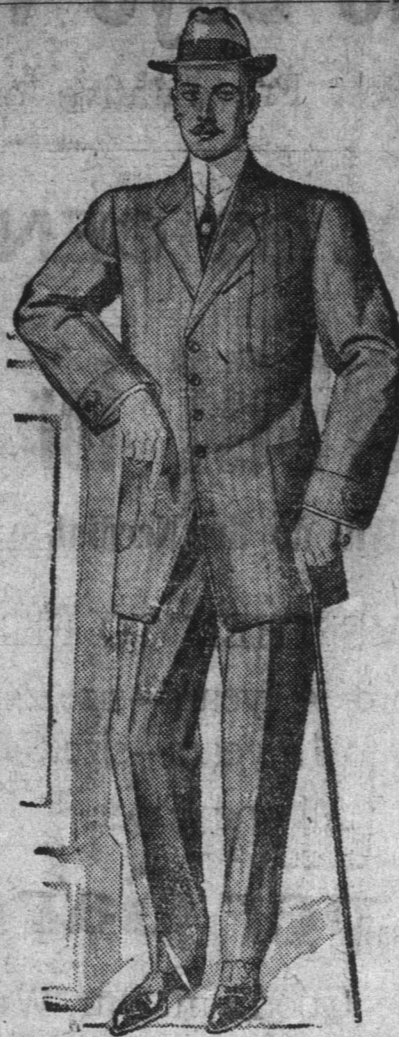
