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NEWFOUNDLAND AND THE CONFEDERATION.

In one of the most dreary and stormy portions of the blue Atlantic, isolated, and presenting a most unin-viting appearance, is the island of Newfoundland, the nearest part of the American continent to Europe, and soon to become, it is now almost certain, part and parcel of this Dominion. The terms upon which New-foundland agrees to enter the Confederacy are similar to those proposed by the Quebec Conference in 1864, with the exception of an increase of \$25,000 a year to be paid her in consideration of the transfer of her crown lands, mines, and minerals-in all \$175,000 for the transfer of the revenuese derived from these sources .-There are several other large sums to be paid by the general government to this little island, and altogether her annual subsidy will be \$408,922 for the purposes of local government.— This appears to be rather a heavy sum of money to pay, looking at the size of the island and its small population of 130,000-just about the number of inhabitants in Montreal; but the commercial importance of but the commercial importance of Newfounland must not be overlooked, in the City of Toronto, nor the fact that its entrance into the Confederacy must not be undervalued. As the time will come when Ca nada will be an independent nation, it is our interest to hold control over an island which commands the waters of our eastern coast, and reap the TENDERS WANTED. benefits of its enormous fisheries. So early as the beginning of the seventeenth century the great Lord Bacon gave it as his opinion that the seas around Newfoundland contained a richer treasure than the mines of richer treasure than the mines of Mexico and Peru, and this statement has since been borne out. The soil of Newfoundland is generally poorrock and sand being the chief ingredients, and where there is any show of vegetation, stunted trees are the principal feature. In the interior there is a little soil which yields fair crops, but not more than enough to crops, but not more than enough to meet the demand of home consumption. What nature denies in one re-

What nature denies in one respect she generally makes up for in another, and in her fisheries alone Newfoundland has the source of a great trade; and with a little attention its pecuniary value could be greatly increased, as the Americans well know. The internal resources of the country are also much greater than is generally supposed, for coal, ground, load, and copper mines exist in abundance—in fact the mineral wealth of Newfoundland is capable of far greater development.
