After a violent and protracted de bate the French National Assembly has rejected by a vote of 409 to 201 the petitions for its dissolution. The Assembly afterwards took the un-usual course of voting that Minister Dufaure's speech on this occasion should be placarded in every com-mune throughout France.

The following is the exposition of the arrangement made of the settlement of the Pacific question, taken from the Ot tawa Times (Government organ) :- " It uld have saved the Government much trouble and responsibility if it had been found possible to bring about the amalgamation of the two rival companies, the 'Interoceanic' and the 'Canada Pacific,' and to accomplish this object no effort on its proving impossible, negotiations were opened with leading men of both companies, and the result has been an agree ment to raise the necessary capital mit to such restrictions as will preven mit to such restrictions as will prevent the danger which has been apprehended, that the control of the road and of the lands would fall into the hands of foreigners interested in arival project. We understand that the Board of Directors is to consist of thirteen members—five from Gutario, four from Quebec; and one specially selected to represent the interests of each of the other Provinces of the Dominion. The stock will be distributed in the same proportion, it being part of the general public in each Province, the entire amount, it being understood that to no director shall be allotted more than one hundred thousand dollars worth of stock. The amount allotted to Onta rio will be rather over \$3,800,000, to Quel becover \$3,600,000, and to each of the other Provinces about \$770,000. Care also will be taken that no successful attem, it shall be made to monopolize the stock in the hands of the Directors. It has been so will be taken that no nembers of either House of Parliament will be placed on the Board, and that men of known wealth or of great railway experience, shall be undertaking. Such are the main features of the scheme, which has been concurred in by gentlemen from all parts of the Dominion and by the Government.

STORMS IN NOVEMBER. People who are fond of analogies may find some satisfac-tion in knowing that most of the great storms that have devastated Great Brit-ain and the European continent have oc-curred in November. What is known as curred in November. What is known as "the great storm" par excellence occurred on November 26-27th, 1703; another which did vast damage in London and throughout the entire country occurred on November 8th, 1800; a third raged from Durham to Corawall in November, 1821; a great storm nearly sank the allied fleets in the Black Sea on November 13-16th, 1854; the north-ast cost of Scotland was ravaged by a fearful storm on November 23rd, 1857; the conclusion of the storm in which the Royal Charter sank was experienced on November 1st, 1869; another storm caused fifty wreeks on the north-ast coast on November 18th, 1861. These are but a few of the evidences of the power of what is called the great November atmospheric wave, a phenomenon whose causes science is beginning to guess at, but whose terrible effects it will probably remain forever powerless to alleviate.
