



The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON

Death cannot long divide. For is it not as though the rose That climbed our garden wall, Had blossomed on the other side?

There is a certain inconsistency sometimes exhibited by Christians that I cannot understand.

I wonder if it has ever puzzled you. It is this: A beloved friend has died—a mother, a father,

a husband or child. Say, for instance, a husband. The bereaved wife says, "I know my husband was a Christian. No better man lived. I know he has gone 'straight home.'"

And yet she is plunged into the deepest sorrow. Is this consistent with the professional belief of Christians in an after life vastly happier and fuller and finer than the one we are now living?

It seems to me that it is only the person who does not believe in a happy after life or who is uncertain about the dead one's fitness for such a life, who has reason to grieve this way.

You say, "But perhaps the wife is sure that her husband is happy—her grief is only for herself at losing him."

No, that can't be quite so, for how often you hear her type refer to the dead as "poor Charles." Besides, suppose the grief were wholly for herself, isn't that an extremely selfish attitude for a Christian to take—to believe that the one she loves is far happier, and yet to give herself over to rebellious and uncomprehending grief because she is separated from him for a time—a time, too, which, according to her belief, is infinitely small compared to the etern-

ity which she shall enjoy with him? "Oh, it's easy to talk, but when you've lost someone you love and the years stretch barren before you—"

Yes, I know, my friend. In the first agony of grief it is next to impossible to see anything but those barren lonesome years.

But after that first grief, don't you think you owe it to your trust in the one you have lost as one fit to be happy in the hereafter, and to your faith in Christianity as a consistent doctrine, to show by the renewed serenity and cheerfulness of your life that you believe that he is really happy and that death is only a temporary separation?

I was talking these things over with a young man who not only believes this, but has lived it through the loss of both father and mother.

"No crane was hung upon the door when my father and mother went away," he said, "just a bunch of flowers. And this is the way it should be. Nobody could miss them more than I—sometimes a million times a day. But the anticipation, the belief, the thorough confidence that there is something beyond the grave, is quite sufficient for me."

It seems to me that the Christian who does not gradually come to this state of mind is denying his faith.

It is for him, as well as for the out-and-out infidel, that Whittier sighs: "Alas for him who never sees The stars shine through the cy-

press trees! Who, hopeless, lays his dead away. Nor looks to see the breaking day Across the mournful marbles lay: Who hath not learned in hours of faith

The truth to flesh and sense unknown, That life is ever Lord of Death. And love can never lose its own."

OTTAWA, To-Day. The total immigration into Canada for April, 1911, was 51,680, as compared with 41,182 for April, 1910. The total arrivals for the month at ocean ports was 35,233, as against 24,880 during the corresponding month of last year.

LONDON, To-Day.

The Imperial Conference discussed the Government's proposal to establish a Standing Committee of the Conference, comprising the Secretary for the Colonies, Colonial Commissioners and other permanent officials. Ward and Fisher approved of the plan, but Botha and Laurier opposed it. The plan was withdrawn, Mr. H. Harcourt saying the Government did not desire to press the scheme unless the approval was unanimous.

OTTAWA, To-Day.

Two new discoveries of diamonds (one in Quebec) have been made in Canada. Mr. Johnston, mineralogist, leaves for Germany in a few weeks in connection with efforts being made to discover a satisfactory commercial process of extracting these diamonds from the chromite, in which they are found. Should such a process be found, and the laboratory staff of the survey are now working on it, it will be of inestimable benefit to Canada.

King Names More Officials for Coronation.

London, May 31.—The King yesterday made a number of special appointments of high and picturesque officials. The Duke of Northumberland, the Duke of Fife, the Duke of Abercorn and the Earl of Crawford were thus appointed respectively High Steward of England, High Constable of Ireland, and Deputy Steward of Scotland.

Among the bearers of the Royal regalia appear the names of Lord Roberts and Lord Kitchener to carry the second and third swords, while the Duke of Roxburghe is appointed to the stewards staff.

The police have issued elaborate regulations to control the crowds on Coronation Day. With the constant arrival of foreign guests, receptions, dinners and balls are being held at the Ducal Houses daily. The coming three weeks will be a whirl of social excitement. The Duke and Duchess of Norfolk gave a dinner and reception to-night in honour of the Colonial premiers.

Queen Mary's crown has just been completed. It is according to her own design with an elegant lace-like tracery wholly in diamonds, the Kokonoo being set in the center. The Crown weighs 19 ounces, the Queen having insisted that it should not exceed the weight of an ordinary hat. It will be used only at the Coronation. After that ceremony the gems will be dismantled and used in separate articles of jewelry. The King will wear his father's crown.

The death occurred yesterday afternoon, after a lengthy illness, of Mrs. Walsh, wife of Mr. John Walsh, night watchman of the Penitentiary. The deceased had been ill for many months. She was well known and highly esteemed in the East End. To her bereaved husband and family the Telegram extends its sympathy.

Imperial Conference.

The cable news to-day reports that the attempt of the British Government to form some central Imperial Organization of a permanent nature has failed. Mr. Harcourt, the Secretary for the Colonies, has withdrawn the Government scheme, as Canada and South Africa were not in sympathy with it. The membership proposed was the Secretary of the Colonies, some Colonial Office heads, and the High Commissioners of the Colonies. Their functions were understood to be purely advisory. The time is apparently not ripe for any such step, and it was withdrawn as it was not unanimously acceptable. If a small step towards Imperial centralization, in the way of a permanent consulting body, is not acceptable, the establishment of any body with powers of control for purposes of providing defence for the whole Empire would be much less acceptable. At present the only course practicable appears to be periodical conferences for exchange of views, and the strengthening of the sentiment of affection and loyalty for the King, which is at present the real tie which binds the Empire together. This sentiment will doubtless be further nurtured by the Coronation ceremonies and the visit of the King to parts of the Empire.





LONDON, June 8. The Birbeck Bank at High Holborn which withstood a run on it last fall caused by rumours that the Institution was in trouble, suspended payment to-day. The directors estimate the deficiency at \$1,875,000, but authorities think \$2,750,000 will be nearer the mark. The total liabilities of the Bank are \$34,380,910. The Official Receiver has taken charge. A petition asking that the affairs of the Bank may be wound up, will be presented to the Court, with a view to reorganizing the Bank.

LONDON, June 8. The May statement of the Board of Trade shows a decrease of \$6,499,500 in imports, and an increase of \$20,375,500 in exports. Raw materials and goods stuff show the largest increase in imports, while the principal increase in exports was in manufactured goods, to which common textiles contributed over \$10,000,000.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 8. News is brought by steamer of the annihilation of a Japanese force in Formosa, by the rebels, against whom the Japanese have been campaigning during the last three years. Three tribes, which made peace, were incited to fresh rebellion by two tribes which remained obstinate. Forty men of a force sent against the Formosans were ambushed. After fierce fighting ten escaped. The mutilated heads of the dead were carried off by the headhunters.

"The Ninth of June."

This is the anniversary of the great fire which swept St. John's in 1846, just 65 years ago. It started in Hamilton's cabinet maker's shop and burned the town to the eastward, stopping at Maggot's Cove, near Holytown. The fire burned for three days, two soldiers were killed while blowing up buildings to make a fire break and thousands were rendered homeless. The monetary loss was up in the millions.

A Strange Story.

A man named Henry A. Smith arrived here by the express yesterday and during the afternoon called on Inspector General Sullivan at his office and made the following statement: He said he belonged to Boston, that he was a mechanical engineer and became acquainted at Boston with a man named Rice, who induced him to come to Newfoundland with him to fit up a pulp mill. Tragedy of Generosity

Gave Large Sums to Charity and Dies in the Workhouse.

A life of vicissitudes has just terminated at Grimsby, G. B., where Robert Day Methuist, once the principal fish merchant of the town, did a pauper in the workhouse. Beginning at Grimsby as a poor lad, Mr. Methuist, by hard work and energy, won for himself a firm position in the fishing industry. He created the largest private business in the industry and amassed a great fortune, but he spent money as fast as he made it. His generosity was lavish. He gave large sums to every kind of charity, and often he would send his carts laden with choice fish to the poorer parts of the town, where his men distributed it broadcast. In late years he met with adversity, and ultimately became an inmate of the workhouse. His friends took him from the union and found him a cottage in the country in which to end his days, but fate was too strong for the pleasure loving old man, and he drifted back to the workhouse, where he died.

 The plaintiff on September last applied for a license to search for minerals over Thompson's Island at Parsons' Pond. Previously the deft. Thompson had applied for a submarine area on Parsons' Pond which included the Island and a license to search over the submarine and Thompson Island was granted to him. Owing to the grant of the license to Thompson of the said Island a grant license was refused to plaintiff. Hence the proceedings, the plaintiff contending that the deft. had no right under a submarine application to get a license for the Island—that he being the first applicant for the Island alone should receive the license. Sir J.S. Winter, K.C., for deft. Thompson, objected that as the property had been assigned the parties to whom assignment was made, viz., Newfoundland Oil Development Co., and the Newfoundland Oilfields Ltd. should be made parties. Mr. A. J. Herder for plif. objected that it was the duty of the deft. to add the parties. C.A.V.

Nets Cut and Salmon Stolen.

When Mr. Geo. Cook went to his salmon nets at Blackhead this morning and yesterday morning he was greatly surprised to find them ripped open with a knife, the twine being badly damaged. The heads of a number of salmon were found in the twine showing that a thief had been at work. This has put Mr. Cook to great loss and inconvenience and he will report the matter to the police.

Marine Notes.

The topsail schr. Carl, Capt. Lundegarde, arrived here at 6.30 p.m. yesterday, coming laden to W. Hynde, after a run of 33 days from Drysat. She had variable weather all the way out.

BREAKING GAME LAWS.—A merchant in the city received a letter from a West Coast resident yesterday asking him to quote a price for a quantity of tinned venison and tinned partridge that he wants to sell. This is a serious infraction of the Game Laws and the authorities should put a stop to it at once.

May Lose Right Hand.

"HERALD" EMPLOYEE SERIOUSLY HURT.

This morning at the office of the Evening Herald an employee named William Adams was seriously hurt, and as a result may lose his right hand. He was employed running the machine used for cutting cardboard for the manufacture of boxes, when it is thought, a piece of the material he used slipped down and he put his hand down to get it out and was caught in the machinery. The hand was badly mutilated and the arm also badly cut. A lad named Dyer, who worked near him, gave the alarm and the man's hand was extricated. Dr. Chaplin who was called was promptly on the scene, bound up the wound and he was sent to Hospital in the ambulance. The doctors there fear that the young man may lose his hand.

Rumoree That Guards Will Disband

A rumor went the rounds of the city to-day that the Methodist Guards had disbanded or were about to do so; but those in authority, to whom the Telegram applied for information on the matter, however denied any knowledge of such a course. A meeting of those in charge of the organization was held yesterday afternoon and certain important matters were discussed, but no further action was taken as regards the appearance of the Guards in the Coronation parade. It is not unlikely that the Guards will parade to a special service in one of the Methodist churches on Coronation Day.

ROW AT BROAD COVE.—Monday evening a fierce fight took place at Broad Cove between several male residents of the place. Some of them were pretty badly injured about the head and face, and one of them came to the police station this morning to take out amputees. He showed the scars of battle and the cases will shortly come up for hearing.

POLICE COURT.—To-day a drunk was discharged and another fined \$1 or 3 days. Several civil cases were heard in the Central District Court.
