Upon leaving the elementary school at fourteen, and passing to the trade which he has chosen, he becomes a compulsory continuation scholar, and is instructed by experts in his particular calling, while also continuing his general education. "In Munich the continuation

school is a beautiful bui ding, which it is an education in itself to work in. I thought of one of the Munich continuation schools the other day when I stood half-paralysed by the nideous vulgarities of the interior of our Victoria and Alberta 'Ait' Museum. From the electric light fittings to the door-handles the Munich continuation school building is a credit to one of the most beautiful cities in the world. The continuation schools embrace classes for all the trades of Munich. There are over fifty distinct manual training classes, equipped with everything that science can provide. Let me give one illustration to show how thoroughly the thing is done.

The answer is that the students were being taught the meaning of their bodies, and the laws of health, that they might protect themselves from the dangers attached to the making of linoleum. 



is intended that the "Empire Day" celebration shall be the outward sign of an inner awakening of the peoples who constitute the British Empire to the serious duties and responsibilities which lie at their door.

It is to be hoped that the simultaneous turning of so many minds to the problems of Empire on the same day may unconsciously lead to a thoughtful and systematic instruction of the rising generation in matters mutually interesting to British subjects in all parts of the world.

It is the moral character of the people of a nation which determines the position which such nation shall occupy in the world.

It is useless to multiply armies and fleets, to supply them with the most modern appliances of war, if the men behind the guns are ignorant of the meaning of the terms loyalty, obedience, selfsacrifice, courage, and devotion to duty.

"I am rather short for a Queen," she used sometimes to say laughingly, but her personality overtopped everything else, and all privleged to come within the range of her direct influence bear the same testimony to the royal dignity and benignity which emanated from her.

The reign of Queen Victoria will always be famous for its wonderful advances in nearly every line of progress. Whether we consider things material or intellectual, it has indeed formed one of the most memorable epochs of British history. It was a reign inspired by everwidening ideals, and added unceasingly to the sum of national happiness, national intelligence, and national morality. There was a great growth of territory and population, an expansion of industry, an extension of commerce, an advance in science, united with an increase of prudence and tolerance and kindly feeling amongst all classes.

"Poor little Queen!" said Carlyle at the time, "she is at an age at which a girl can hardly be trusted to choose a bonnet for herself, yet a task is laid upon her from which an archangel might think I am stating his case fairly shrink."

The Coronation took place on 25th June, 1838, in Westminster Abbey, and inexperienced as she was, it quickly came to be recognized that she was well-meaning and high-principled.

In 1840, on 10th February, Queen Victoria was married to her cousin, Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha.

The tastes, the aims, the hopes, the aspirations of the royal pair were the same. Their mutual respect and confidence went on increasing. Their affection grew if possible even warmer and more intense as the years advanced. Companions in all occupations, the burdens and difficulties of life were thus lessened more than by half for each one of the persons thus happily united in the true marriage of the soul.

The Queen's home-life was a busy one. Children soon added to the liveliness and interest of the household, and the family of the Prince and Queen numbered nine-four sons and five daugh-

"We have our trials and vexations," said the Queen in a letter, "but if one's home is happy then the rest is comparatively nothing."

The great calamity of Queen Victoria's life came in 1861, when the Prince Consort passed away. All her joy was shattered and all pleasure When Victoria came to the throne, railways in work was gone, and she led for a time a life of strict retirement.

### Police Kills Madman On Street.

FRENZIED MAN CHASES BOYS WITH OPEN KNIFE IN NEW

New York, May 13:-Just as the ast throng of visitors were pouring rough the gates of the Botanica ardens and the Zoological Park, at Fordham Road and Southern Bouleard, about 3 o'clock yesterday afteroon, and the current of automobiles eading for the parkway was thickest, wild cries of terror, mingled with owls of rage were heard from the shrubbery in the Zoological Park.

Patrolman Frank Anderson of the Bronx Park station, on crossing duty at the corner, who had just waved his hand to his wife and little daughter, as they passed, heard the commotion and stanted in the direction of it. He had hardly taken two steps when the crowd before him scattered right and left before the rush of we or six young fellows, hatless and panting, who burst through the bushes into the street.

. Half a dozen paces behind them ame a short, stockily built man, clad in ragged clothes, who was shouting hoarsely and brandishing a long glittering knife above his head as he ran.

Crowd Scatters in Panic. The crowd gave way in panic, knocking over women and children and left the policeman alone in the path of the man. Seeing the blue clad figure barring his way, the man hurled a heavy stone, which he carried in his hand, at Anderson's head. The missile grazed Anderson's cap and struck a man behind him.

Not having his night-stick, which patrolmen do not carry until after 4 o'clock p.m., Anderson drew his revolver as the man threw, and fired at him at a distance of a few yards. The man reeled back a step, then recovered himself and came on again, the knife poised. Anderson cooly held his fired into his breast, so close that the lothing and flesh were singed with

hand, he fell and lay still. When Anderson looked around him, the first thing his eyes fell upon was his wife, who had rushed towards when she saw his danger, and fainted dead

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
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
