

Star-Collegian Match.





### A Strange Story.

A man named Henry A. Smith ar-rived here by the express yesterday and during the afternoon called on Inspector General Sullivan at his office and made the following state-ment: He said he belonged to Boston, that he was a mechanical engi-neer and became acquainted at Boston with a man named Rice, who induced him to come to Newfoundland with him to fit up a pulp mill. He also alleged that Rice paid his passage from Boston, and on his way across country, before the train reached the city, he (Smith) fell asleep in the smoking room and when he awoke at the station here Rice had disappeared, as also his wallet and \$150 in cash. He said that he searched for Rice but could not find him, and he then determined to invoke the aid of the police. Mr. Sullivan then sent his man with Smith to search for Rice, but could get no trace of him. The train hands informed the police that they saw no companion with him on the cars between Port aux Basques and St. John's, and the belief of the officers is that Rice is myth and that Smith is a fakir. He prought no tools or luggage except a little bag of old apparel, and last night he was placed in the S. A. Food Depot by the police. This morning he was repeatedly called from his bed but lay in a stupor, and I. G. Sullivan had Dr. O'Connell sent there to attend him. There was nothing to indicate attempted suicide and the belief of the police is that the man suffers from epilepsy. Up to 2 p.m. he had not recovered. A policeman is still in charge of the man.

A life of vicissitudes has just terninated at Grimsby, G. B., where Robert Day Melhuish, once the principal fish merchant of the town, died a pauper in the workhouse. Beginning at Grimsby as a poor lad, Mr. Melhuish, by hard work and energy, won for himself a firm position in the fishing industry. He created the largest private business in the industry and amassed a great fortune, but he spent money as fast as he made it. His generosity was lavish. He gave large sums to every kind of charity, and often he would send his carts laden with choice fish to the poorer parts of the town, where his men distributed it broadcast.
