Ravages of the Plague.



Her sole aim was to make her home as attractive as possible for her husband, but just as their happiness seemed complete by the birth of a little son. "Maggie's" health failed her. The anxiety of her parents and brothers for the recovery of their idolized daughter and sister was indeed sufficient to incite pity in the hearts of many. All that they and her husband's relatives could do to procure relief for her, both physical and spiritual, was done. The nearest doctor lived about 28 miles away, and twice did those anxious brothers, aided by friends who were ever ready to respond to a call for ssistance, walk that distance in order o acquaint the doctor of the need of his speedy arrival, each time endangering their own health, as the roads at that time were in such a condition from the heavy falls of snow as to render them almost impassable for either man or horses. After much difficulty the doctor arived, and for nine days the young mother's life hung in the balance. What days for those anxious ones at home, tortured by suspense: but unavailable were all their efforts, for on the ninth day she passed peacefully away surrounded by her friends. On Monday, the 11th. her remains were taken from her home and conveyed to the church on the south side, where the funeral service was performed by Rev. Fr. O'-Flaherty, who also spoke a few consoling words to her sorrowing relatives. As the body was slowly carried from the church the organ pealed forth in ow, sad strains, "Nearer my God to Thee," a favourite hymn of her who just then was about to be laid in her last resting place, where the earth closed over her, hiding forever from sight all that was mortal of a loving wife, a cherished daughter and idolized sister. She leaves to mourn her an aged father and mother, five brothers and one sister.
